Noblesville Police offer Halloween safety tips

The Noblesville Police Department would like to remind residents that the official designated hours for Halloween this year in the City of Noblesville will be from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 31st, 2015. Officers from the Noblesville Police Department will be paying particular attention to motorists who are not obeying traffic laws in and around residential areas where children will be expected to be walking. We would urge all motorist to exercise due care as children sometimes make sudden or unexpected movements such as darting between parked vehicles and crossing streets in locations that are not properly marked, illuminated or designated for pedestrian crossing.

We would also like to remind citizens to observe a few safety tips that will help to make this an enjoyable evening for all.

Parents:

- Make sure an adult or older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for younger children.
- Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never enter a stranger's home.
- Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.
- Establish a return time.
- Review all the appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.

• Remind children to walk on sidewalks, not in the street. If no sidewalk is available, have children walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.

• Remind children to walk, do not run. Be careful crossing yards and lawns where unseen objects or uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

Costumes and Face Design:

- Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.
- Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)

After shifting to final traffic pattern...

U.S. 31 is completely open in Westfield

The new U.S. 31 freeway in Westfield shifted to its final traffic pattern Thursday as Rieth-Riley Construction is completing a \$63 million contract for the Hamilton County corridor.

The final traffic shift, which is expected to be complete by today, opened all lanes and place traffic in a permanent configuration, bringing the new U.S. 31 Hamilton County closer to completion and enhancing safety, mobility and economic growth in Westfield.

"Upgrading U.S. 31 to freeway standards has helped open the door for Westfield to compete for national economic development projects," explains Mayor Andy Cook. "The US 31 freeway has brought Westfield about 15 minutes closer to Indianapolis and the Indianapolis International Airport. Combine that with development projects like Grand Park, and now our family-focused community is being recognized as one of the best places to raise a family."

Westfield's 400-acre Grand Park had nearly 1.4 million visits this year and booked more than 55,000 hotel rooms in Central Indiana. The U.S. 31 upgrade has assisted Grand Park's goal in creating an unforgettable experience for visitors.

Projects like the U.S. 31 freeway and Grand Park are why Westfield had a nearly 10 percent increase in assessed value in 2015.

About the new U.S. 31 in Westfield

All lanes and ramps are open from 146th Street to the State Road 38 interchange, where construction on the new U.S. 31 Hamilton County broke ground in 2011. The Westfield section is now three lanes in each direction between 146th Street and State Road 32 and two lanes from State Road 32 to State Road 38. Traffic is only able to access the new freeway through entrance and exit ramps, all of which are now open.

The project rebuilt about four miles of U.S. 31 in Westfield and created new interchanges at State Road 32 and 191st Street. Rieth-Riley completed a \$58 million contract in 2014 to rebuild about three miles of U.S. 31, construct a roundabout interchange at 161st Street and complete a split-diamond interchange connecting 146th Street, 151st Street and Greyhound Pass.

The speed limit is being posted 55 mph, but drivers are urged to drive cautiously because contractors will be finishing some work items in the area.

Construction in Carmel
U.S. 31 interchanges at Keystone Parkway, Rangeline Road, 136th Street and Main/131st Street are complete and open to traffic. New roundabout interchanges at 106th and 116th streets are anticipated to open before the end of this year.

Contractors are also making progress on the new ramps at the U.S. 31 and I-465 interchange. Work is on schedule to have all ramps open and free-flowing traffic on U.S. 31 north of I-465 before the end of this year, but some construction will continue into 2016.

Daily US 31 lane restrictions near Old Meridian Street through Nov. 3

During daytime hours through Tuesday, Nov. 3, crews plan to add the final layer of asphalt to US 31 from Old Meridian Street to just north of 136th Street. To safely perform this work, they plan to restrict various lanes of northbound and southbound US 31 in this area daily between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

U.S. 31 from Indianapolis to South Bend

The U.S. 31 Major Moves projects near Indianapolis, Kokomo and South Bend are intended to reduce congestion, increase safety and provide continuity of commerce and regional travel for a highway that stretches from Michigan to Alabama. The new U.S. 31 freeways near Kokomo opened in 2013 and near South Bend opened last year.

When the final six-mile contract in Carmel is open to traffic, a total of 32 traffic signals will have been removed from U.S. 31 between Indianapolis and South Bend, increasing safety and saving a half hour of travel time.

INDOT plans to open bids in November for a new U.S. 31 interchange to replace the traffic signal at State Road 28 near Tipton. Construction of the roundabout interchange is anticipated to begin early next year, and should open to traffic by the end of 2016.

- If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of reflective tape should be used to make children more visible.
- Avoid masks that may obstruct a child's vision. Use facial paint instead.

Motorists:

- Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians, and curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- Travel at a reduced speed (10-15 mph below the posted speed limit) especially in residential areas where it is obvious that children will be walking.

Residents:

- Leave your exterior lights on near your front door if you are participating in handing out candy. Parents/children will use this as a means to identify your willingness to participate.
- Secure any pets (outside and inside) that may become startled because of the costumes, noise, or overall increase in activities on that evening.
- Make sure that children have a clear path to and from your front door. Decorations or other Halloween displays can sometimes impede or present a tripping hazard for unsuspecting children.

Additional Considerations:

- Carrying flashlights will help children see and be seen more clearly.
- When in doubt about a specific treat that your child has brought home, simply throw it away. It is not worth the risk!
- Contact the Noblesville Police Department immediately if you suspect that your child's candy/treat has been compromised in any way!

Patrick W. Reed

May 14, 1928 - October 19, 2015

Patrick W. Reed, 87, of Noblesville passed away Monday, October 19, 2015 at home.



Born May 14, 1928 in Noblesville, he was the son of Frank and Helen (Booth) Reed.

He was 1946 Noblesville High School graduate, during which time he delivered ice to Noblesville homes. He attended Butler (Phi Delta Theta) for 2 years, where he was cut from the football team by Tony Hinkle but later rang his doorbell to take his daughter out on a date: Tony said "what are you doing here Noblesville?" On a trip to South Bend, Knute Rockne's widow served him and several fraternity brothers (one who knew Rockne's son from WWII) dinner.

In 1948, he went to work at Firestone, retiring in 1990. In 1952, he married Jean Martz and bought his only home where he died on Monday. He was an Indy 500 "yellow shirt" volunteer in the '50s. He became a realtor in 1960,

working for Aldred & Mallory, Max Robinson, Ayers, and F.C. Tucker until 2015. Between real estate and delivering ice, he always said he was inside about every house in "old Noblesville."

A 50-year golfer, he was a member of The Elks and First Christian Church. He joked that Ralphie from "A Christmas Story" movie was based on his childhood. Serving on City Council 1976-1980 and 25 years on the Park Board and Planning Commission (until December 2014) earned him "2013 July 4th Parade Grand Marshal" and "Pat Reed Day in Noblesville December 15, 2014". While on the Park Board, a trip to the Children's Museum carousel with his granddaughter prompted his to bring a carousel to Noblesville Forest Park.

He appeared in the 2011 "Lucky Teeter Daredevil Drivers" movie/DVD, having known Lucky in the 1930s. Pat's name is on the bench in Noblesville Seminary Park along with three of his high school buddies.

Preceded in death by his wife Jean in 2012, he is survived by son Mike Reed; granddaughter, Mercedes; sister, Sue Ann Essig; and sister-in-law Ann (Martz) Kerlin.

No services are being held.

It has been a long time....

Millers look for win over Carmel

Noblesville High School football coach Lance Scheib is taking an upbeat attitude entering the post-season playoffs, even though his 3-6 Millers tonight will travel to Carmel to face one of the state's top teams for the start of Class 6A, Sectional 4.

"I love this time of year," said Scheib. "This is the time of year all teams have worked for and all players in the state have an opportunity to end their season at Lucas Oil on Thanksgiving weekend."

Even if the opponent is 7-2, No. 2 ranked Carmel, a Hamilton County opponent which the Millers haven't defeated since before some of the players on this year's team were born.

Noblesville's last win over Carmel was in a sectional game, 27-12, in 2000.

Carmel won two close battles over Noblesville in 2001, 25-13 in the regular season and 34-28 in the sectional. Since that time Noblesville hasn't finished within striking distance of the Greyhounds. In the last five games, Noblesville has been held to a touchdown or less.

Last year in the sectional Carmel defeated Noblesville 28-6, although the game was closer than the final score might indicate. Carmel led just 7-6 at halftime, Noblesville's points coming on a pair of field goals by Andrew Little.

"Our players are looking forward to playing Carmel," Scheib continued. "The path to the state championship runs through Hamilton County and our players understand it will take a solid effort to continue to play for a sectional championship next week."

Nothing which has happened so far this season would give any indication that Noblesville will test Carmel.

The Greyhounds have won six straight since losing back-to-back to Cincinnati LaSalle 35-28 and to No. 1 ranked Center Grove 24-21.

Noblesville's three victories have been over Lawrence North 55-50, Hamilton Heights 35-9 and Zionsville 23-21. The Millers have lost their last four games.

Carmel and Noblesville have played only two common foes. The Millers defeated Lawrence North by five points and Carmel wracked LN 34-14. Carmel downed Hamilton Southeastern, another team in Sectional 4, 28-7 to open the season and Noblesville lost to HSE 20-12.

Scheib has been concerned with the Millers' play since the Hamilton Southeastern game. In Noblesville's last two games the Millers have been blown out by Brownsburg 47-24 and Avon 46-14.

"The last two weeks have been a mystery to the coaching staff on how we have played," Scheib said. "With that said, we have taken some great steps as both players and coaches to make sure we get back to the way we were playing in Weeks 1 through Week 7."

With veteran quarterback Luke Melloh sidelined with an injury, junior McGwire Plumer will start at QB for the Millers. He is 27-of-62 for 327 yards and two touchdowns. He has been intercepted three times.

But, the Golden Eagles’ coach, Tom Dilley, is warning not to put the horse in front of the cart.

“First things first,” said Dilley. “We’re focusing on Greencastle.”

Guerin Catholic will host Greencastle tonight in a first-round matchup.

Greencastle will enter the sectional with a 1-8 record. The Tiger Cubs’ only victory has been a 56-6 decision over Cloverdale, a team which has won one game this season. That lone win was a forfeit decision from Brown County.

Greencastle has lost to North Putnam 28-7, West Vigo 20-13, South Putnam 40-14, Cascade 34-24, Sullivan 59-6, Northview 62-7, South Vermillion 34-31 and Brown County 27-17.

Gruerin Catholic is 7-2, having lost only to Lafayette Central Catholic and Brebeuf.

Greencastle also has some athletes.

Junior quarterback Nick Costin has thrown 150 times and hit on 73 for 850 yards. He has passed for eight touchdowns and has been intercepted six times

Greencastle’s top receivers are Jackie Scanland with 18 catches for 175 yards and JT Matthews with 16 receptions for 191 yards.

Top threat for the Tiger Cubs in the rushing department is Devin Clar with 102 carries for 679.

“It’s the playoffs and we excited about getting off to a good start,” said Dilley.
