

Election Day is soon, but...

Not much to show for it in Hamilton County

Election Day is just over a week away, but in Hamilton County you would hardly know it; no advertising, no rallies and almost no yard signs. In fact for voters in Sheridan, Westfield, Carmel and Atlanta there will be no election because there are no contests. Noblesville, Cicero, Fishers and Arcadia will each have an election, but choices will be very limited.

Mayors, city clerks, city council members and city judges will be elected November 3 in Noblesville, Carmel, Fishers and Westfield. Town councils and clerk-treasurers will be elected in Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta. There is no election for county and state offices, that will come next year.

Sample ballots for those communities with elections are found elsewhere in today's Reporter. In Noblesville and Fishers the only contests are for seats on city council-at-large, in Cicero there is a contest for clerk-treasurer and in Arcadia for one town council seat.

All the municipal candidates elected next week will take office on January 1 for four-year terms. With the new year, Noblesville officially becomes a second class city with a nine-member city council instead of the present seven and city clerk and comptroller positions will replace the present office of clerk-treasurer.

While it is not unusual in Hamilton County to find few Democratic candidates for office, this election may set a record for fewest Democrats ever seeking office: only four plus one independent. Republicans will take all the rest of the local municipal offices by default.

As a result, voter turnout is expected to set records or near-records for low participation. Absentee voting usually gives an indication of how the election turnout will be. Despite a slight increase in absentee balloting in recent days, early voting has been slow and the outlook remains poor for election day.

In the meantime, with so little interest in this year's ection, political attention is being turned to next spring's primary now just over six months away. Numerous offices at the county, state and national levels will be on the ballot. Voters can expect spirited races

for everything from County Council to U.S. President. Election signs may be few and far between in Hamilton County this year, but Cicero Clerk-Treasurer Jan Unger has a few of them around, such as this one in the center of town. Election Day is a week from Tuesday.

With the increased attention on sex and violent offenders from the media, especially around Halloween and holidays, Sheriff Bowen will provide facts to concerned parents on how to locate homes and workplaces of offenders. Specifically, he will address concerns for Halloween night as well as provide safety tips for parents and children. There will be a computer with sex offender registry information that parents can use to check their address and compare it to the addresses of registered offenders.

Also, with the upcoming holiday season quickly approaching, Detective Alex Petty and IT Specialist Zach SeRine will present concepts for the best methods of online

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen shopping and personal safety while at shopping centers. With the rapid advances in technology, having a line of defense against identity theft, hacking, and other cybercrime issues is vital for the thousands who will be shopping from the convenience of a computer or mobile device.

In addition to holiday safety tips, Detective Greg Lockhart will give attendees a clear understanding of home safety—what to do if someone finds that his/her home has been burglarized, and what to do if someone is home when an intruder enters. He will also give proactive tips that may help prevent a home from being targeted. As homeowners prepare for the holiday season, a prime time for thefts and burglaries, Detective Lockhart will assist residents in knowing how to best provide a defense against crime and, if a victim of crime, be apprehending criminals.

In 2014, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office worked 266 theft cases, 67 burglary cases, and 66 fraud/forgery cases. To date in 2015, the Sheriff's Office has taken 171 theft reports, 56 burglary reports, and 60 fraud/forgery reports. Hamilton County averages approximately 150 individuals on the Sex and Violent Offender Registry at any given time. This number does not reflect statistics in Hamilton County areas covered by other law enforcement agencies.

All community members are encouraged to attend. Everyone who attends the forum will be given information and resources that show ways to be proactive in protecting children, homes, identities, and belongings. There will be resources available that detail credit and debit card safety, new technology for home alarms and camera systems, and a home inventory compabetter prepared to assist law enforcement in ny. Attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions of officers and presenters following the presentation.

Fire destroys home on Fawn Hollow Lane

A Noblesville home was destroyed by a fire Saturday afternoon.

14906 Fawn Hollow Lane for a possible residence fire. At 5:40 p.m. the first arriving units on-scene stated they had heavy smoke and flames coming from the garage and roof on the west side of the home. Due to 15 mph winds with gusts to 20 mph out of the west, the first arriving units immediately marked this a working incident and went the initial attack and slowed the fire spread, an offensive attack was then initiated. At 5:42 p.m. it was benchmarked as having water on the fire and was marked under control at 6:25 p.m.

The home was occupied by Sarah Freeman, her daughter and her mother, Marina Clifton. Sarah's husband, Donald Freeman, was at work at the time of the fire. Mr. and Mrs. Freeman were renting the home which is owned by Adam Peeples, of Dublin, Ohio.

Upon interviewing Mrs. Freeman, she stated she smelled what appeared to be the At approximately 5:33 p.m. the Nobles-smell of leaves and wood 10 minutes prior ville Fire Department was dispatched to to the fire. Mrs. Freeman stated she heard loud popping coming from the garage. Mrs. Freeman opened the door to the garage and saw a large fire in the garage. Mrs. Freeman then ran upstairs, woke her napping mother and grabbed her daughter. They were able to safely exit the home through the rear sliding doors.

The house was destroyed by the fire, into a defensive attack. As firefighters made which started in the garage. The cause of the fire at this time is listed as undetermined. The Freeman family does have renter's insurance.

Leinheiser sets another record...

Cross country moving eight on to state

If anyone had any doubts that Hamilton County is the best cross country county in the state of Indiana, they were erased after Saturday's Carmel semi-state meet at Northview Church.

Eight county programs - four boys teams and four girls teams - competed at the semi-state, and all eight advanced to next Saturday's IHSAA state finals in Terre Haute. In fact, the county swept the top four in the boys race. In addition, two Noblesville boys and a Westfield girl qualified for state as individuals.

The boys meet continued the back-andforth between Carmel and Fishers. The Greyhounds won the sectional title two weeks ago, with the Tigers winning the regional trophy last week. The semi-state went to Carmel, as it edged Fishers by 10 points, 64-74.

Ben Veatch led the way for the 'Hounds, and for everyone else. Veatch sailed to the individual title in 14:58.1, 20 seconds ahead of second place. Carmel had its next four runners finish in the top 26, and that helped the Greyhounds seal the semi-state champi-

"It was really close at the sectional, it was really close at the regional, it was really close in the semi-state, so I think we can all look ahead and see that it's going to be really close next week, too," said Greyhounds coach Colin Altevogt.

Fishers had its top five runners all finish in the top 25, with Trevor Thompson pacing the Tigers by finishing 10th.

"Just two really, really good teams, two really even teams, and I think Westfield and HSE could do really well next week also," said Altevogt.

Noblesville's two advancing individuals both landed in the top 30. Eric Hoffman finished 16th and Cole Martin was 29th.

The girls race saw some close competition for the top six teams, but there was no doubt about the winner. Carmel ran away with the meet by scoring an impressive 39 points. Cathedral was the runner-up with 108, and Zionsville placed third with 121.

The Greyhounds got all of their top five runners in the top 20, including the race winner. That would be Sarah Leinheiser, who is still just a junior but is already racing towards legendary status. Leinheiser ran the Northview Church course in a time of 17:22.3, a new course and semi-state re-

"I don't think anybody in Indiana a year ago would've thought any girl in Indiana was going to come close to what Rohrer's doing," said 'Hounds coach Mark Ellington. That would be Anna Rohrer, the now-graduated Mishawaka standout who obliterated courses left and right and holds the state meet record of 17:08.8.

"And I'm certain they would not have picked out Sarah Leinheiser as the girl to be doing anything like this," said Ellington. The coach said that Leinheiser "ran just a phenomenal race today," and credited her with running smart. He noted that a runner has to race smart on the tricky Northview course, "and not go out over your head the opening (kilometer), because it's the fastest K on the course, and then you get punished the rest of the way."

But Leinheiser made her move at the 2K mark, opened up a lead at the 3K, "and at 4K it was a foregone conclusion for her,' said Ellington.

Stacy Morozov finished fourth for Carmel and Maddie Dalton placed sixth.

As for the other county teams, Noblesville finished fourth to guarantee the Millers a place at state. Abigail Little led the way with an eighth-place finish.

Hamilton Southeastern is heading back to state after grabbing the sixth-place team spot. Laurel Black and Sabrina Bippus were 22nd and 23rd respectively for the Royals.




