Tobacco prevention and cessation Overview

Partnership for a Healthy Hamilton County presented information about its management of a countywide Tobacco Prevention and Cessation grant to the Hamilton County All-trustees Meeting Wednesday, Oct. 14, at the Noblesville Community Center. The presentation included an overview of Indiana State Department of Health tobacco prevention and cessation priorities, how they relate to community indicators and PHHC’s work plan objectives to fulfill grant requirements (<http://www.in.gov/isdh/tpc/>).

“It was a terrific opportunity to meet and present to Hamilton County’s trustees,” said Holly Wheeler, PHHC assistant director and Hamilton County TPC interim coordinator. “The trustees are vital to working with residents and assisting them in times of crisis. They have a unique perspective as far as the health needs of those they serve. PHHC was honored to be included in the meeting.”

Attendees included trustees John Patrick, Sheridan; Danielle Carey Tolan, Washington; Debra Driskell, Delaware; Jeff Hern, Fall Creek; Jamie Rulon, White River; Diane Crim, Wayne; and Douglas Callahan, Clay; Glen Schwartz represented Chris Miller of Jackson. Tom Kenley, Noblesville trustee, hosted the meeting. Other attendees included Judge Steve Nation, Steve Dillinger and Christine Altman, county commissioners; Steve Schwartz, county councilor; Kevin Jowitt, Noblesville chief of police; Rick Taylor, Noblesville city councilor; Peggy Pfister, Joe Arrowood and Terry Busby, Noblesville Township Board members; and Kathy Richardson, state senator, Noblesville, District 29, who also addressed the

audience. Susan Ferguson of Prevail, Jim McGee of Good Samaritan Network and Lauri Schwartz of Keep Noblesville Beautiful represented their organizations.

“It was a positive meeting,” Kenley said. “As the first year of my first term as trustee I wanted to invite a good representation of local politicians and not-for-profits from across the county to promote communication among our leaders and let them know that we at the Noblesville Trustee’s office welcome any input they may have.”

Wheeler offered the Indiana Quitline, 1-800-QuitNow, as a resource for trustees to offer the individuals and families they serve. The free phone-based service includes trained cessation counselors, nicotine replacement, specialized programs for youth and pregnant women and web and text cessation services. Since trustees provide monetary assistance, recommending eliminating smoking during income and spending assessments is a way to help their clients’ physical and financial health.

“The Quitline is a program that’s free, confidential and can be supplemented by other, in person, cessation programs available in the community,” she said. Further information about the service can be found at www.indianaquitline.net.

The Partnership for a Healthy Hamilton County was created to respond to the county’s primary health needs as identified by a Community Health Needs Assessment, an Internal Revenue Service requirement for not-for-profit hospitals (cdc.gov/policy/chna/). When contacted by the Reporter, Britt said that he is still the baseball coach as of now, but knows about the situation.

“I have been made aware of the fact the school board may vote me out at the Nov. 10th school board meeting,” said Britt. “My current situation is rallying community support and getting as many people to the board meeting as possible.”

Britt does have support: Signs have popped up in Sheridan imploring the board to “retain Matt Britt” as baseball coach. In addition, Britt’s supporters are planning a petition signing from noon to 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 1 at Biddle Park.

Noblesville Police offer Halloween safety tips

The Noblesville Police Department would like to remind residents that the official designated hours for Halloween this year in the City of Noblesville will be from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 31st, 2015. Officers from the Noblesville Police Department will be paying particular attention to motorists who are not obeying traffic laws in and around residential areas where children will be expected to be walking. We would urge all motorist to exercise due care as children sometimes make sudden or unexpected movements such as darting between parked vehicles and crossing streets in locations that are not properly marked, illuminated or designated for pedestrian crossing. We would also like to remind citizens to observe a few safety tips that will help to make this an enjoyable evening for all.

Parents:

- Make sure an adult or older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for younger children.
- Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never enter a stranger’s home.
- Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.
- Establish a return time.
- Review all the appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.
- Remind children to walk on sidewalks, not in the street. If no sidewalk is available, have children walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.
- Remind children to walk, do not run. Be careful crossing yards and lawns where unseen objects or uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

Costumes and Face Design:

- Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.
- Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)
- If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of reflective tape should be used to make children more visible.
- Avoid masks that may obstruct a child’s vision. Use facial paint instead.
- Motorists:
- Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians, and curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- Travel at a reduced speed (10-15 mph below the posted speed limit) especially in residential areas where it is obvious that children will be walking.

Residents:

- Leave your exterior lights on near your front door if you are participating in handing out candy. Parents/children will use this as a means to identify your willingness to participate.
- Secure any pets (outside and inside) that may become startled because of the costumes, noise, or overall increase in activities on that evening.
- Make sure that children have a clear path to and from your front door. Decorations or other Halloween displays can sometimes impede or present a tripping hazard for unsuspecting children.

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Millers play tough against No. 2 Greyhounds

While only one team can advance in an IHSAA football post-season game, both Carmel and Noblesville had reasons to leave the field with their heads held high after Friday's game between the two teams at Carmel Stadium.

The No. 2-ranked Greyhounds got off to a big halftime lead, then held on during a furious comeback by the Millers to win 45-29, and thus advance to next Friday's Class 6A Sectional 4 championship. Carmel will host Fishers in a re-match of last year's sectional final.

Noblesville, meanwhile, showed an immense amount of pride to lift itself up from being down 31-0 and cause a few nervous moments for the 'Hounds in the fourth quarter. The Millers got as close as 31-15, but two big fourth-quarter scores by Carmel allowed it enough breathing room to hang on.

"You're going against their best, and Noblesville's got a lot of pride," said Greyhounds coach John Hebert. "They do really good things. That proves it, I think, the way they were able to move the ball on us there at the end. For us, I think we just need to keep in mind that half the teams in 6A are now turning in their equipment on Monday and we're not one of them. We feel pretty fortunate about that."

Carmel cruised through the first half, leading 24-0 at the break. Nick Stacy started the scoring with a field goal, then Michael Viktrup hit Jalen Walker for a 33-yard touchdown late in the first period. Tobias Watkins scored a pair of touchdowns in the second quarter on nice runs.

Stephen Watts increased Carmel's lead to 31-0 early in the third quarter with a

five-yard touchdown score. Noblesville got on the board midway through the period, when McGwire Plumer found JD Scheib, and the result was an 18-yard touchdown reception.

The Millers recovered a fumble to open the fourth quarter, and made the most of it. Jarel Youree eventually scored on a three-yard run, then Plumer found Scheib again, this time for a two-point conversion.

Carmel quickly responded, as Jake McDonald threw a 49-yard passing touchdown to Jarrod Redifer. McDonald came in for Viktrup in the fourth period; Hebert said several of the Greyhound players were banged up after going through a tough regular season in the Metropolitan Conference.

Noblesville marched down the field, in a remarkable drive that featured eight consecutive pass completions by Plumer. Stretching the use of the hurry-up offense to the limit, Plumer moved the ball down to the Carmel one-yard line, and Chandler Hurst took it in to score from there.

"It's what we expected," said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib. "It's what our parents have raised these kids to do, what coaches have done as far as coaching, and that is not to give up, and never, ever, ever quit."

The Millers then recovered an onside kick with 3:51 left, but had to absorb a pair of penalties before they could get going. They got to the Carmel 31, but the Greyhounds' Jack Van Remortel stepped in and

intercepted a pass. He wound up taking it 88 yards to score.

Noblesville went down fighting, though. Plumer again used the short quick passes to get the ball down to the Carmel 1, and then ran the ball in. In those two big scoring drives, the junior Plumer - who was thrust into the quarterback position after Luke Melloh suffered a season-ending injury - gave Miller fans a glimpse of the future, and loads of potential for next season. Plumer passed for 318 yards in the game.

"The biggest thing is we proved that when we play 48 minutes, we're a really good football team," said Scheib. "And we proved when we don't, we're very amateur. And if you look at all of our games, when we play 48 minutes, we're in the game or won the game. And when we didn't, it didn't go well. And so that's the one thing that I think our kids will take from this year, is that when we play for 48 minutes, we can play at a very high level."

The Blackhawks scored twice in the fourth frame. Callahan travel 19 yards for a TD and with 2:14 remaining in the quarter Burnell went 10 yards into the end zone.

Westfield boys, Noblesville girls advance to state

It was a successful day for the Noblesville and Westfield cross country teams at Saturday's Carmel semi-state at North-view Church.

In the girls meet, Noblesville's 130 points gave them a fourth-place finish. Abigail Little led the way with an eighth-place finish. Westfield's Devon Leahy placed ninth, giving her one of the individual qualifying spots.
