*Hands on learning at Noblesville Schools...*

## Promise Road’s Box City goes according to “plan”

For the past three years, students at Noblesville's Promise Road Elementary School have been getting hands-on lessons about city planning through the Box City program.

On Thursday, Box City was built again. The fourth-grade students set up city blocks, and the third graders were assigned the task of filling the city. After hearing speeches from Noblesville Long Range Planner Phil Hagge and Mayor John Ditslear, the third-graders were sent back to their classrooms to start the planning stages. "I think it's actually very exciting," said Ditslear. "It's just an opportunity for them to give input, which is important. To work with others, which again we all have to do, and getting various opinions." Promise Road principal Kelly Treinen said the third graders were "going through like a city council type process of getting things approved," for each of their areas. In fact, debate was lively in Lisa Barthuly's classroom about buildings, roads and spaces for animals.

Students learned about the different zones for city blocks, such as residential and commercial. Treinen said the students also got a chance to visit downtown Noblesville prior to fall break, interviewing small and large businesses, "and they actually re-built some of these businesses that they went in and interviewed," she said.

## The year Halloween changed in Hamilton Co.

A half-century ago Halloween was not entirely celebrated the way it is today. And, thank goodness for that. In the 1960s and earlier some teenagers would commit some pretty nasty pranks. Knocking off mailboxes, soaping windows and window screens, setting fire to piles of leaves, throwing corn or other debris on porches and upsetting outhouses were among the common forms of these Halloween activities. (Yes, there were still outhouses in rural areas.) Many teenagers and younger kids would go trick or treating as they still do, but often in homemade costumes as ghosts, witches or scarecrows. Today, of course, Halloween has been commercialized and more civilized.

*EDITOR'S NOTE: The Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) will conduct its Neighborhoods NOW Conference on Nov. 10. HAND has created descriptions of the four prominent themes of the conference. The first runs today; the next three will appear in future editions.*

It is evident that Hamilton County embraces growth. Growing our businesses and creating job opportunities are an important way to achieve sustainable economic growth. Commerce also provides valuable work to our residents, services to our customers, and vibrancy to our communities. Finding the balance of new residential and commercial is a continual challenge communities face. Commerce requires a mix of private homes, rental and apartments in order to have good access to both workers and customers. In the past, connecting with the workforce required access to roads. Now, consumers and workers desire to live, work and go to school all within one community. How possible will it be for us to connect housing for workers – such as our Millennials returning home with their new college degrees - with the jobs our communities need filled? Our communities may be unaware that local teachers, fire and police employees and other city staff are unable to live in the communities they serve, due to high housing costs. For example, in Fishers there are nearly 1,500 households earning less than \$25,000 per year, whereas only 254 apartments lease for less than \$750 per month. This is indicative of the severe shortage of

Companies are beginning to reconsider locating in Hamilton County due to the difficulty in finding entry level workers. Hamilton County needs a plan to address this gap. Twenty-three percent of the jobs in Hamilton County meet the definition of “low wage jobs”. These jobs have increased by 22 percent from 2010-2015.

## Hoosiers asked to keep campaign signs out of rights of way

The Indiana Department of Transportation urges political candidates and their supporters to keep our roads free from encroaching campaign signs for the safety of the motoring public. The signs can block visibility for traffic entering and exiting the roadway at intersections and driveways.

Areas that should remain sign-free include intersections, interchanges and rights of way that run along the roadway. Where the right of way is not clearly marked, boundaries may be estimated as the fence line, the back of the ditch or behind utility poles.

### Sign removal

Indiana Code 9-21-4-6 authorizes INDOT and local governments to remove advertising signs from their public highways. INDOT staff removes encroaching signs as part of their normal maintenance activities and takes the signs to a nearby INDOT maintenance facility, where they may be reclaimed by their owners.

Of course, there’s more than city planning being learned with the Box City project. Treinen said that the driving question is about how can “we, as Noblesville citizens, use the eight habits, to improve work ethic, communication skills and commitment to work among Noblesville businesses.”

The eight habits she’s referring to is based on author Stephen Covey’s 1989 book, “The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People,” which got upgraded to eight habits with the publishing of “The 8th Habit: From Effectiveness to Greatness” in 2004. Those habits include “Be proactive” and “begin with the end in mind,” which the students had to do in order to complete the project.

In addition, students also learned about the soft skills, such as “teamwork, flexibility, attitude, cooperation,” as Treinen said. Those are things that businesses are looking for, and the students asked the small businesses that they interviewed about those soft skills that were necessary.

“We do the eight habits, which is the Steven Covey’s habits of highly effective people, but we use the kid version,” said Treinen. “That’s our culture here at Promise Road. What we’re trying to do is align the soft skills with the eight habits so we’re working together with both of those in what we’re doing in a 21st century atmosphere.”

Nationwide there are billions of dollars spent on fancy costumes, all kinds of yard decorations, exotic treats for the kids, Halloween horror videos, parties with Hallow-

een themes and on and on. The holiday is a real moneymaker for the specialty companies.

Many teenagers do not even actively participate in traditional Halloween trick or treating. It’s not cool. But, 50 years ago we were just getting away from the old ways of marking October 31.

Hamilton County had a new Circuit Court judge in 1965, Edward F. New. He told citizens he was going to be a tough, especially tough on juvenile delinquency. Halloween was to be safe and orderly. Halloween pranks and vandalism would not be tolerated, and violators of his wishes would be dealt with severely.

On October 31, 1965 there was very little rough stuff in Hamilton County. Judge New got a lot of the credit because earlier in the year the public had seen some of his serious methods of dealing with juvenile problems.

Was it Judge New’s policy or was it the year Halloween transformed into a different kind of holiday? Maybe some of both. We’ll never know. But, the judge’s reputation was aided by that year’s experience.

He went on to serve 12 years on the bench and for whatever reason Halloween hasn’t been the same since.

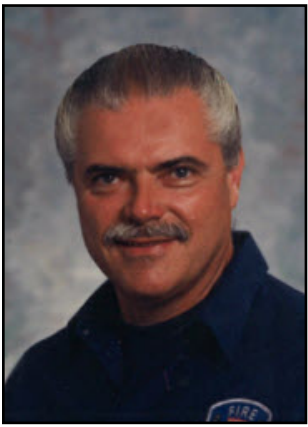

## Sobriety checkpoint scheduled for Saturday night/Sunday morning

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership (HCTSP) will be conduct a sobriety checkpoint on the night of Saturday, Oct. 31 and the early morning hours of Sunday, Nov. 1.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along a roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data along with a consideration of officer and driver safety.

During a checkpoint, vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle, or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officer available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety considerations.

Upon making contact with a driver stopped at a checkpoint, the officer advises the driver of being stopped at a Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license and vehicle registration. If in the course of the contact with the driver the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and the driver may be impaired, or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. This further investigation may involve Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs). If, on the other hand, all looks right during the initial contact, the

driver is usually released in less than two minutes.

The HCTSP is a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County working to increase the usage of seatbelts, to combat aggressive driving, and to decrease impaired driving with the overall goal of creating a safer Hamilton County. The HCTSP is comprised of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, and Westfield Police Department with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

Impaired driving is one of our nation's most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2012, alcohol-related traffic crashes killed 158 people (up from 140 in 2011), accounting for approximately twenty percent of all fatal crashes, and injured another 2,112 people.

About 1000 people are convicted of an impaired driving offense annually in Hamilton County alone, and nearly 200 of those are repeat offenders. In 2012 in Hamilton County, for example, the State filed 1004 charges of operating while intoxicated. Of these, 158 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will be setting up sobriety checkpoints around Hamilton County to aggressively deter, detect, and arrest those drivers who make the decision to drive impaired. Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

# Carmel, Fishers meet again

As strange as it may seem, Carmel and Fishers, two football teams which sit just across White River, have never met in a regular season game.

Post-season? Well, that’s a different story.

Tonight when Carmel hosts Fishers for the Class 6A, Sectional 4 championship, it will be the sixth sectional battle between the two schools. Both are so good this year that no one will be surprised if the winner makes a bid for a state championship.

Carmel is 8-2, beaten only by Cincinnati LaSalle 35-28 and No. 1 ranked Center Grove 24-21. First year coach John Hebert has the Greyhounds ranked No. 2 in the state.

Fishers is 7-3, beaten only by Southeastern 39-33, Avon 36-14 and Cathedral 35-6. The Tigers got revenge from the loss to Southeastern last week with a 38-22 decision over the Royals. Veteran coach Rick Wimmer has his team ranked No. 8 in the coaches poll and No. 11 in the AP rankings. This is Wimmer’s 10<sup>th</sup> year at Fishers where he is 77-38. In this his 33<sup>rd</sup> year of coaching, Wimmer is 241-121.

Carmel is coming off a 45-29 sectional win over Noblesville.

“We had a great first half vs. Noblesville,” Hebert said, “taking the 24-0 lead into halftime. We prepared to play our starters in the second half, but we opened up with a scoring drive and were up 31-0. Since we were banged up at several positions from the regular season we pulled several guys pretty early in the second half. Noblesville made a great push at that point and we found ourselves in a competitive contest. That is a tribute to Noblesville coach Lance Scheib.

“Fishers is such a solid team, as usual,” Hebert continued. “No one is better at preparing and developing their team than Coach Wimmer. Every year they are playing their best ball at the end of the season.

They have a very good offensive line, quarterback and a stable of skilled players. Their defense is very stout and disciplined. I would also say that their special teams are as good as we’ve seen.”

In the previous five sectional meetings, Carmel has won four, including a 14-7 battle in the rain last season. Fishers won 17-14 in 2010.

“Carmel is an outstanding team, deserving of their No. 2 ranking,” Wimmer talked about the Greyhounds. “Offensively, they have several players who are capable of making big plays with their speed and athleticism. Defending them starts with their quarterback (Micahel Viktrup) and their tailback (Tobias Watkins). Their offensive line is probably the best in a number of years. They have three receivers who have the ability to make big plays, but most dangerous is (Jalen) Walker. We must prevent Viktrup from running loose and must also keep their receivers in front of us and tackle very well.

“As always,” Wimmer continued, “Carmel’s defense is very good. They appear to have good quickness up front and play very aggressively. Their secondary does a nice job of keeping receivers in front of them. It can be difficult to get behind, and they tackle very well.”

Viktrup has completed 130-of-195 passes for 1,897 yards and 25 touchdowns. He has been intercepted just three times. Walker has 48 catches for 780 yards and Ethan Merriweather 36 receptions for 536 yards.

Watkins has carried 187 times for 946 Greyhound yards, followed by Viktrup with 76 for 396 and Stephen Watts with 71 carries for 363 yards.

There are similar numbers for Fishers.

Quarterback Zach Eaton is 117-for-217 for 1,639 yards and 15 touchdowns and just two pass interceptions. Keyshaw Burrell, in just six games, has caught 28 passes for 430 yards. DeVonte Adams has 22 receptions for 283 yards and Kade Orris 32 for 495.

Wimmer likes to run the football, and he has three Tigers who share that role. Jeremy Chinn has 90 carries for 605 yards; Jermaine Huddleston 104 for 584 and Trevor Newman 100 carries for 524 yards.

“Beating this Carmel team is going to take great effort and few mistakes from our team,” said Wimmer.

“By all accounts, I’d say that Fishers reminds me of ourselves .... hungry, unified, disciplined, physical and resilient,” said Hebert.

The field for this year’s IHSAA girls cross country state championships, which take place Saturday at the LaVern Gibson Cross Country Course in Terre Haute, will be a familiar one.



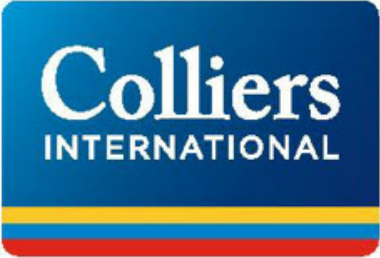

## Late Grizzlies run drops Pacers to 0-2

With just over four minutes remaining at Bankers Life Fieldhouse's opening night of the 2015-16 season, Paul George calmly sank two free throws, which gave Indiana a 96-94 advantage over the Memphis Grizzlies.

But down the stretch, for the second night in a row, the Pacers were unable to close out their opponent, this time succumbing to the front court of Mark Gasol and Zach Randolph.

In the final three minutes, the Grizzlies tore off a 7-0 run which featured four points for Gasol, leading to the Pacers (0-2) to fall 112-103 in their first home game of the season.

"We're still trying to all get tied together," explained Paul George at his locker after the game. "The lineups haven't been consistent so we're still trying to work

through things. It's an adjustment, it's a process. We've just got to figure it out one way or another."

George was able to fill up the stat sheet for the second night in a row, scoring 18 points, grabbing eight rebounds, and passing out five assists. PG brought the crowd to a fever pitch when he drained a 3-pointer to give the Pacers a lead with just under six minutes remaining in the game.

Indiana started the game out flat against the Grizzlies' huge lineup of Gasol (20 points) and Randolph (eight rebounds) at the forwards, falling victim to runs of 7-0 and 13-4 in the first half.

But the bench combination of Rodney Stuckey and C.J. Miles blasted the Pacers back into the game, fueling an 11-0 run which brought Indiana within 3 points.

"If (the pace) is our best weapon, you have to continue to find ways to use it and

it's hard to do it when you don't get stops too," Miles said.

With just over three minutes remaining in the second quarter, Rodney Stuckey received a pass from Paul George on the fast-break and finished in traffic with an and-1, putting the Pacers up 43-42. When the second half ended, the Grizzlies had


retaken the lead, carrying a 50-49 advantage into the locker room.

But in the third quarter, for the second frame in a row, the Pacers outscored the Grizzlies, this time by a 26-23 margin in which they led by as many as nine points — their biggest lead of the evening.

But for the second night in a row to start the young 2015-16 season, the Pacers weren't able to close out their opponent in the waning moments of the game. A sign that their offense — which has looked potent for stretches of games so far — still needs some fine tuning.

"I don't think we're losing focus," said Mahinmi, who scored 11 points and added nine rebounds. "I think we're getting beat on certain points that hurt. I know there were a few times when there were 50-50 balls and they got them and they got on them on fast breaks. Those points really hurt, especially down in the fourth quarter."
