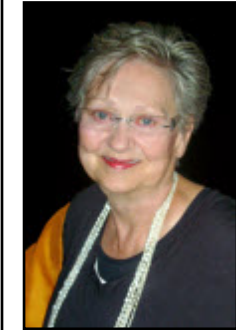

Yes Virginia, There Is An Election

This is a public service announcement:

Only 1 person in 10 knows there is a local election on November 3 and there are candidates on the ballot. Are you the 1 in 10? If not, here is a quick reference. You probably remember the May Primary Election that was held to narrow the ballot to the candidates that would appear on the November General Municipal Election ballot. In November, the selection is between the two parties since the candidates for each party were selected in May. Everyone follow so far?



Now, the good news. The fall municipal (November) election is very important because if you voted in May now you must finish the process so your May election winners have an opportunity to win in November. In other words, if you took the time in May to vote and to make your selection then it is equally important to make your May vote count by voting in November. If you did not vote in May, it still is a good idea to vote in November. The November ballot is much shorter than in May because most candidates are not contested by the "other" party. The result is that voting in November will take about 1 minute and there probably will not be a long line. But as you know, voting is a privilege, seriously.

The General Municipal Election is being held in Noblesville, Fishers, Cicero and Arcadia only because the other cities and town have no contested races. The November election is open to voters who are residing **within** the city or town limits throughout the county. So if you live in the towns of Noblesville, Fishers, Cicero and Arcadia and are a registered voter you can vote in the upcoming election.

Oh, yes the good news. You do not have to wait until November 3rd to vote at your polling place. You can vote now. Did you know that you can vote every day except Sunday at the Hamilton County Judicial Center in downtown Noblesville? Weekdays you can vote from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm and on Saturday from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. Just follow the "Vote" signs. Voting is also open on November 2nd from 8:00 am until noon. After November 2nd voting will take place at the polls on November 3rd in the cities and towns from

Second in a series as HAND Conference approaches...

Baby Boomers and the need for more affordable senior housing

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) will conduct its Neighborhoods NOW Conference on Nov. 10. HAND has created descriptions of the four prominent themes of the conference. The second runs today; the next two will appear in future editions.

The Boomer Generation will increasingly drive the housing market, and Hamilton County needs to prepare for this expansion. "Boomers" were born between 1946 - 1964. In 2011, this generation began to reach the "retirement age" of 65. There will be nearly 20 more years of Boomers entering their senior years. Medical advances have helped peoples live longer, with an average life expectancy of 78 years.

Throughout Indiana, the vast majority of this population does not have adequate assets saved for retirement, and many will rely on Social Security for their sole source of income. In Indiana, only half of private-sector workers participate in retirement plans and the average balance of a retirement plan is \$26,971. High payments for either rent or mortgage will increasingly burden the Boomer Generation.

There will be a substantial need for more senior-friendly housing to combat isolation and accommodate the aging population that

will continue to grow through the middle part of the 21st Century. The rapid growth of Assisted Living facilities in Hamilton County proves the demand, but these are short-term, costly facilities not designed to resolve ongoing, permanent housing needs of Seniors.

The housing interests of Boomers complement those interests of Millennials in terms of walk-able communities with easy access to amenities and services. The cities in Hamilton County are constructing comprehensive networks of trails and sidewalks, but some communities struggle to maintain their aging infrastructure.

Current zoning ordinances in many Hamilton County communities make it difficult to build smaller houses on smaller lots, which many seniors seek when wishing to downsize, both in terms of cost and actual house-size. A smaller and less expensive house and yard is easier to maintain, yet can be difficult to find in Hamilton County. Furthermore, establishing construction standards that require Universal Design and Visitability are ways to prevent costly modifications in the future and develop a housing product that serves all.

226th Street/Jay Ditch bridge is...

First GRS-IBS structure in Hamilton County

The Hamilton County Highway Department is excited to announce the replacement of Small Structure #31008 (Bridge #301 at 226th Street and Jay Ditch in Adams Township) is complete.

This marks Hamilton County’s first **Geo-Synthetic Reinforced Soil - Integrated Bridge System (GRS-IBS)** infrastructure. GRS-IBS is a form of accelerated bridge construction that has been adopted by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). This innovative project was chosen for its ease and speed of construction at a relatively low cost compared to a conventional bridge foundation. While

GRS-IBS structures have been built in other States, Indiana is in the process of embracing it.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) provided valuable technical assistance. In addition, FHWA held a design-construction workshop for the Hamilton County Highway Department and others in the local transportation industry. Furthermore, Indiana Local Technical Assistance Program (LTAP) at Purdue University will showcase the construction of the second Hamilton County’s GRS-IBS structure in spring 2016.

The County Highway Department is planning two additional GRS-IBS structures for 2016 construction and have more in design. These projects are a testament to Hamilton County’s continued commitment to adopting and implementing innovative projects. Millers fans will remember Alexis Shannon and Katelyn O'Reilly. Shannon was the second-leading scorer in Hamilton County with an 18.2 mark. O'Reilly was fifth, averaging 15.1 points a game. O'Reilly also was No. 1 in free throw shooting with an 84 percent mark. Shannon was fifth at 75.

Shannon and O'Reilly, of course, are targeted to be in the starting lineup, O'Reilly at forward and Shannon at guard or forward. The other three starters appear to be junior Brooke Herron and senior Rachel Shipman at guard and sophomore Emily Kiser at guard/forward.

Kiser is 6-2; O'Reilly 5-11 and Shannon 5-10.

Kiser averaged 5.8 points and 5.2 rebounds a game as a freshman. Herron scored at a 4.0 clip and Shipman averaged 2.2 points a game.

After those starting five, spots appear to be open. In that group with the most experience is Haley Conway, a 6-0 senior forward/center.

Herron is a junior. The only other junior on the team is 5-3 guard Sam Salmon.

Joining Kiser as the only other sophomore is 5-7 guard/forward Olivia Morales.

Freshmen include Mallory Johnson, Madison Whertro, Maddie Knight and Kaylin Mertens.

Noblesville's schedule is loaded, starting with Lawrence North on the road on Nov. 5. The Lady Millers will play in the White River Valley Classic at Franklin County on Dec. 22-23 and then a week later will travel to New Castle for the Hall of Fame Classic.

Tigers look for help

Looking at a “reloading” type of season for 2015-16, Fishers coach Michael Gaines said, “We graduated a significant amount of production and experience from last year’s team, so we will need to mature quickly and learn to compete at a high level.”

That hope likely has been set back a couple of notches with an injury to Kara Gerka.

Gerka is coming off a terrific junior season. She was No. 3 in Hamilton County scoring with a 16.1 average. She was sixth in rebounding, averaging 5.9 points a game.

Gerka was a key performer as the Tigers roared to a 21-5 record.

The only other Tiger returning with varsity starting experience is 6-foot Hannah Kroehler, who averaged 3.3 points and 4.1 rebounds a game.

With Gerka gone, that has Gaines searching for a fifth starter to join Kroehler, 5-8 sophomore Ali Gerka, 5-6 senior Alex Von Kamecke and 5-6 sophomore Toni Grace.

That fifth starter likely will come from a group consisting of 5-6 senior Megan Forbes, 6-4 junior Audrey Turner, 5-4 junior Alexandra Bankovich, 5-8 junior Amanda Surber, 5-10 sophomore Casey Walker and 5-10 junior Jaela Baskin.

“Kara Gerka is extremely versatile and athletic,” said Gaines. “Last year she led our team in scoring, rebounding, blocked shots and field goal percentage.”

How long will Fishers be without its senior ace? Gaines isn’t quite certain.

“We are optimistically hoping that she will be back sometime in early to mid-December,” Gaines said.

Fishers will open its season on Nov. 3 at home against Lawrence Central. The Tigers will play in the Hamilton Southeastern Classic and the Lake Central Classic in early November. A mid-December return for Gerka could mean she will miss Hoosier Crossroads Conference games with Westfield, Zionsville, Noblesville and Hamilton Southeastern.

“Team defense and interior scoring will be the focus of our team’s development,” said Gaines.

Viktrup rushes for three TDs, throws for one...

Carmel beats Fishers for Sectional 4 title

Three rushing touchdowns from quarterback Michael Viktrup led Carmel to its third consecutive sectional championship Friday night.

The Greyhounds broke free from a 7-7 halftime tie to get past Fishers 28-7 in the championship game of Class 6A Sectional 4, which took place at Carmel Stadium. The senior Viktrup had a hand - well, most of the time it was a foot - in each of the scores, helping his team to add to its record-setting sectional total. Carmel now has won 27 sectional championships, the most in Indiana.

The 'Hounds will travel to Fort Wayne next week to play Homestead for the Regional 2 championship.

"You don't look ahead," said Carmel coach John Hebert. "You just don't think about anything besides that game right in front of you. When you're playing a team that's led by Coach Wimmer, their defensive coordinator John Jud. They're excellent coaches. They put together a great plan and we're fortunate to come out on top with all the mistakes that we made."

Defense ruled the first half, which ended with both teams scoring a touchdown each. Carmel struck first, as Viktrup used a 10-yard run to get his team on the board. After that it became a defensive chess

match, with the teams holding each other to punts, and the occasional interception.

In fact, it was a pick that enabled the Tigers to tie things up in the second quarter. Fishers interrupted a Carmel drive before it began, when Jeremy Chinn took an interception 55 yards to score. Ben Norton's kick made the score 7-7, and that's where the half would end.

"We played well enough defensively," said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer. "Our defense came up with some turnovers and gave us opportunities."

The Greyhounds scored in the first drive of the second half. Viktrup launched a 28-yard pass to Kurt Rafdal to get Carmel on the move, and finished it with a 37-yard toss to Tobias Watkins for a touchdown. The 'Hounds second touchdown of the quarter came late, but it again started with a big Viktrup throw: He tossed a 50-yard pass to Nathan Melchi to get the ball to the 9, then Viktrup ran the ball in from there to score.

Viktrup finished things up with a two-yard touchdown run with 7:36 left to go in the game. Nick Stacy converted all four extra-point kicks.

"It's a great offense, and you just know things will come together if you stay positive and keep fighting," said Carmel coach John Hebert. He credited his seniors with re-grouping after a pedestrian first half -

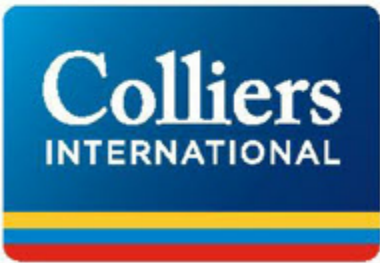

Mel Daniels: 1944-2015...

Former center was a beloved Pacer

The Indiana Pacers Friday were deeply saddened to learn of the passing of former center Mel Daniels, a stalwart on the team's three American Basketball Association championship teams and a member of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Daniels died Friday in Sheridan. He was 71. He is survived by his wife, CeCe and family.

"I join our extended Pacers family in offering my sincerest condolences to CeCe and Mel's family," said Pacers Sports & Entertainment owner Herb Simon. "We

will miss him greatly, but when we look at that Hall of Fame banner in Bankers Life Fieldhouse, we will be forever reminded of what he meant to this franchise."

Daniels was twice named the ABA's MVP (1969 and 1971). He played six seasons with the Pacers, averaging 19.4 points and 16.0 rebounds per game.

A four-time All-ABA selection, Daniels was named to the First Team in 1969, 1970 and 1971, and was a Second Team pick in 1973. He also was named the ABA All-Star Game MVP in 1971 and was the ABA's first Rookie of the Year in 1968 while play-

ing with Minnesota. He is the Pacers' all-time leading rebounder in the ABA (7,643) and he holds the Pacers' ABA record for rebounds in a single season (1,475 in 1970-71).

He is a graduate of the University of New Mexico.

Following the end of his playing career, he joined the basketball staff of the Pacers. He also was an avid horse enthusiast.

His jersey number was retired on November 2, 1985. In September 2012, he was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.
