Third in a series as HAND Conference approaches... Affordable housing in Hamilton County

County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) will conduct its Neighborhoods NOW Conference on Nov. 10. HAND has created descriptions of the four prominent themes of the conference. The third runs today; the next one will appear in a future edition.

Home values are increasing in Hamilton County, but how does it impact our community when 1 in 5 households in Hamilton County are paying more than one-third of their income on housing - a level that's generally defined as "cost burdened?"

While not often recognized, many Hamilton County residents face significant financial burdens with housing, such as seniors, Millennials recently graduated from college with high education debt, and room apartment in Hamilton County. How-

Stressed household budgets leave folks less capable of preparing for a crisis, accessing preventative health care or planning for retirement. Many homeowners risk foreclosure or defer important home maintenance. These same factors impact performance in the workplace, increase healthcare poverty is concentrated in the northern part costs and lower property values. It also helps explain the abundant need at food living in poverty reside in the four cities pantries across the county.

Mayors, clerks, council members, judges up for office...

Election Day is Tuesday

Election Day is Tuesday, with mayors, city clerks, city council members and city judges to be elected Tuesday in Noblesville, Carmel, Fishers and Westfield. Town councils and clerk-treasurers will be elected in Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta. There is no election for county and state offices, that will come next year.

In Noblesville and Fishers the only contests are for seats on city council-at-large, in Cicero there is a contest for clerk-treasurer and in Arcadia for one town council seat.

All the municipal candidates elected on Tuesday will take office on January 1 for four-year terms. With the new year, Noblesville officially becomes a second class city with a nine-member city council instead of the present seven and city clerk and comptroller positions will replace the present office of clerk-treasurer.

While it is not unusual in Hamilton County to find few Democratic candidates for office, this election may set a liam. "My father Maurice Roberts Gilliam grew up there. record for fewest Democrats ever seeking office: only four

plus one independent. Republicans will take all the rest of the local municipal offices by default.

In the Noblesville race for city council-at-large Democrat Paula Gilliam is seeking to become only the second black elected to office in city history. Gilliam told The Reporter that she is running for office because "we need more than one party" in Hamilton County.

"People died for us to vote and 50 years later the bill has to come up again," said Gilliam. "We are citizens of the slight increase in absentee balloting in recent days, early United States, our voices should be heard and the voices of all poor middle class. God did not give us life to just to say it is about me, we are to work together for our neighbors."

Gilliam said that Noblesville "has always been a great place" to raise a family; she raised her children here. She also mentioned the farmers and the big part they have in the area

Gilliam also said she found a letter from her great grandfather, William Penn Roberts, in the April 2, 1880 edition of the Noblesville Ledger.

I feel like my Great Grandfather said it is time to give us a chance, these words are still true," said Gilliam.

Voter turnout is expected to set records or near-records for low participation. Absentee voting usually gives an indication of how the election turnout will be. Despite a voting has been slow and the outlook remains poor for election day.

Voters can still use early voting; it is open from 8 a.m. to noon on Monday.

In the meantime, with so little interest in this year's election, political attention is being turned to next spring's primary now just over six months away. gle to afford the cost of living in Hamilton County.

Further indication of housing stress locally is that in 2011, the Township Trustees reported spending \$375,345 to provide housing for 793 recipients (an average of 66 per month).

"Subsidies" are as unpopular as ever, but the largest government subsidy for housing is the mortgage interest deduction. Paid out annually to homeowners who itemize their taxes, these tax benefits directly lowers housing costs for some. Similar programs to support housing cost relief for the most vulnerable is greatly needed.

Public and private partnerships to need to be developed to build more affordable housing units throughout the county, and support programs that address the unmet needs of Hamilton County families.



Ward receives Thomson Reuters Public Sector Champion Award

Hamilton County Assessor Robin Ward has been honored recently with an award from Thomson Reuters. She was named one of the 2015 Public Sector Champions by the company for her work in tax administration. Ward was awarded the Excellence in Business Process Transformation Award for her work in streaming tax administration.

Per a company statement "The name of the game for government officials sometimes boils down to the need for speed—paired with accuracy, of course. Hamilton County recognized the need to streamline managing administrative data in the office by integrating the Assessors Cama System with their tax and billing system data. Previously, it took several days of time-consuming manual processes, delaying the taxpayers' review time for updated administrative data.

Hamilton County Assessor Robin Ward led the integration of the ProVal solution in her office, subsequently streamlining the flow of information from the assessor's office to the public. Now administrative entry takes less than a day. By freeing up staff and resources, quickly resolving issues, and bringing accurate values to the tax and billing system, she and her team can confidently say they serve the public better."

Ward, who was also recently been named the 2015 Indiana Assessor of the Year, has been employed with Hamilton County for

21 years and is currently serving her 2nd term as County Assessor. She is a Level III Certified Indiana Assessor-Appraiser. Robin served as Noblesville Township Assessor from 1999-2008. She is a member of the Association of Indiana County Assessors and past president of the Indiana Assessors East Central District and is currently serving as District Representative. She is also a member of Indiana Chapter International Association of Assessing Officers.

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

Season opener postponed

New Lady Huskies basketball coach Omega Tandy has been with the team only about three weeks. Since arriving in Hamilton Heights, Tandy has seen good news and maybe not so good news.

She likes what she has seen on the court. She likes the way the Lady Huskies are adapting to the new style of play.

Tandy wishes Taylor Boyd, her 6-3 junior center, was healthy. Boyd likely will be sidelined for the season with an injury. Also sidelined, for the present, is standout sophomore point guard Lexi Branham. She is targeted to return on Nov. 9.

Overall, Tandy says she is "excited."

Tandy has a history of success, both as a player at North Central High School and at Cleveland State University and then as an assistant coach at Lawrence Central and at Ben Davis. At Ben Davis, while working with Hall of Fame coach Stan Benge, the Giants won a state and national championship.

So, it goes to say, Tandy knows how to coach.

She has some good, young talent returning.

"These kids are so smart," Tandy said. "They're picking up the adjustments we are making."

The loss of Boyd will be tough. She averaged 8.6 points and 6-4 rebounds a game last season. Boyd was the fourth leading rebounder in Hamilton County during her sophomore season.

Branham, now just a sophomore, was a key player to last year's team. Running the point very well, she scored at a 7.7 clip and dished out 3.5 assists a game.

The leading scorer returns. She is sophomore, Kayla Kirtley, a 6-foot guard who last year averaged 12.3 points a game.

Also returning with talent and experience are senior Bri Henson, who for now is running the point; junior Ashton Runner, who last year averaged 8.4 points and 4.0 rebounds a game; senior Amy Griffey, who scored at a 3.0 clip; and sophomore Ana Collar, who did well while playing in 22 varsity games.

In a scrimmage on Saturday, Tandy started Henson, Runner, 5-10 junior AireAnna Stretch, Collar and Kirtley.

Westfield set for a run

Ginny Smith isn't exactly a new coach, not in the way a very good season. fans might think of a new coach. She spent five seasons as an assistant at Westfield before taking off a couple of seasons to start a family.

Now, Smith is back, replacing Shane Sumpter who has moved on to coach the Westfield boys.

"I've been around the program for a while," said Smith as she prepares her Lady Shamrocks for a Wednesday season opener at Northwestern.

Northwestern is a new opponent on Westfield's schedule. Smith players aren't new.

"We have a new offense but we have a veteran group who can make adjustments," said Smith.

"We have seven seniors and three juniors and we'll be playing a couple of sophomores before Christmas," said the coach.

"We'll have good senior leadership."

The seniors are Abby Reeder, Annaleise Drudge, Haliegh Reinoehl, Maddy Grennes, Jalyn Foland, Allison VanDyke and Paige Shockley.

Reinoehl is 6-2 and Grennes and VanDyke both are 5-10, so Smith isn't expecting any rebounding problems.

Reinoehl at 9.1 boards a game, led Hamilton County in rebounding last season. Grennes averaged 4.7 boards a game.

No scoring problems, either. Vandyke, at 14.0, was the county's seventh leading scorer. Reinoehl scored at a 12.2 clip and Grennes averaged 11.5. Foland scored at a 6.1 clip and Reeder averaged 5.3 poins a game.

'We're a big team with big guards," said Smith.

There are three juniors on the roster, Allison Dotson, Emily Katter and Morgan Clary.

The two sophomores Smith hopes will develop by mid-season are Ryann Bunting and Sophia Kreag.

'We have some adjustments to make and should do that by late November," Smith said.

Westfield finished 16-7 last year, so with the veterans returning it appears Smith's first varsity club is headed for

Historic sweep for Carmel

Just when you think Carmel and Hamilton County cross country can't make any more history, they do.

The Greyhounds made an unprecedented sweep of the team and individual state champions at Saturday's IHSAA State Finals, which took place at the LaVern Gibson Cross Country Course in Terre Haute. In addition, Carmel's boys team led a 1-2-3 finish of county teams, with Fishers the runner-up and Westfield placing third, the Shamrocks' highest ever finish at state.

The boys race was first this year, and so was the Greyhounds senior Ben Veatch. He defended his individual championship by racing home in 14:59.8. Veatch won by seven seconds, a much more comfortable finish than last year, when he squeaked to victory in .07 seconds.

"It's been great," said Veatch, "We've had a lot of setbacks this year with losing two of our leading seniors, Thomas Revard and Teddy Browning. The resiliency this team has shown, a lot of young guys stepped up and grew up and this is the best team I've been a part of.

Veatch also won the Mental Attitude Award

"It's awesome, knowing what it stands for and it's a great honor, especially with all the guys that have won it in the past," said Veatch. "My role model (Bobby Browning) who won it (in 2013). I've just been trying to be the best man I can be.'

Sophomore Ben Miller, showing a glimpse of the present and future, placed 25th in 15:57.0, earning All-State honors. Carmel finished with 110 points, ahead of Fishers' 158.

"We knew coming in that we were matched up with them pretty tight," said Carmel boys coach Colin Altevogt. "Obviously having the guy win puts us in a good position early. For everything our guys have been able to do this season and how resilient they've been, we're really, really excited to come out today and perform well and run as well as we did."

The Tigers were led by senior Trevor Thompson, who finished 26th in 15:58.0.

"We ran really well," said Fishers coach Nathan Warnecke. "We knew that Carmel was the primary competition today. Carmel ran really well. 
