## Noblesville bypass...

## Ready to rumble

The long-awaited plan for a White River bridge Pleasant Street in Noblesville has been received by county officials and was subject of a meeting County

Commissioners, highway department leadership and Noblesville city officials

The overall project would see Pleasant Street improved from 16th Street on the east to River Road on the west with a second phase possible that would extend the new roadway to join Ind. 32 at Hague Road.

The new bridge, projected to cost about \$2.5 million, will be the county's responsibility. Widening and improving Pleasant Street to the bridge would be a city obligation although negotiations between city and county could provide for the county to undertake some bridge approach costs.

The new roadway would serve as something of a bypass of downtown Noblesville. While it is proposed to be only a two-lane road, it would have left turn lanes and somewhat limited access allowing traffic to move more freely than Conner Street where all east-west through traffic travels.

The plan (a conceptual study), two years or more in preparation, was done by the Corradino Group LLC in cooperation with Butler, Fairman and Seifert Engineering. It provides estimates on various portions of the project. Whether the city has funds to finance Pleasant Street widening has not been revealed, but the county's bridge cost is available in the Major Bridge Cumulative Fund.

No action plan or timetable has yet been discussed. But, pressure has been building in recent years for some action to relieve congestion which is often experienced on Conner Street through the city, and some officials have indicated they are ready to move on a solution.

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
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## 4 days with grandkids makes 1 week Indy Honor Flight

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
