# Republicans win all but one county race

To no one's surprise Republicans won most of the very few races on municipal election ballots in Hamilton County yesterday. But, Jan Unger, the Cicero clerk-treasurer, will be the only elected Democrat in the county as she won re-election over Susan Underwood 448 to 229 with the help of numerous Republican voters.

Two Democrats running for at-large city council seats in Noblesville were unsuccessful as GOP candidates Brian Ayer, Mark Boice and Mary Sue Rowland easily won, each receiving about 2,300 votes. Democrats Paula Gilliam and Mimi DeMoore got 1,094 and 898 votes respectively.

In Fishers Republicans Todd Zimmerman, Cecilla Coble and Rick Block won at-large council seats with each receiving over 3,000 votes. Their lone Democrat opponent Greg Purvis lost but came closer than many suspected with just over 2,000 votes.

At Arcadia the only race saw an independent, Jeff Lockridge challenge Republican candidate Hill. Hill won easily 141 to 31.

Carmel, Westfield, Sheridan and Atlanta had no elections because all Republican candidates were unopposed. All the officials in the county's eight cities and towns take office January 1 for new four year terms.

Some interesting sidelights reported yesterday included a sign seen in Cicero which gave an indication of Clerk Jan Unger's support among Republicans. It read "a Republican Purdue graduate for a Democrat from IU."

The county elections office where the election process went smoothly did get a number of phone calls from Carmel residents who had apparently not been reading the news. They complained that their polling place was not open. That, of course, was because there was no election.

Voting in general was very light as had been expected, but heavier in Fishers than other areas. The small number of ballot contests was seen as the main reason for the poor overall voter turnout.

# I-69 widening, improvements

The Indiana Finance Authority Board made a preliminary selection of an \$85 million Milestone Contractors L.P. proposal to widen and rehabilitate 15 miles of Interstate 69 in Hamilton and Madison counties as part of the state's Major Moves 2020 program. Public hearings are scheduled to collect public comment on the selected proposal.

Two public hearings will be held, with the first taking place at 6 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 5, in the Miami Room at the Anderson Public Library, 111 E. 12th St. in Anderson. The second hearing will begin at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 12 in the Council Chambers at Noblesville City Hall, 16 S. 10th St. in Noblesville.

Milestone Contractors of Columbus and designer United Consulting Engineers Inc. propose to add a travel lane in each direction between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and State Road 38 (Exit 219), and add a southbound lane between the 116th Street entrance ramp and the future 106th

Street exit ramp. In addition, the project includes reconfiguring the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a diverging-diamond design to improve traffic flow, widening the Campus Parkway bridge over I-69, and replacing the Brooks School Road bridge deck over I-69.

**Best value for Hoosier taxpayers**

The IFA and Indiana Department of Transportation sought the proposal that would deliver the best value to Hoosier taxpayers. Design-build teams submitted competing bids that were compared to determine which would accomplish the most within an \$85 million budget.

The IFA and INDOT reviewed and scored proposals from three short-listed design-build teams using criteria described in the [request for proposals](#). The Milestone proposal scored highest for its detailed project management, traffic and public involvement plans. An extended design life for the pavement, rehabilitation of additional structures and added widening

accomplished 18 percent more than was estimated within the \$85 million budget.

**About Major Moves 2020**

Part of Governor Mike Pence's 2014 legislative agenda, Major Moves 2020 invests \$400 million in widening and rehabilitating heavily-traveled interstates that are approaching 50 years of age.

Every year since 2013, Governor Pence and the Indiana General Assembly

have increased funding for transportation. In total, \$1.26 billion from the state general fund, including \$200 million for local roads and bridges, has been budgeted. The current two-year state budget includes \$200 million for expansion projects through 2017.

## INDOT asks motorists to... Report signal, school zone flasher timing errors; overhead lighting outages

The Indiana Department of Transportation asks Hoosier motorists to report signal timings and school-zone flashers that did not change over automatically with daylight saving time on Sunday, Nov. 1. In addition, motorists may report overhead lighting outages above interstates, U.S. highways and state routes to INDOT's district offices around the state.

**Signals and school-zone flashers**

Flashers that alert motorists entering school zones and traffic signals are timed using computerized controllers. This allows traffic signals to use different patterns for periods of heavy traffic, such as the morning and evening commutes.

INDOT is now confirming that the internal clocks in traffic signals and school-zone flashers changed over automatically. INDOT technicians may remotely access the computerized controllers within most traffic signals. INDOT crews must manually patrol and confirm timings for school-zone flashers.

**Overhead lighting**

Photosensors turn on most lighting above state and federal highways, and are not affected by daylight saving time. But turning the clocks back each fall changes daylight during commuting times and may make overhead-lighting outages more noticeable.

INDOT also urges commuters to be more alert when driving at night. About half of the nation's crashes occur at night even though nighttime driving makes up a quarter of the miles traveled.

**Report timing errors, outages**

To report an overhead-lighting outage, signal timing change or school-zone flasher that displays an hour early, contact the INDOT district office for your region. A map of INDOT's districts with links to contact information is at <https://entapps.indot.in.gov/dotmaps/districtmaps>.

INDOT maintains numbered state routes, U.S. highways and interstates, including their intersections and interchanges.

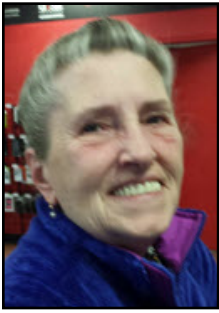

## Ralph Edwin Waltz

January 9, 1920 - October 29, 2015

Ralph Edwin Waltz, 95, of Carmel, Indiana, died on Thursday, October 29, 2015. He was born in Tipton County, Indiana, on January 9, 1920, to the late William and Lena Estel (Heisser) Waltz.



He graduated from Arcadia High School and enrolled at Indiana University, Bloomington, in 1938. He was called to duty for his country during World War II and served as an Air Force cryptographer stationed in the South Pacific from 1942-1945. After the war, he returned to Bloomington and earned a business degree in 1947.

After graduation he began a long career in banking with the American National Bank in Noblesville, Indiana. ## Carmel's Proscenium project to give new life to blighted land

Local developer Anderson Birkla presented details to Carmel City Council Monday night for a new project to transform the old Party Time site on the northwest corner of Carmel Drive and Range Line Road into a new mixed-use community of office space, upscale living, retail shops and dining options on land that is part of the City of Carmel's redevelopment area.

The Proscenium will include 60,000 square feet of office spaces, more than 19,000 square feet of retail and 224 luxury residential units. Six new buildings will be

located on the nearly seven-acre site. The project will also include an underground parking garage with 449 parking spaces, to go with additional surface parking for a total of 608 spaces.

"We are very excited to see this property be redeveloped into what will be a new southern gateway into Civic Square and City Center, providing new opportunities for businesses and residents to work and live in our increasingly vibrant central core. From the Proscenium, residents and visitors alike will be just a few steps or a short bike ride

from the attractions at City Center, the future Midtown and the Arts & Design District," said Mayor Jim Brainard.

Proscenium will follow the tradition of distinct architecture and beautiful streetscapes seen throughout the city's redevelopment areas and will include the extensions of two public streets - Veteran's Way and Executive Drive. To facilitate connectivity, the City of Carmel plans to build a roundabout at Range Line Road and Executive Drive,

which will also serve as a new primary entrance into Civic Square's government center. There will also be a southern entrance off of Carmel Drive as a part of the Veterans Way extension and a pedestrian-friendly entry point near a future new roundabout at Range Line Road and Carmel Drive.

The project will also include a central "Town Green" public space for gatherings, events, relaxation and fun activities open to residents and visitors. On the South side of the space will be a restaurant and tavern overlooking the green space providing for night life and leisure opportunities.

"Just as a proscenium by definition is at the forefront of a curtain on stage, we see

this Proscenium in the same way; standing at the forefront of what our beautiful city has already accomplished and will continue to do in the near future. We are excited to be a partner with the City on this project," said Anthony Birkla, Principal of Anderson Birkla.

The property has been under redevelopment and the guidance of the Carmel Redevelopment Commission, which has approved the purchase of the property. The developers must now gain approval of the City Council for certain financing aspects of the project.

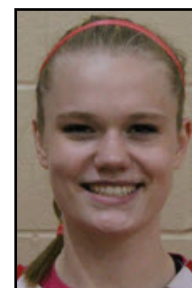
# Fishers blanks LC, 10-0

## 2016 testing regulations highlight return to Phoenix

Testing regulations for the 2016 Verizon IndyCar Series season, announced by INDYCAR, include a two-day promoter test at Phoenix International Raceway in preparation for the series' return to the historic 1-mile oval.

The Phoenix promoter test is scheduled for Feb. 26-27, five weeks in advance of the Phoenix Grand Prix on April 2. It will mark the first Indy car event in 11 years at PIR, which hosted 61 Indy car races from 1964-2005.

Under the regulations that went into effect Aug. 31 and remain through the final race of the 2016 season on Sept. 18, a Verizon IndyCar Series team (defined by INDYCAR as one or more entrants/car numbers under common ownership or control) is permitted a total of eight team test and/or full-size wind tunnel test days. Teams that also field a full-season entry in Indy Lights Presented by Cooper Tires, the top rung of the Mazda Road to Indy development ladder, will now be granted an extra Verizon IndyCar Series team test day once the Indy Lights entry has participated in five 2016 races.

Verizon IndyCar Series teams will continue to receive an extra test day if seat time is divided between a Verizon IndyCar Series driver and Indy Lights driver.

"These regulations balance diverse interests in our paddock while containing costs and fostering great competition," said Mark Miles, CEO of Hulman & Company, the parent of INDYCAR and Indianapolis Motor Speedway. "We are really looking forward to our first promoter test next spring in Phoenix as a great opportunity to showcase the return of PIR to the Verizon IndyCar Series."

"The testing regulations provide teams the opportunity to earn additional test days for competing in Indy Lights and by testing a driver who is a current competitor in Indy Lights," Miles added. "This year the shared test day rule provided several Indy Lights drivers the opportunity to test a Verizon IndyCar Series car at Sonoma Raceway, which we felt was instrumental in the continued development of these young drivers and the overall growth of the ladder series."

INDYCAR has scheduled eight promoter test days in 2016, open to all entrants and mandatory for Leaders Circle members. Promoter test days do not count against the eight-day team test allotment. The Phoenix promoter test in February is the only one not in conjunction with a typical race weekend schedule. The other promoter test days are: March 11, St. Petersburg; April 22, Barber Motorsports Park; May 12, Indianapolis Motor Speedway road course; June 24, Road America; July 29, Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course; and Sept. 16, Sonoma Raceway.

A full-season entrant is allocated a maximum of 10,000 engine miles for use in all tests and race events from the start of the 2016 Verizon IndyCar Series season to the start of the 2017 season. Testing mileage accrued between the end of the 2015 season and start of the 2016 season will come from the entrant's remaining 2015 mileage allocation - which was also 10,000 miles - or be charged at a per-mile rate set by the respective engine manufacturers, Chevrolet and Honda.

Other testing regulation highlights include:

- INDYCAR has scheduled an aero kit safety test April 6 on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway oval. All full-season entrants are permitted to participate in the test, which will be used by INDYCAR to determine approval of aero kit components for the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race.
- Verizon IndyCar Series teams with rookie drivers are allocated two additional team test days for the rookie driver.
- Rookie drivers must successfully complete a superspeedway (ovals 1.5 miles or longer) rookie test prior to participating in a superspeedway promoter test or practice for a superspeedway race, whichever comes first. Rookies participating in the Indianapolis 500 only are permitted a superspeedway test day for the purpose of driver evaluation. The Indianapolis 500 rookie orientation test is scheduled for May 16 at Indianapolis Motor Speedway.
- New Verizon IndyCar Series teams are granted four additional team test days.
- In-season tire testing requested by Firestone, exclusive tire supplier for the Verizon IndyCar Series, must be approved by INDYCAR. Participation is limited to two days per team by invitation from Firestone. All teams are permitted to have one car participate in team testing in conjunction with any approved tire test.
- Engine manufacturer testing is limited to two days each for Chevrolet and Honda, from Sept. 14, 2015, to March 3, 2016. Mileage accrued while using a manufacturer's development engine will not count against an entrant's 10,000-mile limit. No team may participate in more than one of the engine manufacturer test days.
- Aero kit suppliers Chevrolet and Honda are permitted three days of aerodynamic bodywork component testing each between Sept. 14, 2015, and the end of the 2016 race season. Mileage accrued while using a manufacturer's development engine will not count against an entrant's 10,000-mile limit.

All ovals and permanent road courses on the 2016 Verizon IndyCar Series North American schedule are approved testing venues. Additional approved oval test venues are: Auto Club Speedway, Chicagoland Speedway, Homestead-Miami Speedway, Kansas Speedway, Michigan International Speedway, New Hampshire Motor Speedway, Richmond International Raceway and The Milwaukee Mile. Additional approved road course test venues are: Circuit of the Americas, Homestead-Miami Speedway, Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, Palm Beach International Raceway, Sebring International Raceway and Watkins Glen International.

Testing blackout dates are: Nov. 25-30, 2015; Dec. 21, 2015-Jan. 3, 2016; and May 9-30, 2016. In addition, teams may not conduct on-track testing within seven days prior to the start of any on-track activity at a race location (i.e., a promoter test or the first day of practice on a race weekend).



Looking for their first win of the season, the Indiana Pacers traveled to Detroit to take on the Pistons and came out victorious, besting their Central Division foe 94-82. Indiana leaves the Motor City with a win thanks to an excellent second quarter and the play of former Piston Rodney Stuckey.

Indiana began the second quarter trailing by six, but took control of the game by starting the period with a 20-0 run. The outburst enabled Indiana to dominate the quarter 35-17, and the Pacers led 59-47 at halftime.

The second half was the "Stuckey Show." The veteran guard made big play after big play throughout the half. With 2:00 remaining in the third quarter, his three-point play pushed Indiana's lead to 20, its largest of the night. At one point in the second half, Stuckey scored 15 straight points for Indiana, single-handedly keeping the Pistons at bay.

"[Stuckey] showed us that he could do that last year," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "Our second unit is all new this year, so we've been feeling ourselves out, but you know we've got to remind ourselves of what he's capable of doing. [It was] just a great performance and if we had that off the bench every night then it's another reason why we can be really good this year."

He finished with a team-high 23 points on 9-of-14 shooting. With Stuckey leading the way, Indiana's bench outscored Detroit's 43-2.

"Their bench had a lot more minutes than our bench, so we got to factor that in, but the 20 to nothing run was the deal in the game," Pistons head coach Stan Van Gundy said.

Indiana's offense struggled in the final quarter, scoring just nine points, but the defense held Detroit to 15. The Pistons cut the lead to 11 midway through the period, but wouldn't get any closer.

"It feels good to get off of this losing streak and build towards something positive," Pacers forward Paul George said.

George scored 16 to go along with nine rebounds and six assists. Monta Ellis had his best game since donning a Pacers uniform, finishing with 15 points. Finally, George Hill contributed 12 points, six assists, four steals and three rebounds.

Detroit's Andre Drummond was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Week and continued his excellent play tonight. The big man scored 25 points on 12-of-17 shooting and grabbed 29 rebounds. Reggie Jackson scored 20 and dished out six assists and Ersan Ilyasova added 12, including two three-pointers, to support Drummond.


