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Local INDOT projects that swapped federal funds near completion

The Indiana Department of Transportation today joined Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum and other local officials to open its Main Street to two lanes in each directhe city's \$2.3 million 2nd Street project. The project transformed a city street that had not been resurfaced in more than two decades and still had some original brick pavers under the roadway.

'Vincennes' 2nd Street is one of four local projects that exchanged federal funds for state funds last year," said INDOT Director of Local Programs Kathy Eaton-McKalip. "The program allowed local communities to accelerate construction projects such that all are now nearing completion."



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

gish start, we'd always have to battle back. Tonight, our whole focus the past couple weeks has been urgency, start with urgency. Tonight we finally put it all together, put four quarters together and played great."

That made the halftime score 28-7, and Westfield added on to it in the second half. William Harrison nailed a 42-yard field goal midway through the third quarter; that complemented the six extra points he kicked for the game. With three minutes left in the third, Pepiot threw to Max Mc-Cool, who took it 25 yards to the end zone. Westfield's defense stepped up again at the start of the fourth quarter, when it made a goal-line stand. The Bronchos had driven down to the one-yard line, but the 'Rocks stopped them there. "It gives us huge confidence," said linebacker Jackson Garrett. "It just allows us to keep going and we know we're playing well. There's nothing that's going to stop us when we get those stops." "Complete, total resolve by our defense," said Gilbert. "Our defense has not been great this year. But we are getting better, and I think we're getting better fast. That goal-line stand was awesome." That led to the Shamrocks' final touchdown of the night, which came with 7:46 left in the fourth, when Brandon Karsnick made a two-yard run to score. Lafayette Jeff, to its credit, went down swinging, scoring three touchdowns in the final 5:28, but Westfield had the game in hand by then. Pepiot had an outstanding game, completing 14 of 20 passes for 255 yards. He totaled four touchdowns for the night: Three passing and one rushing. Manley and Milo Beam each had five receptions. Froelich's 80 yards led the Shamrocks' rushing. This win sends Westfield up to the Wildkats' stadium next week, where the Shamrocks will take on an undefeated Kokomo team. The 'Kats smashed Huntington North 57-0 to win the Sectional 12 championship - Kokomo's first football sectional trophy since 1985. But that's for later - right now, Westfield is celebrating another sectional trophy of its own. 'We're going to enjoy tonight," said Gilbert. "You got to celebrate the victories and never take them for granted. There's people that go decades and not win a sectional. Believe me, we are not taking them for granted. We're thrilled."


