Indiana Chamber of Commerce honor...

Carmel is 2015 Community of the Year

The Indiana Chamber of Commerce presented Mayor Jim Brainard with its 2015 Community of the Year honor at its 26th Annual Awards Dinner at the Indiana Convention Center held Wednesday. The honor was presented before a crowd of more than 1,000 business and community leaders from across the state of Indiana – including Governor Mike Pence and several state elected officials.

Carmel was honored for its 20-year effort to reinvent itself. “The once-small town is today among the fastest-growing cities in the country. Restaurants, shops and a variety of residential and business projects form the new downtown. A focus on the arts and business advantages – particularly in the software and health care industries – also are fueling success,” remarked the Indiana Chamber in presenting the award. “The powerful combination of busi-

ness growth and quality of life amenities that make the city a great place to work and live is rarely seen.”

Mayor Brainard accepted the award on stage. “We’re trying to build a city that is able to compete. If we can’t compete with the most beautiful and most fun places on Earth, we’re not going to be able to get those people to Indiana and we’re not going to then be able to attract the corporations that want to hire those people,” said Mayor Brainard. “On behalf of the citizens of Carmel, my staff and all public officials throughout the city and township, I want to thank the Indiana Chamber for this honor.”

Previous communities honored include: Bloomington (2014), Bedford (2013), Indianapolis (2012), Kokomo (2011) and Terre Haute (2010).

The Chamber also honored State Sen. Brandt Hershman (R-Buck Creek) as the Governmet Leader of the Year and Dustin Sapp of TinderBox as the Indiana Vision 2025

Noblesville Parks Department prepares for holidays with events, camp

The Noblesville Parks Department is offering a variety of special activities and events to keep children and families active and having fun this holiday season.

“November and December are busy months. There are occasions when families want to be together and others when children need to be with their peers and parents hunger a break. We have several options to keep everyone smiling during the joyous holiday season,” Recreation Director Nichole Haberland said.

Holiday activities taking place in the next two months include:

Elf’s Holiday Family Party – The parks department will host a new and free holiday party from 6 to 8 p.m. Friday, December 4 at Forest Park Lodge. Help name the newest parks team member – an elf – who is joining them for the holiday season. Other activities include stories, crafts and family games.

Chicago Christmas Shopping Bus Trip – The Noblesville Parks Department will host its annual “Chicago Christmas Shopping” bus trip on Saturday, Dec. 5. Bring the kids or make a day-trip getaway.

The bus will leave Noblesville City Hall, 16 South 10th Street, at 7 a.m. and will return at approximately 11 p.m. The cost is \$50 per person and the deadline to register is 4 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 2 or when the bus is filled. Those under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Parent’s Night Out (ages 4-12) – Camp counselors will allow free play and organized play as the group need to keep children active and engaged while parents have a night out on the town. Parent’s Night Out is held in the Forest Park Lodge basement from 6 to 9 p.m. Nov. 13 and Dec. 11. Cost is \$5 per child.

Parent’s Day Out (ages 3-12) – Need more than just a few hours to accomplish tasks? While you take the day to shop, camp counselors will allow free and organized play from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Dec. 12 in the Forest Park Lodge basement. Cost is \$25 per child. Pre-registration is required as limited spaces are available.

Preschool Holiday Workshop (ages 2.5-5) – Create presents for your family this

holiday season with the recreation staff from 9:15 a.m. to 10:45 a.m. Nov. 17 and Dec. 17 in the Forest Park Lodge basement. Cost is \$5 per child.

Winter Break Camp – To assist parents with kids home from school, the parks is offering camp Monday through Wednesday, December 21-23 and December 28-30 at Forest Park Lodge. Join the recreation staff for a few fun days of games, crafts, nature, laughter and friendship. Campers should bring their lunch and wear gym shoes. Two snacks will be provided each day. Camp is 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. Before and after care is available from 7 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. for \$3 per day. Youth can attend the camp for a day or the week. The weekly cost is \$75 for residents (\$90 for nonresidents) and the daily rate is \$30 for residents (\$40 for nonresidents).

Westfield submits application for Best Communities competition

Westfield is moving forward in its pursuit of being named a semi-finalist in the America's Best Communities competition. The Downtown Westfield Association submitted its application yesterday in hopes of securing funding that would help fund the community's downtown revitalization plans.

"It's truly exciting to see the community come together for the America's Best Communities grant," Mayor Andy Cook said. "For Westfield to be named a quarterfinalist in this competition is truly an honor. We want to keep the ball rolling."

Westfield was named a quarterfinalist in the competition earlier this year, and is vying for one of 15 semifinalist positions that will be selected in early 2016. Semifinalists will then have the chance to present their revitalization plans to judges that will decide whether those communities move forward in the competition.

America's Best Communities is a unique, multi-stage, three-year contest. Launched in September 2014, communities with populations of 9,500 to 80,000 and located within Frontier's 27-state footprint are eligible to apply.

The America's Best Communities top three competition winners will be announced in April 2017 following a year of implementing the visions and plans. The community with the most innovative and effective plan will be awarded a \$3 million grand prize. Second place will win \$2 million, and third will win \$1 million.

The America's Best Communities competition is sponsored by Frontier Communications, DISH Network, CoBank and The Weather Channel.

Local INDOT projects that swapped federal funds near completion

The Indiana Department of Transportation today joined Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum and other local officials to open the city's \$2.3 million 2nd Street project. The project transformed a city street that had not been resurfaced in more than two decades and still had some original brick pavers under the roadway.

"Vincennes' 2nd Street is one of four local projects that exchanged federal funds for state funds last year," said INDOT Director of Local Programs Kathy Eaton-McKalip. "The program allowed local communities to accelerate construction projects such that all are now nearing completion."

INDOT sets aside about \$220 million of its federal highway funding each year for local transportation projects. Passed by the Indiana General Assembly in 2013, House Enrolled Act 1067 allows INDOT to swap \$1 in federal funds with 75 cents in state funds for approved projects.

Carmel Main Street project

In August, the city of Carmel reopened its Main Street to two lanes in each direction east of U.S. 31. The \$4.2 million project accommodates increased traffic from the new U.S. 31 exit and includes new utility lines, enclosed drainage and sidewalks.

Shelbyville Fairland Road extension

A \$905,000 section of Shelbyville's Fairland Road is on schedule to open by the end of this year. When all sections are completed, Fairland Road will connect I-74 Exit 109 with State Road 44/McKay Road, growing Shelbyville's industrial park and reducing truck traffic and congestion downtown.

Delphi streetscape project

In 2012, Delphi was named one of the state's "Stellar Communities". The city of Delphi used \$434,000 in state funds to replace a 100-year-old water line underneath a planned Stellar road and streetscape project.

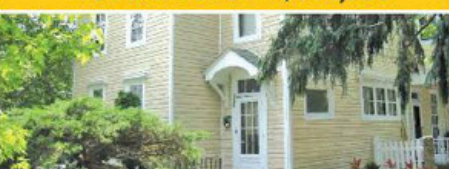

Defense, offense solid as a “Rock”...

Westfield wins third consecutive sectional

Everything clicked for the Westfield football team Friday night, and what a great time for that to happen.

The Shamrocks played solid defensively and strong offensively, which added up to a 45-27 win over Lafayette Jeff in the

Class 5A Sectional 11 championship at Riverview Health Stadium. This marks the third consecutive trophy for Westfield - the first time the 'Rocks have ever achieved that feat - and the eighth overall for the school.

"Kudos to this group of seniors, being a part of three straight sectional champion-

ships," said Shamrocks coach Jake Gilbert. "I couldn't be happier. We have coaches who hadn't won a sectional, we got players who hadn't won a sectional, some move-ins, and it just never gets old."

Westfield will travel to Kokomo next Friday to play for the Regional 6 championship.

The Shamrocks got going right away, with Nate Froelich scoring their first touchdown: A 35-yard run at the 8:40 mark of the first quarter. Then it was the defense's turn: The Bronchos got the ball down to the Westfield 3-yard line, but the 'Rocks forced a fumble and recovered.

"It's just a huge momentum shift for us when we get backed up against the goal line, and then we come away stopping them and they don't get any points," said Luke Lammers, one of Westfield's fine

defensive backs. "It's great. It's a great momentum shift."

The Shamrocks led 14-0 after the first quarter, thanks to a big play. Quarterback Ryan Pepiot threw a pass to Evan Manley, and that became a 67-yard touchdown reception.

Lafayette Jeff answered by scoring on a 21-yard pass just 12 seconds into the second period, but Westfield took control late in the quarter. Pepiot found Jonathan Swidan for a 24-yard touchdown pass a little past the halfway mark of the quarter, then Pepiot powered the ball in from the 1-yard line as time expired in the first half.

"We started slow in the past few games," said Pepiot. "We were on a four-game losing streak. We always had a slug-

gish start, we'd always have to battle back. Tonight, our whole focus the past couple weeks has been urgency, start with urgency. Tonight we finally put it all together, put four quarters together and played great."

That made the halftime score 28-7, and Westfield added on to it in the second half. William Harrison nailed a 42-yard field goal midway through the third quarter; that complemented the six extra points he kicked for the game. With three minutes left in the third, Pepiot threw to Max McCool, who took it 25 yards to the end zone.

Westfield's defense stepped up again at the start of the fourth quarter, when it made a goal-line stand. The Broncos had driven down to the one-yard line, but the 'Rocks stopped them there.

"It gives us huge confidence," said linebacker Jackson Garrett. "It just allows us to keep going and we know we're playing well. There's nothing that's going to stop us when we get those stops."

"Complete, total resolve by our defense," said Gilbert. "Our defense has not been great this year. But we are getting better, and I think we're getting better fast. That goal-line stand was awesome."

That led to the Shamrocks' final touchdown of the night, which came with 7:46 left in the fourth, when Brandon Karsnick made a two-yard run to score. Lafayette Jeff, to its credit, went down swinging, scoring three touchdowns in the final 5:28, but Westfield had the game in hand by then.

Pepiot had an outstanding game, completing 14 of 20 passes for 255 yards. He totaled four touchdowns for the night: Three passing and one rushing. Manley and Milo Beam each had five receptions. Froelich's 80 yards led the Shamrocks' rushing.

This win sends Westfield up to the Wildkats' stadium next week, where the Shamrocks will take on an undefeated Kokomo team. The 'Kats smashed Huntington North 57-0 to win the Sectional 12 championship - Kokomo's first football sectional trophy since 1985.

But that's for later - right now, Westfield is celebrating another sectional trophy of its own.

"We're going to enjoy tonight," said Gilbert. "You got to celebrate the victories and never take them for granted. There's people that go decades and not win a sectional. Believe me, we are not taking them for granted. We're thrilled."

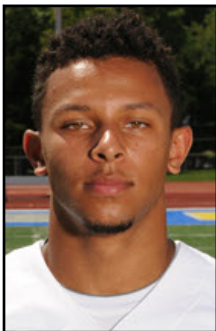
The 'Hounds scored twice in the third quarter, with Jalen Walker rushing into the




