### Republicans win all but | Westfield captures third one race

#### By FRED SWIFT

To no one's surprise Republicans won most of the very few races on municipal election ballots in Hamilton County yesterday. But, Jan Unger, the Cicero clerktreasurer, will be the only elected Democrat in the county as she won re-election over Susan Underwood 448 to 229 with the help of numerous Republican voters.

Two Democrats running for at-large city council seats in Noblesville were unsuccessful as GOP candidates Brian Ayer, Mark Boice and Mary Sue Rowland easily won, each receiving about 2,300 votes. Democrats Paula Gilliam and Mimi respectively.

In Fishers Republicans Todd Zimmerman, Cecilla Coble and Rick Block won at-large council seats with each receiving over 3,000 votes. Their lone Democrat opponent Greg Purvis lost but came closer than many suspected with just over 2,000 votes.

At Arcadia the only race saw an independent, Jeff Lockridge challenge

Republican candidate Hill. Hill won easily 141 to 31.

Carmel, Westfield, Sheridan and Atlanta had no elections because all Republican candidates were unopposed. All the officials in the county's eight cities and towns take office January 1 for new four year terms.

Some interesting sidelights reported yesterday included a sign seen in Cicero which gave an indication of Clerk Jan Unger's support among Republicans. It read "a Republican Purdue graduate for a Democrat from IU.

The county elections office where the election process went smoothly did get a DeMoore got 1,094 and 898 votes number of phone calls from Carmel residents who had apparently not been reading the news. They complained that their polling place was not open. That, of course, was because there was no election.

### Divided council adopts "one year" resolution

The resolution is retroactive to January of this year. This covers the time earlier this when County Commissioners requested \$3 million for construction of a Public Safety Training Center.

> not announced that they will seek re-election. The new candidates in the field are George Kehl, Fishers police chief, and Jeff Hern, Fall Creek Township trustee.



### Kids these days...Part two

The last time I had the opportunity to write for this space, I shared how great our kids are these days. This time, I want to talk about why they're not so great. The United States is a world power, and as Americans, we are always competing with other countries. We want to be the best at everything. This past summer, I truly enjoyed watching all the women's World Cup soccer games and cheering for

our team, wearing my red, white, and blue headband 90 minutes at a time. I wanted us to win. We had to win. And we did. It was awesome!

We Americans are always competing at something, it seems: the World Series, the Olympic games, new technologies, engineering the best car, and increasingly, in education. As a public school teacher, I feel that the free public education provided to every child in our country is just about the best thing our country does. Every kid can go to school and receive, more or less, the same quality education for free. On top of that, we have many other options for those who want to pay for it.

However, according to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), an organization which "provides a forum in which governments can work together to share experiences and seek solutions to common problems," the US was most recently ranked 27th among developed nations in mathematics performance and 16th in reading performance. These low rankings do not fit well with our usual domination in sports and our general attitude that winning is everything.

What should also be considered when looking at these rankings, however, are the various factors playing into the performance of other nations. For example, in China, a country often recognized for new technologies, only 34% of high school aged students attend school. Only allowing those students most suited to attend school raises the country's perceived scores tremendously. However, it does not portray a true picture of the nation's ability to educate its people.

In South Korea, most recently ranked number one in the world for mathematics performance by the OECD, students attend school up to 16 hours a day, six days a week. In South Korea, suicide is the leading cause of death among teenagers. Earlier this year, two high school girls in the city of Daejeon jumped to their deaths, leaving a note stating, We hate school."

While there surely are nations offering their children an excellent education without these negative factors, I believe the US offers its children a quality education with a balanced schedule that allows our kids time for being kids. Kids in all levels of school in the US have time during the school day for art, music, and physical education. Outside of school hours, they play sports, participate in clubs and activities, take fun classes, play outside, watch movies, talk to friends, go on trips, and anything else they choose to do. Guerin Catholic will have next week off, then return to action Friday, Nov. 20 at Decatur Central.






