Sheridan approves 2015-16 spring and winter coaches...

Britt remains as Sheridan's baseball coach

In a 5-0 vote the Sheridan Community Schools Board of Trustees on Tuesday evening approved the district's 2015-2016 spring and winter coaches.
Approximately 60 Sheridan area residents attended Tuesday's meeting after rumors circulated throughout Sheridan that varsity baseball coach Matt Britt would not be approved for the 2016 spring season.
"I think it's time to kind of put that behind us and focus on the kids and the program and coaching baseball," said Britt. "It was a tough situation to deal with personally, but from everything I gather, there was a lot of community support and ultimately some concessions were made on both sides of the fence."

Britt was also appreciative of what he called an "overwhelming feeling of support" that he got from the community.
"Very appreciative of all the phone calls and texts and ultimately all the people that showed up tonight, too," he said.
Sheridan High School athletic director Brian Jones said he was "very pleased we got it all worked out," and that everything is moving in a positive direction. His wife Joni Jones was also happy.
"I was proud of our community tonight, and I haven't felt that way in a long time," she said.

IKEA coming to Fishers

IKEA, the world's leading home furnishings retailer, today announced it is submitting plans to the City of Fishers, Indiana for a store that would increase the Swedish company's presence in the Midwestern U.S. as its first store in the state. Pending approvals, construction of IKEA Fishers could begin as early as Summer 2016, with an opening in Fall 2017. (The closest IKEA stores currently include: the Cincinnati-area store in West Chester, OH; and Chicago-area IKEA Bolingbrook and IKEA Schaumburg.)
Located approximately 15 miles northeast of downtown Indianapolis, the 296,000-square-foot proposed IKEA store and its approximately 1,000 parking spaces would be built on 35 acres along the eastern side of Interstate 69, just south of the E. 116th Street exit. Store plans reflect the same unique architectural design for which IKEA stores are known worldwide. IKEA also will evaluate potential on-site power generation to complement its current U.S. renewable energy presence at nearly 90% of its U.S. Locations.
"We are excited at the prospect of growing our Midwest presence with an Indianapolis-area store," said IKEA U.S. president Lars Petersson. "A location in this retail corridor would provide our already 184,000 Indianapolis-area customers their own store and would introduce the unique IKEA shopping experience to other consumers throughout Indiana."
IKEA Fishers would feature nearly 10,000 exclusively designed items, 50 inspirational room-settings, three model home interiors, a supervised children's play area, and a 350-seat restaurant serving Swedish specialties such as meatballs with lingonberries and salmon plates, as well as American dishes. Other family-friendly features include a 'Children's IKEA' area in the Showroom, baby care rooms, play areas throughout the store, and preferred parking. In addition to the more than 500 jobs that are expected to be created during the construction phase, approximately 250 coworkers would join the IKEA family when the new store opens. IKEA Fishers also would provide significant annual sales and property tax revenue for state and local governments and schools.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness told WISH-TV that IKEA's decision to open a store here is "a big win" for the city.
"There are certain retailers in the world that, when they decide to locate in your community," Fadness said in a story on WISH-TV's Web site, "it says something about the quality and character of your community."

Veteran's Day brings ceremonies, reflections

The Noblesville American Legion post and the Noblesville Veterans of Foreign Wars will host today's Noblesville Veteran's Day program, which takes place at 11 a.m. on the Courthouse Square. Mayor John Ditslear will speak, there will be a simple flag ceremony, and both organizations will present wreaths. There will also be a remembrance of Staff Sergeant Matthew R. Ammerman, a Noblesville resident who was killed in Afghanistan last December.

The ceremony will be broadcast on Hamilton County Television for those who cannot attend. After the ceremony, the American Legion post will host a ham and bean lunch, with everyone welcome to attend.
As the United States celebrates Veteran's Day today, the stories of those who served come to light. That includes the story of the Commander of the Noblesville VFW: Navy Post Commander Jim Castor. A life-long Noblesville resident, Castor

signed up for the Navy, saw action in the South Pacific during World War II, then returned home - all while he was a teenager.
"I went into the service when I was 16," said Castor, now 88. He was actually too young, but he had a driver's license that said he was a year older. His mother signed him up to go into the service - "but she didn't know it," Castor said.

Dura Products preliminary resolution

The Noblesville Common Council has approved the preliminary resolution for designating an economic revitalization area for Dura Products, 17265 Harger Court.
Dura Products will construct a new 15,000-square-foot building and install new and used equipment for the manufacturing and distribution activities of the company. Total investment for this project will be

approximately \$1.8 million for real property and \$1.15 million for personal property.
"We are excited to have another successful manufacturing businesses relocate to Noblesville. Our city is the agricultural gateway to northern Hamilton County and Dura Products provides small and large farmers with dependable, safe equipment," Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear said.

Dura Products was founded by owners, Patrick and Marcy Molter, who have been in the farming industry in many capacities - from family farming to agricultural sales to sales and service of agricultural pumps and meters. Dura Products places a high priority on products that address today's

Noblesville Schools Education Foundation receives grant

The Noblesville Schools Education Foundation has been awarded a \$5,000 grant allowing its executive director, Sharon Trisler, to earn a Certificate in Fund Raising Management from The Fund Raising School at the Indiana University Lilly Family School of Philanthropy.

The Indiana Association of Public Education Foundations (INAPEF) awarded the grant to the Noblesville Schools Education Foundation as part of a program designed to bolster Indiana's K-12 public education foundations' impact on our state's public education. The certificate program consists of four, multi-day, intensive courses that teach the fundamentals for building a solid fundraising foundation to meet organizations' financial goals. Participating in the certificate program demonstrates a commitment to fundraising leadership.

The Noblesville Schools Education Foundation exists solely to provide fund-

ing for scholarships and classroom grants that allow Noblesville Schools' teachers to expand the educational opportunities offered to their students. Since 2007, the Foundation has funded more than \$200,000 in classroom and school grants, \$17,460 in teacher scholarships, and \$18,000 in scholarships to graduating seniors who plan to pursue a career in teaching.

Statewide, K-12 public education foundations collectively raise an average of \$7 million annually that is invested back into public schools in the form of district-wide initiatives, teacher grants, and scholarships.

In addition to the grant given to the Noblesville Schools Education Foundation, INAPEF awarded grants to eight additional Indiana's K-12 public education foundations through a grant INAPEF received from Lilly Endowment Inc.

environmental concerns including the EPA requirement that all portable re-fillable containers have either a one-way check valve and/or tamper evident seals on all openings.

"Dura Products continues to experience exponential growth and is poised to become the No. 1 brand in agricultural transfer systems, as well as one of the top three American made transfer systems for the diesel exhaust fluid market. We are very proud to be a Hoosier born company, with the majority of our suppliers located in Indiana," Dura Products owner Patrick Molter said.

Dura Products Inc. has 70 United States distributor locations as well as two in Canada.

"Noblesville is logistically well-suited and has a balanced community infrastructure, making it attractive for employee recruiting and retention. We are excited to build our new corporate office and manufacturing facility in Noblesville," Molter added.

As part of the resolution, the common council has approved the location as an economic revitalization area eligible for an eight-year tax abatement on the \$1.8 million of real property. Currently, the City of

Noblesville receives minimal property taxes on the vacant land. Subject to the adoption of a confirmatory resolution, the tax phase-in allows 100 percent of the assessed value of the building to be deducted the first year and approximately 13 percent less each of the following seven years.

During those eight years, the city will earn \$191,330 of net property taxes and the developer will save \$240,670. In exchange, Dura Products will relocate 11 current employees and create 28 new jobs within five years with an average wage of \$40,560 without benefits.

Dura Products also is receiving a five-year tax abatement on personal property. During that time, the city will earn \$25,154 in net property taxes and the developer will save approximately \$43,846.

November 10 was the preliminary resolution, which is the introduction to an economic development project and lays out the initial request for approval with council. Because the "first look" resolution was passed, a public hearing and confirmatory resolution will be held at the next council meeting on November 24.

VETERAN'S DAY

Castor was assigned to the *U.S.S. Columbia*, which was in the last Naval battle of World War II in the Lingayen Gulf, which is in Northwest Luzon in the Philippines. The ship sunk two Japanese cruisers, two battleships and two destroyers.

"We had nine major bombardments," said Castor. "We shot down 29 planes and we took three kamikaze hits. That did a lot of damage."

But once the war was finished and the Japanese surrendered, the *Columbia* took off for Truk, a lagoon in Micronesia that was a Japanese base, and re-signed a peace treaty with the Japanese.

Castor spent nine or 10 months more in the Navy after the war ended.

"I was supposed to get out in San Diego," he said. But the Navy said he was in an "irreplaceable job," and stayed on until the *Columbia* went through the Panama Canal, then to Bermuda for two weeks, then finally landing in Boston, and that's where Castor was discharged.

"I was glad to get back," said Castor. After considering a career in the service, he decided to attend Purdue University - "and Uncle Sam was going to pay for it," said Castor - where he majored in electrical engineering.

"The same thing they teach in the third grade," said Castor. "Just about!"

Castor went on to work at Firestone for a few years, then opened his own business, Castor's Auto Clinic. He worked there until he retired in 1999.

"I've been a VFW member for almost 58 years, and I love Noblesville and I've enjoyed life," said Castor.

Over at the Sheridan American Legion, Commander Charlie Stapleton was also very young when he served his country.

"I spent my 19th birthday in Korea," he said. Stapleton has been the commander at the Sheridan post "five out of the last six years," and said he will "probably run again as long as my health holds up."

"We have a good bunch of guys here," said Stapleton, who turned 70 in April. He said the Legion has "donated over \$12,000 to the community" in scholarships. If the post ever finds someone in trouble, Stapleton said it tries to help out the best it can.

The Sheridan Legion hosted a Veteran's Day dinner Tuesday night, a free meal for veterans and their spouses. Stapleton said no one is ever turned away from the dinner.

"Never have, never will," said Stapleton.

The Legion will also attend three different Veteran's Day programs that will be presented by Sheridan Schools. The programs take place at 9:45 a.m., 1:30 p.m. and 7 p.m.

The Cicero American Legion is conducting a ceremony at 11 a.m. today at the Cicero Cemetery. The Legion will also conduct a presentation in conjunction with students at Hamilton Heights Elementary School at 2 p.m.

"One of the teachers is a veteran, he's speaking," said Jody Brown, commander of the Cicero Legion. "We have a retired Marine Gunnery Sergeant, Brett Mize, he'll be playing Taps near the end of the ceremony at the school tomorrow."

The Legion lined Jackson Street in downtown Cicero with flags Tuesday. The post has also joined with East Union Christian Church to raise \$12,000 for a diabetic alert dog for the 16-year-old daughter of a retired Army Sergeant in Tipton.

Heights returns to action on Friday, hosting Noblesville.

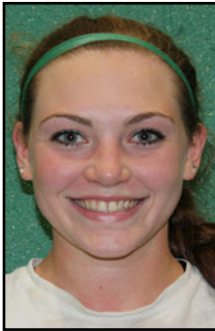

Fishers also plays at Lake Central, but Fishers and Southeastern will not meet.

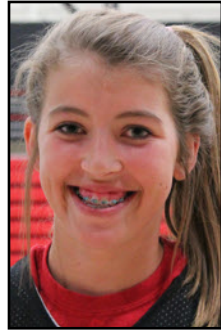
