## GOP rallies for Fall Dinner

With the focus now on next year's big



elections, Hamilton County Republicans rallied Tuesday night for their annual Fall Dinner. While 2016 will feature the important presidential and congressional election, the spring primary will be the first target locally

for the GOP.

With victory in the primary being tantamount to election and with no slating in Hamilton County, it will be a wide open, highly competitive election in May. An open judgeship, a contest for a local state senate seat and a likely battle for control of the county council should make for a spirited primary campaign.

The mood at last night's dinner presented that of a unified and friendly political atmosphere. But, you can bet officeholders and candidates were sizing up their chances, anxious to see if their likely opponents were present and who was consulting with who.

The crowd of around 350 at Ritz Charles last night was largely composed of the core of county Republican movers and shakers and major contributors representing firms doing business with local government agencies.

Also attending the function were Congresswoman Susan Brooks and Indiana House Speaker Brian Bosma along with state legislators from Hamilton County and numerous county and city officials.

Openly campaigning for nomination next year were Steve Carter, running for Indiana Attorney General; representatives of Todd Young, running for U.S. Senate, David Najjar seeking election as judge of Hamilton Superior Court 2, and Jeff Hern, candidate for County Council.

## NHTSA endorses seat belts for school buses

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration made news earlier this week when it endorsed putting in seat belts for Web site that the NHTSA's announcement was "a victory for school buses.

Officers will join more than 250 state and local law enforcement agencies, to conduct high-visibility patrols encouraging drivers and passengers to drive sober and buckle up

"The Thanksgiving holiday period is an extremely busy travel time in Indiana," said

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. "Our focus is on keeping drivers and passengers safe. Increased patrols will allow us to look for intoxicated drivers or those unsuspect you've been drinking, we will pull you over."

Increased enforcement during the Thanksgiving holiday period is an annual statewide effort supported by federal funding allocated to the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership from the Traffic Safety Division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). Officers from law enforcement agencies across the county will work overtime to conduct sobriety pa-

around the clock.

According to ICJI, in November 2014, across Indiana, resulting in 235 injuries and fatalities. Additionally, in the same month, crash reports indicate 276 accidents involved a driver or a passenger unrestrained, resulting in 303 injuries and 15 fatalities.



store more salt than it could previously. The new facility hold 5,000 tons of salt and the other salt barn houses 3,500 tons. Johnson said an average snow storm requires approximately 600 tons of salt to cover the entire city.

"By having two barns now, we should always be able to take delivery of our salt in the off season like right now. That helps tremendously not having to worry about that." Johnson said.

The second salt barn, which includes a 10,500 gallon tank for calcium chloride, also saves the city fuel and time and should make a visible impact immediately when utilized.

"The people on the eastside of Noblesville should see an improvement on their service and response time when winter hits because of the new salt barn. The new facility is estimated to save our drivers an hour and 15 minutes every time they have to refill," Mayor John Ditslear said.

The street department's other salt barn is on 16101 River Road on the west side of Noblesville. The department also uses one bay at its 1575 Pleasant St. building to make a salt brine.







Kokomo's best team ever???

# Westfield's next opponent

Arguably, Kokomo has the best football team in its history.

The Wildcats couldn't have done much better. They are 11-0, with a sectional championship, heading into hosting the regional this Friday.

Just in time for the arrival of Westfield for a 7 p.m. battle.

The game isn't exactly a match-up of a Hoosier Crossroads vs. old Hoosier Crossroad, but it has the taste of being one. More like Hoosier Crossroads and North Central Conference, but the HCC is a loop which welcomed in old HCC teams McCutcheon, Harrison and Lafayette Jeff two years ago.

All of which, actually, means little to Friday's regional game, unless you want to scoreboard compare a little.

Westfield won a sectional championship last week by defeating Lafayette Jeff 45-27. Back on Sept. 18, Kokomo beat Lafayette Jeff 46-14 in a North Central Conference game.

In the first round of the sectional, Westfield knocked off Harrison 42-22 after opening the season with a 38-21 win over Harrison. Kokomo has defeated Harrison 48-14

Kokomo won its sectional by bombing Huntington North 57-0 after a first-round 20-15 win over Muncie Central. Both are NCC teams but Huntington and Kokomo did not play during the season. Kokomo did win during the season against Muncie Central 63-28.

Kokomo will come into the regional game averaging an impressive 45.4 points on offense and 14.5 on defense. Westfield is averaging 31.6 points a game and the 7-4 Shamrocks are allowing 31 points a contest.

"Kokomo is enjoying its best season in history, I believe," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. "I'm sure they have great chemistry. They are excellent offensively and look scary on film running the ball."

Run the ball is what the Wildkats do best. Senior Jeron Gray has carried 198 times for 1,672 yards; junior Keenen Wheeler 114 times for 1,127 yards and senior Marcelle Kenner 124 times for 897 yards.

That's not to say Kokomo can't pass. Sophomore quarterback Kyle Wade is 63-of-101 for 1,119 yards. The leading receiver is Gray with 16 receptions for 168 yards.

But, Kokomo doesn't pass the pill like Westfield does. The Shamrocks' quarterback, Ryan Pepiot is 201-for-354 for 2,546 yards.

Pepiot has thrown for 17 touchdowns and has been intercepted a dozen times. Wade has 13 TD passes and five interceptions

Pepiot is Westfield's second leading rusher with 133 carries for 512 yards. His leading pass receiver is Evan Manley with 50 catches for 778 yards. Milo Beam, in eight games, has 26 receptions for 394 yards. Lucas Schultz, who is playing free safety on defense, has 29 receptions for 302 yards and Max McCool 43 receptions for 436 yards.

Kokomo's success has been somewhat surprising. The Wildkats were just 6-4 last year and lost to Harrison, 17-14, in the term of the Senior Jeron Gray has carried 198 year and lost to Harrison, 17-14, in the opening game of the sectional.

"We have to beat them in chemistry, in toughness, in physicality and in execution," said Gilbert.

"I think we are getting better fast and findind out identity, finally. It has taken us awhile, but I really like where our team is right now. The kids have worked hard and the assistant coaches have done a terrific job

"We will have to play a full team game for four quarters, but our kids know that and we are excited for the challenge," Gilbert concluded.

Fishers dominated the boards 36-11 and shot 21 more free throws than did Anderson, while the Indians held the advantage on 3-poit shooting and turnovers.

Fishers committed 31 turnovers in the game

Three Tigers finished in double figures, led by sophomore Ali Gerka with 18 points. Junior Toni Grace scored 17 points off the bench and Hannah Kroehler added a dozen.

Fishers' size played a huge part in the win. Kroehler, the 6-0 senior, had 13 rebounds; 5-10 junior Jaela Baskin pulled 7, and 6-4 junior Audrey Turner collected 6.

"Kroehler had a great night on the boards," said Gaines. "It seems every time a rebound came off, Hannah had it."

Grace led the team with five steals. She also played a key role as Anderson was charging. With the score at 48-43, Grace stole the basketball; scored a bucket on the play and added a free throw. Then, Gerka made a full-court pass to Megan Forbes for a two-pointer.

Fishers will join Hamilton Southeastern on Saturday as the two Hamilton County clubs play in the Lake Central Invitational. Fishers and HSE will not meet.


