

## Carmel marks 12 years of arts grants with 2016 call-out

"We view the support of our arts organizations as a strong economic development tool for the City of Carmel. Since the creation of the Arts & Design District in Carmel, we have had more than





All this helps attract families and visitors to the city, and helps local businesses. A study by the Americans for the Arts shows that the typical arts event attendee spends close to \$30 per person, per event, in addition to the cost of admission. "With the variety of shows at The Palladium and the Center for the Performing Arts, our local businesses are reaping the benefits. Based solely on the tickets sold last season, that additional spending is close to \$3.5 million at local merchants and service providers," said Mayor Brainard.

# Tonight at Penn

Down through the years a trip to the state finals, or even winning the state, has run through two of Indiana's most storied football programs, Carmel and Penn.

That will happen again tonight as first-year varsity coach John Hebert will take his 10-2, No. 2 ranked Greyhounds into the South Bend area to face Penn's 11-1, No. 3 rated Kingsmen.

Eight times since 1987 Carmel and Penn have faced each other in the chase for a title, once in the regional, five times in the semi-state, and twice in the finals.

In semi-state play, Carmel and Penn have met each of the last two years, Carmel winning 14-13 last season and 28-13 the year before. Many of the games have been nail-biters. That's wasn't the case in 2011 when the Greyhounds took a big 54-0 cakewalk from Penn.

Penn's only loss this season came in the fourth game when the Kingsmen dropped a 24-21 thriller to Orachard Lake St. Mary's out of Michigan. No Indiana team has come close to a Penn machine which is averaging 41.6 point a game on offense and giving up 14.2 points an outing.

Carmel's only losses came in the second and third games of the year, losing to Cincinnati LaSalle out of Ohio 35-28 and to No. 1 ranked Center Grove, 24-21, here in Indiana. The loss to Center Grove caused Carmel to finish second in the powerful MIC conference. The Greyhounds are averaging 34.5 points a game and giving up 18.6 points a contest.

"Penn is a great football team once again," said Hebert. "Their offensive line is enormous and well coached."

Carmel's 14-13 win over Penn last year is still fresh in the mind of Hebert, who at that time was an assistant under Kevin Wright.

"Camden Bohn, their quarterback, is their best player and the biggest concern for our defense," Hebert said. "He can run very well. He had 130 yards on 17 carries against us last year.

"Defensively they are very disciplined and physical.

"We must establish the ability to control the football and at least neutralize their special teams, which are excellent," Hebert added.

The Greyhounds have shown their talents in running and or pass the pigskin.

On the ground, Carmel will try to battle Bohn with three Greyhounds. Tobias Wat-


