Merger will keep Arts programs going in Noblesville

The Noblesville Cultural Arts Commission appears headed for merger with the Nickel Plate Arts District in a move that will likely keep popular Cultural Arts programs alive for the community. The organization has been financially troubled in the past year or two and in danger of going out of business. Nickel Plate Arts, on the other hand, receives generous grants from the Hamilton County Visitor and Convention Commission which gets its revenue from the countywide Innkeepers Tax. Nickel Plate is the organization working to develop cultural arts opportunities along the route of the former



Nickel Plate Railroad from Fishers and Noblesville north to Tipton. The rail line contributed greatly to Hamilton County's development in 19th and 20th centuries. Currently Nickel Plate owns and operates the historic Judge Stone House at 8th and Maple Ave., the Stevenson House next door, and has plans to renovate its newest acquisition, the Kincaid House at Fishers. The Cultural Arts Commission has a long history in Noblesville, offering such annual programs as Shakespeare in Park, Art on the Square, a band concert and Law Day. But, financing these and other operational costs has become more than the volunteer organization can handle, according to John Davis, treasurer of the group. The merger of the two cultural organizations is not final. The deal has been approved by the Cultural Arts board of directors, but must still be approved by the Nickel Plate board which is in the process of "looking closely" at

the merger plans, according to Aili McGill, director of Nickel Plate Arts. The agreement, if approved, will guarantee continuation of the current Cultural Arts Commission programs for at least two years, and beyond assuming there is continued public support of the programs. The Judge Stone House, centerpiece of the Nickel Plate District along 8th Street, is one of the oldest remaining homes in the city. It was built prior to the Civil War by the county judge for whom it is named, and is now open to the public every Wednesday to Saturday. The district hopes to develop other sites along the rail route in Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta as well as the historic Kincaid House at Fishers. A hiking and biking trail is also planned by County Parks essentially following the 165 year old Nickel Plate line from Noblesville to Atlanta.

Three newest officers sworn in to Noblesville Police Department

On Tuesday, Nov. 10, Chief of Police Kevin Jowitt and Mayor John Ditslear swore-in the three newest members of the Noblesville Police Department. Officers Whitney Coffin, Corey McGriff and Keelie Eads took the oath in the Council Chambers of City Hall in front of members of the officer's family, friends, police department members and city employees. The swearing-in ceremony culminates an applicant selection process which dates back to November of 2014. On November 6, the three police recruits successfully graduated from the 206th Session of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy, where they spent the past 15 weeks in Plainfield receiving training in a variety of areas to include criminal and traffic law, firearms, emergency vehicle operations, human behavior, physical tactics and EMS awareness to name just a few. Several of the officers were recipients of awards that were presented during the graduation ceremony. McGriff graduated with honors and Coffin received special recognition for achieving the third highest overall academic score for the class and she also served as an assist squad leader. The officers will now return to the police department to complete approximately two weeks of in-service training prior to entering the Field Training and Evaluation Program where they will spend another 16 weeks. During this period, the officers will be assigned to several different Field Training Officers who will evaluate the performance of the new officers as they learn to apply their training from the academy to the day-to-day functions of being a police officer. At the completion of the Field Training and Evaluation Program, the officers will then be certified to work by themselves in a solo-capacity role and will be assigned to a shift within the Patrol Division. When all is said and done, the officers will have accumulated more than 39 weeks or 1,560 hours of training prior to being released to work as a police officer for the City of Noblesville.

Eastbound I-465 to US 31 ramp shift tonight

Carmel marks 12 years of arts grants with 2016 call-out?

Next year marks the 12th anniversary of the City of Carmel's financial support for the local arts community with special Support The Arts grants from the city's budget. Since 2004, more than \$8 million has been approved for local community arts programs.

The City is now taking applications for the 2016 Arts Grants. Last year, \$698,050 was approved for grants to more than a dozen local arts organizations. Next year, another \$700,000 has been budgeted by the City Council for the grants that will be proposed by the Mayor. All grants must be approved by the City Council.

"We view the support of our arts organizations as a strong economic development tool for the City of Carmel. Since the creation of the Arts & Design District in Carmel, we have had more than

350,000 visits each year and that number grows as more merchants locate in the district and additional public events are added, bringing millions of dollars to our local economy, real revenue that is exceeding expectations and will far surpass the city's investment in redevelopment," said Mayor Jim Brainard.

The world-class performing arts center, The Palladium, with a diverse variety of musical and entertainment performances, helps draw visitors from all over the Midwest and beyond. Many also come for events at The Tarkington and The Studio Theater, the three venues that comprise the Center for the Performing Arts. Carmel is also home a vibrant Arts & Design District with art galleries, the Indiana Design

Center, shops and restaurants, where major events are staged throughout the year, including monthly gallery walks, classic car shows and the popular International Arts Festival.

All this helps attract families and visitors to the city, and helps local businesses. A study by the Americans for the Arts shows that the typical arts event attendee spends close to \$30 per person, per event, in addition to the cost of admission. "With the variety of shows at The Palladium and the Center for the Performing Arts, our local businesses are reaping the benefits. Based solely on the tickets sold last season, that additional spending is close to \$3.5 million at local merchants and service providers," said Mayor Brainard.

It's Carmel vs. Penn, again....

Tonight at Penn

Down through the years a trip to the state finals, or even winning the state, has run through two of Indiana's most storied football programs, Carmel and Penn.

That will happen again tonight as first-year varsity coach John Hebert will take his 10-2, No. 2 ranked Greyhounds into the South Bend area to face Penn's 11-1, No. 3 rated Kingsmen.

Eight times since 1987 Carmel and Penn have faced each other in the chase for a title, once in the regional, five times in the semi-state, and twice in the finals.

In semi-state play, Carmel and Penn have met each of the last two years, Carmel winning 14-13 last season and 28-13 the year before. Many of the games have been nail-biters. That's wasn't the case in 2011 when the Greyhounds took a big 54-0 cake-walk from Penn.

Penn's only loss this season came in the fourth game when the Kingsmen dropped a 24-21 thriller to Orachard Lake St. Mary's out of Michigan. No Indiana team has come close to a Penn machine which is averaging 41.6 point a game on offense and giving up 14.2 points an outing.

Carmel's only losses came in the second and third games of the year, losing to Cincinnati LaSalle out of Ohio 35-28 and to No. 1 ranked Center Grove, 24-21, here in Indiana. The loss to Center Grove caused Carmel to finish second in the powerful MIC conference. The Greyhounds are averaging 34.5 points a game and giving up 18.6 points a contest.

"Penn is a great football team once again," said Hebert. "Their offensive line is enormous and well coached."

Carmel's 14-13 win over Penn last year is still fresh in the mind of Hebert, who at that time was an assistant under Kevin Wright.

"Camden Bohn, their quarterback, is their best player and the biggest concern for our defense," Hebert said. "He can run very well. He had 130 yards on 17 carries against us last year."

"Defensively they are very disciplined and physical."

"We must establish the ability to control the football and at least neutralize their special teams, which are excellent," Hebert added.

The Greyhounds have shown their talents in running and or pass the pigskin.

On the ground, Carmel will try to battle Bohn with three Greyhounds. Tobias Wat-

Sheridan wins big

With one of its stars, last year's Hamilton County scoring leader Brittany Welch, sitting on the bench a second consecutive game and with another, Audrey Reed, playing through a second game while guarding a broken nose with a mask, Sheridan's Blackhawks Tuesday evening in Hobbs Memorial Gym easily unloaded on an outmanned Faith Christian School team, 63-18.

The win evened Sheridan's record at 1-1 going into a Saturday evening Hoosier Heartland contest at Eastern.

Coach Jeff Guenther said Welch will play in that game and that he isn't certain when Reed will play with the difficult-to-see-through nose guard.

In a scrimmage before Sheridan's first game with Speedway, the two players

bumped into each other, causing the injuries.

"Reed is having a hard time seeing through the mask," Guenther said.

Even so the 6-foot Reed scored 21 points in the game last evening.

"She's coming along," Guenther said.

At the same time other Lady Blackhawks may be gaining more experience and confidence.

"I said this is a young team which will have to grow up. It's a brand new group of players," Guenther added.

But, without doubt, a different look of a basketball team once Welch and Reed are healthy and playing together

Eight different Lady Blackhawks scored last evening.

There was never any question about who would win the game. Sheridan led 13-2 after one quarter, 28-6 at halftime, and 44-12 after three periods.

Reed found herself on the hardwood several times in the game, which caused Guenther to question the referees.

"Sometimes when you're bigger and better, officials don't make all the calls," he said.

Sheridan shot only eight free throws.

The Blackhawks were 25-of-45 from the field, and that included a 6-of-14 night from 3-point range.

Reed retired from the game with her 21 points and still 5:16 left to play. Sheridan led 54-14 at that time.

Two teammates joined Reed in double figures. Faith DeVaney, a 6-0 senior forward, notched 14 points and senior forward Nixon Williams added 12 points.

The opening of the conference season and Welch's return to the court on Saturday at Eastern will signal a big night for the Blackhawks, even though the Comets have opened with three straight losses, falling to Western 65-51, Lewis Cass 55-36 and Eastbrook 70-36.

There wasn't a junior varsity game last evening. Faith Christian doesn't have a junior varsity team.

'Hounds suffer season's first loss

Carmel suffered its first loss of the season Tuesday, dropping an overtime contest to Roncalli 54-49.
