Noblesville Schools announced today that Coach Lance Scheib has informed them he will not be returning as football coach. Scheib shared the decision while meeting with school officials to review the football program. He has been head football coach for the Noblesville Millers since 2008 and is also a US History teacher at the high school.

"I want to thank Coach Scheib for the eight years he has spent serving our student athletes," said Jeff Bryant, principal Noblesville High School. "Coach Scheib has shown

a high degree of character while modeling the type of integrity, leadership, and character that we expect from all of our coaches. The numerous relationships that he has formed with students, parents, and colleagues will leave a long-lasting impression."

Noblesville will begin the process of identifying a replacement for Scheib immediately and will announce their selection at a later date.

Scheib will remain in his role as teacher at Noblesville High School.

2015 holiday events to begin soon in Downtown Noblesville

The City of Noblesville, Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, Noblesville Main Street, Nickel Plate Arts and Hamilton County, are finalizing plans for the upcoming holiday activities and would like to invite the public to attend.

The season will kick off at 7 p.m. Friday, November 27 with the annual Lighting Ceremony, sponsored by the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce. This event, held at the Hamilton County Judicial Center, 1 Hamilton County Square, is always a hit with families and includes special holiday music, a reading of "The Night Before Christmas" by Mayor John Ditslear, and of course, the lighting of the beautiful downtown lights and Christmas tree. The ceremony will take place inside with the tree lighting on the courthouse square.

Prior to the lighting ceremony, Noblesville Main Street will feature more than 20 ice sculptures as part of the annual Ice Festival around the courthouse square. Beginning at 5 p.m. the public can view the pieces and receive complimentary hot chocolate while supplies last. The ice sculptures will remain on display as weather permits.

Also on November 27, Nickel Plate Arts will open its Gifted III exhibit at the Judge Stone House, 107 South Eighth Street, from noon to 5 p.m. Nickel Plate Arts will transform the gallery into a unique Holiday boutique where shoppers can purchase handcrafted gifts from gifted local artists. In addition to paintings,

Nickel Plate Arts will feature ceramics, furniture, paper arts, stained glass, sculptures, textiles and woodworking. From 3 to 6 p.m., there will be a reception for November Showcase Artist Bobbi K. Samples to meet her and view her work at the Stephenson House.

Noblesville Main Street will be promoting the shop local theme this year on Saturday, November 28 commonly known as Small Business Saturday. The group will feature an information station with merchant directories and a list of holiday events from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in their tent located next to Matteo's Ristorante Italiano, 40 North Ninth Street.

The holiday festivities will then continue at 2 p.m. Sunday, November 29 with the annual Holiday Parade. As always, the holiday parade will mark the debut of Santa Claus to Noblesville for the season. Boys and girls are invited to stop by Santa's House on the courthouse square after the parade or during the hours listed below and tell him what they would like for Christmas. There is no charge to visit with Santa and parents are welcome to bring their own camera and take photographs.

The fun then continues on Friday, December 4 from 5 to 8 p.m. at the First Friday event, sponsored by Noblesville Main Street and the City of Noblesville. The downtown shops and restaurants will

As Fishers Police Chief, Kehl has shown a true dedication to public service, being integral in establishing and managing many initiatives that make Hamilton County's residents safer, including county-wide efforts such as the Hamilton County/Boone County Drug Taskforce and the Hamilton County Metro Child Exploitation Taskforce. Under Kehl's leadership, the Fishers Police Department became one of only a few agencies in Indiana to be Internationally Accredited by the Commission of Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies.

level of public safety to the residents of Hamilton County," Kehl stated.

U.S. Rep. Susan Brooks and Gary Mayor Karen Freeman-Wilson will be the featured speakers at the [Hazelett Women in Leadership Forum](#) Nov. 23 at the Indiana Statehouse.

They will address the topic of women's leadership in government, discussing what skills women bring to government and what perspectives they offer.

The forum was created by Ambassador Randall L. Tobias, the Randall L. Tobias Foundation, the IU Tobias Center for Leadership Excellence, Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis and the IUPUI Office for Women.

Participants are asked to [register for the forum](#), which is free and open to the public. It begins with a reception at 5 p.m. in the Rotunda, followed by the presentations at 6 p.m. in the North Atrium.

"This program grows out of a desire to honor and hear from individuals who are successful leaders," said Carol Madison, executive director of the Tobias Center.

"Our speakers are individuals who exemplify excellence in leadership and work to support the advancement of women in leadership roles.

"To that end, the IU Tobias Center, the IUPUI Office for Women and IUPUI Chancellor Nasser H. Paydar invite the community, corporate leaders, students and scholars to share in a learning experience focused on women leaders in all walks of life," Madison said. "Honorees offer insights into knowledge about leadership in the modern workplace, including their reflections on the role of gender, work/life balance and effective communication."

Brooks represents the 5th District of Indiana, which spans eight counties in Central Indiana. When elected, she became the first Republican congresswoman from Indiana since the 1950s.

Brooks served as deputy mayor of Indianapolis under Mayor Steve Goldsmith and was appointed U.S. attorney for the Southern District of Indiana in 2001 by President George W. Bush.

ISP to add extra patrols

In an effort to make the upcoming Thanksgiving Holiday travel period safer, the Indiana State Police has partnered with approximately 250 other law enforcement agencies statewide in participating in the annual **Safe Family Travel**, Operation Pull Over campaign. The campaign begins November 13th and runs through Sunday, December 6th. The Indiana State Police will be conducting high visibility enforcement efforts including sobriety check points and saturation patrols looking for impaired drivers and unrestrained motorists.

To help ensure the safety of all motorists during this holiday period, the Indiana State Police will also be participating in Operation C.A.R.E., or Combined Accident Reduction Effort. Operation C.A.R.E. is a federally funded

program and will allow additional troopers to patrol Hoosier roadways during this upcoming holiday period.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, safety belt use is the most effective strategy a person can employ to prevent death and minimize injury resulting from traffic collisions.

Please help do your part to make the Thanksgiving Holiday travel period safe by observing the following safety rules:

- When planning to travel, make sure you are well rested, as a fatigued driver is a dangerous driver.
- Increase your following distance; remember the two-second rule.
- Watch for slowed or stopped traffic when approaching construction zones

- Leave a car length between you and the vehicle in front of you in stopped traffic. Watch approaching traffic in your mirror and be prepared to take evasive action.
- Decrease your speed according to traffic and road conditions
- Beware of bridges, overpasses and intersections where ice tends to form first in cold inclement weather.
- Don't use cruise control on slick roads.
- Make sure everyone in your vehicle is properly restrained.
- DON'T BE DISTRACTED-Pull over and stop to use electronic devices.
- DON'T DRIVE IMPAIRED-Have a designated driver.
- MOVE OVER and SLOW DOWN for emergency and highway service vehicles.

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

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Lady Millers move to 3-1

Noblesville tops Heights

It was a tale of two basketball teams, two very different basketball teams, in a Friday night girls basketball game between long-time Hamilton County rivals Noblesville and Hamilton Heights at the Husky Dome.

Sam Salmon came off the bench and reached double figures with 10 points.

Shannon also added four assists and four steals.

Noblesville won the rebounding battle, but not by a lot, 39-27. Emily Kiser led the Millers with nine boards. Shannon yanked eight and O'Reilly pulled six. For the Huskies, sophomore Ana Collar and freshman Sydney Griffey each led with five boards.

Two sophomores led Heights in scoring, Lexi Branham with eight points and Kayla Kirtley with seven.

With the loss, Heights has come out of its first week with a 1-1 record. The Huskies will host Frankton on Tuesday and Eastern on Friday.

Noblesville has a big week ahead, playing at ranked Lebanon on Tuesday; hosting Brownsburg in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game on Friday and playing at Warsaw on Saturday.

"That will be a real test for us," said Buckley.

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

Pacers hold off 'Wolves, continue hot streak

In the third quarter against the Minnesota Timberwolves, the Pacers led by as many as 27 points. In the fourth quarter, that lead shrunk to just one as the cheers at Bankers Life Fieldhouse quickly turned to nervous speculating.

With one minute remaining and the Timberwolves pushing the ball up the floor, Zach LaVine fumbled a pass out of bounds, giving Indiana the ball with 50 seconds left in the game. Monta Ellis, using a pick from Lavoy Allen, drove to the hoop and put in a layup with his left hand to push their lead to three. On the other end, still facing a one-possession game, Ellis forced the ball to come loose and blocked the shot, resulting in a Pacers fastbreak that ended with C.J. Miles getting fouled and sent to the free throw line, where he made 1-of-2. Enough to extended Indiana's lead to four.

"They are an explosive team with young guys who never quit on games," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel explained after the game. "They took all their bigs out, went with five 3-point shooters and opened up the game. We get a lead and we have to keep scoring, keep attacking."

Needing a score, the Timberwolves turned to Andrew Wiggins, who had 26 points on the night, but his 3-pointer

missed the rim entirely, allowing the Pacers to seal the 107-103 win; their sixth win in their last seven games.

LaVine made things interesting with six seconds left when he drilled a deep 3-pointer, but Ellis' free throw on the other end put the Pacers back in front by four points once more, which proved to be the final margin of victory.

As the Timberwolves continued to rally in the fourth quarter, the Pacers tried to parry the runs, but were unable to gain traction for long stretches of play, such as a nearly five-minute period of play in which Indiana was unable to score a field goal. In the first 7:30 of the final quarter, Indiana scored just four points.

"Giving up 30 points in the fourth is unacceptable," Paul George said. "We were aware this team was going to keep coming and that's what they did."

But after a LaVine layup with 4:31 remaining, which cut the Pacers' lead to just three, Glenn Robinson III nailed a 3-pointer from the wing to push Indiana's lead up to seven.

"It's surprising for a young player to make steady, solid plays," Vogel said. "I feel good every time he's out there." It seemed at the time that Robinson's shot would be the final dagger the Pacers needed to topple the Timberwolves, but Minnesota had other plans.

A 3-pointer from Nemanja Bjelica, followed by a layup from Wiggins made the score 101-100, the closest margin since the second quarter.

On the next possession, Pacers head coach Frank Vogel subbed in Lavoy Allen for Ian Mahinmi, and Ellis and Allen executed a pick-and-roll which led to Ellis' game-sealing layup with 41 seconds on the clock.

"I've been feeling good the last four or five games. Hopefully I can be more consistent with it. The shots were going in tonight," said Ellis, who finished the night with 24 points on 11-of-17 shooting.

The driving layup from Ellis, coupled with George's game-high 29 points, proved to be enough for Indiana to escape with a win on a night where its lead shrunk by 26 points in the final 16 minutes of play.

Although the first half featured seven ties and five lead changes, the second and third quarters belonged to the Pacers, as they outscored Minnesota 66-46 over that stretch. First it was George Hill, hitting a 3-pointer to give the Pacers a lead late in the second. Then on the next sequence, a PG-Ellis fastbreak ended with an Ellis dunk, putting Indiana up by three. From there, they pushed their lead to the game-high 27.

But the fourth and final quarter proved to be a challenge for the Pacers, as Minnesota outscored them 30-17.

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
