What happened to Fishers' proposed sports complex?

The City of Fishers greeted news of the nationally known IKEA furniture store's plans to locate their first Indiana store with great fanfare. There was statewide publicity last week when the furniture giant announced it would spend \$34 million on a huge store near 116th Street and I-69. And, the project would apparently involve no property tax abatement.

But, what has happened to the even bigger plan by GK Sports and Entertainment to build a sports and



recreation complex in Fishers? It was announced with equally great fanfare last winter. The developer said it would spend \$76 million on the giant sports attraction to be located near 146th and I-69.

These two projects would add tremendously to the Fishers and Hamilton County economy. But, nearly eight months later officials have heard little from GK which was due to come before the city council to present a timetable for construction and get final approval.

The project is not on the agenda again this month and some sources say they don't expect it to be back. Other officials including city councilman Pete Peterson remain more optimistic, refusing to believe plans for the complex are dead. He said he heard GK is still working to putting

financing in place, but the city has apparently been given no date when they can expect to hear the project is a 'go.'

The GK Sports operation is a nationally recognized developer of sports and entertainment venues. Plans at Fishers called for a 4,200 seat fieldhouse as the centerpiece of its development. The company has apparently not yet purchased the ground for the complex.

So, the question arises as to whether the location might be too close to Westfield's Grand Park which is already in business and presumably doing well financially. Or, are plans still alive and just taking more time than originally hoped?

It depends on who you talk with, and certainly a hope that it's not a case of counting chickens before they're hatched.

Garrick Mallery named Noblesville Christmas Parade's grand marshal

Mayor John Ditslear announced today that the grand marshal of this year's Christmas parade will be Garrick Mallery. Mallery, whose family's roots in Noblesville date back to 1820, turns 88 on Dec. 21.

After graduating high school, Mallery attended Purdue University for one semester before he joined the U.S. Army in 1946 and served as an officer in the Cryptography Division. Earning the rank of second lieutenant before the war ended, Mallery returned to Purdue where he graduated with a degree in agricultural economics and hosted a weekly farm show on the college's radio station.

Mallery returned to Noblesville in 1951 and started his career in real estate.

Other accomplishments in Mallery's life include being one of the Noblesville Elementary Football League's founders; finance chairman for the construction of First United Methodist Church on Monument Street; a dedicated 4-H leader for more than 25 years; and a longtime president and director of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce. In the 1960s, Mallery organized the Hamilton County Health Department and Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Starting Tuesday, Reynolds turns on its...

Christmas lights display

Reynolds Farm Equipment's annual tradition of sharing the Christmas Spirit is beginning to take shape outside of its Fishers, Indiana store location.

The free Christmas lights display can be seen at dusk beginning Tuesday, Nov. 24 thru Thursday, Jan. 3, 2016. "I'll be the first to admit, I'm biased of the Christmas lights excitement," says Lawson. "To see the newly added displays, it's very heart-warming and I hope that everyone enjoys them as much as the rest of Reynolds family does."

INDOT gets ready for winter

Governor Mike Pence has declared this week, Nov. 15 through 21, as Winter Weather Preparedness Week in Indiana. The Indiana Department of Transportation has been preparing for the upcoming winter season since the snow and ice melted last spring. INDOT's top wintertime priority is removing snow and preventing ice on more than 11,000 miles of interstates, U.S. highways and state routes.

Salt in stock

Last winter, nearly 278,000 tons of granular salt and 5.2 million gallons of salt brine were deployed on state and federal highways. INDOT continues to receive deliveries of salt and already has more than 193,000 tons on hand.

New plow equipment

Last winter, INDOT plow trucks logged nearly 5.7 million miles – the equivalent of 228 trips around the earth or 12 round trips to moon.

INDOT continues to add new equipment to its fleet of more than 1,000 plow trucks. A total of 10 "tow plows" will be used this year to clear multi-lane highways. The tow plow and material spreader are pulled behind and to the side of a yellow INDOT plow truck, allowing one driver to clear two lanes at once.

Each yellow plow truck undergoes a full bumper-to-bumper inspection, and mechanics will repair mechanical problems before the first winter storm.

Each yellow plow truck takes 2-3 hours to complete its route with salt assisting in melting between passes. In addition, INDOT has outfitted 50 marked white pickups with plows and material

spreaders to clear ramps, intersections and trouble spots.

Hiring, training drivers

Last winter, INDOT staff logged 311,000 man hours performing winter operations. Mechanics, salt loaders and radio operators support plow drivers to keep the trucks running around the clock when needed.

INDOT has been holding job fairs and aggressively hiring seasonal and full-time plow drivers over the past few months. Applications are still being accepted for some locations at <http://careers.in.gov>. Both plow drivers and supervisors attend classroom training to learn new technology and techniques.

Preventing potholes

INDOT spent the warmer months resurfacing and sealing state highways to prevent water from seeping into the pavement and forming potholes.

During the current fiscal year, INDOT is awarding contracts to resurface 727 miles of state highways. In addition, INDOT maintenance crews sealed more than 1,200 lane miles this year. INDOT has increased its preservation and maintenance program since Governor Pence took office in 2013 to keep pavement and bridges in good condition for as long as possible.

Traffic shift on 106th and 116th streets at U.S. 31 today

Beginning around 9 a.m. today, crews plan to shift traffic on 106th and 116th streets. Various lane restrictions should be expected in these areas until 4 p.m. while lane adjustments are made.

Traffic on 106th Street will be shifted to the north side of the road so crews can construct the south side of the new roundabout interchange. Following this shift, all turning movements will remain open, and traffic on 106th Street will remain one lane in each direction (combined through and left-turning lanes), plus right-turn lanes to northbound and southbound US 31.

Traffic on 116th Street underneath US 31 will be shifted to the south side of the road under the bridge. Traffic west of US 31 will also be shifted, but will continue to have one right-turn lane to southbound US 31 and one left-turn lane to northbound US 31.

Pending favorable weather conditions, crews currently intend to open the new 116th/Pennsylvania streets roundabout before Thanksgiving.

seen it all from selling his first home in Noblesville for \$3,000 in 1947 to helping other developers locate and purchase a site he used to pass by on bus on the way to school, now known across the nation as Klipsch Music Center."

In 1955, Mallery served on a three-person board appointed to recount the nearly 1,800 votes cast in the Nov. 8 Noblesville general election that year. Republican candidates for mayor, clerk-treasurer and two councilors defeated their Democratic challengers by a range of four to 14 votes. The three men spent two days hand counting all of the paper ballots.

Prior to White River Elementary School's opening in 2000, the land was farmed on and owned by Mallery's family. During the dedication ceremony, Mallery presented the original deed to the property – a land grant deed signed in 1824 by President James Monroe – to the school corporation.

"That's my legacy – giving land to Noblesville Schools for White River Elementary," Mallery said.

In 1962, Mallery played Santa in the inaugural Noblesville Christmas Parade and fondly remembers the experience of that first year. He was joined by his helpers, Pam Swhier and Carol Jo Kenley, and rode atop a Noblesville fire truck.

"There was a swarm of people. I've never seen so many people. The paper said 8,000 people attended but Noblesville only had a population of 5,000 at that time so people came to Noblesville for the parade," said Mallery. "When they put it together, I guess they thought I was bigger than anybody else. I was glad to play Santa because I had been him before for a few stores."

After the first year, Mallery continued portraying Santa in the parade for the next seven or eight years and reprised the role at the 50th anniversary in 2012.

"I love Noblesville and the people. There are a lot of good people here and we've got businesses, recreation, parks – anything you could want," Mallery said.

Mallery's wife, Nancy, died in 2009 after 54 years of marriage. They have four children: daughter, Carol Payne, a mortgage underwriter; and sons, David, food business; Fred, retired real estate; and John, a banker. He also has eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Indiana State Police will conduct D.U.I. checkpoint

On the evening of November 20th and the early morning hours of November 21st, 2015 Indiana State Police troopers will participate in an enforcement checkpoint targeting impaired drivers in Marion County. After the checkpoint, troopers will conduct roving saturation patrols aggressively seeking impaired drivers throughout the Indianapolis District which covers Marion, Johnson, Shelby, Hendricks, Hamilton, Hancock and Boone Counties.

"The purpose of enforcement checkpoints is to remove impaired drivers from Indiana roadways" stated Indiana State Police District Commander Lt. Jeff Payne. "Checkpoints also educate the motoring public of the ongoing efforts by the Indiana State Police to reduce the number of impaired driving crashes and deter anyone from driving while intoxicated."

Reminders so motorists do not find themselves "Over the Limit and Under Arrest":

* Plan ahead and always designate a sober driver before consuming alcohol.

* Don't drive your vehicle if you've been drinking alcohol. Call a taxi or a sober friend. A cab ride is cheaper than a D.U.I. arrest.

* Take care of your friends. Never let a friend drive while impaired. Take their keys.

* If you are hosting a party, always offer non-alcoholic beverages. Make sure all of your guests leave with a sober driver.

* Never provide alcohol to anyone under the legal drinking age of 21.

Motorists are encouraged to report suspected impaired drivers by calling 911. Give a vehicle description and direction of travel.

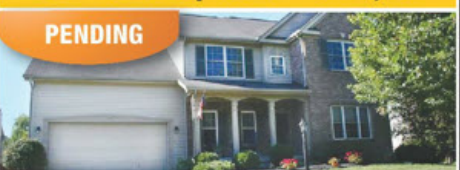



Pacers get easy win over Sixers

Paul George and the Pacers made it look easy on Wednesday night. George scored 21 of his 34 points in the third quarter as Indiana (7-5) rolled to a 112-85 road win over the hapless Philadelphia 76ers (0-12).

The Sixers, the NBA's lone remaining winless team, remained competitive in the early going, as the game featured two ties and seven lead changes over the first quarter and a half. Philadelphia trailed just 33-31 with 5:40 to play in the second quarter, but Indiana reeled off a 12-2 run to open up a double-digit lead.

The Blue & Gold put the game away shortly after halftime. George knocked down a 3-pointer on the first possession of the third quarter, a play that was a harbinger of things to come.

Indiana opened the second half with a 15-2 run, with George scoring 11 points and

knocking down three 3-pointers over the first 4:31.

"I thought we did a great job taking it to them to start the half," George said after the win. "We kind of got it going early and the momentum took it from there."

The two-time All-Star scored 10 more points before the quarter was through, allowing head coach Frank Vogel to rest his starters for most of the fourth quarter.

Even still, the Pacers' reserves kept adding to the lead, stretching the margin to as many as 33 points at one point.

Indiana did all of this even without starting point guard George Hill, sitting out his second straight game with an upper respiratory infection, and sixth man Rodney Stuckey, missing his fourth consecutive game with a sprained ankle.

In their absence, George more than picked up the slack, finishing with 34 points (two shy of his season high) in just under 32 minutes to go along with eight rebounds, five assists, and four steals.

"His work ethic on his shooting and his offensive game – all his moves and everything – is very, very impressive," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel. "It's showing up on the basketball court, with just his confidence. Your hard work breeds confidence. He's playing at a high level right now."

Those steals were indicative of a dominant team defensive performance, as the Pacers forced Philadelphia into an astounding 31 turnovers. The Sixers came into Wednesday's contest leading the NBA in giveaways and they had dug themselves an even deeper hole in that statistical category by the time this contest was over.

C.J. Miles played the Robin to George's Batman, recording 20 points while knocking down 4-of-7 attempts from 3-point range. Chase Budinger added a season-high 15 points and six rebounds off the bench for Indiana, while fellow reserve Jordan Hill chipped in 10 points and seven boards.

Rookie point guard T.J. McConnell led Philadelphia with 16 points and six rebounds. Fellow rookie Jahlil Okafor added 14 points and six boards in the loss.

The Pacers now return home to Indianapolis, where they will host the Milwaukee Bucks on Saturday, Nov. 21 at 7:00 PM ET.


