sentatives are part of the caucus leadership and committee chairmanship assignments that were announced House Speaker Brian C. Bosma (R-Indianapolis) on Thursday.

Rep. State Kathy Kreag Richardson (R-Noblesville) will serve as the Majority Caucus Chair, and will also be the vice chair of the Elections and Apportionment

Committee. Also, State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel) will serve as the

Chair of the Committee on Joint Rules, and be the vice chair under Bosma for the Committee on Joint Rules

"I firmly believe that committees are the workhorses of our legislative institution. Much of the heavy lifting is done in our committees, which are requiring more from legislators than ever before," Bosma said.

Bosma announced the appointment of State Rep. Mike Karickhoff (R-Kokomo) as deputy speaker pro tem, and State Rep. Sharon Negele (R-Attica) as assistant majority whip. State Rep. Bill Friend (R-Macy) continues as the Speaker Pro Tempore, and State Rep. Bob Heaton (R-Terre Haute) remains the Majority Whip. State Rep Eric Koch (R-Bedford) and State Rep. Greg Steuerwald (R-Avon) will serve as assistant Majority Caucus Chairs.

Other changes include State Rep. Martin Carbaugh (R-Fort Wayne) as the new chairman of the Insurance Committee, and State Rep. Cindy Kirchhofer (R-Beech Grove) as chairwoman of the Public Health Committee. Former Public Health chairman State Rep. Ed Clere (R-New Albany) will assume a role on the Ways & Means Committee.

Hamilton County EMA conducts exercise

Officials from public agencies and organizations across Hamilton County came together for a functional planning exercise at the Hamilton County Emergency Management Agency

The exercise was designed to test the operational response, from activation to staffing to management, of the Emergency Operations Center in Hamilton County. Plans, policies, procedures, and capabilities were examined as they were put through a practical application.

The exercise scenario consisted of a tanker of hazardous material overturned on a bridge across the White River in Hamilton County, releasing contents both in the water and in a cloud. To further exacerbate the problem, the incident occurred on a busy Saturday autumn afternoon when multiple events were in progress around the county. As the incident unfolded, numerous injects of real-life possibilities were given to officials to test their reactions and the resources available. Medical facilities, public utilities, organizations, and others joined forces with public safety officials to address potential issues and problems that were generated by the exercise. Evaluators from outside Hamilton County also attended to review the response by local authorities.

Through functional exercises and trainings such as this, public officials from various agencies evaluate their knowledge as they prepare for any unusual situations, such as terrorism, hazardous materials, epidemics, natural catastrophes or manmade disasters that may occur in Hamilton County. Officers and officials regularly practice and prepare for all types of incidents that may occur in and around the county to ensure the safety of area residents.

The Indiana Arts Commission (IAC) new Indiana State Poet Laureate.

Wagner teaches poetry and memoir writing at the Indiana Writers Center and literature for Butler University's Religion, Spirituality and the Arts seminar. She holds an M.F.A. in Creative Writing from Indiana University – Bloomington and is the author of two poetry books, The Harmonist at Nightfall: Poems of Indiana and Evening Chore. Her poems have been featured in Ted Kooser's syndicated column, American Life in Poetry and in Garrison Keillor's radio program, The Writer's Almanac.

Born in Goshen, Indiana, Wagner grew up in rural Wells County, near the town of Markle, Indiana. She is married and has two grown children. She has taken part in international cross-cultural experiences in Somalia, Kenya, Haiti, and Honduras as well as domestic crosscultural experiences working and living with the Clifton-Choctaw of Louisiana. Her special interest is in Native American history and Indiana history and folklore.

"I am delighted and honored to represent poetry in a state that has shaped my artistic vision in so many ways and given me such a wealth of subjects to explore," Wagner said. "In the next two years, I look forward to traveling its length and breadth as I promote Indiana poets and foster the writing and reading of poems in a variety of settings - schools, parks, program, libraries, senior and veteran centers, and historic sites. Hamilton County WIC to host Baby & Me Tobacco Free classes

Hamilton County Women, Infants and Those with questions or who are interest-Children (WIC). Partnership for a Healthy Hamilton County (PHHC) and Hesalthy Communities of Clinton County (HCCC) have partnered to offer Baby & Me Tobacco Free (BMTF), a program funded by the Indiana State Department of Health to assist pregnant women in smoking cessation. Participants who complete four classes, quit smoking during pregnancy and remain smoke-free are eligible for \$25 in diaper vouchers for up to 12 months postpartum. They do not have to be WIC clients to participate.

"We are excited about this opportunity to assist pregnant women who smoke and their unborn babies," said Sharon Barrett, director of Indiana Health Centers Hamilton County WIC program. "Smoking while pregnant increases the likelihood of low birth weight, preterm delivery and decreased respiratory function. This program fits with WIC's mission to help women deliver healthy babies by educating them about proper nutrition and selfcare, and to keep their babies healthy after delivery by offering breastfeeding classes and checkups.'

Components of the Baby & Me Tobacco Free program are a commitment to become a non-smoker while pregnant and after delivery, program enrollment, attendance at four prenatal smoking cessation classes which include education about Indiana's Tobacco Quitline, 1-800-Quit-Now, and passing a breath test for up to 12 months after the baby is born. Successful participants receive \$25 in diaper vouchers monthly, which are redeemable at CVS Pharmacy or Walmart. 
The classes came to Hamilton County through a partnership between HCCC and PHHC. Both counties hold ISDH Tobacco Prevention & Cessation grant funding. which promotes Indiana's Tobacco Quitline, 1-800-QuitNow. HCCC also has grant funding for Baby & Me Tobacco Free and is encouraged to share the program with surrounding counties.


"As counties we share the same goals of smoking cessation and Quitline promotion, and offering BMTF furthers both of those goals in a targeted, high-risk group," said Kathy Martin, tobacco prevention and cessation coordinator and BMTF facilitator for HCCC, who will teach the classes. "We want all babies to be born healthy and on time and are happy to collaborate in order to do so."

"BMTF broadens PHHC's reach in a critical component of its tobacco prevention and cessation program by offering cessation services to a population in which smoking endangers not just one, but two, people," said Holly Wheeler, assistant director, PHHC, and interim tobacco prevention and cessation coordinator for the county. "It's all about decreasing smoking rates, and helping pregnant moms do so just makes sense. WIC was a natural choice for collaboration because of its commitment to keeping pregnant mothers healthy and because of the relationships it builds with its clients."

The BMTF program is available to other residents and caregivers to whom the mother and baby will be exposed before and after delivery. The child's father deliver twins or multiples are eligible for or other regular caregiver, such as a vouchers in the same amount for each grandparent, who complete BMTF classchild. Classes are held the first Tuesday of es, quit smoking and pass monthly breath tests, also are eligible for monthly \$25 diaper vouchers.

All BMTF participants are encouraged to use Indiana's free, phone-based tobacco cessation service, 1-800-QuitNow. Further information about the service can be found at www.indianaquitline.net.

"At this point, we will probably start with our four seniors, Chris Roberts Patrick Weitzel, Jacob Chesney ad Taylor Ly," said Schrank.

"The senior have done a nice job providing leadership, and their effort has been great.

"The fifth spot in the starting line is up for grabs, but frontrunners there would probably be between Aidan Roaten and Tommy Glidden," Schrank added.

Glidden is a 6-1 junior and Roaten is a 6-4 junior.

Schrank believes finding backup help will be a strength of the team.

"That is one positiive hat I am looking forward to this year," explained the coach. "I think we have 10 guys that we could put into a game and we shouldn't see much



"Our starting lineup may change from game to game because guys have worked and earned a spot in practice. Certainly, Weston Burtron (6-6 junior) could start, especially in games where we need his length. Our younger guys (6-2 sophomore Jack Waitt, 5-11 sophomore Austin Hunter and 5-6 freshman Drake Delph) will have to work to overtake ohers right now, but they have all done well in practice so far and also will earn some time.


Sam Crail was injured and will not be able to play his junior season.

"I am excited about our group," Schrank continued. "We have a group that has put in a lot of work in the off-season to improve individually and collectively.

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


Gunn will be big gun...

Last season was a disappointing year for Hamilton Southeastern's Royals.

"We had to fight through injuries and illness," Coach Brian Satterfield


"This year the team will be young again, with only three seniors. However, there should be plenty of competition for varsity positions." Satterfield added. "The coaching staff feels there are many players who will be competing for varsity minutes."

One of those players will be one of the best juniors in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference and one of the best players in the sectional area, 6-7 Zach Gunn. Last year he averaged 18.2 points and 10.2 rebounds a game.

Other lettermen returning will be 6-3 senior Greg Miller (6.7 points and 2.5 rebounds); 6-8 sophomore Brennan Schofield (3.4 points and 2.0 rebounds); 6-0 senior JD Bembry (3.0 points), and 6-1 junior Austin Holzum (1.6 points).

Bembry is injured and expected to miss the first week of the season. Miller, 6-1 junior Conner Rotterman, Gunn, Schofield and 6-4 junior Jack Davdison likely will be in Satterfield's starting lineup when the Royals begin play on Nov. 24 at home against Muncie Central.

"The keys this year will be finding players who have great chemistry, provide leadership, are unselfish and they limit turnovers," said the coach. "The one piece that was missing last year was a lock-down defender. If we can find that person(s), we feel we can have a very good season."



Miller and Bembry got into the starting lineups at times last season and will provide senior leadership. Schofield ad Holzum were two other payers who saw quality time and bring special qualities to the team.

The remaining cast for this year could come from any of several players, including 6-5 senior Jaylon Tapplar, 6-4 junior Brock Burns, 6-2 junior Jack Habegger, 6-6 junior Aaron Shank, 6-2 junior Trevin Trabue, 5-11 sophomore Nick Bowman, 5-10 sophomore Cobie Dillard, 5-10 sophomore Josh Fugate, 6-5 freshman Aaron Etherington and 6-0 freshman Noah Smith. Etherington had two brothers that graduated from Hamilton Heights, and both are playing Division I basketball in college.

"All have shown times of being able to help us out," said Satterfield. "Thus, practices should be very competitive. We will use the first half of the season to help us figure out who gives us the best opportunity for success in the post season.

"The challenge for the team will be gaining the varsity experience that it lacks and gaining cohesiveness with each other at both ends of the floor.

"The staff feels we will be very capable if all understand what is needed for success at both ends of the floor. Being active and communication will be vital for the team to

"This could be another great opportunity for the Royals to have a successful season," Satterfield added.

Southeastern will play in a big 12-school, Dec. 29-30 event at Columbus City, Huntington North High School and Huntington University. 


Basketball Hall of Fame closed on Sundays through February
