Bishop's Park now owned by the public

I try to keep up on the happenings of interest in Hamilton County, but events are moving pretty fast these days. I had missed the acquisition of a historic piece of ground by the County Parks Department, probably not the only thing I've missed.

At any rate, the public now owns what was known for years as Bishop's Park in Jackson Township. In the not too distant future the park board will



draw plans for the redevelopment of the scenic 23-acre site along Cicero Creek south of Arcadia.

More than 100 years ago the then-private park was a favorite for local families to picnic, hold family reunions and probably wade if not swim in the creek.

In recent times the park became inactive. And, finally in 2012 County Parks was able to purchase it from the Stover Family. It is one of several acquisitions by the park board and will become the 13th park in the system.

Chris Stice at the parks office tells me a plan for developing the ground has yet to be done, but may not be too far in the future. Such things are always dependent on money, but park officials wisely keep pushing because they know

that open land is disappearing in our county and if the best sites for recreational development are not acquired, they will be gone to developers or speculators.

This fall and winter park officials are concentrating on a pedestrian bridge at Strawtown connecting the White River Campgrounds with Koteewi Park and extending the Monon Trail from 216th Street to the Sheridan town limits.

The county has developed a truly impressive number of parks that often are overlooked by many of our own residents. Koteewi, Coxhall and Cool Creek parks can rival anything other counties have in their park systems.

NWMS hosts Jay-Noblesville Classic robotics competition

Noblesville West Middle School hosted the Jay-Noblesville Classic, a high-energy statewide robotics competition on Saturday.

Teams from across the state attended the first ever Classic, mostly from Central Indiana, but there were also squads from Jay County and Portage competing. This event, part of the VEX Robotics Competition series, is a qualifier for the state championship and showcased student-built and controlled robots competing against each other to perform tasks and navigate obstacle courses.

"This is a qualifying event, so they're trying to win a few different types of awards that qualify them to be able to compete at the state competition in March, at Warren Central," said Brandon Crawford, the NWMS Robotics Club sponsor. Doing well at state means a chance to advance to the world competition in Louisville.

The competition included two levels - IQ, which was geared for elementary to middle school students featured plastic robots that were assembled via kits. Crawford said that kids even as young as second grade were competing. The other level, VRC is for middle to high school students, who built their own robots.

While the goal for the IQ level was pretty much to score as many points as possible in the competition, there was more strategy involved for the older kids in VRC. Crawford estimated there were "right around 40 teams" competing in the VRC level on Saturday.



"They take the top eight teams, and then those eight teams pick two people to alliance with," said Crawford.

Doing that "promotes kids going out and saying 'Hey, I saw you were good at that. We're not in the top eight, but we think we could benefit you in the finals if you take us

to the finals with you.' So there's that social aspect to it, kind of a salesmanship to it," said Crawford.

Another aspect was the judging, where the robot-makers had to stand up in front of judges and present their engineering notebooks and defend their design process.

Some Christmases there was snow which made it all that much more exciting, especially as you walked and stopped in at each store. Sometimes I just looked in the windows thinking about what I wanted for Christmas or what I thought about getting someone else. Also, most of the time it was really cold as well. Santa’s house was on the courthouse lawn and pictures could be taken with you sitting on Santa’s lap. It was always interesting when the child felt they were too big to sit on Santa’s lap or did not want to! You always received a candy cane from Santa! You could then go across the street for hot chocolate at the Corner Drug Store! Always a great treat! It was exciting to look at Essig Bros and see all the bicycles and other interesting things they had. Then there was JC Penney. It was a two story store right next to Essig Bros on the east side of the square. The Diana Theater always had a Christmas movie to go see. All of the teenagers would eventually end up there on the weekends watching a movie. There was Falvey’s and Zeckel’s clothing stores for men and Mister Ed’s for women. My wife,

Kim, worked at Mister Ed’s. When we got married she told me after we were married she had a substantial clothing bill at Mister Ed’s! Her response, looking good for me! There was the Spiegel catalog store, and I really liked to go in and look around Smith’s Jewelers! Hey, I even bought a few things there!

When I arrived in high school in 1969, I got a job at the Sears store on the North side of the square. The store manager was John Randall. John was a super nice guy to work for. My job was to come in after school and unload the boxes of different items that people had ordered. So, I knew what everybody ordered for Christmas! We were a catalog and appliance store. We had refrigerators, washing machines, dryers and televisions. On Saturday I worked all day from 8 to 5. Christmas was a big time for our store. We got the Christmas catalog in and it was my job to put stickers on the catalogs of different promotions. Man that was a many hour job! All done by hand! On Saturday I got to work the front counter and the floor as people were interested in the different appliances. I got to meet just about everyone in town. It was such a great job and I really got to partake in the excitement of Christmas with decorating the store and listening to all the people talk about their plans for Christmas with family and friends. We always had Christmas music going as well!

My second Christmas season working, Esther Goodwin, who was the credit manager, asked me if I had thought about a Sears’s credit card. I did not think Sears would do such a thing for a teen ager. But Esther worked it out and I got a limited card with a \$300.00 limit! Well, you know I had to try it! By the way Sears was the big deal before Wal Mart came on the scene. I got a small television for my bedroom and of course, I got some things for my girlfriend and my dad and mom. The reality of paying my weekly

payment was now there. Esther made sure I lived up to my obligations!

The ladies who worked at Sears always made Christmas fun and brought in all kinds of items to eat. Cookies, cakes and just about everything and anything. For some reason, all those ladies thought they needed to watch out for me and make sure I was doing well. “How is school going? What girl are you seeing? Did you know who that girl was that came in? She seemed nice. Where are you going this Friday? Did you remember something for your mom? Have you been cleaning your room?” I think I had about 6 mothers! They were all great and they really cared about each other and they were making sure I was doing all the things I needed to. They cared about me and I appreciated it. Most of them had worked there for years. Of course, I lifted things for them and did errands for them, and just about everything else they needed.

Kind people made Christmas a special time in Noblesville. There was always someone who was trying to help someone else! Firestone and the Foundry were the big employers and Christmas was always an exciting and wonderful time of the year. It made for a great childhood and a wonderful teenage experience of seeing how people cared about each other in Noblesville.

Be kind to someone at Christmas, it is and was a Noblesville tradition. Also, remember the real reason for Christmas, it is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, the Saviour. Remember to make wonderful memories, they are always important to remember how great things were and can be later in life. Noblesville did that for me!

Report to the Community challenges Fishers to tackle mental health status quo

Mayor Scott Fadness, together with stakeholders from the City, Community Health Network and Hamilton Southeastern Schools, recently announced the Mental Health Task Force’s Report to the Community. The report is the culmination of the task force’s monthly exploratory meetings, and rolls-out recommendations with measurable goals for the community moving forward.

“I have been humbled by this process and the things we’ve learned during our exploration,” said Mayor Fadness. “The recommendations in the report will require continued collaboration and diligence as our community tackles these mental health challenges. I am confident that today is a great start, but there is still much to do.”

At the 2015 State of the City, Mayor Fadness announced the formation of the Mental Health Task Force to learn more about the state of mental health in Fishers. Members include City officials, public safety personnel, City Councilors, Community Health Network, Hamilton Southeastern Schools, Mike Reikoff from the Peyton Reikoff Foundation for Hope and area members of the clergy, and the task force chairperson is Suzanne Clifford, Senior Vice President of Integrated Primary Care for Community Health Network. That task force met monthly from January to July to discuss a variety of topics in hopes of taking a comprehensive look at mental health challenges. Key objectives and recommendations emerged as the task force explored the current state of mental health, barriers to access and gaps in service.

“This kind of community collaboration is not the norm and has been inspiring to be a part of,” said Suzanne Clifford. “The recommendations within this report can bring about real change in Fishers and help people get access to resources that will give them hope and promote their recovery. Mental health is an uncomfortable topic to discuss and I commend the task force for their efforts.”

The task force will move forward with six recommendations surrounding education and training and two recommendations for resources and access. A few highlighted recommendations include:

- Expand crisis intervention training (CIT) to additional public safety personnel
- Develop a comprehensive plan for HSE schools
- Develop a youth training plan for public safety departments
- Remodel WeCare Community Paramedicine program to address mental health

“With more than a quarter of Fishers residents in school at Hamilton Southeastern Schools, it was important for us to have a seat at the table when addressing the state of mental health in the community,” said HSE Superintendent Dr. Allen Bourff. “A proactive approach to mental health care in our school system protects our children now and our community as they age. We have an opportunity to be a leader in this effort in a way that positively impacts generations of Fishers residents.”

“Moving forward, the task force will meet on a quarterly basis to follow-up on recommended action items and keep us accountable for reaching our measurable goals,” said Mayor Fadness.

The Mental Health Task Force will continue to work on the report’s recommendations and will report back to the community via an “Annual Check-up” each year. The community is encouraged to download the report, get informed and get involved.


“So many times during our monthly meetings we discussed the stigma surrounding mental health,” said John Weingardt, City Council Vice President. “It is important for people to be comfortable sharing their stories, because you never know whom it might inspire to get help. As a City Councilor, I want to see a healthy community that works together to fight hard challenges, but as a resident, personally affected by the mental illness of a family member, I

want people to know that there is hope and resources. If we help just one person, this is already a success.”





Pacers close strong in win over Bucks

Pacers head coach Frank Vogel has made it a point of emphasis in recent days for his team to close games strong.

The reason for Vogel's message? A little over a week ago, Indiana allowed Minnesota to whittle a 27-point lead down to one before holding off the Timberwolves for a narrow victory.

Playing at home for the first time since that contest, the Pacers (8-5) had no issues putting their opponent away, dominating the third quarter and never letting up en route to a 123-86 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks (5-8).

The Blue & Gold outscored the Bucks 35-16 in the third period to seize control of Saturday's contest, then stretched the margin to as many as 40 points in the fourth.

"We learned from that Minnesota game," Pacers forward Glenn Robinson III said after a career night. "(We learned to) just continue to be in attack mode, continue to (keep up) our pace throughout the game, and just not let up."

The visitors got off to a fast start, leading by as many as six in the early going. The Bucks attacked the rim early, getting to the free throw line 12 times before the Pacers even drew a foul.

But Indiana eventually found its groove and strung together some stops to trigger a 10-0 run late in the first quarter that moved the home team back in front. The two teams traded leads in the second quarter, but it was the Pacers who led by a narrow margin heading into the break.

The third quarter, however, was all Indiana. The Pacers scored the first eight points of the period to take a double-digit lead, then closed the period with a 22-5 spurt over the final 5:50 to effectively put the Bucks away.

Indiana shot 60 percent from the field and knocked down 4-of-8 3-pointers in the third and set a new season high for points scored in any quarter after halftime.

"We were aggressive on both ends," forward C.J. Miles said of the pivotal period. "We got out and ran. We got stops and we got our hands on the basketball. When you get stops and create extra possessions for yourself, you can score in bunches like that."

They were nearly as good in the fourth quarter, outscoring Milwaukee 33-19 to close out the win.

"We took our starters out and our second unit really opened the game up even more," Pacers star Paul George said after the win. "I thought they played well, they shared the ball, they moved it around, and they were ready."

Miles led the offensive attack, scoring 13 of his season-high 21 points in the third quarter, going 4-for-6 from the field and 2-for-3 from deep over that stretch.

Miles led six Pacers players in double figures.

George finished with 20 points, seven rebounds, and seven assists despite sitting out the entire fourth quarter. Jordan Hill had a season-high 20 points on 9-of-10 shooting and 11 boards. Second-year forward Glenn Robinson III set a career high with 17 points off the bench, going 4-for-4 from 3-point range. Chase Budinger added 13 points, while Monta Ellis added 12.

Budinger got the start on Saturday because point guard George Hill continues to battle an upper respiratory infection. Hill, who missed the last two games, dressed for Saturday's game but head coach Frank Vogel said he only would play him in an "emergency" situation.

Hill was able to watch this one as a spectator, as his teammates cruised to victory.

Greg Monroe was dominant for the Bucks in the first half, recording a quick double-double with 11 points and 13 rebounds, seven of them coming on the offensive end, but added just one rebound in a little over eight minutes in the second half. Jabari Parker and O.J. Mayo were the only other Milwaukee players to reach double figures, both finishing with 10 points.

The Pacers hit the road again on Tuesday night to take on the Washington Wizards before returning to Indianapolis to host the Chicago Bulls next Friday.

Schneider, Fuel keep winning at home

Peter Schneider scored the game-winning goal and added an assist as the Indy Fuel (9-3-1-0) remained a perfect 6-0 at home, beating the Quad City Mallards (7-5-1-2) 3-2 at Indiana Farmers Coliseum on Saturday night.

Schneider's goal at 11:41 of the third period gave the Fuel a 3-1 advantage at the time, and came off an opportunity generated by the forward's speed. He chased down a puck in the Mallards' end, cut back to his right and shot the puck through the defenseman over the left shoulder of goaltender Brody Hoffman (19 saves) for the score.

After a scoreless opening frame, the Fuel opened the second with the game's first goal from captain Zach Miskovic at 2:40, his first of the season.

The Mallards would even the game at 1-1 on Darren McMillan's first of the sea-

son at 11:54, but Kyle Stroh gave the Fuel the lead once again at 18:14 on an excellent individual effort, battling through traffic and beating Hoffman with a wrist shot from the low slot.

Quad City added a late six-on-five goal with 4.2 seconds remaining for the 3-2 final.

Mac Carruth earned the win for the Fuel with 30 saves as Indy won its fifth-straight contest. The two teams will go head-to-head again tomorrow afternoon at 5 p.m. ET from Moline, IL.

Swimmers from 12 countries, including nearly 20 Olympians, highlight a European roster set to square off against Team USA, led by Olympic champions Missy Franklin and Ryan Lochte, at the seventh Mutual of Omaha Duel in the Pool on Dec. 11-12 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Leading the way will be Ranomi Kromowidjojo of the Netherlands, 2012 Olympic gold medalist in the women's 50- and 100-meter freestyle, and Daniel Gyurta of Hungary, 2012 Olympic champion in the men's 200m breast.

Additional Olympic medalists slated to compete include Russia's Yuliya Efimova, Denmark's Lotte Friis and Aliaksandra Herasimenia of Belarus on the women's side, as well as Hungary's Laszlo Cseh and Russia's Vladimir Morozov for the men. Hungary's Katinka Hosszu, world record holder in the women's 200m IM, will also swim in Indianapolis.

over two sessions: Friday, Dec. 11 at 7 p.m. Eastern and Saturday, Dec. 12 at 2 p.m. Eastern. Adult all-session tickets cost \$65, \$50 and \$35 depending on location; Children's (ages 12 and under) all-session tickets are \$55, \$40 and \$25. Single-session tickets are also available beginning at \$20 for adults and \$15 for children. All tickets are for reserved seating. Tickets can be purchased via usaswimming.org.

NBC will air two hours of coverage from the Mutual of Omaha Duel in the Pool on Sunday, Dec. 19 from 4-6 p.m. Eastern.
