With this three-part effort the county has become the envy of the state. More people want to live here than anywhere else or so it seems as we watch all the new building and improvements. Dillinger has been a big part of this along with the help of some good fellow commissioners which is absolutely necessary in county government where there is no single executive. A majority is needed to do anything. And over the years Steve Holt and later Bill Karns and Christine Altman have provided that majority.

When elected in 1988 Dillinger, Holt and holdover Commissioner Peg Goldberg faced big challenges: 300 miles of gravel roads, a terribly overcrowded courthouse, a

county jail operating beyond capacity, a lackluster fairgrounds. Riverview Hospital needed upgrading and expansion to meet approaching competition, we had no emergency management system, no hazardous waste and trash disposal center, no enforcement of accurate weights and measures, no county airport and essentially only one county park.

When we look across the county today we see corrections to all these shortcoming we faced a quarter-century ago. Is it all perfect? No, and not likely to be. But, most has gone well, very well. So, I’m glad to see Dillinger on the verge of declaring for another term in office. There is still work to be done and we know who can do it.

Increase in fees begins Jan. 1... Westfield City Council approves new trash ordinance

In a unanimous vote the Westfield City Council approved the Garbage Ordinance at Monday night’s City Council meeting. The new ordinance includes a \$.68 monthly increase in trash and recycling fees.

“The Westfield City Council’s primary focus is being fiscally responsible,” explains Chuck Lehman City Council President. “This small increase is necessary in order to maintain the same great level of customer service Ray’s Trash provides to our citizens.”

The monthly trash fee will go up from \$11.64 to \$12.32, which calculates out to \$2.04 a quarter. The increase is effective January 1, 2016, but property owners will start noticing the increase in their December 2015 bill as the service cycle is billed ahead of time.

“Statement” game for ‘Hounds...

Carmel beats Noblesville in top 10 clash

After dropping both of its games to Noblesville last season, the Carmel girls basketball team wanted to make a statement.

The Greyhounds did Tuesday night at The Mill. In a clash of two of Class 4A's top teams, No. 6 Carmel beat the No. 8 Millers 56-48. The victory improved the 'Hounds to 4-1 on the season, while Noblesville dropped to 6-2.

"They're the sectional champions and rated ahead of us in Hamilton County," said Carmel coach Tod Windlan, who called it "a statement game for my program to come on an away floor and just see if we could out-tough them."

The first quarter ended with Noblesville ahead 13-11, but there was a harbinger of things to come in the final couple minutes. The Millers were in front 13-7, but the Greyhounds cut that lead with a nifty flip shot by Emily Kmec, then Blake Smith rolled the ball in.

After a little bit of back-and-forth to begin the second period, Carmel took the lead for good when Carrie Larson drained a 3-pointer to make the score 18-17. Leading 22-20 with 1:47 left, the 'Hounds then finished the first half on a 7-0 run, with baskets by Mackenzie Wood and Amy Dilk, then a 3-pointer at the halftime buzzer by Kmec.

Carmel then took control in the second half, pushing its lead into double digits early when Olivia Christy hit a 3-pointer early in the third to make the score 32-21. The 'Hounds led by as much as 46-28 early in the fourth period before the Millers started making a comeback.

Brooke Herron scored six points in the middle of the fourth for Noblesville, with her layin cutting Carmel's lead to 50-42. A 3-pointer by Rachel Shipman with 28.5 seconds left got the Millers to within 55-48, but that was as close as they would get. Smith's foul shot with 25.3 seconds left got the score to the final margin.

Smith led the scoring with 17 points, while Kmec added 15. Christy and Kmec both handed out four assists. Kmec and Smith also grabbed seven rebounds each, with Celene Funke getting five boards.

Katelyn O'Reilly and Emily Kiser both scored 12 points for Noblesville, with O'Reilly making it a double-double by pulling 16 rebounds. Brooke Herron added 11. Kiser had six rebounds and also blocked three shots.

"We missed some shots," said NHS coach Donna Buckley. "We missed easy shots. Literally uncontested, and we got tight. And then I thought we just tried to force some things that, with their length, wasn't there."

Carmel plays at Hamilton Southeastern Friday, in an afternoon game that starts at 1 p.m. with the junior varsity. Noblesville

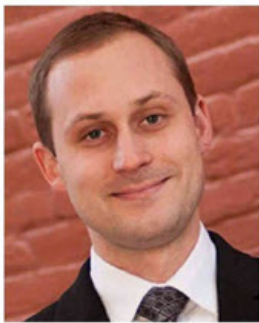

Millers, Huskies, ‘Hawks ready

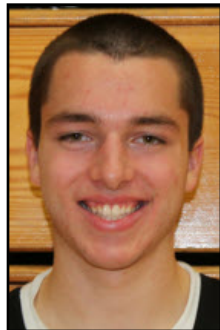

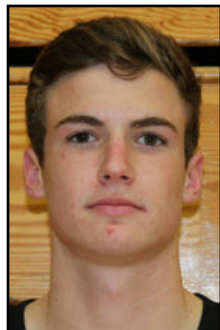
“Our players have been working very hard and they are excited to compete. It will be a challenging season, but I like the character and chemistry of our team,” the coach added.

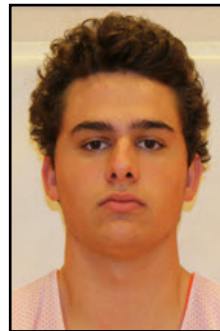
Crist, Weatherford and Lutz led the Huskies in scoring in the scrimmage.

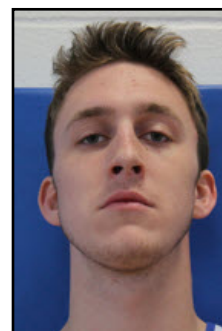
