Construction could start within four months...

New Riverview facility planned for Westfield

If all goes well Riverview's new Westfield outpatient facility will get underway within the next four months. The 100,000 square foot building will occupy the northeast corner of U.S. 31 and Ind. 32, formerly Westfield school property.

Architect for Riverview Health's Board of Trustees is American Structurepoint of Indianapolis. Structurepoint presented drawings and received approval Monday night at a hospital board meeting, according to Riverview administrator Pat Fox.

The Westfield project will come before any expansion on the Noblesville campus, Fox said. Eventually Riverview is planning to make some type of major expansion either east of the hospital on the former Kahlo Auto property or south on the eastside of River Road.

Hospital officials are expected to coordinate with city and county officials on the expansion in Noblesville. The city has hopes of developing the west side of White River and the county has hopes of seeing highway improvements and a new bridge several blocks south of Ind. 32.



New 116th/Pennsylvania streets roundabout

The new two-lane roundabout at 116th/Pennsylvania streets is now open to traffic. Westbound 116th Street traffic will be restricted to one lane between Pennsylvania Street and US 31 while crews continue work on the US 31/116th Street interchange.

State Road 37 access at Town and **Country Boulevard closes Dec. 1**

Contractors working to replace a traffic signal controller cabinet will close access to and from Town and Country Boulevard immediately east and west of State Road 37 in Noblesville early Tuesday, Dec. 1 beginning at 12 a.m. (midnight) and ending at approximately 5 a.m.

During this time, the traffic control signal will be disabled at the intersection of State Road 37 and Town and Country Boulevard. Access to State Road 37 will be closed at Clover Road and Mercantile Boulevard. Motorists are advised to seek an alternate route during the early morning closure.

Pleasant Street and Greenfield Avenue will remain open and provide the nearest local access to Clover Road and Mercantile Boulevard.



PARKING AND SHOPPING AT SHOPPING CENTERS AND MALLS

Parking lots at shopping centers and malls can be a magnet for crime such as thefts from vehicles, vehicle thefts, and purse-snatchings especially during the hectic holiday season. It is important for citizens to always be aware of their surroundings in order to minimize the potential for becoming victimized

- Park only in well-lighted and highly visible locations.
- Park in areas where there is regular vehicular/pedestrian traffic.
- Always lock doors and activate the car alarm.
- Remove any and all valuables that can be

- devices, cellular phones, cash and coins and recently purchased merchandise are highly sought after by criminals). • Be very alert when walking to and from
- your vehicle in parking lots as it is much easier for criminals to hide between vehicles. Try to avoid talking on your cellular phone or engaging in conversation with anyone that may be accompanying you. This will only serve to distract you as you're walking to and from your vehicle.
- For women, be sure to secure your purse in such a way that it would be difficult for a stranger to walk up and grab. When possible, leave as many valuables at home or secured in your vehicle in order to become less of a potential target.
- Trust your instincts if you see someone that concerns you...find another parking space, change directions or vell for help.
- Keep your keys in your hands and use your

 - Do not replace outdoor security lights with bulbs of seasonal colors such as red and/or green. These colors significantly reduce the amount of light emitted making it easier for an intruder to navigate around your property
 - It is not uncommon for criminals to take advantage of the generosity of people during the holiday season by soliciting donations door-to-door for charitable causes although no charity is involved. Ask for their identification, and find out how the donated funds will be used. If you are not satisfied, do not donate.
 - Be a responsible neighbor and report any suspicious people, vehicles or activity in your neighborhood to the police. All it takes is a phone call.

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
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Kiser has 31-point night...

Millers roll to 71-49 win

Miller Nation, 2015-16 style, showed up for Noblesville's season opener Wednesday evening with a couple of questions on their minds.

How good is this young Miller team, the second team for Coach Brian McCauley?

How good is this senior kid John Kiser? Most Miller fans came away from The Mill feeling good about both questions. Really feeling good about the 6-5 Kiser.

Noblesville had far too much for visiting Northwest to handle. Nine different Millers scored as Noblesville powered its way to a 71-49 victory.

Kiser? Not a bad opening night as he poured in 31 points and added nine rebounds.

All of which got everyone talking about Kiser. McCauley talked in terms of Kiser being an Indiana All-Star. Other talk centered around Kiser, arguably, being the best Miller basketball player since a guy by the name of Tom Coverdale.

Of course, all questions came on a night a not-too-hot Northwest team was in the building. The Millers, and Kiser, will be more tested next Friday and Saturday when the Millers hit the road to play Fishers and then Carmel.

The Howe game scheduled at NHS on this Saturday has been postponed until a later date.

"I liked the effort tonight," McCauley said following the game. "We were not as sharp as I had hoped for. We fouled too much; we made defensive mistakes and we committed some careless turnovers.

"But, the chemistry of this team is good. I like this team," McCauley added.

McCauley had good comments for the play of Corby Mertens. He also scored in double figures, drilling 13 points. Max Flinchum just missed double digits, scoring 8.

It was a game in which it appeared Kiser could score whenever he wanted and from most anywhere on the court.

"John played so consistently," said McCauley.

So did the Millers, except for a bump in the road in the third quarter. Noblesville led 22-9 after one quarter and 37-25 at halftime. In the third quarter, Northwest once closed the margin to 39-33. Ryan Ogden and Kiser pumped in 3-pointers and the Millers were off and rolling again.

"I liked the way we fought out of that period of the game," said McCauley.

The Millers hit 24-of-40 shots and stuck in 16-of-17 free throws. Noblesville was 7-of-14 from 3-point range.

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Huskies win thrilling opener

As far as season-opening games go, the boys basketball clash between Hamilton Heights and Lebanon Wednesday night in the Husky Dome was exciting, nail-biting and the Huskies won.

It was also definitely played like a first game of the season, especially in the first quarter. sAfter a shaky start, both teams settled down to produce a thrilling finish that included EIGHT lead changes in the final two minutes and 29 seconds. Heights had the lead at the buzzer, as a Sterling Weatherford layin with less than 15 seconds to go gave the Huskies a 59-58 win over the Tigers.

"It's great," said Hunter Crist, who incidentally scored 31 points in Heights' win. "I said, I was going to be so upset if we lost tonight. I would've been going straight to my room."

Crist did everything he could to keep himself from a self-imposed grounding. So did everyone else on the team. Eight different Huskies scored, and they all scored at least two points, which means that every basket did indeed count.

"We're going to grind it out," said HH coach Chad Ballenger. "We've got other kids that can hit shots too, and I thought Hunter did a good job."

Heights led 51-43 late in the game, but a fired-up Lebanon squad erased that with a 9-0 run. A steal by sophomore Alex Siegfried moved Lebanon ahead 52-51.

After that, both teams kept matching each other basket-for-basket. Crist hit a pair of free throws, Tigers junior Trevor Lakes answered with a jump shot. Weatherford made a layin, Siegfried hit two foul shots. Crist scored on a putback, Lebanon junior Will Byrd scored to get the Tigers up 58-57.

Heights called a timeout at that point. The final basket would go to Weatherford, who was having a frustrating game: He got in foul trouble early and found himself sitting for much of the action.

But Weatherford held his nerve playing with four fouls in the fourth quarter, and hit the game-winner as the clock reached single digits. Lebanon got one more try, but a shot at the buzzer missed.

The thrilling finish contrasted with the start, which was all jitters. The Tigers led 7-6 in a quarter that featured 11 combined turnovers. Crist was held to two points - a pair of free throws, with Weatherford and TJ Freeland also making baskets.

"It's pretty much what you expect from a first game," said Ballenger. "Sloppy, turnovers, a lot of fouls."

The Huskies got going in the second quarter, blasting off to a 26-15 lead. Dustin Williams scored his five points in the period, and Crist poured in the last six of the run, including a 4-from-4 mark at the free throw line. Crist wound up making 15 of 17 foul shots on the night.

"We're going to run through him," said Ballenger. "I didn't think he shot the ball well at times, but we're going to do a lot through him. Very pleased, he handles the ball, he does a lot."

Lebanon trimmed the Huskies lead slightly before the break, as Heights took a 28-23 lead into halftime. The teams played evenly through the third quarter (where Crist scored 13 points) and that set the stage for the tense fourth quarter.

Crist scored the majority of Heights' points, so no other Husky scored more than six. But those contributions were still huge. Freeland proved himself worthy of starting with six points, and he led the Huskies' rebounding with four. Williams' secondquarter points were big, as were Tyler Wil-

termood's two big baskets in the period, giving him four points.

"I couldn't be more pleased," said Ballenger. "Makes the turkey taste a little better tomorrow."

Next up for Heights is a Saturday afternoon game with Mount Vernon that will be played at the Indiana State Fairgrounds Coliseum. Tip-off time is 5:15 p.m.


