Southeastern moves to 2-0

Royals “Gunn” down Indians

Hamilton Southeastern 49, Lake Central 31.

It was a different second half in a Saturday afternoon special won by HSE at Southeastern.

Zach Gunn made it that way.

In the first half, Gunn scored three points, coming on a 3-pointer late in the half.

Southeastern led only 21-19 at halftime.

In the second half, Gunn, Southeastern’s 6-7 junior super star, poured in 22 points as the now 2-0 Royals simply ran away from the Indians from northern Indiana.

Southeastern outscored Lake County in that second half 28-12.

“We talked about that at halftime,” said HSE coach Brian Satterfield. “Gunn had only one 3-pointer in the

second half. The rest of his points were on 2-pointers and free throws.”

And, that was that.

Gunn scored nearly half of his team’s points, 25 of 49. Gunn came within six points of matching the 31 points Lake Central put on the boards.
