Kenley running for another State Senate term

Kenley

Luke Kenley, the State Senator of Indiana's 20th District, announced on Wednesday that he will seek another term.

Kenley, a Republican, has represented District 20 since 1992. District 20 comprises the middle third of the county: Washington, Noblesville and Wayne townships. Portions of Carmel and Fishers are also in the district.

The following news release announced Kenley's decision:

Republican State Senator Luke Kenley announced today he is seeking another term in the Indiana State Senate representing District 20, which is composed of portions of Hamilton County.

A former Noblesville City Court Judge, Kenley is Chairman of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, where he is responsible for helping draft the state's biennial budget. He also serves on the Senate Committee on Tax & Fiscal Policy.

"I have always been committed to making sure our state budget supports our priorities such as road funding, K-12 and higher education, and economic development and job creation, and that commitment will never waiver," Kenley said. "Many elected officials tend to forget that every tax dollar our state spends was first earned by a hard-working Hoosier, and government should not take one penny more

than is necessary to provide essential services. It is our responsibility as public servants to ensure those dollars are spent as efficiently as possible so we deliver the very best services at the lowest cost. Hoosiers deserve nothing less."

During his tenure Kenley:

- Was the architect of the new school funding formula which ensures growing schools receive the funding they need by having the dollars follow the student
- Authored legislation providing record increases in education funding including \$470 million for K-12 and \$70 million in performance funding
- Authored and passed balanced budgets with increases in funding for critical areas including education and infrastructure without raising taxes – and that also maintain \$2 billion in reserves
- Authored the landmark property tax reform bill which cut property taxes by \$1 billion per year, the largest tax cut in Indiana's history, and included the constitutional amendment setting property tax caps for each type of taxpayer
- Authored legislation repealing the state inheritance tax
- Authored landmark welfare reform legislation which reduced Indiana's welfare rolls by 50 percent
- Indiana now ranks first in the Midwest and eighth in the nation for its business tax climate
- Indiana's unemployment rate is below the national average
- Supported Gov. Mitch Daniels' Major Moves program which provided nearly \$4 billion in cash to pay for a

decade of road construction across the state without new taxes or debt

- Fought to get an additional \$200 million per year in funding to continue the progress made under Major Moves
- His two most recent budgets have added more than \$1.2 billion in new road funding including \$100 million per year for local roads and bridges
- Secured funding for the US 31 and US 37 improvements in Hamilton County
- Provided Hamilton County officials additional funding to help with the building, repair and maintenance of local streets, highways and bridges

Kenley is energized and looking forward to the campaign:

"My campaign slogan is 'A Citizen's Legislator in Touch with the People' and I'm looking forward to going door to door and hearing from the voters in Senate District 20. We have a strong grass-roots plan in place and I'm ready to hit the ground running. I work hard to represent the good people of Hamilton County and I hope they will hire me for another term," Kenley said.

Kenley is a graduate of Miami University (Ohio) and Harvard Law School and was a 1st Lieutenant in the US Army. He and his wife Sally are active members of First Methodist Church.

Lake and Lodge Outfitters, an antique hunter's dream, is going to close after the holidays. Owner Gerry Hiatt has operated the store for many years, first in Noblesville and since 2004 in Arcadia. Some of the inventory dates back 70 years when Hiatt as a boy first bought items at local farm sales.

Sheridan is "MundyStrong"

The town of Sheridan has experienced its share of adversities over the last couple of years. In the recent past a downtown Sheridan fire destroyed a historic building. A broken water line flooded Sheridan High School and destroyed much of the gymnasium area.

During each occasion the community stepped forward offering their support. Residents delivered food and water to the firefighters that battled the downtown fire. An outpouring of residents descended on Sheridan High School to offer their help in cleaning up the water damaged school.

Now a new adversity has presented itself to the small rural community and its school system, and in true Sheridan fashion, the community is stepping forward lending its support.

Sheridan Community School Superintendent Doctor David Mundy recently announced he has been diagnosed with cancer.

Mundy said after weeks of testing it was determined he has a form of cancer known as Squamous Cell Carcinoma.

Shortly after Mundy's announcement Sheridan Elementary teachers, Scott Ellis and Candy Hall kicked off a support campaign known as #MundyStrong.

"When we heard of Dave's battle with cancer we all wanted to do something to help and to let him know we were thinking of him," said Ellis. "We most definitely did not want him to think we were going to let him go through this alone."

"Candy Hall and I decided to sell #MundyStrong t-shirts. We wanted the profits to help out in any way that we could, but more importantly we wanted a visual reminder to Dave that we all love him and are praying for him," continued Ellis.

Hall and Ellis then talked with Sheridan resident Sara Moore, owner of Moore, Etc, Moore offered to provide the #MundyStrong shirts that are now being sold by staff at Sheridan Community Schools.

The first round of sales produced more than 200 shirts sold. Ellis said, "We are now going to place a second order. Last night I received I received over 50 texts and Facebook messages from people wanting to support Dave with #MundyStrong shirts."

Sheridan is not the only school district in the county participating. Westfield and Noblesville are also offering #MundyStrong shirts.

Mundy began his teaching career at Noblesville and later became Principal at

Westfield Intermediate School prior to being promoted to Assistant Superintendent at Westfield.

Mundy will undergo seven weeks of chemotherapy and radiation treatments. "From now until Christmas Break I will continue to work as much as I can, but I may have to do some of it from home as needed and will be using my sick days from school," said Mundy. "The Sheridan School Board has been tremendously supportive and great to work with. I also cannot thank my administrative team enough for their help with some of my duties."

"This is what makes Sheridan unique. When the chips are down the community comes together in good times and in rough times," said Kim DeVaney, a member of the administrative staff.

Director of Business for Sheridan Community School Robin Popejoy said, "This is the advantage of living in small town. We can make a small place into a great place."

Administrative Secretary Kim Childers stated, "School Resource Officer Jeff Weir said it best when he stated, no one has more faith in this community and this school district than Dave Mundy." DeVaney fol-

Noblesville Schools named to National College Board Advanced Placement honor roll

Noblesville Schools announced that it has been named to the national College Board Advanced Placement (AP) Honor Roll. Noblesville Schools is one of only 13 districts in Indiana to be included.

The honor roll recognizes schools that have increased student participation in AP coursework while improving high AP exam performance levels, a challenging combination to attain. The ranking is based on 2013-2015 Noblesville High School (NHS) data.


NHS has exceeded the state benchmark for AP scores for over five consecutive years and in 2015 exceeded the benchmark by 22 percentage points. Additionally, almost 200 more AP exams were administered at NHS in 2015 than 2014.

The College Board is a not-for-profit organization that promotes college readiness through the SAT and Advanced Placement Program.

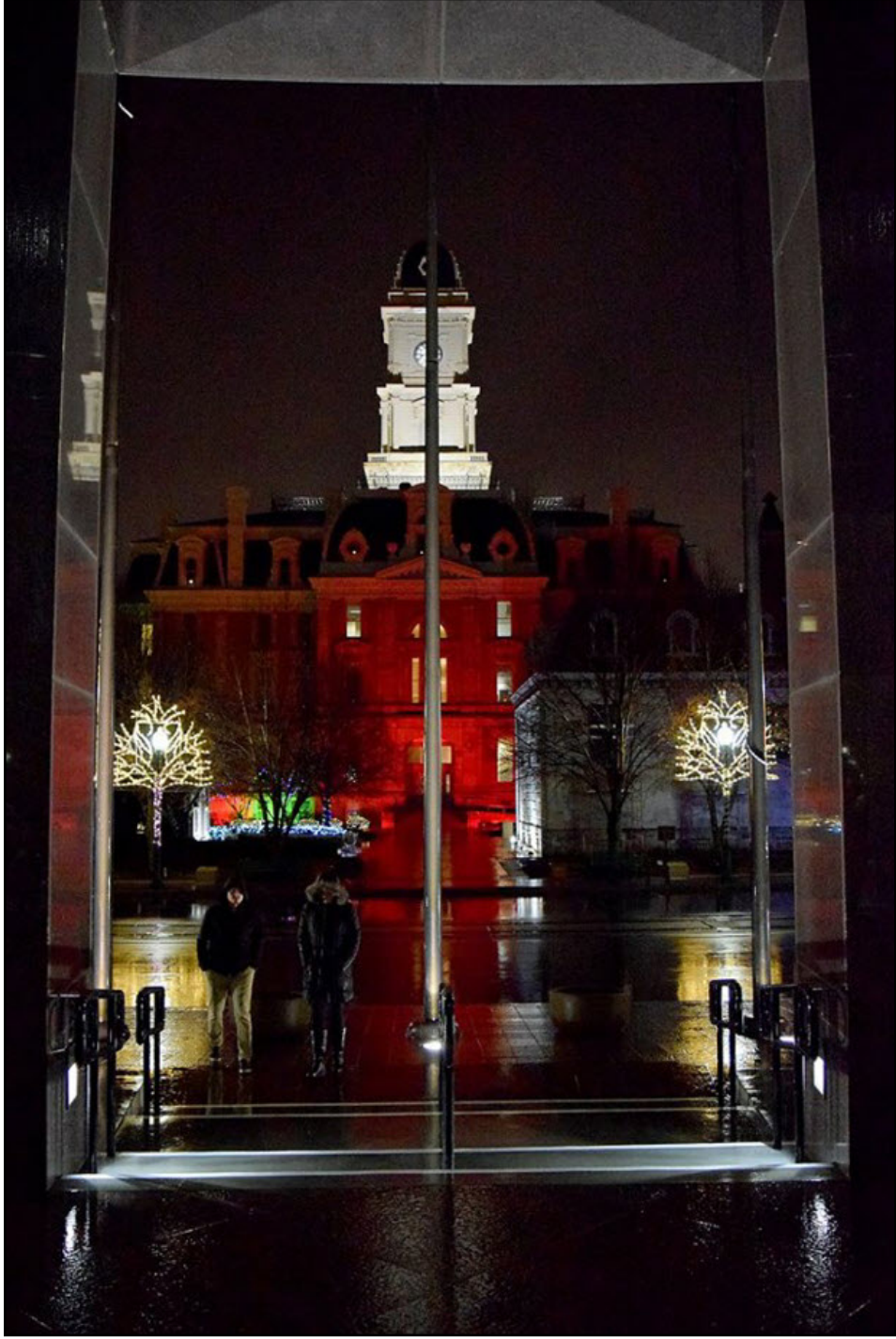

Millers fight off Royals

When Becca Bergman graduated last season after helping Noblesville to a sectional championship, she left behind the model for point guards of the future.

All of which leads Miller fans this season comparing Coach Donna Buckley point guards to Bergman. Tough to do. There aren't many around.

But, Noblesville does have good point guards and last evening at Hamilton Southeastern one such point guard, Brooke Herron, led the Lady Millers to a 51-42 victory over the Lady Royals.

Herron hit eight straight free throws in the fourth quarter to protect a Noblesville lead.

The Millers trailed 9-8 after one quarter and Coach Chris Huppenthal's Royals had Noblesville tied at 19-19 going into halftime intermission. Noblesville got the lead, 39-29, in the third quarter, led by Alexis Shannon, Emily Kiser and Katelyn O'Reilly.

In the fourth quarter, the Millers nailed just one field goal (by O'Reilly), while Herron went 8-for-8 at the line and Shannon added two free throws.

For the game, Noblesville was 16-of-18 shooting free throws.

"Brooke (Herron) is playing a new position as point guard," said Buckley. "She growing at that position."

"We had to foul in order to get the ball," Huppenthal said. "We fouled Herron and she hit her shots."

"We have to refine some things," Huppenthal continued. "We have a young team and there simply aren't any breaks in our schedule."

Huppenthal wants to get his point guard, junior Bre Lloyd, going. She was held to three points.

"Bre is struggling a little and has lost some confidence," said Huppenthal. "We hope to do some things against Greenfield (on Saturday) to get her going."

Noblesville's "Big 3" of Shannon, O'Reilly and the sophomore Kiser all scored

"North Central is a Top 10 team with some quick guards," said Buckley.

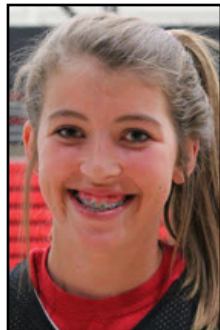

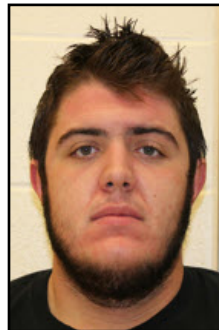

Basketball is often referred to as "a game of runs," and victory No. 2,000 certainly proved the motto true.

Indiana got off to a great start, amassing a 16-5 lead in the early going. But Los Angeles responded with a 14-5 run to bring the score to 21-19 midway through the first quarter. When the period was said and done, the teams were all even at 29.

Indiana started the fourth with a flurry of scoring. A Blue & Gold 14-1 run, capped by back-to-back Paul George 3-pointers, gave the Pacers an 86-70 lead.

"We did not play well," Clippers guard Austin Rivers said of the fourth quarter. "I do not know what else to say. We did not execute and we did not play defense."

But once again, the Clippers came roaring back, cutting the lead to six with less than four minutes remaining courtesy of a 14-4 spurt.

From there, Los Angeles intentionally fouled Ian Mahinmi three times in an attempt to slow Indiana down, but the big man made 4-of-6 attempts to keep his team

in the lead and thwart the Clippers' plan. After, Indiana controlled the game until the final buzzer.

"We know what we're doing with this group," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "We had a good preseason. We had three bad games to start. We are still finding our way a little bit. We are just playing with confidence."

Paul George led Indiana in scoring once again with 31 points on 9-of-23 shooting. He was 8-of-10 from the free-throw line and also grabbed 10 rebounds. Rodney Stuckey contributed 18 points off the bench.
