


The town of Sheridan has experienced its share of adversities over the last couple of years. In the recent past a downtown Sheridan fire destroyed a historic building. A broken water line flooded Sheridan High School and destroyed much of the gymna-

During each occasion the community stepped forward offering their support. Residents delivered food and water to the firefighters that battled the downtown fire. An outpouring of residents descended on Sheridan High School to offer their help in cleaning up the water damaged school.

Now a new adversity has presented itself to the small rural community and its school system, and in true Sheridan fashion, the community is stepping forward lending its support.

Sheridan Community School Superintendent Doctor David Mundy recently announced he has been diagnosed with

Mundy said after weeks of testing it was determined he has a form of cancer known as Squamous Cell Carcinoma.

Shortly after Mundy's announcement Sheridan Elementary teachers, Scott Ellis and Candy Hall kicked off a support cam-

paign known as #MundyStrong. "When we heard of Dave's battle with cancer we all wanted to do something to help and to let him know we were thinking of him," said Ellis. "We most definitely did not want him to think we were going to let him go through this alone."

"Candy Hall and I decided to sell #MundyStrong t-shirts. We wanted the profits to help out in any way that we could, but more importantly we wanted a visual reminder to Dave that we all love him and are praying for him," continued Ellis.

Hall and Ellis then talked with Sheridan resident Sara Moore, owner of Moore, Etc, Moore offered to provide #MundyStrong shirts that are now being sold by staff at Sheridan Community

The first round of sales produced more than 200 shirts sold. Ellis said, "We are now going to place a second order. Last night I received I received over 50 texts and Facebook messages from people wanting to support Dave with #MundyStrong shirts."

Sheridan is not the only school district in the county participating. Westfield and Noblesville are also offering #MundyStrong shirts. Mundy began his teaching career at

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Noblesville Schools named to National College Board Advanced Placement honor roll

Noblesville Schools announced that it hs been named to the national College Board Advanced Placement (AP) Honor Roll. Noblesville Schools iss one of only 13 districts in Indiana to be included.

The honor roll recognizes schools that have increased student participation in AP coursework while improving high AP exam performance levels, a challenging combination to attain. The ranking is based on 2013-2015 Noblesville High School (NHS) data.

NHS has exceeded the state benchmark for AP scores for over five consecutive years and in 2015 bested the benchmark by 22 percentage points. Additionally, almost 200 more AP exams were administered at NHS in 2015 than 2014.

The College Board is a not-for-profit organization that promotes college readiness through the SAT and Advanced Placement Program.

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
