Sheridan man dies in Thursday morning crash

A Sheridan man died Thursday morning after a single-vehicle crash just south of Sheridan.

Shortly after 8 a.m., Hamilton County Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to the 22800 block of Mule Barn Road on a report of a vehicle inverted in a field. Responding officers found a blue Chrysler PT Cruiser on its left side in a hay field. Witnesses at the crash scene stated the vehicle was travelling southbound on Mule Barn Road when it crossed the center line and ran through several yards before hitting a tree, rolling over, and landing on its

The driver of the vehicle, identified as James E. Gallimore, age 59 of Sheridan, was pinned inside the vehicle when first responders arrived. Mr. Gallimore succumbed to his injuries at the scene before he could be extricated from the vehicle. According to an initial crash report, Gallimore did not appear to be wearing a safety belt at the time of the crash.

This is an open investigation by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office. Toxicology and autopsy results are pending as investigators try to determine the cause of the crash or if medical issues possibly preceded the crash. Anyone with information should contact Deputy S. Goff at 317-773-1282.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office was assisted by Sheridan Police and Fire Departments.

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

New "tow plows" hitting the road in East Central Indiana

Motorists in East Central Indiana should conditions are always better behind a plow expect to see new larger plows on some at work than in front. highways this year during winter weather. The "tow plows" allow one truck to plow and treat two lanes at once.

The tow plow provides motorists with more consistent driving conditions on multi-lane highways and optimizes use of fuel, equipment and labor.

The tow plow and material spreader are pulled behind and to the side of a standard yellow INDOT plow truck, and can be deployed or retracted by one driver using in-cab controls.

Drivers should watch for tow plows on stocking up on salt or fuel, or when redeployed to other parts of the state as needed, tow plows will be used on these highways in east central Indiana:

- Interstate 74 between I-465 and Greens-
- Interstate 69 between State Road 32 and State Road 26
- State Road 3 between New Castle and
- Muncie • U.S. 31 Kokomo freeway

Don't crowd the plows!

Motorists should be prepared to see tow plows during winter weather and practice safe driving habits near all snow plows. Drivers should not attempt to pass a tow plow if all lanes are blocked, but stay a safe distance and speed behind the plows. Road

Stay back: Give snowplows room to work. The plows are wide and can cross lane markings, including the centerline and shoulder. Don't tailgate and try not to pass. If you must pass, take extreme caution and beware of snow coming off the plow.

Slow down: Snowplows travel below the speed limit. Be patient. They clearing roads of snow and ice and helping to keep you safe. Allow plenty of time. Remember, "Ice and snow, take it slow."

Make room: A snowplow operator's Indiana's multi-lane roads. Except when field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they don't always see you. Keep your distance and watch for sudden stops or

Move over for emergency vehicles!

Remember, Indiana's Move Over Law applies to snow plows and highway maintenance vehicles as well as emergency vehicles such as police, fire and ambulance. Roadside service and utility vehicles are also protected.


The Move Over Law requires motorists to approach cautiously when an emergency vehicle is stopped on two or four lane roadways with emergency lights flashing.

Change lanes away from the emergency vehicle if you can do so safely. If not, reduce your speed 10 mph under the posted speed limit and proceed with caution.

Paul George named Eastern Conference Player of the Month

The Indiana Pacers' Paul George and the Golden State Warriors' Stephen Curry today were named the Kia NBA Eastern and Western Conference Players of the Month, respectively, for games played in October and November.

George led the Eastern Conference and ranked fourth in the NBA in scoring (27.2) ppg), helping the Pacers win 11 of 13 games after an 0-3 start. The 6-9 George also averaged 8.1 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 1.56 steals in 35.6 minutes per game. His 51 three-pointers placed him second in the East and tied for third in the NBA. George scored at least 20 points in 12 straight games to close out November, the longest streak of his career. The streak included a season-high 40-point performance in a 123-106 win over the Wizards on Nov. 24, the second 40-point game of his career.

Curry was the driving force behind the Warriors' record-setting 19-0 start, ranking first in the NBA in scoring (31.6 ppg) and three-pointers made (94). He hit 42 more triples than any other player for October and November, and his 77 three-pointers in November broke his own record for the most in a calendar month (75 in March 2015).
