Trails of Hamilton County

It is time for a road trip. Pack the car with snacks and head north. Probably you have never heard of (unless you have lived here for a long time). Englewood. Boxleytown, Millwood, Spargersville, Shielsville, Buena Vista, Deming, Bethlehem or Richland? These towns reflect the early development of Hamilton County but as new people came the names of the towns changed too

At the stop light in Cicero, turn left and head west toward Sheridan which once was Millwood. Follow the trail (road) through Bakers Corner and onto Boxley. These towns were growing fast in 1831 with wonderful pastures, rivers and hills to build cabins. Sheridan did not get platted until 1860, rather late due to the continued growth of Boxley. Cicero was the place of the first post office in 1839. A very important town north of Cicero is Strawtown once known as Woodville and is thought to be the oldest town. Considered a sight for the first State Capital, however Strawtown lost by one vote. Had Strawtown won the vote, Hamilton Counties smallest towns today would be very different. Some say the one vote loss was between Noblesville and Strawtown for the county seat. William Conner and Josiah F. Polk, who took it upon purchase by the pioneers. themselves to name the town of Noblesville, had a hand in

the selection of the Hamilton County seat, all would agree. William Conner donated the land for the County seat. Each town had its special features in those early days and many early settlers became prosperous in Hamilton County. It settlements, villages and towns in Hamilton County.

Hortonville lies north of Westfield and is connected to the Monon railroad – long gone. The roads made a difference also to the growth of the early days. The early pioneers moved slowly as they cut their way through the thick forests making room for their wagons. The distance become important when the government released the land for

Hamilton County was officially created on May 12, 1823. The county was divided into two townships. The south half became Delaware Township and the northern portion, White River Township. In 1833, the boundaries was a good place and there is deep history in all the for all nine townships were drawn, creating Adams, Clay, Delaware, Fall Creek, Jackson, Noblesville, Washington, Soon the population began to shift from the small north Wayne and White River. Originally Hamilton County was carved from Marion County. The state legislature of 1826 added part of Madison County to Hamilton, but a year later that part of Madison County was return to them. In 1844, the original boundaries of the county were restated and have remained since that time.

The "trails" of Hamilton County still have views of land, from Westfield to Indianapolis. For the first year or so, it hills and great places to build your cabin especially in Northern Hamilton County. On your road trip, stop by Boxley. There is a wonderful restful cemetery on a hill where many of the early pioneers have their final place. in the township was the Noblesville and Lafayette road. There are many names in the Boxley cemetery that once made Boxleytown a vibrant section of Hamilton County.

Just a seasonal note, did you know or remember the first Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony in Noblesville was 1934? Tradition is a good thing. Haircuts costs were reduced from 35 cents to 25 cents that same year. Probably that historic note has never been repeated.

Many of the dates and places were taken from the "Remembrances" book published in 1976 telling the timeline of Hamilton County from 1783 to 1976 written by John A. Foland.

Natural causes claimed Sheridan crash victim



An autopsy conducted late Thursday determined that a Sheridan man who died Thursday morning after a single-vehicle crash just south of the town died of natural causes.

year's corn and soybean crops would be some flooded fields entirely ruined. The predictions dire warned of higher prices to come at the grocery stores.

Now that the crops have been harvested

and are being counted those estimated losses are found to not be what the experts had feared. In Hamilton County the crops have been near normal yields. For most local farmers it was a reasonably good year.

Diane Turner, Purdue Extension Educator for Agriculture and Natural Resources, says the exact figures on crop production three rural northern townships. And, rural

will not be reported until February. But, areas remain in Wayne and parts of Wash-Last spring's abnormal rainfall brought most farmers seem to feel the soybean crop predictions that this will be at or near the normal yield of 53 bushels per acre.

Corn crops in Hamilton County average severely reduced with about 155 bushels per acre and may be down slightly. There was damage or outright failure of crops in some low-lying fields, but damage was not as widespread as had been first thought.

> While many residents of urban and suburban areas of Hamilton County may think farming has been pushed out by the steady development of former farmland for housing and commercial construction, the fact is agriculture remains a major industry in the county accounting for about \$116 million annually.

> Hamilton County is composed of 402 square miles or 257,000 acres. Just over forty percent of this land area is found in the

ington Townships. With at least half the county rural in nature, farming remains underway on a majority of this rural land.

Turner has Purdue Ag reports that say 131,000 acres in our county are devoted to actual farming including raising corn, soybeans, wheat, hay and a few minor crops such as tomatoes and strawberries plus pasturing of livestock.

While the number of acres devoted to farming in the county has rapidly decreased over the past 30 years, greater yields per acre have made up for some of this loss. No till planting of corn accounts for a significant part of the increased yields.

So farming continues to be a big part of the local economy, and ranks 44th among the state's 92 counties. And, fortunately for hundreds of local farmers this year has not turned out to be a bad one.






The final score was proof of how this nip-and-tuck basketball game was played. Fishers led 16-13 after one quarter; Noblesville had a 26-24 lead at halftime, and the Tigers carried a 44-40 advantage into the fourth quarter.

"I liked the way we started the game," McCauley said. "I'm proud of the way our kids played tonight."

The Millers now are 1-1 heading to Carmel tonight.

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Crist's 33, Weatherford's double-double, solid free throw shooting...

Huskies get big win over GC

In an up-and-down game of runs, there's one thing that can help a team win a basketball game:

Free throws.

Hamilton Heights made quite a few of its foul shots - 22 of 28, to be exact. Hunter Crist had the most free throws of all the Huskies - 17 of 18. That was a huge part of Heights' 62-54 victory over Guerin Catholic Friday night in front of a packed and raucous crowd at the Eagles Nest. It was the first time that the Huskies had beaten the Golden Eagles since 2010.

"It's a good win for us," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "We're still trying to find our way. With Hunter and Sterling (Weatherford) and Caymn (Lutz) coming back, but we've got a lot of kids that haven't played varsity before."

The first quarter was tight before Heights broke away to turn a 9-7 deficit into a 13-9 lead at the end of the period. Sterling Weatherford scored four points in the quarter. Meanwhile, GC got big 3-pointers from Matthew Godfrey and Christian Munson.

The little run that Heights made in the first quarter turned into a big run in the second period. The Huskies outscored Guerin Catholic 19-7 during the first five minutes of the quarter, eventually taking a 32-16 lead. Weatherford added six more points, while Crist scored seven, Tyler Wiltermood, a sophomore coming off the bench, added four points.

But the Golden Eagles stormed back with a furious and sudden run, pouring in 11 points in the final two minutes of the half. Munson scored six straight points to begin GC's push, then Jack Hanson added another five points, including a '3.' His layin at the buzzer got Guerin to within 32-27 at halftime.

"It's a game of runs," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "Obviously in the first half we let one get away."

The Golden Eagles continued their run into the third quarter, with Munson scoring three points to cut the Huskies' lead to 32-30. Crist responded with a putback and two foul shots, making the biggest scoring run of the third quarter. Heights had weathered the Guerin storm, but was still ahead by only 40-36 after three.

"Anytime momentum changes like that, you just don't know what can happen," said Ballenger. "They still got two outstanding shooters in Godfrey and Munson, and just worried about them going off.'

Heights was able to keep the Golden Eagles at arm's length in the fourth period, thanks to a Weatherford basket, and a steal by Crist that led to a three-point play early in the quarter. That gave the Huskies a 45-37 lead.

Heights led by as much as 53-41 with 2:47 left in the game. The Huskies didn't score a basket in the final four minutes of the game, but Crist made sure his team would get the victory: He went to the free throw line 14 times in the final 4:02 and made 13 attempts, and that helped Heights hold off one last push by Guerin, which included a pair of 3-pointers by Rhett Helt and another by Grant Fremion.

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

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
