According to a study conducted by ES-PN and the National Institute on Drug Abuse, former NFL players abuse prescription painkillers at a rate of four times the general population. On the home front, pills are easy to get and 1 in 5 Indiana teens have admitted to abusing prescription drugs. Recent studies have found that high school football players are more likely to abuse prescription drugs than other athletes.

Teaming with the Colts and their professional athletes provides an opportunity to help those held in the grip of pain and addiction. The partnership heightens awareness of the dangers of abuse and options for treatment for those suffering from addiction.

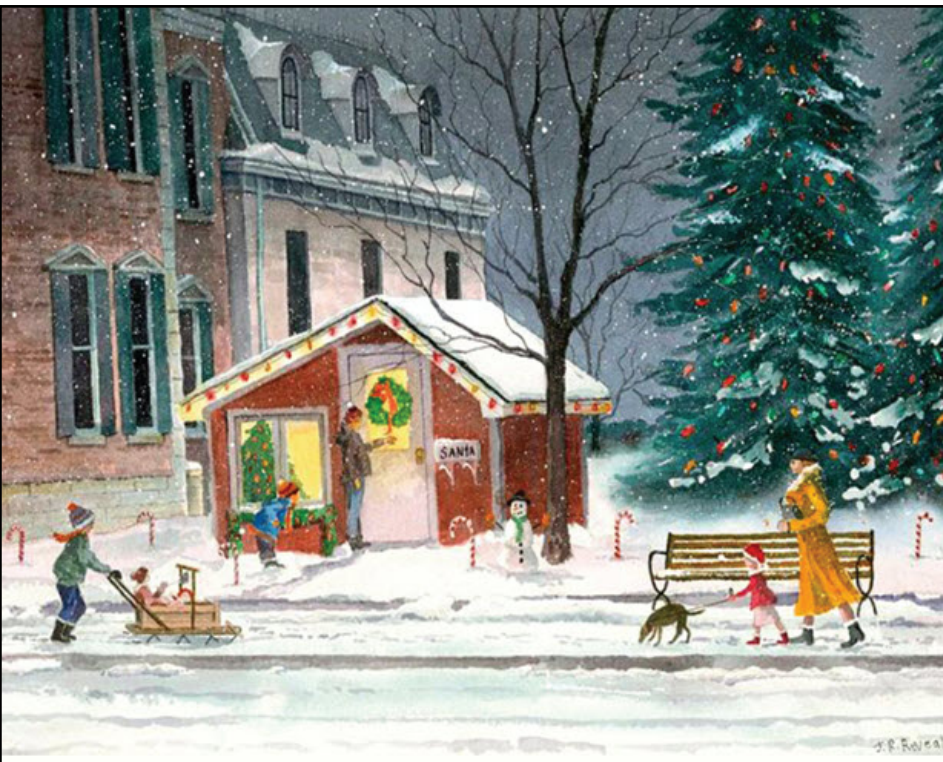

Veterans from The Barrington in Carmel honored by Indy Honor Flight

Three veterans from The Barrington of Carmel were honored by Indy Honor Flight with a personally escorted trip to Washington, D.C. last month to experience first-hand the nation’s monuments devoted to those who have served our country. Ray Casciari, who served in the Pacific as a pilot in the Army Air Corps during World War II, was able to meet two granddaughters at the World War II Memorial for the special event, which also honored his fellow resident Dominick Paielli, a Navy veteran, and Will Elsner, an Air Force veteran.

“I’m proud of the fact that I was able to serve my country,” said Casciari. “My parents and older brother were immigrants from Italy. I was the first child in my family who was born in this country. Where I came from in Pennsylvania, you grew up and worked in the coal mines. Going into the Army presented not only the opportunity for me to fulfill my lifelong dream of flying an airplane, but I was also able to serve my country during a time of war and ultimately earn an education.”

Casciari, who lives at The Barrington with his wife Carol, was 20 when he left Pennsylvania for the Army Air Corps, which didn’t become the Air Force until after World War II. An avid lover of aviation, he was originally assigned to join the 22nd Bomb Group in Nadzab, New Guinea, in 1945. As a pilot on the B-24 bomber, Casciari flew in several missions, eventually moving to Clark Field in the Philippines, then on to Okinawa before retiring as a First Lieutenant. He and Carol, married now for 37 years, lived for 35 years in Carmel before moving to The Barrington two years ago. Casciari, who attended Penn State, joined two neighbors at The Barrington for the October 31st Honor Flight.

“Three of my other neighbors had already gone on Honor Flights when I was

approached by the Honor Flight organization,” added Casciari. “They all had such wonderful experiences that I was happy to agree to go, both to be honored for my service and to pay my own respects to my fellow veterans. The day trip was a wonderful way to mark the upcoming Veterans Day.”

Indy Honor Flight is a nonprofit organization and part of the National Honor Flight Network, which is dedicated to recognizing veterans for their sacrifices by escorting them to Washington, D.C. to view the national veterans’ memorials. Casciari, Paielli and Elsner were taken to the National WWII Memorial and the U.S. Marine Corps, Vietnam Veterans, Lincoln, Korean War Veterans and U.S. Navy Memorials in Washington, D.C. during the October 31st trip. Highlights included a Heroes Banquet at Plainfield High School the evening before the veterans went to the memorials, a visit to Arlington National Cemetery and witnessing the “Changing of the Guard”, as well as a return celebration with family and friends at Plainfield. All three men were convinced to go by fellow resident of The Barrington and Navy veteran Ken Ritchhart, who went on an Honor Flight himself in April.

“The Honor Flight experience was incredibly emotional and can’t really be conveyed in words and photos,” said Ritchhart. “Those who make this possible for veterans do a fantastic job. Before this trip, I was under the impression that in many ways, patriotism in our country was not prevalent any more. I was so tremendously surprised and thrilled at how many people of all ages were expressing patriotism and gratitude as they celebrated us as veterans during the trip. It was overwhelming in the best way.”

Dollison scores 24...

Tigers hold off Millers for HCC victory

“We dedicated the season to his father, who passed away a couple of weeks ago,” said Fishers coach Joe Leonard.

Leonard was talking about senior standout Lance Dollison who last evening in the Tiger Den did his own dedication, pouring in 24 points while leading the Tigers to a huge 58-54 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory over Noblesville.

Three of Dollison’s points came on a steal, lay-in and free throw with 1:23 remaining in the game.

“That was the biggest play in the game,” said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. “It was a five-point swing in the game.”

Dollison’s 24-point night was a career-high for the 6-foot 6-inch guard/forward and it ended a very entertaining evening of basketball between Dollison and Noblesville’s 6-5 John Kiser, who finished with 20 points for the Millers.

The final score was proof of how this nip-and-tuck basketball game was played. Fishers led 16-13 after one quarter; Noblesville had a 26-24 lead at halftime, and the Tigers carried a 44-40 advantage into the fourth quarter.

“I liked the way we started the game,” McCauley said. “I’m proud of the way our kids played tonight.”

The Millers now are 1-1 heading to Carmel tonight.

Kiser was the only Miller in double figure, but he had a lot of help. Max Flinchum and McGwire Plumer each scored nine points and Corby Mertens added eight

Zach Eaton finished with 11 points for Fishers.

In an up-and-down game of runs, there's one thing that can help a team win a basketball game: Free throws.

Hamilton Heights made quite a few of its foul shots - 22 of 28, to be exact. Hunter Crist had the most free throws of all the Huskies - 17 of 18. That was a huge part of Heights' 62-54 victory over Guerin Catholic Friday night in front of a packed and raucous crowd at the Eagles Nest. It was the first time that the Huskies had beaten the Golden Eagles since 2010.

"It's a good win for us," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "We're still trying to find our way. With Hunter and Sterling (Weatherford) and Caymn (Lutz) coming back, but we've got a lot of kids that haven't played varsity before."

The first quarter was tight before Heights broke away to turn a 9-7 deficit into a 13-9 lead at the end of the period. Sterling Weatherford scored four points in the quarter. Meanwhile, GC got big 3-pointers from Matthew Godfrey and Christian Munson.

The little run that Heights made in the first quarter turned into a big run in the second period. The Huskies outscored Guerin Catholic 19-7 during the first five minutes of the quarter, eventually taking a 32-16 lead. Weatherford added six more points, while Crist scored seven, Tyler Wiltermood, a sophomore coming off the bench, added four points.

But the Golden Eagles stormed back with a furious and sudden run, pouring in 11 points in the final two minutes of the half. Munson scored six straight points to begin GC's push, then Jack Hanson added another five points, including a '3.' His layin at the buzzer got Guerin to within 32-27 at halftime.

"It's a game of runs," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "Obviously in the first half we let one get away."

The Golden Eagles continued their run into the third quarter, with Munson scoring three points to cut the Huskies' lead to 32-30. Crist responded with a putback and two foul shots, making the biggest scoring run of the third quarter. Heights had weathered the Guerin storm, but was still ahead by only 40-36 after three.

"Anytime momentum changes like that, you just don't know what can happen," said Ballenger. "They still got two outstanding shooters in Godfrey and Munson, and just worried about them going off."

Heights was able to keep the Golden Eagles at arm's length in the fourth period, thanks to a Weatherford basket, and a steal by Crist that led to a three-point play early in the quarter. That gave the Huskies a 45-37 lead.

Heights led by as much as 53-41 with 2:47 left in the game. The Huskies didn't score a basket in the final four minutes of the game, but Crist made sure his team would get the victory: He went to the free throw line 14 times in the final 4:02 and made 13 attempts, and that helped Heights hold off one last push by Guerin, which included a pair of 3-pointers by Rhett Helt and another by Grant Fremion.

"We felt pretty good at halftime just being down five," said Golden Eagles coach Pete Smith. "Cut it to two, but our free throw shooting really cost us.

"We couldn't guard them," Smith continued, noting that's been a pattern over three games: "Cathedral we

couldn't guard, we couldn't guard Herron, we couldn't guard Heights."

In the end, Crist wound up with 33 points, marking the second time he's hit the 30-point threshold in just

three games this season. He also grabbed eight rebounds and had four steals. Weatherford wound up with a double-double, totaling 12 points and 11 rebounds. Wiltermood scored eight points, including his key first-quarter baskets for Heights.

Munson led the Golden Eagles with 25 points, while Hanson scored 14 points. Christian Daniels and Munson both grabbed five rebounds. Matthew Godfrey handed out seven assists, with Hanson dishing out four. Calen Cunningham had three blocked shots.

The Huskies play another big Class 4A team on the road tonight, traveling to North Central. The Golden Eagles will be back at the Eagles Nest, taking on Arsenal Tech.

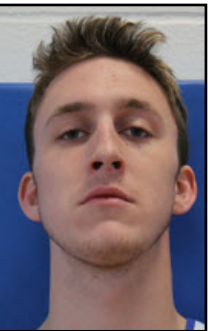


