The County Line

Many projects in store for county in 2016

As we near the end of 2015 and move toward 2016 we can hopefully look forward to progress on many fronts in the public sector in Hamilton County.

One of the biggest should be the beginnings of a plan to upgrade State Road 37 between Noblesville and I-69 at Fishers.

County and city officials are looking forward to an announcement this week from Gov. Mike Pence that \$100 million will be granted for the massive improvement (as first revealed here last summer). This will eliminate the numerous stop-and-go signals, replacing them with elevated roundabouts to relieve major congestion for commuters.

But, as the plan now stands the rebuilt intersections will be those from 146th Street south to I-69 with county and Fishers funding of about \$12 million each in addition to the \$100 million state grant. If the intersections from Ind. 32 to 146th are to be rebuilt, Noblesville will have to get involved in the funding to at least the extent of county and Fishers contributions.

Another major project locally that should improve the near-southside of Noblesville is the much publicized development of the former Hamilton County Farm Bureau Co-op property.

This historic site on South 8th Street is the location of the city's early grain milling

operation which contributed greatly to the city's growth more than a century ago. It is slated to be developed as an apartment complex. Hamilton Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) plans the housing facility with a historic twist, using parts of the old grain elevator in its plans. This project is seen as perhaps the opportunity to begin what city officials say will be the improvement of the Southwest Quad, meaning the southwest section of Noblesville which some claim has been overlooked.

Another project in Noblesville which could get underway in 2016 is the long-proposed bridge over White River at Pleasant Street. The idea is to allow through traffic to bypass the downtown area where congestion often occurs. The plan now awaiting final approval by county and city officials would allow traffic to exit Ind. 32 at an improved River Road, go south and curve into the new bridge, then continue east on Pleasant to Ind. 37 and beyond.

After years in the planning work may get underway next year on the Midland Trail, a multi-use hiking and bike pathway from Noblesville to Westfield along the old Midland Railway. Westfield is moving on its portion west of Gray Road. Noblesville which has money for right-of-way purchases is due to get started on their portion east from Gray Road to White River.

Could 2016 see a resolution of Noblesville's downtown parking needs? Most informed observers feel that a multi-level parking garage similar to those in other cities the size of Noblesville is the answer. Some type of off-street parking is going to be needed with the expansion of the Gov-

ernment and Judicial Center and the increasing number of visitors to the business district.

The Judicial Center expansion is certain to go. Architects have submitted preliminary plans, money is earmarked and officials say the need for more space already exists. Architect's renderings show an impressive new west façade to the seat of county government.

Then there are a couple of possible projects that will apparently not become fully approved or revealed next year. One is Riverview Hospital's plans for expansion on the west side of the river on the former Kahlo property, and the other is a re-use of the former Firestone Industrial Products site on Noblesville's east side. City officials have not revealed what, if any, plans they have at that location where some type of development is seen as key to upgrading that old factory neighborhood.

Elsewhere in the county, plans are afoot to develop what is called the Midtown Redevelopment in Carmel tying the downtown area with the popular Civic Center area to the south, rejuvenating the old downtown area of Fishers, converting the old high school at Sheridan into a major senior citizen housing facility, continued development of Westfield's Grand Park and Riverview's major new Westfield out-patient medical facility.

All these projects are considered financially doable in our prosperous county. Getting them underway in a timely manner will require the bold inclination and steady attention of political leadership in the various communities.

Tony Etchison named to Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's Silver Team

Tony Etchison, a 1991 graduate of Noblesville High School, has been named to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's Silver Anniversary Team for 2015-16.

Etchison was a four year varsity player for Hall of Fame coach, Dave Nicholson. He scored 1,357 points in his high school career and led Noblesville to three consecutive sectional titles. Etchison was named all-Hamilton County four years, all sectional and all-regional three years, all conference three years, all Indianapolis Metro team, and Hamilton County Player of the Year twice.

Etchison averaged 22.8 points, five rebounds, and four assists his senior year. He received a scholarship from Mercer University,

where he was a two-year starter for Coach Bill Hodges. He earned all-academic honors four years and led the TransAmerican Conference in three-point shooting. Tony is an agent for Farm Bureau Insurance in Noblesville. He and his wife Toby and their three sons reside on a farm in Cicero, IN.

"Tony was an outstanding player for us for four years," said Nicholson. "He was one of the hardest workers and most dedicated players to play for the Millers. He deserves this outstanding honor as one of the top players in Indiana graduating 25 years ago. He was a great player but he is even a greater person! I am very proud of Tony and what he is doing with his life."

Noblesville upsets NC

Noblesville's Lady Millers took a lick at No. 8 North Central Saturday afternoon in The Mill, beating up on the Panthers with a fourth quarter explosion.

Coach Donna Buckley's crew, after battling NC for three quarters, outscored North Central 28-17 in the fourth quarter to finish with a 73-57 victory.

While North Central was falling to 6-3 on the year, Noblesville moved to 9-2 with Fishers coming in for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game next Friday. The Lady Millers are 3-0 in the HCC.



So it was again when the Class 4A No. 3 Greyhounds hosted the Millers Saturday night at the Eric Clark Activity Center. Carmel led the entire game, but Noblesville kept things close from start to finish before the 'Hounds finally won 49-45. For Carmel, it was a good way to rebound after its loss to Lawrence Central. For the Millers, it was another close loss but good fight against a potential sectional opponent.

"We struggled last night," said Carmel coach Scott Heady. "We just didn't play very well." So, Heady was happy that his

Greyhounds were able to come back "and play better against a good team," as well as do "a lot of positive things." After addressing some things Saturday morning, Heady said he thought his team responded well and were better.

The game followed a consistent pattern: The Greyhounds would jump out to a healthy lead of eight or 10 points, then Noblesville would make a run to get within four or five points. The first quarter illustrated it perfect: Carmel scored the first eight points, but a 3-pointer by John Kiser got NHS on the board, and the Millers eventually cut the Greyhounds' lead to 13-10 by the end of the period.

Noblesville was still within 15-12 before a quick burst got Carmel back up 20-12. Preston Flamion drained a 3-pointer and Sterling Brown made a jump shot. The Millers answered with a 7-0 run, with Kiser scoring six of those points. That got Noblesville within 20-19, but the half ended with jumpers by Brown and Sam Oliphant to get Carmel's lead back up to 24-19.

Brown continued to play well in the third quarter, adding on another six points. The Millers, meanwhile, were helped out by a pair of '3s' by Ryan Ogden. Noblesville was as close as 31-27 with seconds remaining in the period, but the quarter ended with a huge swing: Brown scored on a jump shot, then Alex Falander stole the inbounds

pass and scored at the buzzer. Just like that, it was 35-27 Greyhounds.

Noblesville coach Brian McCauley called that series of events "disappointing," noting that a four-point deficit would soon become 10: Trenton Richardson scored the first basket of the fourth quarter.

"But we did some good things as well," said McCauley. "I thought our bench was great tonight. "Brandon Barthel came off the bench tonight and just really provided a ton of energy for us."

McCauley also said Nick Mills had an "outstanding" night for Noblesville. "Nick came in and hit a big floater for us and then knocked down three free throws," said the coach.

Carmel's biggest lead was 41-29, after Cole Jenkins made a layin. The Millers answered that with a 12-4 run: Kiser scored six points, then McGwire Plumer and Max Flinchum both made 3s. But the 'Hounds were able to hang on, thanks to a couple free throws by Richardson and Brown.

Brown finished up with 15 points, while Flamion scored 12 and also pulled five rebounds. Falander added nine points.

Kiser led all scorers with 25 points, and also had seven rebounds.

The Greyhounds return to MIC play on Friday when they host 4A No. 2 North Central. Noblesville will travel to Anderson, another potential sectional opponent, next Saturday.

George scores 48 points, but...

Jazz stop Pacers comeback in OT

Paul George had a career night and the Pacers staged a memorable rally, but it wasn't quite enough to beat the Jazz in Utah. The Jazz (9-9) fought back from a five points down in the final minute of regulation to force overtime, then held off Indiana (12-7) in the extra period, 122-119.

After an off night in Thursday's loss to Portland, when he scored just 11 points and missed all nine of his 3-point attempts, George exploded for a career-high 48 points on Saturday night. The reigning Eastern Conference Player of the Week made 15-of-27 shots, went 8-for-11 from 3-point range, and led the charge in the Pacers' comeback from a 17-point second half deficit.

For plenty of moments late in the fourth quarter and even in overtime, it seemed as if the night would belong to George and the Pacers. But ultimately, it just wasn't to be.

"We played well enough to win," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after the game. "...We just didn't do enough. It hurts."

The Jazz led by five at halftime opened the third quarter with a 14-2 run, the exact same way they started the second half en route to a 21-point victory over the Pacers on Oct. 31 in Indianapolis. This time, however, Indiana didn't fold.

George knocked down a couple 3-pointers, Rodney Stuckey and George Hill followed suit, and the Blue & Gold quickly climbed back. They closed the period with a 13-2 run to tie the game at 84.

"I thought we shared the ball," George said of his team's lightning-quick rally. "We moved it. We played with a lot more force. You know, we played together. It got us back in the game."

The contest remained tight for much of the fourth quarter, but the Pacers seemingly took control down the stretch as George and Stuckey scored six points each over a three-minute stretch to turn a 96-96 tie into a 108-103 lead with 1:18 to play.

The Jazz, however, rallied to within one after Trevor Booker sank four of six free throws, aided in part by a clutch offensive rebound by former Butler star Gordon Hayward. George calmly knocked down two foul shots of his own with 15.8 seconds to play, but Alec Burks raced down the court on the ensuing inbound and found Derrick Favors, who hit a layup and drew a foul on Lavoy Allen.

Favors sank the free throw to tie the game with 10.6 seconds left and George missed a shot to win the game on the other end, sending the game to overtime.

The extra period was an exciting one, featuring five lead changes. Indiana moved in front, 119-118 on C.J. Miles' fastbreak bucket with 1:02 left, but that would be the last time they scored on the evening.

Trey Burke hit what would prove to be the game winning jumper on the next possession, then after a turnover by George, Favors banked in a shot to give the Jazz a three-point lead with 17.2 seconds to play.

The Pacers got off three shots that would have tied the game on their final possession, but none of them fell, and the Jazz escaped with the victory and the season sweep of Indiana.

"It really hurts," George said of the loss. "Especially being up and winning and not taking care of business to close."

In addition to George, four other Pacers players scored in double figures in the loss. Stuckey matched his season-high with 23 points on 8-for-14 shooting. Miles added 12, George Hill had 10, and Jordan Hill contributed 10 points and eight rebounds.

Favors led Utah with a career-best 35 points, going 14-for-24 from the field, and pulled in 13 rebounds. Hayward added 22 points, five rebounds, and five assists. Burke had 19 points and seven assists off the bench.

"I think this is a game where you scratch your head and wonder how we got back into it," Hayward said. "But Fav was tremendous and carried us to the victory."

Saturday's loss concluded a four-game Western Conference road trip for the Pacers, who went 2-2 with wins over the Lakers and Clippers.
