An alternative funding solution

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of four columns that Mayor Ditslear is writing regarding the upcoming vote on a trash fee for the City of Noblesville.



As we worked on next year's budget for the past several months, one thing became clear with our present financial constraints – we need to look at the possibility of implementing a trash fee. After a closer review of the numbers, possibly became a

reality. The Noblesville Common Council has begun talking about considering an implementation of a trash fee for Noblesville residents. While I know all new fees are unwelcomed, it is important that I share the background to be transparent to our residents and why I support the change.

How did we get to this point?

From 2010 to projections for 2016, Noblesville has lost \$30,420,314 because of property tax caps. In that same time frame, the city has not had a significant increase in operating funding. Last year, we requested a budget to be passed in the red in order to add more public safety personnel – and used a portion of our Rainy Day Fund. That budget is now in the black but the city would be financially irresponsible to continuously use cash to support the budget.

How will it impact you?

The trash fee being proposed is \$10.57 per residence, per month. That equates to \$126.84 per year – the actual cost for the city of each residence. The average trash fee for Hamilton County is around \$12.50 and one area requires citizens to contract their own removal.

I know we have some residents who live on a fixed income or receive a reduction on their property taxes. As the city does with their wastewater bill, these residents would be eligible to receive a 50 percent discount on their monthly trash bills.

What it means?

Westfield Parks and Recreation makes trail additions

As 2015 comes to a close the Westfield parks department is making the public aware of three additions to the city's trails system.

- *Covered Swing* – An Eagle Scout project, this covered swing along the Monon near Custom Concrete gives trail users a place to sit and rest with some protection from the sun or rain. The swing is the Scout project of Andrew Bredensteiner, who started in Scouts as a first grader.

Andrew's father, Jeff Bredensteiner, passed away suddenly in February. The project is dedicated to his memory.

"Now all the people that pass by and sit on my swing will know how much I loved my father," Andrew said. "Even though he did not build the swing with me he was still a big part of the path that got me to be ready to build it."

Andrew also says he learned leadership, organization, perseverance, time management and budgeting skills over-

Kenley: Local students gain state government insight

Local high school students recently got a behind-the-scenes look at state government during the 2015 Luke Kenley Leadership Conference held at the Indiana Statehouse.

State Sen. Luke Kenley (R-Noblesville) annually invites high school junior and senior student leaders to his conference in Indianapolis. This year, students from 10 area high schools participated.

Students interacted with Gov. Mike Pence and State Sens. Jean Breaux (D-Indianapolis), Jim Merritt (R-Indianapolis) and Jeff Raatz (R-Centerville). The state officials encouraged students to get involved in their local communities and answered questions about their roles as public servants, touching on topics like Indiana's lifeline law, education, utilities, and redistricting.

Students also heard from media reporters who cover the Indiana General Assembly. Tony Cook with the Indianapolis Star, Kevin Rader with WTHR 13 and Brandon Smith with Indiana Public Media shared their experiences from previous legislative sessions and offered their perspectives on media, technology and the ever-changing field of journalism.

"I started this program as a way to connect young leaders with public servants in order to help students understand the critical role of state government, and how they can be involved as future leaders," Kenley said. "It's encouraging to meet with these young, bright students in our community and know how passionate they are about providing solutions for issues that face Indiana."

Less is more...

Five ways sports parents can do better in 2016

Sports parents, do you want to do more to help your kids succeed at their game in 2016?

Prominent sport psychology coach Dr. Rob Bell of Fisher, Indiana, co-author with Bill Parisi of the new book *Don't Should On Your Kids: Build Their Mental Toughness*, has this advice:

Less is more.

The growing emphasis on trophies, winning and external rewards such as scholarships is driving parents to make kids focus on the end result rather than the process. But only a love for the process will give kids the grit the guts, the resiliency and the will to fight without giving up. This can only come from within.

So instead of critiquing, giving feedback and creating expectations by telling them what they should -- or should not -- do, here's how parents can truly help their young athletes:

- Let them set their own goals for each season – then hold them accountable.
- Allow them to fail and to learn from failures’ priceless lessons.
- Forget about the outcome, allowing them to embrace the process. This is what will give them the mental toughness they need to succeed.
- Drop the focus on trophies and scholarships. Expectations about these and other external rewards are not what the process is about.
- Don't talk about the game in the car ride home. Emotions are still running high and kids may feel cornered. It'll only backfire.

Rob works with athletes, coaches and teams on achieving peak performance. He was coached winners during the PGA tour and advises major universities including Notre Dame.

seeing the construction of the swing. “This was a real life experience and I know that this experience will help me in the future,” he said.

One of the three stations was funded by local nonprofit Anna’s Celebration of Life, and is designed to assist in spreading awareness of the great need for children who are disabled.

- *Custom Concrete Fitness Stations* – Due to their location adjacent to the Monon Trail, Custom Concrete was able to install three fitness stations on their property just off the trail. The stations give trail users a place to stop and stretch, but also allow employees of Custom Concrete the ability to incorporate fitness into their workdays. “What started as a simple path to the Monon has now grown to become a culture shift in how we look at wellness,” Custom Concrete’s Levi Schrock said. “We encourage employees to have ‘walking meetings’ on the Monon instead of being restricted to a conference room. When some of our office staff have been sitting for many hours trying to get work done, we encourage them to take a quick stretch on the fitness stations and do some small exercises to loosen any stiffness.”

- *Grassy Branch Bridge* – The new bridge over Grassy Branch connects the Monon Trail all the way to S.R. 32. A huge advantage to trail users of all kinds, this project is one stepping stone to extending the Monon all the way through Westfield’s city limits. Phase 5 (Monon over S.R. 32) and Phase 7 (Monon Elementary to 216th Street) are the two final phases of the Monon through Westfield’s corporate limits.
- *Monon Phase 6* – The Monon Trail has been extended from 181st Street to Monon Trail Elementary. The expansion adds 6,800 feet to the mainline Monon Trail and about 1,250 feet of connector trail along 181st Street. Signs, lighting and other items will be completed this coming Spring. The project also include a stub connector along 181st Street that will connect in the future to Asa Bales.

The trash fee is needed to accommodate the request of adding four new police officers to our department. Public safety is the community’s No. 1 issue and I want to ensure we have the numbers needed as our community continues to grow.

We also plan to use the fee for infrastructure needs. As the city increases its road mileage we must provide funds to maintain those improvements. If the surfacing budget is affected, it could mean that five to 10 roads that we plan to address next year will have to wait. Right now, we are looking at losing \$500,000 for resurfacing – not including pothole, storm sewer, sidewalk repairs and resurfacing of our alleys, which have not been done since 1995.

If not now?

Budget issues unfortunately are not a new issue. The city, its departments and the Common Council have done its best job running a lean government; however, the city needs the funds to continue moving forward. It allows money for a number of needed projects and expected services. In 2017, we will need to address understaffing within our departments.

There will be a ripple effect if we cannot get this passed. The city has always paid for residents to have trash and recycling for free. If a fee is not implemented, the city will be forced to cut the amount from our current services, which may include brush pick-up, tree planting, sidewalk repair and street projects.





Balance was the word of the game in a big county girls basketball clash between Carmel and Westfield Tuesday at the Eric Clark Activity Center.

In the end, the Class 4A No. 10 Greyhounds used some intense defense to end the unbeaten run of the 4A No. 7 Shamrocks, by the score of 51-48. Carmel held an eight-point lead late in the fourth quarter before Westfield made one last push.

The entire game was close. Jalyn Foland started things off with a 3-pointer for the 'Rocks, then Carmel burst out to an 8-3 lead, with Olivia Christy and Emily Kmec hitting a couple 3s of their own.

Foland and Allison VanDyke responded with - what else? - a couple downtown shots, and even Haliegh Reinoehl got in on the long-distance action with a 3. That gave Westfield a 12-10 lead, but Carmel worked its way back to lead 15-14 after one quarter.

The 'Hounds jumped ahead 26-20 by halftime. Carrie Larson made a 3-pointer, and Christy scored four points, including a basket off a steal. Meanwhile, Carmel was starting to press, and held Westfield to six points in the second period.

"They're a very solid team shooting the basketball if you let them get their feet set and stuff," said Carmel coach

Tod Windlan of the Shamrocks. "We wanted to create a game that didn't let them run their stuff."

But Westfield blasted back in the third period, opening it with five points from VanDyke. Reinoehl then took over the game, scoring eight points, including six on three straight baskets. That got the 'Rocks ahead 33-30. Larson tied it up with another 3, and Amy Dilk got a basket to roll in to give Carmel a 35-33 advantage after three quarters.

The Greyhounds led by eight points on three different occasions, with Dilk's layin getting them up 48-40. Westfield made one last run to get within 50-48, but that was with 1.5 seconds left. Kmec's free throw placed the score at its final.

"We went stagnant," said WHS coach Ginny Smith. "We just got real passive there. I think we got tight and it kind of showed."

Carmel didn't get anyone in double figures, but had four players - Christy, Kmec, Dilk and Larson - all score nine points. Dilk had a fantastic game, with eight rebounds and five assists.

The 'Rocks got three players in double figures: VanDyke scored 16, Reinoehl 15 and Foland 10. VanDyke pulled five rebounds.

Both teams are back in action Friday on the road. Westfield (10-1) travels to Zionsville for a Hoosier Cross-

roads Conference game, and Carmel (7-2) heads to Brownsburg.



Friday
