Preparing for Christmas Food and Toy Drive...

Noblesville Fire receives large gift donation

On Saturday, December 19, members of the Noblesville Fire Department will spread out across the city providing items to less fortunate families as part of this year's Firefighter's Christmas Food and Toy Drive.

Thanks to the generosity from the community, Elizabeth Wood, NFD employee and coordinator of the toy portion of the annual drive, said the original goal of assisting more than 120 Noblesville families was achieved.

"We were able to add some families on top of what we normally do," she said. "We had a lot of good donations this year."

Wood said the families are provided to the fire department by Good Samaritan Network and the Noblesville Township Trustee's Office. Donations were accepted at all seven Noblesville fire stations and City Hall through December 11 and included a special drop-off from resident Crystal Keyes and her family.

"It's hard to say because many of our donations are anonymous, but to my knowledge this is one of the single largest toy donations from one family," Wood said.

Keyes, owner of Crystal Keyes Photography LLC, said she wanted to help in 2014 but had missed the deadline. To make a donation this year, Keyes offered Christmas photo sessions where she asked the 22 families scheduled to bring toys instead of paying the \$250 fee.

"Each one brought a ton of stuff. It was really fun, very humbling," said Keyes. "People were bringing in huge items."

Keyes said it was her mother, Mindy Dicenso (who also assisted with the day-long photo sessions), who instilled the importance of giving back at a young age – a lesson she and husband, Jase, are teaching their five-year-old daughter, Lu.

"I love teaching our daughter this is what it's all about," Keyes said. "It is such a good feeling."

Keyes said she hopes to make the large donation an annual occurrence.

"I'm very thrilled to do something like this. That my family is in a place to help others that don't get a Christmas," said Keyes. "I'm so thrilled to live in our community. I feel like I didn't do anything."

Purchase Crock-Pots for PHHC

Every year, the Noblesville Boys and Girls Club puts together its "Stuff da Bus" fundraiser, where local individuals and businesses purchase a "seat" on a school bus.

The donated money is spent on a variety of programs for the Club. This year, the Club will also use it to help those outside the Club. Members of the Club used some of the money to purchase Crock-Pots, which will be donated to Partnership for a Healthy Hamilton County (PHHC).

Those Crock-Pots will be used as incentives for Healthy Helpings, a pilot program that assists those who are clients of county food pantries and mobile food distributions in learning about how to integrate fresh produce into their diets while utilizing shelf-stable ingredients often available at pantries.

Lauren Sebring, the Club's Assistant Program Director, said the kids went out shopping the day before Thanksgiving, heading to Walmart, and shopped all day, purchasing all of the Crock-Pots that were donated to Healthy Helpings.

"It pulls on their hearts," said Sebring. "It gives them an opportunity to know that they're making a difference. Not only for a day or for a week, but it's making a long-term difference for them."

Janet Gafkjen, the director of PHHC, was on hand to collect the Crock-Pots Wednesday afternoon from the members of the Club.

"It's an opportunity for them to not only experience what it is to go out and shop for things, but also allow them an opportunity to find out how many families that are actually needy in Hamilton County, and they have an interest in being able to help and provide that Crock-Pot," said Gafkjen. "It also gives that sense of pride from them, and also for all those in the community, this is a project that we're launching and it's

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
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Celebrating win No. 200

It's a tough weekend ahead for Sheridan's Blackhawks. Coach Chris Schrank calls it a "huge weekend."



Guerin & LN ... Just 1 win?

Smith faces old friend

Guerin Catholic coach Pete Smith says he never expected to play Lawrence North in mid-December and both teams would be looking for their second victory.

That will be the situation Friday when Guerin Catholic (1-4) travels to Lawrence North (1-2).

And, although a pleasant surprise, Smith may have never expected to meet an old friend, Scott Radeker, bringing an undefeated team to the Eagles Nest. That will be the situation on Saturday if Radeker's Lafayette Jeff team defeats Logansport on Friday before the Saturday trip to Guerin.

"Lawrence North is very talented," Smith said. "They have at least three Division 1 players in their starting lineup. We're going to have to limit them to one shot to give ourselves a chance to beat them."

Lawrence North has defeated Brebeuf 61-47 and lost to Marion 79-70 and Lawrence Central 63-62.

Radeker will take a 6-0 Lafayette Jeff team to Logansport on Friday before visiting Guerin Catholic.

Radeker started his coaching career as an assistant for Smith on the 1993-94 Noblesville team that was regional finalists. He was the Millers' assistant for eight years.

The Guerin-Lafayette Jeff game will feature two 20-point scorers. Christian Munson is averaging 20.8 points a game for Guerin. David Hanyard, a 5-10 senior, is scoring at a 20.3 clip for Jeff.

Both have strong backups. Darin Collins is averaging 13.3 points for Jeff and Matthew Godfrey is averaging 13.0 for Guerin.

"Scott has got his best team since he's been at Jeff," Smith said. "They have two super high school players in Collins and Hanyard, and they complement each other very well."

"It's one of the rare instances that we'll have a size advantage over them, but boy they are as quick as Muncie Central was, and we struggled staying in front of the basketball against Muncie."

Lafayette Jeff has defeated Fountain Central 67-25, Crown Point 71-64, Frankfort 71-66, Twin Lakes 82-72 in overtime, McCutcheon 57-56 and Harrison 58-56.

Guerin started the season with a win over Herron and since that time has lost to Hamilton Heights, Tech, Northwest and Muncie Central.

"We didn't shoot the ball overall very well this past weekend," said Smith, "and we're still having a real tough time staying in front of the basketball. That's not a good combination."

"We're giving up 71-plus points a game, almost 10 more a game than our 2006-07 team, which is our highest average ever. That's way too many points. We've stressed that fact in practice this week."


NWMS 8th boys fall to Riverside



Culver standouts lead Player of the Week honors

Ignas Masiulionis and Marie Steiner walk the same campus in northern Indiana, and the Culver Military/Culver Academy standouts are among the honorees in the IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program for the week of Dec. 7-12.

The Eagles' duo is joined by Clinton Prairie senior Kale Morris, Castle junior Jack Nunge, Delphi senior Myka Roth and Evansville Central junior Zion Sanders as weekly winners in the recognition program coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Masiulionis and Steiner are respective boys' and girls' winners for District 1, Morris and Roth for District 2, and Nunge and Sanders for District 3.

The 6-1 Masiulionis averaged 29.5 points in leading Culver Military (2-2) to a pair of victories. The Lithuanian sharpshooter opened his week by scoring 30 points with two rebounds and one assist in a 50-48 victory over Tippecanoe Valley. The junior guard followed by tossing in 29 points with eight rebounds and one assist in a 66-53 triumph over Portage. For the week, Masiulionis sank 19-of-31 shots, including 13-of-21 3-pointers, plus 8-of-13 free throws.

Monta Ellis scores 19 over former team...

Pacers turn tables on Mavericks, 107-81

Last season, when the Pacers beat the Mavericks in both their meetings, Monta Ellis was donning the uniform of the Mavs. But on Wednesday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, the Pacers were thankful to have Ellis in the Blue & Gold, as the kinetic guard used a combination of incisive drives to the hoop and 3-pointers to dispatch his former team 107-81.

Ellis started the game off on the erratic side, missing a few layups that on most days he'd make. But just four minutes into the third quarter, Ellis — who finished the night with 19 points — knifed his way into the lane on a fast break, euro-stepping for a bucket to put Indiana up by four at the time. Ellis tallied all 19 of his points in the second half.

"I had some good looks, just wasn't going down," Ellis said of his scoreless first half. "Coaches just told me to attack, to keep taking my shots, and I was just able to get out in transition in the beginning of the second half and get some easy buckets."

When asked if he was nervous to be playing against his former squad, Ellis demurred.

"I've been playing basketball too long to be nervous," he said.

In the fourth, still looking to put away the Mavericks for good, Ellis drained two from beyond the arc with just under six minutes remaining in the game, pushing Indiana's lead to 22 points and effectively ending the night of the Mavs.

Dirk Nowitzki missed 3-of-4 3-point attempts in the first four minutes of the fourth quarter — and made just 1-of-7 in the game — while the Pacers continued to pile up points on the offensive end. Three

from C.J. Miles and Rodney Stuckey helped open up the Pacers' lead to 14 points, forcing Mavericks head coach Rick Carlisle to call a timeout with 8:20 remaining in the game.

But coming out of the timeout, the Pacers continued their onslaught, receiving timely buckets from Ellis, Rodney Stuckey, and C.J. Miles as they began to put the Mavericks away for good.

With both teams scrapping to shoot over 30 percent in the first half, the Pacers' offense began to take form during the third quarter, in the shape of a 12-2 run to help Indiana take an 11-point lead into the final frame, thanks to Ellis' 13 third-quarter points. The quarter was ended by a Rodney Stuckey steal in which Stuckey (12 points) rifled a pass to a streaking Ellis for a dunk against his former team.

At the first half buzzer, the Pacers trailed the Mavericks by just two, holding a lead until the final moment when Mavericks guard Raymond Felton (16 points) connected on a 3-pointer in the final seconds to give his team the advantage at the break.

But once the second half began, the Pacers never looked back, outscoring the Mavs 62-34 over the final two quarters. It was the Pacers' second win in a row, and third in their last four games.

When asked what turned the fortunes of the Pacers in the second half, Paul George — who finished his night with 19 points on 7-of-18 shooting — recited a familiar formula that has carried the Pacers early on this season.

"Defense," George said. "Same thing every night: Defense."



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
