Trash fee addresses staffing needs

While working on the Noblesville Police Department five-year strategic plan completed in 2014, we identified the need to add police officers to address very specific crime reduction objectives. A total of six positions were requested and three were approved by the Noblesville Common Council through the 2015 budget.

Hiring four new police officers now will allow the police department to accomplish the goals in our 2014-2015 strategic plan to develop data-driven crime reduction and targeted enforcement programs. Timing is important because if I hire a police officer today, he/she doesn't go out onto the streets for almost a year because of the training that is required.



Among the needs moving forward, the department would like to hire an intelligence officer, refill a position with the Hamilton-Boone County Drug Task Force and form a targeted enforcement unit, which we could task with specific enforcement activities that were related to specific problems we are having in Noblesville on a week-by-week or day-by-day basis.

These additions will allow us to identify specific problems we're having and develop intelligence-driven data to help point us toward effective enforcement strategies. The targeted enforcement unit would then be tasked to implement those enforcement strategies and have an impact on whatever that problem is. The nature of what is problematic to public safety in Noblesville is constantly changing – problems could range from traffic accidents at a particular intersection to very specific theft or burglary problems – and I know these enforcement strategies will have an impact.

We also realized we need to take a more active role with preventative strategies. Hiring a fourth new officer will allow us to create a school resource officer program supervisor. That person also would be tasked with researching and developing more effective prevention programs targeting at-risk young people.

A growing community with a changing threat picture is going to require a police department that is growing concurrently. If we don't begin to add police officers we are going to begin to fall behind. We need these four police officers and we need alternative funding to address very specific problems we have in the community and to help keep those problems from being exasperated by staffing issues. I thank the community for its continued support of public safety.

What did Hamilton County look like in 1816?

As we prepare for the Indiana Bicentennial next year, we may wonder what the area that was to become Hamilton County looked like in 1816.

A sketchy picture has been put together by state historians including our own county historian, David Heighway who related some of the information here. Records are few, but some facts emerge about the years leading to statehood and the decade that followed.

We know that native Indian power was broken by the War of 1812 which ended only two years before Indiana was admitted to the union. In 1816 there were almost no white settlers in Hamilton County. William Conner who first arrived in 1802 had returned after serving as a scout for the U.S. Army in the War of 1812. He was living at Conner Prairie with his Delaware Indian wife, Mckinges.

There was likely a French-American fur trader, John Brouille from Vincennes, living in what is now the Carmel area, and there likely was some type of trading post or small settlement at Strawtown where an early trail crossed White River and an Indian settlement was known to exist. (A minor gun fight between territorial troops and Indians had been reported there in 1813.)

Otherwise, the area that was to become Hamilton County was a vast forest with only a few Delaware Indians along White River. They had fled during the war, but returned for what was to be only a short stay.

The treaty of St. Mary's in 1818 provided that all native inhabitants leave central Indiana by 1821. It was this treaty that marked the beginning of pioneer settlement. As the Delaware tribe was preparing to leave in 1819, settlers first arrived at Horseshoe Prairie, a flood prone area along the river between pres-

Residents of The Barrington lend a helping hand...

Christmas tree decorating contest, canned food drive

ent Noblesville and Conner Prairie. The site was abandoned a few years later.

But, within five years of statehood settlers from Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio began pouring into the county. They included veterans of the War of 1812 and even some Revolutionary War vets. By 1823 there was sufficient population to form a new county. Hamilton County, created by the state legislature that year, was originally larger than it is today. It included about half of what would become Tipton County.

Settlement continued moving generally from southeast to northwest. Huge sections of forest land were cleared by pioneer families in a rapid, but back-breaking race to get farming operations started.

In less than 30 years the settlers transformed the county into a largely agricultural community which it would remain for more than a century until suburban development began in the mid 20th century.

Hamilton County’s name honors one of the nation’s founding fathers, Alexander Hamilton. The origin of the name of the county seat is not so certain. Noblesville was named for a member of the Noble family, perhaps one who never saw Noblesville.

James Noble was one of Indiana’s first two U.S. senators and is usually believed to be the city’s namesake. Lavina Noble, possibly his sister, was scheduled to be something of a mail order bride for the city’s co-founder Josiah Polk. But, legend has it that pioneer life was not for her, and when she saw the rugged village she left without marrying Polk.

James Noble may never have seen Noblesville, having lived at Brookville and then in Washington before dying unexpectedly in 1831. The Nobles were a prominent early Indiana family.

James’ brother, Noah, became governor in the 1830s, so sister Lavina would have been a good “catch” for Polk who may have had his own political aspirations. He was eventually named Noblesville postmaster, and of course the name he and the town’s co-founder William Conner chose “stuck” regardless of whether it was to honor the senator or the would-be bride that got away.

Feinstein to feature Hoosier student in concert at Feinstein's/54 Below in NYC

Michael Feinstein, the Artistic Director of the Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel, is slated to introduce teen vocalist Lucas DeBard as part of his inaugural engagement at the new Feinstein's/54 Below Supper Club. DeBard is the winner of the 2015 Great American Songbook Academy™, a project founded by Michael Feinstein. Feinstein will perform at the 54 Supper Club from December 20-30 and DeBard will join him December 20-23.

"I created the Songbook Academy™ to foster young artists who have an interest in the American Songbook, which includes the music of classic Broadway, jazz standards, and popular music. Through this program, we are reaching a new generation to teach the music of the American Songbook and the history that inspired and influenced its composers," said Michael Feinstein, founder of the program and the organization called the Great American Songbook Foundation.

DeBard, an 18-year-old from Lebanon, Indiana, sang two American standards at the July Academy: "I'm Gonna Sit Right Down and Write Myself a Letter," and "I'll See You in my Dreams." As the first place winner he receives the chance of a lifetime: the opportunity to make his New York City debut with Michael Feinstein during his engagement at Feinstein's/54 Below. As first place winner DeBard is serving as the Great American Songbook Youth Ambassador for one year and will have opportunities to perform throughout the

year. In September he made his Kennedy Center debut, along with Songbook Academy™ Alums Nick Ziobro, Julia Goodwin, and Madelyn Baillio.

DeBard was one of forty high school vocalists at the week-long Songbook Academy™, held in the Indiana city of Carmel. The annual event is sponsored by the Great American Songbook Foundation and is the only U.S. competition dedicated solely to the music from Broadway, Hollywood musicals and the Tin Pan Alley era of the early to mid-twentieth century.

This holiday performance will mark the kick-off for the 2016 Songbook Academy™. The application is now available online at www.TheSongbook.org until March 25, 2016. High school students grades 9-12 have the opportunity to participate. Forty students will be invited to the Songbook Foundation's headquarters in Carmel, IN, July 16-23, 2016, to participate in a seven-day academy on interpreting and performing the music of the Great American Songbook. Five-time Grammy nominee, Michael Feinstein, and other top music industry and theatre professionals will conduct workshops and master classes throughout the week. Tony nominee Laura Osnes joined Michael Feinstein as a guest Mentor for the 2015 Academy. The final competition performance will be held in the 1,600 seat Palladium Concert Hall at the Center for the Performing Arts.

Middle quarters kill Shamrocks....

Millers win with balance

If you're an opponent playing Coach Brian McCauley's Noblesville basketball team and you come away holding Miller ace John Kiser to 10 points one would think you're feeling pretty good about a potential victory.

Not on this night. Not at The Mill Friday evening.

Westfield's held Kiser to a season-low 10 points, but Noblesville still came away with a 48-37 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory over the Shamrocks.

Three other Millers finished in double figures as Noblesville's showed its best scoring balance of the season. Max Flinchum and Corby Mertens each notched 12 points and Ryan Ogden added 10.

That offensive performance and a good defensive performance was what the Millers needed while moving to 3-2 on the year and 1-1 in the conference.

"It was a good conference win for us," said McCauley. "It was a great game showing our balance.

"Our defense was good against a good Westfield team. Our second quarter defense when we held them to 3 points was the difference in the game tonight."

Westfield coach Shane Sumpter agreed. "We have so many lulls in our scoring," said Sumpter. "Tonight it was the second quarter.

"Our defense did a good job. Jonah Welch did a good job guarding Kiser," Sumpter added.

With the loss Westfield dropped to 0-2 in the conference with a game in The Rock tonight against undefeated Tipton. The Shamrocks are 1-4 overall.

Most of Westfield's offense last evening, as has been the case most of the season, came from Charlie Warner. He netted 15 points. Conner Osswald and Welch each canned eight points. Sawyer Olsen grabbed eight rebounds.

Kiser led Noblesville in rebounding with 7.

The second and the third quarters were huge for Noblesville. After the two teams finished in a 13-13 tie after one period, Noblesville outscored Westfield 10-3 in the second quarter and 13-9 in the third period.

Noblesville has a big road game tonight, playing at lone-time rival Hamilton Heights.

Pacers pull away from Nets, 104-97

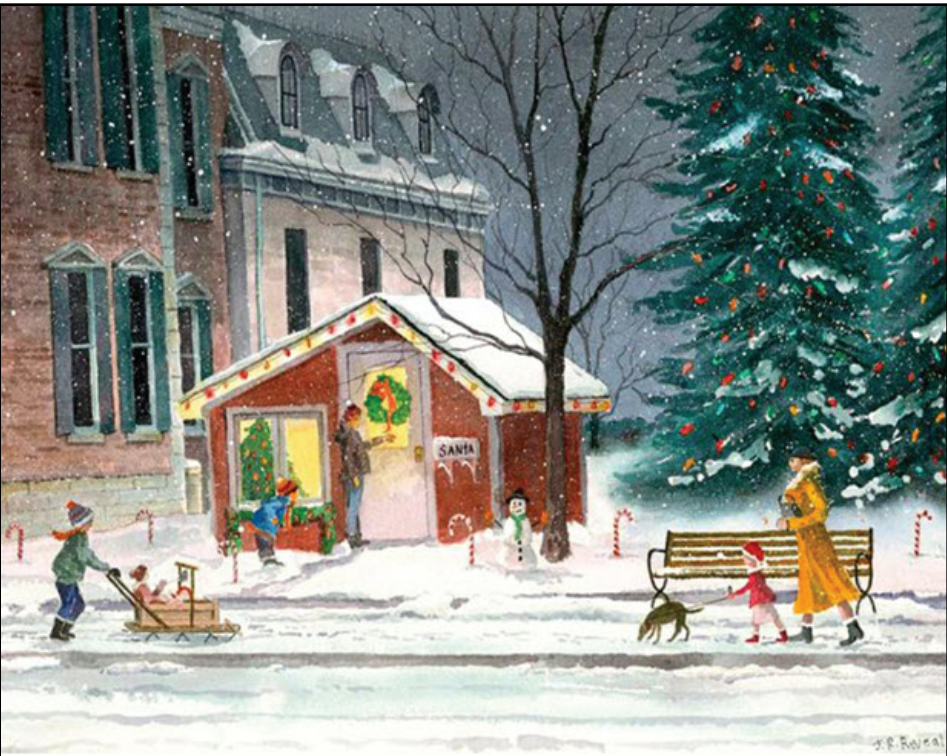

It was perhaps a little tougher than expected, but the Pacers (16-9) dominated the fourth quarter to beat the Brooklyn Nets (7-19) on Friday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 104-97. The win capped a 3-0 homestand for the Blue & Gold, who are now set to embark on a two-game road trip to Memphis and San Antonio.
Friday's game was a tightly contested affair for much of the night. Neither team led by double digits until the final minutes of the contest, which featured six ties and 14 lead changes through the first three quarters.
Though the Nets entered the night with the second-worst record in the Eastern Conference and were playing just their second road game since Nov. 28, Brooklyn had a five-point lead heading into the fourth quarter.
"The flow of the game was a little nasty," Pacers forward C.J. Miles said after the victory. "It just felt like we couldn't get it moving right on either end. It was just finding a way to buckle down in the fourth quarter. There's going to be a lot of games like that during a long season."

The visitors stretched their advantage to as many as seven points before the Pacers mounted a rally. Spearheaded by a lineup that paired starters George Hill and Paul George with reserves Rodney Stuckey, Lavoy Allen, and Jordan Hill, Indiana reeled off nine consecutive points, taking an 83-81 lead on George Hill's 3-pointer with 7:44 to play.
Brook Lopez tied the game once again with a hook shot on the next possession, but George found Allen open on the right baseline for a jumper 16 seconds later, which once again put Indiana back in front.
They would not trail again. George and Jordan Hill combined for the Blue & Gold's next 17 points down the stretch as the Pacers gradually pulled away for their fourth win in their last five contests.
George led the way, recording his seventh double-double of the season, finishing with 23 points and 10 rebounds. Jordan Hill also finished with a double-double (his fifth of the year), scoring 10 of his 14 points in the fourth quarter and grabbing 11 boards (five on the offensive glass).
Hill even threw down a vicious dunk that effectively put an exclamation mark on the win, a one-handed jam on

Nets forward Bojan Bogdanovic that gave Indiana its first double-digit lead with 2:36 to play.
"Jordan's been a monster, he's been great," Miles said, before joking: "He's even been dunking the ball. We've been trying to get him to dunk for like six months and the last two weeks he decided the rim was 10 feet, not 18."
Stuckey had another strong outing coming off the bench for Indiana. The Pacers' sixth man scored in double figures for the fourth straight game, finishing with 15 points and seven rebounds.
"I'm going to continue to be aggressive," Stuckey said. "...Any time I see a lane and I can drive the ball and attack the rim, I'm definitely going to do it."
Nets point guard Jarrett Jack led all scorers with 26 points and also tallied nine rebounds and six assists, though he managed just two points on 1-of-4 shooting in the fourth quarter. Brook Lopez added 18 points, while Thaddeus Young had 14 points and 14 rebounds in the loss.
The Pacers now head to Memphis, where they'll take on Mike Conley and the Grizzlies on Saturday night in the second half of a back-to-back.

IceMen take down Fuel

The Evansville IceMen scored twice in the third period to defeat the Indy Fuel 2-1 at Ford Center on Friday night in the first half of a back-to-back set between the two teams.
Alex Wideman tied the game up just 1:08 into the third period for Evansville (10-13-2-0) before Jordan Sims notched the game-winning goal at 11:28. The comeback effort derailed a 20-save effort from Shane Owen, many in spectacular fashion.
Kyle Stroh opened the scoring just 4:54 into the game with a wrist shot that beat Scott Greenham (28 saves) over the right shoulder to put the Fuel up. Garrett Bembridge and Alex Lavoie picked up the assists on the goal, and for Lavoie he now has four points (2-2-4) in his last four games.
