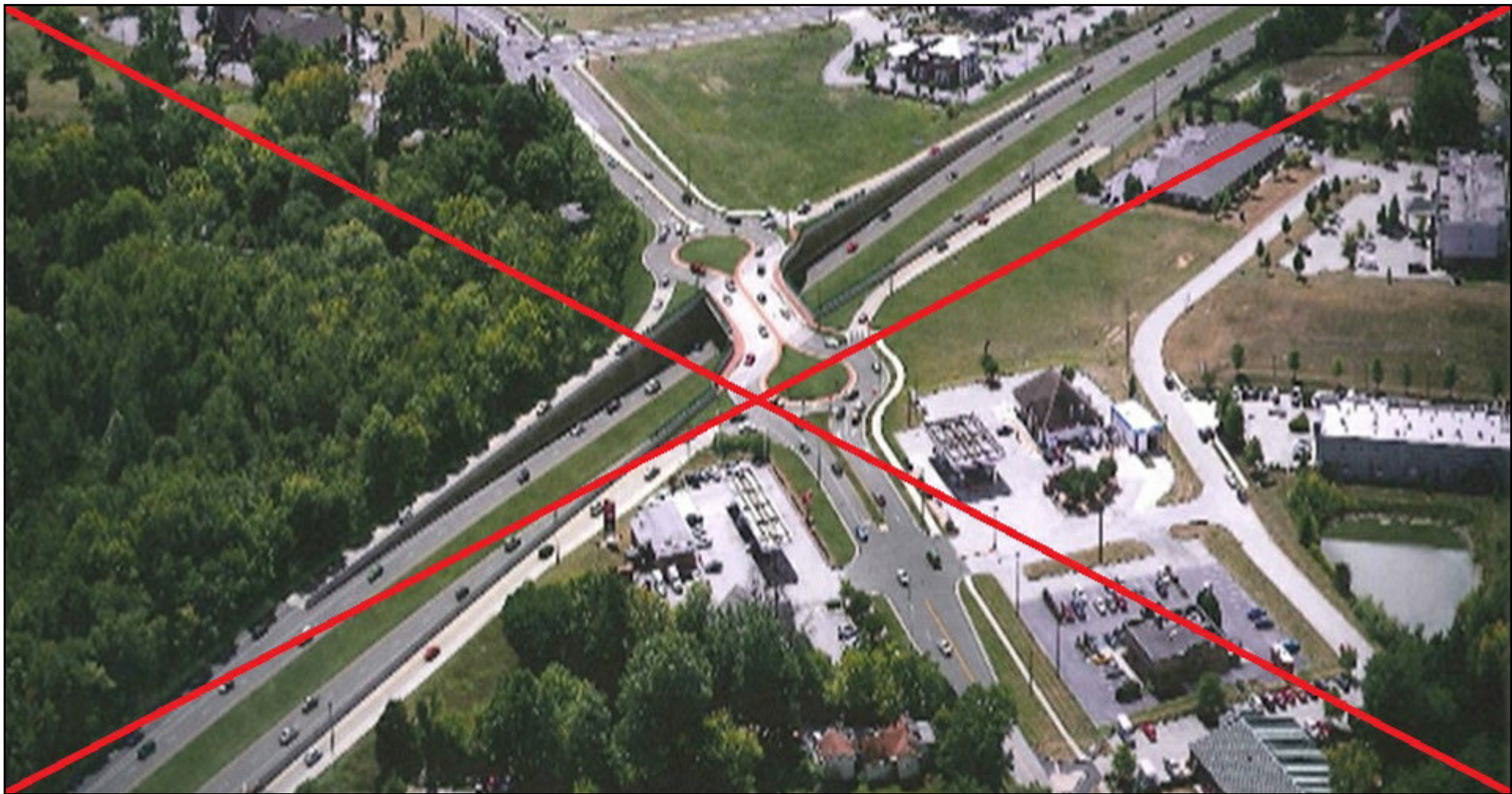

Maybe not for Nob City

There may be differences concerning who, why and when, but the thing Noblesville residents can take to the bank is that the City, for the most part, has been left out of the \$100 million that Gov. Mike Pence has given to the much publicized State Road 37 project.

For the most part.

Those of you living in Noblesville and driving each day to Indianapolis, using State Road 37, will have a

much easier drive through the Fishers area. It will start at 146th Street.

At 146th Street will be constructed a roundabout overpass. When that happens, motorists attempting to get onto 146th from the east or the west will be able to do that much easier (much, much easier) than today. Those of you backed up on 146th Street morning, noon, night and all times in between will know what I'm writing.

And, your drive south to and or through Fishers will be much easier (much, much easier).

There will be a series of roundabout overpasses as you travel through the Fishers area. Motorists, starting on the

north side at 146th, will glide through the area without stop lights and backups.

Safe, comfortable and fast drive from Noblesville through Fishers. Much like the Keystone Parkway Carmel constructed a few years ago.

Plus, Hamilton County has pulled off what folks like Commissioner Steve Dillinger had dreamed about for years. Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt and Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness led the negotiations to allow local control (and the \$100 million) to remain here in Hamilton County, mostly with Fadness and Fishers.

Control over the corridor will be relinquished during the construction period to Fishers. Once the construction is finished, the corridor will be returned to the State.

Local control allows lots of local business owners to relax, especially those who own businesses along the corridor in Fishers. In other words, State Road 37 in this area will not become a Highway 31 such as the State now is finishing through the Carmel area.

So far, so good. In fact, it's a great deal. But, so far you haven't heard a great deal, if any, about how the \$100 million will be used in Noblesville. Nor, from Noblesville mayor John Ditslear.

"I wasn't asked to take part in the negotiations," Ditslear told the Hamilton County Reporter in an exclusive interview earlier this week.

"I was told that that we (Noblesville) will get what is left over (from the \$100 million)."

"Mayor Ditslear attended several of our meetings," said Heirbrandt.

From designs The Reporter received from the County when first reporting on the 37 Corridor project, it appeared that heavily used crossings of the highway in Noblesville would receive the same roundabout overpasses as those which will be built in Fishers.

We were led to believe that roundabout overpasses would include Greenfield Ave., Pleasant Street and hopefully Indiana 32/38. Elsewhere on this page is a sketch of what the Greenfield Ave. roundabout overpass would look like, given to us by the County.

That can still happen, Heirbrandt said, if Noblesville comes up with \$16.5 million, which is what Hamilton County and Fishers have given to the project.

"All (Mayor) John (Ditslear) has to do is pull the trigger," said Commissioner Dillinger."

One little problem with that, as we at The Reporter see it, is that Noblesville is listed in "Phase 2" of the project and nobody I've talked with can tell me when "Phase 2" might happen. I've been told that "Phase 1" might take, and probably will take, five to seven years.

If a Pleasant Street roundabout and overpass, alone, isn't even started for seven years or more, that means seven years or more that Noblesville it isn't likely to have a Pleasant Street bypass of the downtown area.

In 7 to 10 years you might see a new governor; new commissioners, new mayors. Noblesville has been talking for 50 years about a bypass. Noblesville could be talking another 50 years unless action is taken, NOW.

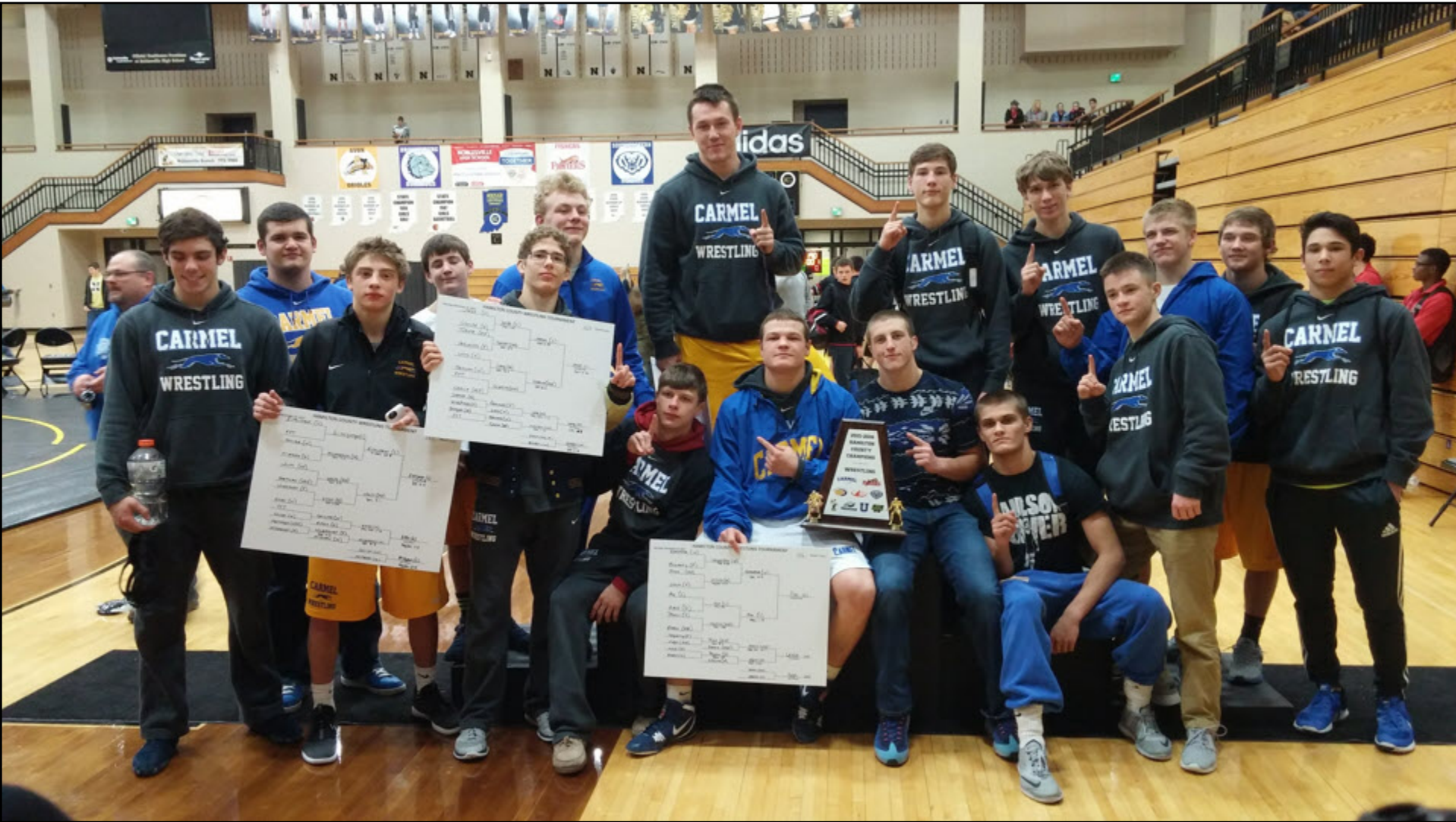

Four individual champs each for Carmel, HSE...

Greyhounds pull away for team victory

Reporter Sports EditorIn a tight wrestling meet, the little things can make all the difference.

Such was the case at the Hamilton County meet, which took place Saturday at The Mill in Noblesville. Carmel reclaimed the team championship that it won two years ago, getting past defending champion Hamilton Southeastern 241.5-228. Westfield placed third, while Noblesville was a strong fourth.

The Greyhounds, ranked No. 8 in the IndianaMat.com poll, and the Royals had the same number of individual champions

with four each. Carmel got all 14 of its wrestlers in the top six, with HSE scoring 13 of its 14.

The 'Hounds also helped themselves out by getting extra points for how they won. For example: Two of their champions, 195-pounder Nick Fox and 220-pounder Sam Hipple, each won their championship matches by pin. Getting a fall gives a wrestler's team two bonus points. The senior champions were joined in the winner's circle by junior Adam Jerde (120) and sophomore Jack Eiteljorge (145).

"The part that makes this exciting is, the Carmel kids like to practice," said Greyhounds coach Ed Pendoski. He noted that

the Carmel heavyweights - Fox, Hipple and 285-pounder Deshawn Williams - set the tone for what they do in the practice room.

Southeastern's four champions began with Austin Holmes, the 126-pound senior who is a two-time state qualifier. Also winning were junior Joe Mazero at 170, and seniors Spencer Irick at 182 and Bryce Chastain at 285.

"It really came down to about three or four matches that really swung the tournament," said HSE coach Kyle Poyer. "Carmel's got a great squad."

The Royals and the 'Hounds will see each other again in a dual meet, and of course in the sectional.

"Each of us are going to improve throughout the season," said Poyer.

Westfield had a solid hold on third place, with 183.5 points. The Shamrocks had two champions: Seniors Zachary Steele at 132 and Evan Eldred at 138.

"It was an interesting day," said WHS coach Terry O'Neill. "It was kind of a dress rehearsal for the post-season and conference tournaments. Having two champions was really, really good. I thought both those boys wrestled outstanding today."

Noblesville finished fourth with 152 points. The young Miller team had one champion: Junior Nick Brady at 113. Noblesville was boosted by runs to the final from two seniors: 170-pounder Josh Marlow and Dylan McGuffey at 182.

"Josh Marlow upset the No. 1 seed first round, got second," said Millers coach Tom Knotts. "Dylan McGuffey wasn't seeded at all and got second. I thought everybody wrestled as hard as they could."

Fishers placed fifth as a team with 140 points. The Tigers had one champion, sophomore Alexander Strueder at 106 pounds.

Hamilton Heights was sixth with 138.5 points, but had two champions. Senior Trezdon O'Neal won at 152 pounds, with junior Clayton Cowan triumphing at 160.

Guerin Catholic placed seventh with 63 points, while Sheridan was eighth with 33 points. Both teams had a wrestler finish fourth: Sophomore Korbin Lane at 132 for the Golden Eagles, and senior David Powers at 220 for the Blackhawks.

Millers win again....

Heights is latest victim

Noblesville’s Millers won two basketball games this weekend scoring a combined total of just 109 points, ending the weekend Saturday evening at the Husky Dome with a 61-45 decision over Hamilton Heights.

Earlier in the week, Noblesville scored 55 points in a seven point win over a good Anderson team.

Is this a sign of the new basketball (winning basketball so far) that Coach Brian McCauley has installed?

“They do to you what they did to us tonight,” said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. “They get you down and then they control the pace.”

“We were able to set the tempo by getting off to the 20-7 first quarter start,” said McCauley. “Max (Flinchum) got eight points and John (Kiser) scored six in the quarter.”

After that, Hamilton Heights didn’t really make a serious run. The Huskies outscored Noblesville 7-2 in the second quarter to climb to within eight by halftime. But, the Millers took off again in the third quarter, outscoring the Huskies 17-12.

“We had a nice run in the second quarter,” Ballenger said. “But, we are not shooting the ball. We’ve had a zone tossed at us all season and we’ve struggled to score. We’ve got kids who can shoot. I don’t know the problem.”

Against Noblesville, which so far this season has flashed some good defense, the Huskies hit 26 percent from the field, going 12-of-45. They were 3-of-17 from 3-point range. They did nearly all of their damage at the line, going 18-of-22.

Caymn Lutz led Heights’ scoring with 18 points. Sterling Weatherford was the only other Husky in double figures. He had 11. Hunter Crist, who a couple of games back became still another Husky to score 1,000 points in his career, was held to seven points on 2-of-12 shooting.

Weatherford finished with a double-double, adding 10 rebounds to his 11 points.

Like Ballenger said, go figure.

Noblesville became a somewhat different team this weekend as McCauley inserted junior forward Grant Bullard into the lineup and junior guard McGwire Plumer became more of a scoring weapon.

“Bullard is a strong player who plays good defense and is a very coachable player,” said the Miller coach. “In the Anderson game, he took three charges.

“Plumer’s mind-set is to score more points and he has been doing that,” McCauley added.

Noblesville was led at Heights by Kiser, who was, well, typical Kiser. He scored 21 points and collected nine rebounds. Flinchum hit 3-of-3 boomers and finished with 16 points.

The Millers were 20-of-34 shooting the pill; hit 17-of-25 free throws, and connected on 4-of-6 shots from 3-point territory.

Noblesville now has a 4-2 record and has won three straight. Their only losses so far this season were a four-pointer at Fishers and a four-pointer at Carmel.

The Millers will return to action in their own Dec. 29-30 tourney at The Mill.

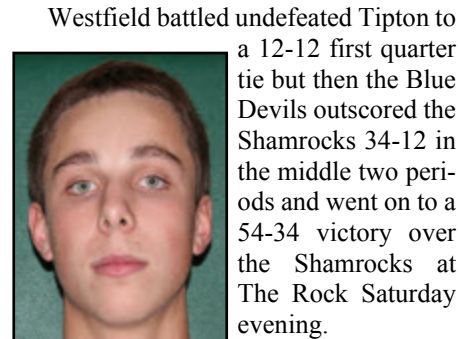
Richardson finished with 18 points, while Brown had 12. Richardson also led the boards with seven rebounds. Alex Falender dished out four assists.

Memphis snaps Pacers win streak

The Memphis Grizzlies (15-14) stymied the Pacers' offense and snapped their three-game win streak on Saturday night at FedEx Forum, handing Indiana (16-10) a 96-84 road loss.

Memphis led for virtually the entire night, limiting Indiana to just 39 percent shooting and a season-worst 17.9-percent clip from 3-point range.

"With a team like (Memphis), they load the paint so well, it's kind of hard to play in the paint and get easy baskets at the rim," Pacers forward Paul George said.

The Grizzlies opened the night with a 9-1 spurt and led by as many as nine points in the first quarter as the Pacers struggled to get going offensively. George had 11 points in the opening period, but the rest of his teammates managed just five as Indiana converted just 5-of-18 shots in the period.

Pacers guard Rodney Stuckey provided a nice spark leading the second unit in the second quarter. Stuckey, who had scored in double figures in four straight contests entering Saturday night, registered 10 points in 11:32 in the first half.

Memphis maintained its lead all the way until halftime, but Jordan Hill's putback with 3.9 seconds left in the second quarter trimmed the Pacers' deficit to just one heading into the locker room.

The Pacers briefly surged in front early in the second half, tying the game at 46 on George's 3-pointer 1:19 into the third quarter and taking their only lead of the night on George Hill's floater 28 seconds later.

Memphis moved back in front less than a minute later, when Matt Barnes buried a corner three, the start of a 12-0 Grizzlies run. The Pacers climbed back within two points on two occasions late in the third quarter, but the Grizz pushed their lead back to double digits in the fourth quarter and the Pacers never got within two possessions over the final nine minutes.

"We didn't get stops when we needed to get stops and were trying to get back in the game," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after the loss. "...It wasn't good enough."

With the victory, the Grizzlies swept the season series with Indiana for the second consecutive year (Memphis spoiled the Pacers' home opener with a 112-103 victory back on Oct. 29). The win was a much-needed confidence boost for Memphis, who had lost two straight and four of their last five.

George led all scorers with 29 points on 8-of-22 shooting, but he also had seven of the Pacers' 17 turnovers. Monta Ellis had 13 points and Stuckey added 11. Jordan Hill recorded his sixth double-double of the season, finishing with 10 points and 13 rebounds (five on the offensive glass).

Former Lawrence North High School standout Mike Conley led the Grizzlies with 20 points and eight assists. All-NBA center Marc Gasol was solid all-around, contributing 19 points, 12 boards, and six assists. Defensive specialist Matt Barnes gave the Grizz an unexpected offensive boost, hitting his first four shots en route to a double-double (15 points and 10 rebounds).

It doesn't get any easier for the Pacers, who now head to San Antonio for a date on Monday night with the Spurs, who boast the NBA's second-best record and are a perfect 15-0 at home so far this season.

"It's a tough one, but we have another one on Monday and we have to get ready for San Antonio," Ellis said. "We have to put this one behind us and keep moving."

Indy Fuel beat IceMen 3-1

After playing the role of tough-luck losers a few too many times over the past month, the bounces finally went in a favorable direction for the Indy Fuel. The Fuel (11-14-2-0) used a complete team effort in addition to a couple of fortunate breaks to earn a 3-1 victory over the Evansville IceMen (10-14-2-0) Saturday night at Ford Center. The win ended a three-game slide for Indsy, and salvaged a split in the weekend doubleheader against the Hoosier State rival IceMen.

Goaltender Mac Carruth made 44 saves, the Fuel's penalty kill unit tacked on a goal to a spotless outing and Indy's offense found the net in each period to pave the way to a big two points on Saturday. With the road victory the Fuel find themselves back on top of the IceMen in both the season series with Evansville (three games to two), as well as in the Midwest Division standings (24 points to 22).

For the second-straight evening Indy opened the contest's scoring in the first period. Cody Sharib surprised goaltender Scott Greenham with a quick shot from a narrow angle to give the Fuel a 1-0 lead 13:10 into play. Nick Mattson and Daniel Ciampini provided the assists on Sharib's eighth of the season, which is tops among Indy rookies.
