Emigh resigns as Republican county chairman

After five years in the once-powerful position of Republican county chairman Pete Emigh is calling it quits. He will leave the chairman's post Dec. 31. Vice chairwoman, Laura Campbell will take over until a new chairman is elected in a January caucus of Hamilton County GOP precinct committeemen.
Mrs. Campbell, a Carmel city councilor-elect, is one of at least two individuals



considering running for the chairmanship in the upcoming caucus. Pete Peterson, a Fishers councilman, is the other.
Technically any Republican resident of the county is eligible to run, but those with friendships inside the organization are odds-on favorites.
Emigh, a financial services specialist, succeeded to the chairmanship when former chairman Charlie White resigned amid a residency controversy which also ended his career as Secretary of State. Emigh lives in the Westfield area.
His resignation follows by only a few weeks the resignation of Andrew Greider, executive director at party headquarters.

The chairmanship was once a powerful position in the county, as it was with every county chairman whose party was in control of state government. State jobs as well as local government positions were cleared through the chairman. Lucrative license branch manager jobs were appointed by the chairman with some of the branch proceeds finding their way back to the party treasury. These "perks" are long gone.
Also keeping the chairmanship in this county less influential than in other counties is the fact that an office seeker once successful in the party primary does not need the party support since there is rarely opposition to GOP candidates in general elections.

And, without slating in the primary, a candidate does not receive or expect party endorsement and must generally win a primary with his or her own organization, money and shoe leather.
Next year will apparently see new leadership in both political parties in the county. Democratic chairman Keith Clock is reportedly also planning resign. There is no indication of who may be interested in taking the rather thankless job in an overwhelmingly Republican Hamilton County. The party holds one minor office among 125 elective positions at the city, township and county level.

Road work suspended

New highways will help make holiday travels safer and more efficient. Earlier this month, INDOT opened the new 27-mile I-69 section between NSA Crane and Bloomington, and replaced the final U.S. 31 stoplights through Carmel and Westfield with interstate-style exits.
Most highway maintenance and construction projects will halt work this holiday travel season to increase roadway mobility and safety. INDOT directs its contractors to pull back barriers and barricades to the safest extent possible. Some restrictions will remain in place for ongoing road construction, including:
• The left lane of I-94 eastbound is closed in Porter County between Mile 21 and State Road 49 (Exit 26), and

Mike Hendricks named Noblesville Controller

Mayor John Ditslear has announced that Mike Hendricks will serve as the Noblesville controller, effective January 1, 2016. With Noblesville moving to a Second Class City designation, the previously elected clerk-treasurer role will be divided to an elected clerk and an appointed controller.
"Mike's leadership and unquestioned knowledge of the city's budget and finances made him a natural fit to become controller," said Ditslear. "In his 21 years of service to the city, Mike has excelled in every role asked of him. I have no doubt that this will continue, which is why I asked him to lead the city as controller."
In his new role, Hendricks will ensure that public tax dollars are utilized in a fiscally responsible manner in order to provide optimal services to Noblesville residents.
"As we transition into a Second Class City, Mike will spearhead the new financial setup within the City of Noblesville. His ability to work with department directors and problem solving will be invaluable as controller," Ditslear said. "Mike also has the ability to focus on immediate concerns while seeing the big picture. He and his office will ensure Noblesville's short- and long-term fiscal viability."
As controller, Hendricks is responsible for maintaining comprehensive financial information, developing an internal control structure ensuring that the assets of the government are protected from loss, theft or misuse and compiling financial statements. His office will be involved in the processing of all daily financial transactions of the city.
"I am honored to be given this opportunity. I look forward to the new challenges and working with all the departments in this new position," Hendricks said.
The City of Noblesville's 2016 budget is \$75.5 million with a general fund of \$45 million.

Four years in the making...

New U.S. 31 is fully open

After four years of detours, closures and construction, the U.S. 31 Hamilton County project is nearly complete.

"Nearly" complete means there is still a little bit of work to do to finish up the project. But the mainline of U.S. 31 is open to traffic, and is free of stoplights between State Road 38 and I-465.

The project began in 2011 at SR 38, and was originally scheduled to be under construction through 2018. But the timeline was accelerated with the goal of finishing things up by the end of this year. The total investment was \$350 million, which was used to upgrade 13 miles of highway, build 49 new bridges and 12 new interchanges in both Carmel and Westfield.

The majority of the interchanges along the new highway are roundabouts. Main and 136th streets in Carmel, and 161st and 191st streets in Westfield access U.S. 31 now by roundabouts. Construction is continuing on the roundabouts for 106th and 116th streets in Carmel, with those expected to be completed sometime next year.

The interchange at 146th and 151st streets is a "split diamond," while the State Road 32 junction is a single point urban interchange, so named since only one stoplight is necessary to allow the traffic flow on and off the highway. State Road 38, the first interchange completed, is known as a folded diamond, with the ramps on the northeast corner of the interchange "folded" to protect nearby MacGregor Park.

Mainline construction of U.S. 31 was completed last week with the removal of the stoplights at 106th and 116th streets. Traffic on the high way was shifted onto new bridges over 106th and 116th streets, opening the freeway to three lanes in each direction.

That final phase of construction was celebrated in a ceremony that commended the project, which is arguably the most ambitious road project in Hamilton County history. Governor Mike Pence was on hand, along with Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook, Congresswoman Susan Brooks and Indiana Department of Transportation Commissioner Brandye Hendrickson.

In addition to the roundabouts at 106th and 116th streets, work is being finished up on the new free-flowing ramps from I-465

to northbound U.S. 31. Those are anticipated to be open to traffic and in their final configurations next week. Crews will also work to complete the U.S. 31/Meridian Street transition underneath I-465 into next year.

The U.S. 31 Hamilton County project is part of a long-range plan to remove all stoplights from the highway between Indianapolis and South Bend. Construction has already been completed on the highway in northern Indiana, between Plymouth and South Bend, and in the Kokomo area, where a new bypass was finished two years ago. As of now, only three stoplights remain on U.S. 31 between I-465 and Koko-

- I-65 traffic shifts or crosses the median for bridge construction at Main Street in Greenwood (Exit 99) and just south of the Henryville Rest Area (Mile 21.5).

mo: At 236th Street in Hamilton County, and at State Road 28 and Division Road in Tipton County.

One of those stoplights will be removed soon: INDOT announced on Tuesday that the contract for an interchange at U.S. 31 and SR 28 has been awarded to Rieth-Riley Construction Company.

Weather permitting, work to relocate utilities, clear right-of-way and remove ex-

isting structures will begin in early 2016. Road construction is scheduled to begin around April. A closure of State Road 28 for up to 120 days is tentatively estimated to begin in June. The specific closure date will be announced next year. The new interchange is expected to open to traffic in November. All work on the contract should be complete in 2017.

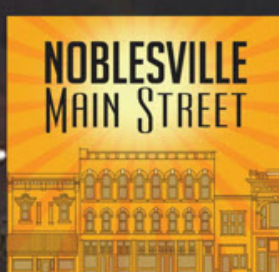

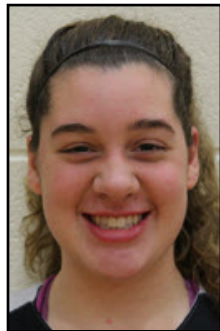

But, even worse, Southeastern was just 7-of-12 from the charity line

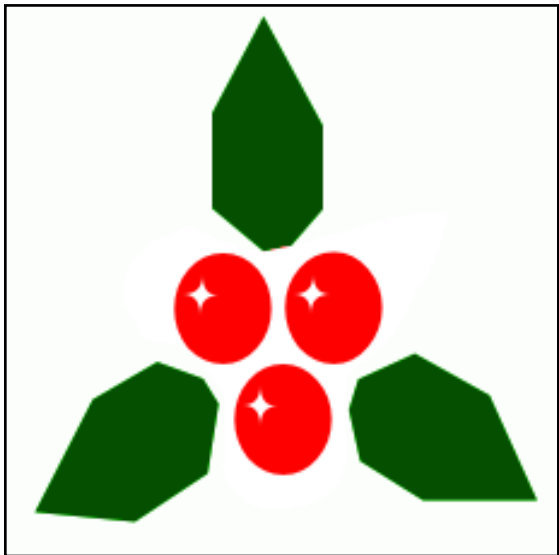
“We’ve got to be able to hit free throws,” Satterfield said. “We’ve been hitting our free throws well.

Two record setters pace IBCA Player of the Week honorees

DeAnn Kauffman of Union (Modoc) and Lyla Muhlenkamp of Jay County each set school records en route to collecting honors in the IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program for the week of Dec. 14-19.

Kauffman and Muhlenkamp share the weekly award for girls’ District 2. They are joined by Portage senior Canaan Cooper, Marion senior Vijay Blackmon, Evansville Reitz senior Dru Smith, South Bend Clay senior Mykayla Baylor and Greenwood senior Holly Hoopingarner as weekly winners in the recognition program coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Cooper and Baylor are respective boys’ and girls’ winners for District 1, Blackmon is the boys honoree for District 2, and Smith and Hoopingarner collected respective boys’ and girls accolades for District 3.

Kauffman averaged 31.0 points and 11.7 rebounds in three victories, including a school-record 43 points in one game, as Union (Modoc) improved to 7-1 for the season. A 5-10 guard, Kauffman totaled 27 points with 11 rebounds, four assists and three steals in a 55-35 victory over Shenandoah. She followed with 23 points, nine rebounds, five assists and four steals in as the Rockets posted a 65-26 triumph over Wes-Del. Kauffman concluded her week by pouring in 43 points with 15 rebounds, two assists and one steal in a 72-46 decision over Cowan. Over the three games, she sank 30-of-45 field goals, 5-of-10 3-pointers and 28-of-38 free throws.

The 5-6 Muhlenkamp averaged 23.0 points over two games, including a 40-point game where she sank a school-record 12 3-pointers in a 64-39 victory over Blackford. The 3-point total is the second-best by a girl in Indiana annals, behind only the 13 3s made by Jill Reynolds of New Harmony in a game in the 1995-96 season. Muhlenkamp sank 13-of-20 shots, 12-of-18 3s and 2-of-3 free throws in her big game. She also added six points as the Patriots (11-2) beat South Adams 47-24.

Hoopingarner averaged 39.5 points over two games, and Baylor tallied norms of 25.5 points and 18.5 rebounds over two games to claim the other girls’ awards.

The 5-4 Hoopingarner scored 37 points with four rebounds, six assists and two steals, but it was not enough as Greenwood dropped a 68-66 decision to Rushville. The IUPUI recruit then unloaded 42 points with nine rebounds, four assists and four steals as the Lady Woodmen moved to 9-4 with an 80-69 victory over Franklin. For the two games, Hoopingarner converted 28-of-44 shots, 10-of-15 3-pointers and 13-of-16 free throws.

Baylor propelled South Bend Clay (8-4) to a pair of victories. The 6-2 forward opened with 26 points, 20 rebounds, five steals and three blocks in a 61-43 triumph over Concord. Baylor also tallied 25 points with 17 rebounds, four steals and four blocks as the Colonials knocked off New Prairie 71-48.

Cooper, Blackmon and Smith each netted 30 points or more in at least one game to collect laurels among boys’ players.

A 6-3 guard, Cooper tossed in 33 points with nine rebounds, three assists and three steals as Portage moved to 3-3 with a 72-65 victory over Lowell in its only game of the week. Cooper was 8-of-13 from the field, including 6-of-9 on 3-pointers, plus 11-of-15 on free throws for his big night.

Blackmon averaged 29.0 points and 7.0 rebounds over two games for Marion (5-2) for his honor. The 6-2 guard tallied 30 points with five rebounds, six assists and two steals, but the Giants lost 86-79 to Kokomo. Blackmon followed with 28 points, two rebounds and four assists as Marion came back for a 92-47 decision over Elwood. In two games, Blackmon made 21-of-39 shots, 9-of-20 3-pointers and 7-of-9 free throws.

The 6-3 Smith produced 30 points with seven rebounds, six assists and four steals as Evansville Reitz (5-0) defeated Castle 70-60 in its only game of the week. The University of Evansville signee converted 8-of-17 shots, 3-of-6 3-pointers and 11-of-12 free throws to account for his scoring output.

Matthew Godfrey was nominated from Guerin Catholic for the boys, while Haliegh Reinoehl was nominated from Westfield for the girls.
