Hamilton County government learns about identifying, responding...

Zoeller hosts human trafficking training

Indiana Attorney General Greg Zoeller and his staff held a training Wednesday for the Hamilton County Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) on how to identify and respond to human trafficking, a crime that has victimized hundreds of thousands of individuals, mostly women and children, across the U.S. and Indiana.

The local SART is made up of several government, law enforcement, nonprofit and medical groups that operate within Hamilton County, including the Hamilton County sheriff, county prosecutor, local police departments, child services and several area hospitals. Today's training was held at Noblesville City Hall and nearly 100 members of SART attended.

January is National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month. Zoeller said human trafficking – in which someone is bought and sold for sex or labor – is a very violent and often hidden crime. The average age at which children in the U.S. first become victims of sex trafficking is 13, and the average age of death of those involved in prostitution is 34, with homicide as the most common cause of death.

Being able to recognize the signs of human trafficking, Zoeller said, is key to recovering victims and prosecuting criminals. Educating the public on these crimes and reducing demand for commercial sex which fuels trafficking are the primary goals of the Attorney General's

Winkler could serve 80 years

Maxwell Winkler, the Fishers teen accused of brutally murdering 73 year old Henry Kim in a Fishers park, has withdrawn his previously entered plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty but mentally ill. In addition Winkler entered an admission to the State's request for firearm enhancement in regards to his sentencing.

Winkler was 17 years old when accused of shooting Kim multiple times and slashing his throat.

Winkler, along with his attorneys and prosecutors, negotiated a plea agreement submitted to Hamilton County Superior Court 3 Judge William Hughes.

A statement released by the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office stated, "The agreement provides that Mr. Winkler would enter a plea of guilty but mentally ill to the charge of Count 1: Murder and an admission to the Request for Firearm Enhancement. The agreement further provides that, should the Court accept the agreement, Winkler's sentence on the Murder count would be sixty-five (65) years, with all of that time to be served in the Indiana Department of Correction. The Request for Firearm Enhancement would add twenty (20) years, of which fifteen (15) years would be executed and served in IDOC and five (5) years would be suspended to five (5) years of probation. Accordingly, the total sentence would be eighty-five (85) years with eighty (80) years execut-

Citizens Police Academy

The Noblesville Police Department is currently accepting applications for the next Citizens Police Academy. The academy is a 12-week course, free of charge, designed to provide community members with an opportunity to become better acquainted with our professional staff and to learn about police procedures. The Academy will familiarize citizens with the operations of the police department. This includes classes on patrol procedures, criminal law, narcotics, search and seizure, tactical operations, investigations, juvenile law, firearms demonstration, emergency vehicle operations, use of force issues and police canine demonstration. Participants will also have the option to ride with a patrol officer and witness the street-activity our officers encounter on a day-to-day basis.

The objective of the Citizens Police Academy is not to create quasi-cops, but

Two incumbents file on first day

Two incumbent county officeholders and a former one left no doubt of their intentions to run in this year's election as they were the first to show up at the County Elections Office on the first day of filing.

County Treasurer Jennifer Templeton, County Surveyor Kenton Ward and former County Auditor Robin Mills filed as the doors opened Tuesday morning. All three are seeking office in the May 3rd Republican primary.

Templeton is a first term treasurer seeking her second four-year term while Ward, already the longest serving officeholder in the county, is running for his

10th term. Mills, former two-term auditor, is currently chief deputy in the office.

Elections officials expect a busy month of filing before a February 5 deadline. Most of the candidates will be signing up to run in the GOP primary. Democrats are expected to offer few, if any, candidates for county or state legislative office.

Voters can look for a spirited contest for three County Council-at-large seats. Five likely candidates have already indicated they will run including the three incumbents Brad Beaver, Rick McKinney and Jim Belden. Challengers are Jeff Hern and George Kehl.

Two County Commissioners are up for election. Incumbents Steve Dillinger and Mark Heirbrandt have said they will run again. Opponents, if any, have not yet announced their plans.

With Judge Dan Pfleging planning to retire from the Superior Court bench, a contest is possible. But, thus far only Court Magistrate David Najjar has said he will run for the position.

State Sen. Luke Kenley will seek reelection and he may face opposition from newcomer Scott Willis who has all but declared his candidacy.

In addition to actual officeholders, there will be candidates for the county's 200 precinct committeemen posts and dozens of Republicans and Democrats seeking to be delegates to their respective state conventions.

“Human traffickers target the most vulnerable in our society, young girls who may have already been sexually abused or have runaway from home,” said Zoeller, who serves on the National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG) Standing Committee Against Human Trafficking. “These victims could be our neighbors or our kids’ classmates, and they have likely come into contact with someone who could have helped if they recognized the signs.”

According to the National Human Trafficking Resource Center, within 48 hours of being on the street, at least one third of runaways are approached for recruitment into the sex industry. An estimated one out of six runaways reported to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children in 2014 were likely child sex trafficking victims.

Child pornography is also often involved in cases of trafficking. Zoeller is advocating this legislative session for tougher penalties against criminals who perpetrate some of the worst crimes against children, including those who sell or purchase children for sex and those who manufacture child pornography.

In 2015, the AG’s office staff trained more than 3,300 individuals at nearly 60 events across the state on recognizing and responding to human trafficking. Some key red flags of someone who may be a victim of trafficking include if the person:

- Avoids eye contact.
- Has few personal possessions and appears under the control of someone else.
- Exhibits unexplained injuries or other signs of physical or mental abuse.
- Sometimes has been “branded” with a tattoo if trafficked by a gang or organized crime.
- Exhibits a lack of knowledge about his or her current whereabouts.

As part of the training today, SART has agreed to join the Attorney General’s [Not Buying It](#) effort and take steps to address and prevent human trafficking within their organization. To join Not Buying It, an organization is encouraged to schedule a human trafficking training for all staff, adjust HR policies to prohibit financial support of the commercial sex industry and post awareness materials.

Prevail of Hamilton County, a nonprofit that serves victims of crime and abuse, is part of SART and Michelle Corrao,

Prevail’s assistant director, helped lead this effort. Corrao is a victim of sexual assault herself, has been recognized by the White House for her leadership on sexual assault issues and serves on the Indiana Protection for Abuse and Trafficked Humans (IPATH) Task Force, which Zoeller co-chairs.

“Part of the Hamilton County Sexual Assault Response Team’s mission and vision is to prioritize the needs of sexual assault victims and to support or lead prevention and education programs,” Corrao said. “Today our team is grateful for Attorney General Greg Zoeller and his office to partner together on our mission to raise awareness, provide education and prevent human trafficking in our community.”

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear recognized the Attorney General’s Office and the local SART for attention to this crime.

“Human trafficking is a despicable crime and the efforts by Attorney General Greg Zoeller and the Hamilton County Sexual Assault Response Team to protect victims and prevent further acts is admirable,” Ditslear said. “While this is not a trending crime in Hamilton County, it is important we stay ever vigilant and a leader in the prevention and awareness of human trafficking.”

In addition to the local SART, the Indiana Commission for Women and the Indiana State Bar Association’s Women in Law Committee joined Not Buying It this year. to produce informed citizens. The academy is intended to open lines of communication between the community and the police department. By allowing citizens a firsthand look at the police department and how its operations are handled, citizens take away a better understanding of the police role in the community. Additionally, citizens bring a wealth of knowledge about their community and particularly, the problems in their neighborhood. In this way, police are able to learn and better understand the concerns of the citizens.

Eligible candidates must:

1. Be at least 18 years of age
2. Have no felony convictions and no misdemeanor convictions within the last (3) years
3. Pass a background check
4. Reside or be employed in Noblesville

The next academy session (Spring-2016) will begin on February 17 and will conclude on May 11, 2016 with a graduation ceremony. Classes will be held every Wednesday evening from 6:30 - 9:30 p.m.

ed and served in prison and five (5) years suspended to probation.”

The Prosecutor’s Office statement indicates a plea of guilty but mentally ill means that the person suffered from a mental illness at the time of the offense but that the condition did not render the person unable to appreciate the wrongfulness of the conduct at the time of the offense.

Winkler will continue to be held in the Hamilton County Jail until hearing that will be held on February 5 for the Court to consider the plea agreement.

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Tough first half....

Tougher road ahead

If Noblesville's Millers, after finishing the first half of the season with a 10-10 mark, are expecting lighter practices the second half, they should wait until Coach Brian McCauley pulls out the upcoming schedule.

If the coach already hasn't done that. The schedule will get even tougher, starting Saturday when Noblesville drives to Muncie Central.

"Muncie Central is a very good team," McCauley looked ahead to opponent number one in the stretch run of 2015-16. "They have experience, size, athleticism and skill," he added.

The Bearcats are only a sample of things to come.

In the Millers' final 12 games are three teams ranked in the state's top 10, Lawrence Central No. 6; Pike No. 8 and Logansport No. 9.

Looking ahead to the final 12 competition, Muncie Central is 7-2, Zionsville 7-1, Logansport 8-0, Hamilton Southeastern 7-4, Mt. Vernon 8-2, Pike 8-2, Indianapolis Howe 9-3 and Lawrence Central 10-2.

The Howe game, postponed from the first week of the season, has been scheduled for Feb. 13.

There just aren't many, if any, soft spots along the way.

"Muncie Central has a very good record," McCauley continued, "with notable wins over several quality teams.

"We'll really have to focus on limiting our turnovers, rebounding and defending

the paint in order to compete in this game," the coach concluded.

McCauley, based on his team's play in the first half of the season, may be looking for more scoring balance and most consistent scoring.

Senior John Kiser is leading the way with a 22.7 scoring average and yanking 8.0 rebounds a game. Junior Max Flinchum is the only other Miller averaging in double figures. He is at 10.6 and has produced two nights zipping over the 25-point mark.

"Despite losing three games last week I think we grew as a team," said McCauley. "Several of our players learned throughout last week, which will hopefully translate to improved play in the future.

"We have a very demanding January schedule which will challenge us and force us to improve," he said.

Muncie Central's only losses were to Hamilton Southeastern, 87-82 in a season opener and to unbeaten Logansport 64-61.

The Bearcats have defeated Yorktown 72-49, Shelby County (Kentucky) 79-64, Guerin Catholic 80-68, Anderson 81-76, Delta 56-52 in overtime, Fishers 78-66 and Jay County 68-52.

In comparing scores, Noblesville has beaten Anderson 55-48 and lost to Fishers 58-54.

Muncie Central will hit Noblesville's defense with four Bearcats scoring in double figures, Phillip Corten at 14.0, Andre Jones at 12.0, Donald Allen at 11.1 and Duane Clemens at 9.2.

Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory sets all-time annual attendance record

Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory scored a record number of visitors in 2015, announcing today that attendance for the year was at an all-time high with 314,149 visitors. This marks the fifth year out of the last six years that LSMF set a record for attendance, and is just the second time it eclipsed 300,000 guests.
