Public gets first view of Grand Junction Plaza plans

David Rubin, the principal of Land Collective, has a big vision when it comes to what will be the City of Westfield's new park.

"I think of Grand Junction Plaza as Westfield's Central Park," said Rubin after finishing his presentation on the new plaza. Over 140 people packed into Westfield's City Hall to view the presentation Thursday evening, and the plaza is certainly cutting

edge when it comes to design, aesthetics and ambitions.
"It is the beautiful, public open space at the core of the community that everyone plugs into," said Rubin.

The well-attended presentation afforded Westfield residents a detailed look at each part of Grand Junction. There were additional presentations by Matthias Hollwich of HWKN Architecture, which is providing the landscaping and design of the park, and a representative from Bruce Mau Design, which is working on the imaging and branding of Grand Junction.

Several Westfield public officials were in attendance as well, including councilman Jim Ake.

"I'm very pleased that we had the turnout we did," said Ake. "The hall was filled to overflowing."

Ake noted that at the start of the meeting, the attendees were asked if they had seen the Grand Junction concept, or were familiar with it.

"I don't think any hands went up," said Ake. "So everybody was here that they knew about the project, but it looks like they came to learn more about the final presentation and what that looked like."

One of the first phases of the project will be the re-alignment of Mill Street, a north-south road that starts at Main Street (State Road 32) and currently ends at Park Street. The new Mill Street will begin to curve at its intersection with Park Street, then turn east and go to a new ending point at Union Street. The new Mill-Union inter-

Be counted in special census...

Westfield enumeration is underway

Census workers are going door to door counting residents for Westfield's special census.

"With so much growth happening in Westfield we want to make sure we have the most accurate information available when it comes time to seek population based funding," Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said. "Financially it made sense to participate in a special census prior to 2020."

Residents are encouraged to open their doors and answer questions that are estimated to take a total of 5-10 minutes. Census Bureau workers will be identifiable through official badges that will in-

clude their photo and personal information, along with a tote from the US Census Bureau. The Westfield Special Census will continue to be conducted until all areas of Westfield are accounted for, a projected time of 6-7 weeks.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$625,000, with an expected increase in annual revenue of \$330,000 every year. The additional tax revenue will fund essential services like street repair and infrastructure improvements.

section will end at around where the Midland Trace Trail junctions with Union.

The main stages of Grand Junction include Jersey Plaza, which is appropriately located at the intersection of Jersey and Mill streets. Jersey Plaza will have something for everyone during all seasons, including fountains for people to enjoy in the summer, and an ice skating rink in the winter. Refreshments will be available at the Cafe Pavilion on the east side of the plaza.

South of the plaza will be the Great Lawn, which gently slopes downward towards the Stage Pavilion. That will be a place for plays and concerts, with plenty of seating on the lawn.

One of the major phases includes the re-alignment of Grassy Branch Creek, which will help control flooding, "increase the health of the creek, and tie it in with stormwater management goals for the City of Westfield," according to an information packet on the city's Web site.

Across the stream from the Great Lawn is the Wetland Amphitheater and the Boardwalk Stage, another area for plays and performances. A large Meadow south of the wetland area provides another place for socialization.

"It's a clean design," said Ake. "It works well with the different venues, circulation pattern, the circuit board he talked about, connecting people with the different areas of the park. It's just wonderful."

Finally, two important Westfield trails, the Anna Kendal and Midland Trace trails, will connect with each other at the park. That will give trail-goers complete access to Westfield's trail system.

"I was very excited by the large turnout," said Rubin. "I think it was a very positive response to a very exciting project that will have an extraordinary impact on the City of Westfield in ways that will promote socialization and people gathering. It's emblematically as creative as the people of Westfield."

Rubin said that the design development drawings were 100 percent completed, so now the construction documents will be put together. He said those "will take several months."

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New routes in Henry and Wayne counties...

New INDOT “tow plows” to hit the road in Pendleton District

Motorists in the Pendleton District can expect to see new larger snow plows on certain highways this winter during snow conditions. Motorists can expect to see the new plows on I-69 between SR 32 and SR 26, and on U.S. 40 west from Cambridge City to SR3 in Henry County, then north on SR3 to I-70. The new “Tow Plows” allows one plow truck to clear two lanes on a highway at once.

The tow plow and material spreader are pulled behind and to the side of a standard yellow INDOT plow truck, and can be deployed or retracted using in-cab controls. Drivers should not attempt to pass a deployed tow plow if all lanes are blocked, but stay a safe distance and speed behind the plows. Road conditions are always better behind a snow plow at work than in front.

Drivers should watch for tow plows on Indiana’s multi-lane roads. Except when stocking up on salt or fuel, or when deployed to other parts of the state as needed, tow plows will be used on these highways in the East Central District:

- Interstate 74 between I-465 and Greensburg
- Interstate 69 between State Road 32 and State Road 26
- U.S. 40 West from Cambridge City to SR 3 in Henry County, then North on SR3 to I-70
- U.S. 31 Kokomo freeway

Motorists should be prepared to see Tow Plows during winter weather and practice safe driving habits near all snow plows. Remember, Indiana’s Move Over Law applies to Snow Plows, as well as Emergency (Police, Fire and Ambulance) Vehicles and Road Side Service Vehicles.

Watch out for larger snow plows, or “tow plows” in eastern Indiana this winter.

Below are some helpful hints for driving around snow plows:

- **Stay back:** Give snowplows room to work. The plows are wide and can cross lane markings, including the centerline and shoulder. Don’t tailgate and try not to pass. If you must pass, take extreme caution and beware of snow coming off the plow.

- **Slow down:** Snowplows travel below the speed limit. Be patient. They clearing roads of snow and ice and helping to keep you safe. Allow plenty of time. Remember, “Ice and snow, take it slow.”
- **Make room:** A snowplow operator’s field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they don’t always see you. Keep your distance and watch for sudden stops or turns.

“They’re good,” Ballenger talked about his next opponent. “They are physical.”

Battle of top 10 1A teams...

After cold third quarter, ‘Blazers fall to Tindley

Things got a little too cool for the University boys basketball team as the second half of the Trailblazers' game with Tindley began Friday night at the U Center. After a steady first half, University suddenly found itself frustrated in the third quarter, where it only scored two points.

The 'Blazers managed to get it together in the fourth period, but it was too late: The Tigers were the winners 48-43.

It was a game between two ranked teams in Class 1A. University is fifth and Tindley is ninth. The two squads could meet again in the Bethesda Christian sectional.

"We didn't make any shots," said UHS coach Brandon Lafferman about that third quarter. "We missed a lot of 3s in the third quarter against the zone, but they were good looks."

The first quarter was back-and-forth between the two teams, but Connor Holly helped out the 'Blazers with a pair of 3-pointers. David Howard then converted a 3-point play with 0.3 seconds left in the period, and that got University ahead 16-12.

The Trailblazers got up by as much as 24-14 in the second period. Josh Alford opened the quarter with two layins, while Emerson Halbleib was a force on the boards, grabbing five rebounds. Tindley cut the lead to 24-21 with a 7-0 run, but Howard ended the period with another 3-point play, and University's halftime lead was 29-22.

But the lead evaporated in the third quarter, with the Tigers scoring 17 points. Meanwhile, the only points the 'Blazers could get in the period came from a layin by Halbleib.

So, University trailed 39-31 going into the fourth quarter, but it fought back. Neither team scored until about the halfway point, when Josh Watson hit a 3, then Halbleib made a rebound basket. Just like that, UHS was back in it, 39-36.

"We could have definitely gone away," said Lafferman. The coach said some of his players "made some good energy plays." "I'm happy with the effort," said Lafferman. "Tindley's a good team. They played really well. I'm sure we're going to see them again."

Alford hit a 3-pointer to cut a 43-36 Tindley lead to 43-39, and Josh Watson's 3 got University within one, 44-43. Foul shots got the Tigers up 46-43, and University did have a chance to tie when it forced a turnover with a few seconds left. But Tindley stole the ball and made a pair of free throws to seal the game.

Howard scored 10 points to lead the Trailblazers. Halbleib yanked 13 rebounds to go with his nine points. Watson's three 3-pointers equaled nine points for him.

"I thought our defense was good, I thought we rebounded the ball fine," said Lafferman. "We just didn't make enough shots."

University is off until next Friday, when it plays at Cardinal Ritter.

Frenchman Mahinmi leads the way...

Pacers persevere, beat Pelicans

Just a few miles from the French Quarter, a French center led the Pacers (21-15) to a 91-86 victory over the Pelicans (11-24) on Friday night in New Orleans.

Ian Mahinmi had his hand in a little bit of everything over the course of the night, especially down the stretch. The fashionable Frenchman recorded his third double-double of the year with 17 points (on 7-of-12 shooting) and 10 rebounds and matched a season high with four blocks.

"I just wanted to be tough," Mahinmi told FOX Sports Indiana's Jeremiah Johnson after the win. "I wanted to be there for my teammates. Tonight on the road, a tough win like that, I'll take that."

Friday's game wasn't pretty, but the Pacers persevered through a season-high 25 turnovers to gut out the victory, their second straight road win. Though the Pelicans lost All-NBA forward Anthony Davis to a back injury a little over three minutes into the contest (Davis exited after diving for a loose ball in the stands with 8:49 left in the first quarter), Indiana played from behind for most of the night.

The Pelicans used a 22-6 run to close out the first quarter to open up a 14-point lead. The double-digit lead didn't last for long, but between Indiana's struggle to maintain possession and some timely baskets from Ryan Anderson and Tyreke Evans, New Orleans mostly had the upper hand until the final half of the fourth quarter.

The Pacers trailed by one with five minutes to play, but Monta Ellis found Mahinmi in the post for a three-point play that put the Blue & Gold in front for good with 4:46 left in the contest.

Mahinmi added a free throw 35 seconds later, then blocked Evans on the opposite end. Ellis hit a jumper with 2:45 to play that pushed Indiana's lead to five, but the Pelicans climbed back within three on a pair of free throws from Jrue Holiday.

New Orleans very well could have gotten the ball back with a chance to tie the game after the next possession if not for Mahinmi, who out-hustled the Pelicans' defense to corral an offensive board on an Ellis miss. C.J. Miles' driving layup 16 seconds later once again made it a two-possession game.

Alexis Ajinca scored on the other end to make it 89-86 and the Pelicans wound up getting two shots to tie the

game in the final minute, but both Holiday and Eric Gordon missed 3-point shots down the stretch. Paul George grabbed the rebound after the latter and calmly knocked down two free throws with 5.6 seconds remaining to seal the victory.

In addition to Mahinmi, three more Pacers players scored in double figures. Miles had 15 points and seven rebounds off the bench while hitting 3-of-8 shots from 3-point range. George added 13 points, seven rebounds, four assists, and three steals. Ellis finished with 10 points and a team-high eight assists.

The bulk of the Pelicans' offensive production came from just two players. Anderson, Davis' replacement at power forward, scored 16 of his 21 points in the first half. Evans had 19 of his game-high 27 points after halftime and also tallied seven rebounds, five assists, and four steals in the loss.

After winning on Wednesday night in Orlando and again on Friday in New Orleans, the Pacers will look to close out their road trip with a third straight victory on Sunday evening in Houston. Indiana will take on James Harden and the Rockets at 7:00 PM ET at the Toyota Center.

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
