Campbell takes helm of county Republican Party

Laura Campbell, Carmel, Indiana, has announced that she is seeking the position of Chairman of the Hamilton County Republican Party. After five years as Vice-Chairman, Campbell became the acting Chairman of the Party on January 1, 2016, upon the resignation of the former Chairman.

Campbell will serve as Chairman until the county's precinct committeemen and vice-committeemen elect a replacement later this month. "I know what it takes to win political campaigns as a volunteer and as an elected official," Campbell stated. "I have never been one to shy away from a challenge and I intend run for Chairman," she

added. "I will spend the next several weeks talking to the precinct committeemen about my vision for the County Party and how we can strengthen our grassroots organization, recruit volunteers, and win elections in the fall," she continued. Campbell wants to make sure that the county party is open to all Republicans. "This county is full of people with conservative ideas and talents," she stated. "I want to ensure the party is a big tent that makes everyone feel equally welcomed and valued," she concluded.


Prior to serving as Vice-Chairman, Campbell was Executive Director of the Hamilton County GOP for over nine years. Campbell brings over 15 years' of political experi-

ence in state and local politics. Last year, Campbell won an open seat on the Carmel City Council. Campbell promises to use her experience in grass roots campaigns to achieve Republican victories in 2016.

Campbell first moved to Hamilton County in 1977. She has worked in public relations, marketing, commercial real estate, and politics. Her husband, Judge Richard Campbell, has served as Judge of the Hamilton Superior Court 4 since 1997. Their son attends Carmel Middle School.

Indiana American Water offers cold weather tips

As colder weather approaches, Indiana American Water would like to remind homeowners to be prepared for freezing winter temperatures and act to prevent costly plumbing repairs.

"During winter weather, water pipes need special care to keep them from freezing," said Indiana American Water President Deron Allen. "Weatherproofing your home against the cold will not only lower your energy bills in the winter, but it will also help protect your indoor plumbing against the threat of breaks."

Indiana American Water encourages its customers to take the following precautions to reduce the risk of freezing pipes that can burst.

- **Know the location of your main water shut-off valve.** If a pipe freezes or bursts, shut the water off immediately. The main water valve is usually located along a basement wall next to the water meter or where the water supply enters the building.
- **Know the areas in your home where water pipes are most vulnerable to freezing** – crawl spaces, outside walls, outside faucets, unheated rooms, basements, garages or attics.

- **Eliminate sources of cold air near water lines.** Make your basement airtight by repairing broken windows, insulating walls and closing off crawl space vents and doors.

- **Protect your pipes.** Wrap exposed water pipes with insulation or UL-listed heat tape. Newspaper or fabric may also work as temporary measures.

- **Drain water lines to outside faucets.** Disconnect garden hoses and, if practical, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets.

- **Keep your thermostat at 55 degrees or higher.** If you plan to be away for an extended period of time, battery-operated freeze alarms are available for less than \$100 that dial a user-selected phone number if the inside temperature drops below 45 degrees. This and the help of a neighbor or family member to check the house regularly can be very effective in avoiding damage.

When Temperatures fall below zero:

- **Allow a small trickle of water to run overnight to keep pipes from freezing.** The cost of the extra water is low compared to the cost to repair a broken pipe.

- **Open cabinet doors to expose pipes to warmer room temperatures.**

If you pipes freeze:

- **Shut off the water immediately.** Don't attempt to thaw frozen pipes unless the water is shut off. Freezing can often cause unseen cracks in pipes or joints that will leak when thawed.

- **Apply heat to the frozen pipe by warming the air around it, or by applying heat directly to the pipe.** You can use a hair dryer, space heater, or hot water. Be sure not to leave space heaters unattended and avoid the use of kerosene heaters or open flames.

- **Once the pipes have thawed, turn the water back on slowly and check for cracks and leaks.**



Clutch shooting and solid defense sends Westfield past Carmel...

'Rocks shock 'Hounds

Confidence can take a basketball team far, and confidence took the Westfield boys basketball team to one of its biggest wins in years Saturday.

The Shamrocks used clutch shooting and strong defense in the fourth quarter to upend Carmel 40-36 at The Rock. It was the first time since March 5, 2010 that Westfield had beaten the Greyhounds.

"I'm happy that we got a win," said Shane Sumpter, in his first year as the Shamrocks' boys basketball coach. "We don't really get into that. We come out every game and try to prepare, get better every single game."

Carmel led by as many as nine points twice in the third quarter, and still led by 33-26 early in the fourth period. But after that, the 'Rocks rolled on to a 14-3 run. It started with a 3-point play by Charlie Warner with 6:10 to go, and that made the score 33-29.

Warner later hit a 3-pointer to cut the Greyhounds' lead to one, then Ian Kristensen nailed two free throws at the 2:23 mark to put Westfield in front, 34-33. Carmel's PJ Baron made a layin to get his team back in front, but Kristensen delivered a 3-pointer with about a minute to go. That got the Shamrocks ahead 37-35, and they wouldn't trail again.

"Confidence all the way," said Kristensen of his big shot. "We were sharing the ball there at the end real well."

"That's just a gutty play by a gutty kid," said Sumpter.

Carmel tried for a shot, but couldn't get it and the ball wound up back in the hands of Westfield. Josh Van Dyke was fouled with 14.1 seconds to go, and he sank two more free throws to get the Shamrocks up 39-35. Westfield hung on from there, with Sawyer Olsen's foul shot answering a free throw by Carmel's Sterling Brown.

The 'Hounds opened up a 14-6 lead after the first quarter, with Trent Richardson scoring six points in that period. Westfield was able to hang around for most of the game, but Carmel maintained a lead of anywhere from four to nine points before the Shamrocks made their run.

Warner wound up with 17 points on the night.






