Competition will be serious for county Republican Party leadership

For the first time in decades there will be serious competition for leadership of the Hamilton County Republican Party when the entire precinct organization meets on January 30, to select a new chairman. Pete Emigh resigned the chairmanship on December 31.
Transition has not always been peaceful in the GOP family. In the 1970s there was open warfare between factions of the party when leaders in the northern and southern parts of the county struggled for control.
In 1978 John Pearce formed an alliance between north and south to be elected head of the party. Relative peace was maintained until recent years when Charlie White



ousted then-chairwoman Leann Cook. Later, White had to resign when allegations were brought against him for living at an address other than where he was registered to vote.
Emigh was White's heir to the top spot in 2011. He resigned last month saying he needed to spend more time with his family and his business. Before leaving the office he filled a large number of vacancies in the precinct committee organization. Presumably the newly appointed committeemen are to vote for his choice as successor.
If this theory proves valid, Pete Peterson treasurer of the county party and a Fishers city councilman, would be elected chairman on January 30.
But, Laura Campbell, former vice chairman and a Carmel city councilor, has also entered the race and is believed

to have significant support through her years of work in the party organization.
The county has 208 precincts. If every committeeman and vice committeeman show up for the election there could be 416 voting in the caucus, but there will likely be a number of "no shows."
The caucus could prove to be a rehearsal for the regular party re-organization next year when all committeemen elected in the May 3 primary this year will choose the party leadership for four-year terms.
Why is all this important? The GOP is by far the dominant party in the county with Republicans holding 124 of the 125 elected local offices. In theory their political leader is the county chairman. In addition, the party leadership is expected to raise major money and turn out a big vote plurality on election day for statewide Republican candidates.

Improving education today leads to a better future tomorrow

In order to perform well at college, a student must do well in high school, and in order for a student to do well in high school, they need effective teachers. As lawmakers, we must provide Hoosier students access to high-quality education by helping schools retain and recruit the best and the brightest educators.

There is no question that great teachers have an impact on the future leaders of our community. That is why in the 2016 session, lawmakers are considering two important bills regarding the evaluation of education in Indiana — one for teachers and one for schools.

From the House of Representatives, legislation that directly affects teacher evalua-

tions passed on Tuesday. This bill will decouple teacher bonuses from the spring 2015 ISTEP scores. Teacher evaluations will only be included if these scores benefit the educator. By doing this, teachers who saw an improvement in their classes’ ISTEP scores are able to receive recognition in their evaluations. During the state’s transition to higher standards, we want to ensure our already great teachers are not unfairly penalized due to this expected drop in scores. House Bill 1003, of which I co-sponsored, will now be sent to the Senate for consideration.

Legislation coming out of the Senate addresses school evaluations and performance measurements. This bill provides that a school’s new evaluation grade cannot be lower than the state-awarded grade the school received the year before. Any consequences a school could receive based on poor performance cannot be administered unless the school falls into the lowest A-F category for the 2014-2015 school year. By

defaulting to the higher of the two grades, we are able to keep accountability in place without unfairly penalizing the school. After passing out of the Senate, the bill was heard by the House Education Committee. Members voted to send it to the full House of Representatives for consideration. I supported and voiced this in public this summer in study committee that this was a path we should take.

This session, I am authoring five bills. One would amend a collective bargaining agreement between a school corporation and the governing body if both parties agree to its terms. Another deals with membership of redevelopment commissions. This bill would require that the commissioner of a redevelopment commission be a member of the school board of a school that includes the redevelopment commission’s taxing district.

I am also focusing on K-12 education funding. This bill would remove deadlines for school money projects. It would also

allow a school corporation to use its debt service property tax rate for 2016, while also providing compensation for teachers and personnel after 2016. The next bill deals with teacher salary scales. Under this bill, changes would be made to determine increases or increments in a local salary range. It would also remove an obsolete provision.

Finally, I have filed a bill that endorses Spanish language proficiency in the workplace. It would provide students, who are about to graduate school and join the workforce, the opportunity to have a special distinction on their diploma stating that they are proficient in speaking Spanish.

Timing of proposed tax fee is big disappointment

I attended last week’s city council meeting and listened to the arguments on both sides of the trash fee debate. Here are some thoughts.

My biggest disappointment here is the timing of this proposal. We’ve heard for a year that 2016 was going to herald a new era in Noblesville city governance. We are now a second class city...bigger council, more representation by new people with new ideas, more professional financial staff. Yet, these new people with new ideas are being asked in their first few meetings in office, to implement a new tax (fee) without even having the opportunity bring new ideas to the table. It’s the same old proposal from years ago with nothing new to offer. There isn’t even a new initiative associated with it; they’re being asked to raise taxes just to keep the status quo.

I’ve read the justifications for the fee and I agree with the idea in principle: fees for service is the fairest way for people to pay for city services. Those who use it pay for it. The problem is, we’re already paying for trash pick-up. We decided long ago to use tax money for it. We’re now being asked to pay twice, once in taxes and again on our sewer bills.

I get it. It’s not meant to be revenue neutral. It’s meant to be a new tax.

Councilors O’Connor and Taylor make the point that “household growth has caused the cost of trash pick up to double in the past 12 years.” That may be true but every one of those new households is now paying taxes, which more than covers the cost of their trash pick-up. It’s built into our tax structure.sAnd, that’s an issue because our tax rate is already the second highest in the county. Take a close look at the tax table the county treasurer is required to publish each year. Noblesville’s city rate, leaving out schools, libraries, township and county taxes, is \$1.20 for every \$100 of taxable value. By comparison, Fishers rate is 62 cents, Carmel’s is 70 cents and Westfield’s is 77 cents. You could make the point that that’s because our taxes pay for trash pick-up, but then I would ask that if we’re going to levy this fee, then let’s have some tax relief. But, that’s not part of the plan.

I don’t understand why our tax rate is twice as high as Fishers’. How can they run their city twice as efficiently as we do? That’s why we need some new ideas. Based on these figures, I’m not convinced we’re running the city as efficiently as we can. I think there are ways to save money that haven’t been uncovered. At last week’s council meeting one speaker noted that the mayor and department heads are still driving city cars home, and that we give very generous benefits to our elected officials. That doesn’t sound to me like we’ve made the tough decisions, yet the city is asking the taxpayers to dig deeper just to keep things going as they are.

And, the timing of this guarantees that any new ideas will come AFTER the council levies the new tax. And we all know that once government imposes a tax, it’s very hard to get rid of it.

It would be nice to look to city staff for some answers. The shift to a second class city was supposed to raise the level of professionalism in city finances. But instead of new ideas and a higher skill level, we now have the same person who has been writing the budget all along running the city’s financial department. I like Mike Hendricks and he may very well be a good manager but I’m not aware that he has any financial training or credentials, and I don’t think we can depend on him to bring new ideas to the table.

The tax caps were instituted seven years ago. It’s hard to believe we are still blaming them for our troubles. They should have sent a message to city governments: get a

handle on your expenses because the taxpayers are tired of constantly having to pony up more money. I don’t think we got the message because we’ve had plenty of time to adapt but we’re still having trouble and blaming the caps. This is a creative way to tax people because it’s a fee, not a tax, so not subject the caps. I’d like to see some of that creativity used to save money instead of squeezing more out of the residents.

So, back to timing. I realize the strategy here is to get this done quickly so people will forget it by the time the next election rolls around. But, as Mary Sue Rowland said at last week’s council meeting, what’s the rush (other than political expediency)? Considering millions of dollars are at stake, is it really necessary to ramrod this through in the first month of this council’s existence? Why not spend a little time deliberating? Why not ask our new, expanded finance department for alternatives? Why not have this new council take a good hard look at the budget and determine why our peer communities are so much more efficient than we are?

One last thought: Property tax increases are nearly invisible because they are just higher numbers on a bill we pay twice a year. This one will be a line item on a bill we pay every month, a constant reminder of how our new, improved, expanded, more representative city council failed, in its very

first month, to live up to its promise of new ideas, new initiatives and new energy in City Hall, and instead opted for the same old tired solutions.

Timothy Lee Simmerman

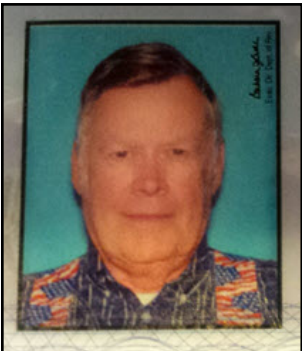
January 6, 1940 - January 9, 2016

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Noblesville girls win, O'Reilly reaches 1000...

Miller boys stopped in double overtime

If the Noblesville boys basketball team doesn't play another overtime game this season, that would be just fine with the Millers.

Noblesville endured more overtime frustration, this time in front of a raucous crowd at Zionsville Friday. The Eagles came from behind in regulation and the first overtime, then did it again in a second extra period to beat the Millers 61-59.

The girls game was a close one too, with Noblesville winning 51-48 over an Eagles team that's having its best season in 12 years.

"First of all, give Zionsville credit," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "They played hard and they made some shots when they had to. We made some shots when we had to, we missed a couple shots when we needed them, too."

Noblesville led 38-34 with 33.6 seconds left in regulation, but two Eagles baskets sent the game into the first overtime at 38-all. Zionsville then led a couple times early before John Kiser scored four straight points to get the Millers up 44-42.

A Zionsville 3-pointer pushed the Eagles ahead 45-44, then Kiser drained two free throws with 22 seconds left to give Noblesville the lead at 46-45. But the Eagles tied the game with a free throw with 7.4 seconds left. The score was 46-all, and that's where overtime ended.

That set the stage for a second overtime that defies belief. Zionsville's early basket put them up 48-46, but then both teams set the nets afire by making seven - yes, SEVEN - 3-pointers in a row.

The Millers' Max Flinchum made the first, the Eagles' freshman sensation Isaiah Thompson made the second. Noblesville answered with Corby Mertens fearlessly hitting a 3, then Zionsville's Riley Bertram drained a long-range shot.

How about another 3, Corby? Swish. The Eagles' Jack Pilcher stepped in. 3-point shot, nailed it.

Flinchum, anything to add? Boom - another 3.

When the dust settled, Noblesville held a 58-57 lead, and Kiser's free throw made it 59-57 with 32.4 seconds left. But the Eagles got within one after Thompson hit a free throw, then stole the ball and laid it in to take the lead at 60-59. The Millers' final shot attempt didn't go, and another Zionsville free throw sealed the game.

The overtime fireworks overshadowed the other three quarters, but those were exciting, too. Neither team led by more than four points, which is a good example of just how close this game was.

Kiser scored 24 points and grabbed seven rebounds, with Flinchum adding 17 - he drained five 3-pointers on the night. Mertens added 11. McGwire Plumer dished out nine assists.

Noblesville has no time to dwell on this loss, tough as it may have been. The Millers host Columbus North tonight, with a 7:30 p.m. tip-off.

"This is huge," said McCauley. "I'm excited to play tomorrow night, because I want to see how our guys respond. It'll be fun. If we respond positively, I know we have mental toughness. If we don't, we're in trouble."

In the girls contest, the Millers were down 23-19 at halftime, then scored eight straight points to jump ahead 27-23. The back and forth continued until Alexis Shannon hit a 3-pointer with under two minutes to go. That moved Noblesville ahead 47-46, and it would not trail again.

Millers coach Donna Buckley credited her team with making "enough plays at the end" to get the win, which is Noblesville's third straight. The Millers are 19-4 for the season.

"Our seniors stepped up and made a lot of big plays to get the win," said Buckley. Katelyn O'Reilly led the scoring with 24 points, and passed the 1000-point mark for

her career during the game. O'Reilly joined her teammate Alexis Shannon, who reached 1000 points earlier in the season.

"I'm so proud of her," said Buckley. "It's a huge accomplishment. We've only had a handful of kids do that in the history of this amazing program. She's definitely one of the all-time greats here and just really proud of her and happy for her accomplishment."

Shannon added 12 points for Noblesville. Emily Kiser pulled down 13 rebounds for the game, with O'Reilly grabbing nine. Kiser also handed out four assists and blocked two shots.

Next up for the Millers is a huge Thursday game at The Mill: Heritage Christian, winner of the last two Class 2A state championships. Heritage is playing in 3A this year, and is ranked No. 2 in that division with a 16-2 record.

Westfield is 3-8 and will play on the road tonight at Lafayette Jeff.

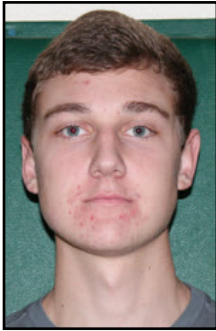

Early turnovers, offensive rebounds...

Defensive struggles send Pacers to loss at Washington

The Indiana Pacers entered Friday night's contest against the banged-up Washington Wizards hoping to pick up a much-needed win before embarking on a four-game Western Conference road trip. But the Pacers' defense let them down, as Indiana (22-18) fell to Washington (19-19) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 118-104.

Washington shot 52 percent on the night as John Wall and Bradley Beal combined for 50 points on 21-of-36 shooting in the victory.

"They took the fight to us," Paul George said after the loss. "It was like they (were) comfortable from the get go. You can't do that, you can't let a team get comfortable."

The Pacers fell into an early hole, thanks to a bevy of turnovers and failure to protect the defensive glass. Indiana committed five turnovers and allowed the Wizards to collect five offensive rebounds over

the first five-plus minutes, as Washington jumped out to an early 11-4 lead.

The Wizards led by as many as nine, but the Blue & Gold quickly clawed back thanks to some hot shooting. The Pacers knocked down 11-of-17 shots in the first quarter (64.7 percent) and led 27-24 after the period.

Indiana found a lot of success attacking the paint, with Paul George scoring eight points in the first quarter and backup big men Myles Turner and Lavoy Allen combining for 11 points on 4-for-4 shooting. All told, the Pacers tallied 20 points in the paint in the first quarter alone.

But the Pacers couldn't sustain their hot shooting in the second quarter. Indiana missed 10 of its first 11 shots to open the period as Washington reeled off a 15-2 run to take a double-digit lead.

George Hill finally got the offense clicking again — the Hometown Hero scored all of his 12 first-half points over the

final 6:08 before halftime — but seemingly every time the Pacers scored, the Wizards' All-Star backcourt of John Wall and Bradley Beal had an answer. Thanks in large part to that duo, Washington racked up 35 points in the second quarter alone.

The Pacers weren't able to make any major halftime adjustments, as the Wizards maintained and even extended their lead over the final two quarters. Washington led by 16 points heading into the fourth and as many as 19 on the night. Indiana never got within single digits after halftime.

"It's not one player or one play that loses the game," Hill said. "I think it was a team effort and we didn't deserve to win tonight."

George led the Pacers with 21 points, five rebounds, and seven assists, though he made just 6-of-19 shots overall and 1-of-7 from 3-point range. Hill added 19 points and eight rebounds, while Monta Ellis chipped in 17. Allen joined them in double

figures, scoring a season-high 15 points on 6-for-8 shooting.

Wall, however, dominated the game, racking up 28 points on 12-of-21 shooting, seven rebounds, and eight assists.

"That's the head of the snake," George said. "I feel like he got going and really put the confidence in all those players. John is a player that makes his teammates better."

Beal, in just his second game back after missing a month with a stress reaction in his right leg, had 22 points on 9-of-15 shooting, going 4-for-7 from 3-point range.

The Wizards also dominated the glass, outrebounding Indiana 54-35 overall and 17-6 on the offensive end.

The Pacers now hit the road for a tough four-game road trip, which begins Sunday night in Denver, a venue where Indiana hasn't won since Nov. 2007. Indiana will also visit Phoenix, Golden State, and Sacramento before returning to Indianapolis to host the Los Angeles Clippers on Jan. 26.



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
