Westfield named one of Indiana's safest cities

A Consumer Affairs report has named Westfield as one of the top ten safest cities in Indiana.

The report, which uses data from the Census Bureau and FBI crime statistics, ranks Westfield at #7 in the state.

"I'm not surprised that Westfield is consistently listed as one of the safest communities in Indiana," Mayor Andy Cook said. "Our public safety professionals take their jobs very seriously and work tirelessly to keep our residents and visitors out of harm's way."

The Consumer Affairs Report comes out just as Westfield's Police Department released its year-end report. This report compiles information over the past year on traffic accidents, arrests and other calls for service.

The report shows decreases in robberies, hit-and-runs and traffic fatalities when compared to 2014 numbers.

"Our officers and civilian staff continue to make me proud with the work they do," Police Chief Joel Rush said. "They perform their duties diligently and take great pride in serving the Westfield community."

Timing of proposed tax fee is big disappointment

I attended last week's city council meet- handle on your expenses because the taxsides of the trash fee debate. Here are some pony up more money. I don't think we got thoughts.

My biggest disappointment here is the timing of this proposal. We've heard for a year that 2016 was going to herald a new era in Noblesville city governance. We are now a second class city...bigger council, more representation by new people with new ideas, more professional financial staff. Yet, these new people with new ideas are being asked in their first few meetings in office, to implement a new tax (fee) without even having the opportunity bring new ideas to the table. It's the same old proposal from years ago with nothing new to offer. There isn't even a new initiative associated with it; they're being asked to raise taxes just to keep the status quo.

I've read the justifications for the fee and I agree with the idea in principle: fees for service is the fairest way for people to pay for city services. Those who use it pay for it. The problem is, we're already paying for trash pick-up. We decided long ago to use tax money for it. We're now being asked to pay twice, once in taxes and again on our sewer bills.

I get it. It's not meant to be revenue neutral. It's meant to be a new tax.

Councilors O'Connor and Taylor make the point that "household growth has caused the cost of trash pick up to double in the past 12 years." That may be true but every one of those new households is now paying taxes, which more than covers the cost of their trash pick-up. It's built into our tax structure.sAnd, that's an issue because our tax rate is already the second highest in the county. Take a close look at the tax table the county treasurer is required to publish each year. Noblesville's city rate, leaving out schools, libraries, township and county taxes, is \$1.20 for every \$100 of taxable value. By comparison, Fishers rate is 62 cents, Carmel's is 70 cents and Westfield's is 77 cents. You could make the point that that's because our taxes pay for trash pickup, but then I would ask that if we're going to levy this fee, then let's have some tax relief. But, that's not part of the plan. I don't understand why our tax rate is twice as high as Fishers'. How can they run their city twice as efficiently as we do? That's why we need some new ideas. Based on these figures, I'm not convinced we're running the city as efficiently as we can. I think there are ways to save money that haven't been uncovered. At last week's council meeting one speaker noted that the mayor and department heads are still driving city cars home, and that we give very generous benefits to our elected officials. That doesn't sound to me like we've made the tough decisions, yet the city is asking the taxpayers to dig deeper just to keep things going as they are. And, the timing of this guarantees that any new ideas will come AFTER the council levies the new tax. And we all know that once government imposes a tax, it's very hard to get rid of it. It would be nice to look to city staff for some answers. The shift to a second class city was supposed to raise the level of professionalism in city finances. But instead of new ideas and a higher skill level, we now have the same person who has been writing the budget all along running the city's financial department. I like Mike Hendricks and he may very well be a good manager but I'm not aware that he has any financial training or credentials, and I don't think we can depend on him to bring new ideas to the table. The tax caps were instituted seven years ago. It's hard to believe we are still blaming them for our troubles. They should have sent a message to city governments: get a

the message because we've had plenty of time to adapt but we're still having trouble and blaming the caps. This is a creative way to tax people because it's a fee, not a tax, so not subject the caps. I'd like to see some of that creativity used to save money instead of squeezing more out of the residents.

So, back to timing. I realize the strategy here is to get this done quickly so people will forget it by the time the next election rolls around. But, as Mary Sue Rowland said at last week's council meeting, what's the rush (other than political expediency)? Considering millions of dollars are at stake, is it really necessary to ramrod this through in the first month of this council's existence? Why not spend a little time deliberating? Why not ask our new, expanded finance department for alternatives? Why not have this new council take a good hard look at the budget and determine why our peer communities are so much more efficient than we are?



Noblesville girls win, O'Reilly reaches 1000...

Miller boys stopped in double overtime

doesn't play another overtime game this season, that would be just fine with the Millers.

Noblesville endured more overtime frustration, this time in front of a raucous crowd at Zionsville Friday. The Eagles came from behind in regulation and the

first overtime, then did it again in a second extra period to beat the Millers 61-59.

The girls game was a close one too, with Noblesville winning 51-48 over an Eagles team that's having its best season in 12 years.

"First of all, give Zionsville credit," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "They played hard and they made some shots when they had to. We made some shots when we had to, we missed a couple shots when we needed them, too."

Noblesville led 38-34 with 33.6 seconds left in regulation, but two Eagles baskets sent the game into the first overtime at 38-all. Zionsville then led a couple times early before John Kiser scored four straight points to get the Millers up 44-42.

A Zionsville 3-pointer pushed the Eagles ahead 45-44, then Kiser drained two free throws with 22 seconds left to give Noblesville the lead at 46-45. But the Eagles tied the game with a free throw with 7.4 seconds left. The score was 46-all, and that's where overtime ended.

That set the stage for a second overtime that defies belief. Zionsville's early basket put them up 48-46, but then both teams set the nets afire by making seven - yes. SEV-



EN - 3-pointers in a row.

The Millers' Max Flinchum made the first, the Eagles' freshman sensation Isaiah Thompson made the second. Noblesville answered with Corby Mertens fearlessly hitting a 3, then Zionsville's Riley Bertram drained a long-range shot.

How about another 3, Corby? Swish.

The Eagles' Jack Pilcher stepped in. 3-point shot, nailed it.

Flinchum, anything to add? Boom - another 3.

When the dust settled, Noblesville held a 58-57 lead, and Kiser's free throw made it 59-57 with 32.4 seconds left. But the Eagles got within one after Thompson hit a free throw, then stole the ball and laid it in to take the lead at 60-59. The Millers' final shot attempt didn't go, and another Zionsville free throw sealed the game.

The overtime fireworks overshadowed the other three quarters, but those were exciting, too. Neither team led by more than four points, which is a good example of just how close this game was.

Kiser scored 24 points and grabbed seven rebounds, with Flinchum adding 17 - he drained five 3-pointers on the night. Mertens added 11. McGwire Plumer dished out nine assists.

Noblesville has no time to dwell on this loss, tough as it may have been. The Millers host Columbus North tonight, with a 7:30 p.m. tip-off.

"This is huge," said McCauley. "I'm excited to play tomorrow night, because I want to see how our guys respond. It'll be fun. If we respond positively, I know we have mental toughness. If we don't, we're in trouble."

In the girls contest, the Millers were down 23-19 at halftime, then scored eight straight points to jump ahead 27-23. The back and forth continued until Alexis Shannon hit a 3-pointer with under two minutes to go. That moved Noblesville ahead 47-46, and it would not trail again.

Millers coach Donna Buckley credited her team with making "enough plays at the end" to get the win, which is Noblesville's third straight. The Millers are 19-4 for the season.

"Our seniors stepped up and made a lot of big plays to get the win," said Buckley.

her career during the game. O'Reilly joined her teammate Alexis Shannon, who reached 1000 points earlier in the season.

"I'm so proud of her," said Buckley. "It's a huge accomplishment. We've only had a handful of kids do that in the history of this amazing program. She's definitely one of the all-time greats here and just really proud of her and happy for her accomplishment."

Shannon added 12 points for Noblesville. Emily Kiser pulled down 13 rebounds for the game, with O'Reilly grabbing nine. Kiser also handed out four assists and blocked two shots.

Next up for the Millers is a huge Thursday game at The Mill: Heritage Christian, winner of the last two Class 2A state championships. Heritage is playing in 3A this year, and is ranked No. 2 in that division with a 16-2 record.

Defensive struggles send Pacers to loss at Washington

The Indiana Pacers entered Friday night's contest against the banged-up Washington Wizards hoping to pick up a muchneeded win before embarking on a fourgame Western Conference road trip. But the Pacers' defense let them down, as Indiana (22-18) fell to Washington (19-19) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 118-104.

Washington shot 52 percent on the night as John Wall and Bradley Beal combined for 50 points on 21-of-36 shooting in the victory.

"They took the fight to us," Paul George said after the loss. "It was like they (were) comfortable from the get go. You can't do that, you can't let a team get comfortable."

The Pacers fell into an early hole, thanks to a bevy of turnovers and failure to protect the defensive glass. Indiana committed five turnovers and allowed the Wizards to collect five offensive rebounds over

jumped out to an early 11-4 lead.

The Wizards led by as many as nine, but the Blue & Gold quickly clawed back thanks to some hot shooting. The Pacers knocked down 11-of-17 shots in the first quarter (64.7 percent) and led 27-24 after the period.

Indiana found a lot of success attacking the paint, with Paul George scoring eight points in the first quarter and backup big men Myles Turner and Lavoy Allen combining for 11 points on 4-for-4 shooting. All told, the Pacers tallied 20 points in the paint in the first quarter alone.

But the Pacers couldn't sustain their hot shooting in the second quarter. Indiana missed 10 of its first 11 shots to open the period as Washington reeled off a 15-2 run to take a double-digit lead.

George Hill finally got the offense clicking again — the Hometown Hero scored all of his 12 first-half points over the

the first five-plus minutes, as Washington final 6:08 before halftime — but seemingly every time the Pacers scored, the Wizards' All-Star backcourt of John Wall and Bradley Beal had an answer. Thanks in large part racking up 28 points on 12-of-21 shooting, to that duo, Washington racked up 35 points in the second quarter alone.
