**Challenger for Kenley...**

**Willis files for Senate 20 seat**

The long-rumored candidacy of an opponent for State Sen. Luke Kenley became official yesterday when Scott Willis, Westfield area resident and Carmel business owner, filed for the State Senate Dist. 20 seat.

Kenley, longtime legislator who chairs the Senate Finance Committee, is a Noblesville resident, local businessman and former city judge. The two men will face each other in the May 3 Republican primary with the winner almost certain to be elected in November in the heavily Republican district.

To no one's surprise U.S. Rep. Susan Brooks also filed her candidacy for re-election this week. She is expected to have little or no opposition in the primary, but a Democrat, Allen Davidson, has filed and will likely face Brooks in the November election to represent the 5th congressional district.

No candidates for office in Hamilton County have filed in the past two days other than those seeking party positions of state convention delegate and precinct committeeman. Candidates for all offices and party posts have until noon on February 5 to file at the County Elections Office.

# Ben Davis, Pike suspensions force schedule changes

Last Saturday's fight between the Ben Davis and Pike girls basketball team has had repercussions not just for those two schools, but for their opponents.

The fight, which took place during the Marion County Championship, quickly went viral and made its way to the IHSAA. On Monday, Commissioner Bobby Cox announced that both schools' seasons would be ended immediately, thus canceling all remaining games that Ben Davis and Pike were to play.

The Giants and the Red Devils are both members of the Metropolitan Conference, which has a Hamilton County

member in Carmel. The Greyhounds had not yet played either team, so that means Carmel will not face them as originally scheduled. The 'Hounds were supposed to play at Pike tonight. This includes varsity, junior varsity and C-Team contests.

The Greyhounds were to play Ben Davis on Jan. 29. Instead, Carmel will host Jay County that night, with the JV starting at 6:30 p.m. Senior Night ceremonies will take place on this date as well.

In addition to the regular season, the Giants and Red Devils have been suspended from participation in next

month's IHSAA Girls Basketball State Tournament. The two teams were to play in Class 4A, Sectional 11, hosted by Decatur Central, which will be redesigned as a four-team tournament. Other teams in that sectional are Perry Meridian, Roncalli and Southport.

Ben Davis and Pike high schools shall not receive any sectional tournament revenue from this year's tournament. Also, the Saturday contest between the two schools shall stand as a double forfeit. Both school's girls basketball teams shall be placed on probation for the entire 2016-17 school year. .

# Millers knock off Eagles

With sectionals now less than two weeks away, a girls basketball team is looking to get something out of every game to prepare it for the tournament.

Noblesville got quite a few things out of its Thursday game with Heritage Christian at The Mill. The Millers rebounded spectacularly, played with great toughness and composure, and the end result was a thrilling 57-52 win over the Eagles, a team that won the previous two Class 2A state championships.

Heritage is playing in 3A this year due to the IHSAA's success factor, but the Eagles have been a high-level team for years, regardless of class. They're ranked No. 2 in 3A, behind only undefeated Princeton. In the one-class coaches poll, Heritage is No. 5, and Noblesville No. 13.

"We definitely understand that we beat a really good basketball team," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. "But, we also think we're a pretty good basketball team and understand that when we play well, we have a chance to do some things."

"It was definitely nice for our kids. I thought we defended really well and just did all the little things that it takes to beat a team like that."

While the final score was close, the Millers actually held the lead for the majority of the game. Noblesville was ahead for the last nine minutes of the second half, when Rachel Shipman was fouled while making a 3-point shot. Shipman drained all three free throws to move Noblesville ahead 36-33, and the Millers were in front from then on.

That included all of the fourth quarter, with Noblesville getting up by as much as 49-41 when Maddie Knight - she's a freshman - banked in a 3-pointer with around three and a half minutes to go.

Noblesville still led by 53-50 with 30 seconds left, after which Heritage chipped that lead down to one, 53-52, with a couple of free throws. But Shipman was fouled with 12.4 seconds left, and she made both her shots. Noblesville got the ball back, Shipman went to the line again, and her two free throws with 4.9 seconds left sealed the win.

"We worked so hard throughout the whole game, and I didn't want to give it up for our team," said Shipman. "So I just kind of stepped up and pretended like I was in practice, just hit them."

The game started with some back-and-forth, which led to Heritage Christian leading 6-5 early. But that's when Noblesville scored 10 unanswered points to jump ahead 15-6. Alexis Shannon scored four of those points. The first quarter ended with the Millers up 19-11; Katelyn O'Reilly made a putback right at the end.

The second period began with O'Reilly making another rebound basket, just 32 seconds in. A little later, O'Reilly's third putback gave Noblesville a 24-13 lead. Katelyn had 14 rebounds on the night to go along with her 16 points, another double-double.

Before the start of the game, O'Reilly received a commemorative basketball in honor of her reaching the 1000-point mark.

"They're a really good team, I give all the credit in the world to them," said O'Reilly, who said her team wanted to show everyone what they were made of in this game.

"We showed great teamwork to get the ball around," said O'Reilly. "I think everyone on the court did well."

Noblesville led 25-20 at halftime. The Eagles began the third quarter with their expected run, scoring six points very quickly to lead 26-25 with 6:50 left.

Buckley called a timeout, and that got the Millers settled down. They also slowed the tempo down, passing the ball well and making patient plays. Emily Kiser's jumper gave Noblesville the lead back at 27-26.

Heritage Christian led one last time at 29-27, but baskets from O'Reilly and Brooke Herron moved the Millers ahead 31-29, and they would not trail again. The Eagles had one last tie at 33-33, before Shipman made her 3-for-3 foul shots.

After O'Reilly's 16, Herron and Kiser each added 10 points. Shipman and Shannon added to the balanced scoring with nine points each. Kiser grabbed seven rebounds, and Shannon had six boards. Kiser also handed out four assists, while O'Reilly blocked two shots.

With the win, the Millers improved to 20-4, giving them back-to-back 20-win seasons.

Next up for Noblesville is their final home game of the year: The Millers host Martinsville on Saturday afternoon.

# Sheridan edged 42-41

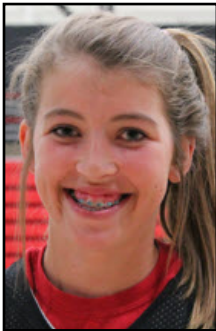
Talk about heartbreaks. After playing some great defense and holding Clinton Prairie to seven points combined in the second and third quarters, Sheridan dropped a 42-41 decision to Clinton Prairie Thursday in the Hoosier Heartland Conference Tourney at Carroll.

Coach Jeff Reed Guenther's Blackhawks were outscored 16-14 in the fourth quarter.

Sheridan's biggest problem was the start of the game when the Lady Gophers leaped away to a 19-13 first quarter lead.

The Blackhawks had a cold shooting night, hitting on just 12-of-46 shots for 26 percent shooting figures.

Sheridan was 4-of-18 from 3-point territory.



Brittany Welch led Sheridan with a double-double, scoring 21 points and pulling 10 rebounds. Also in double figures was Audrey Reed with 12 points.

The loss shoved Sheridan into the consolation round of the tourney. The Blackhawks will play an 11:30 a.m. game Saturday at Taylor, facing Frontier. If Sheridan wins, the Blackhawks will go to the fifth place game. If not, it's the seventh place game.

Southeastern and Zionsville are the only undefeated teams remaining in the conference. But, Coach Brian Satterfield's Royals still are looking at a Nov. 29 HCC contest at tough Noblesville and then will close their conference

season on Feb. 19 at home against Brownsburg.

And, Zionsville, even with a victory tonight, will have no cakewalk ahead. The Eagles still have conference games with Brownsburg, Avon and Fishers.

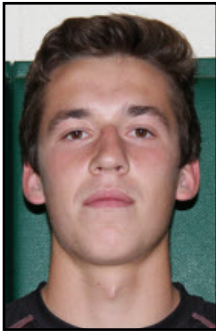
