Noblesville residence fire causes \$200,000 damage

An early morning fire in Noblesville caused around \$200,000 in damage Saturday morning.

At 5:49 a.m., fire units were dispatched to a reported residence fire at 2388 Sheridan Road. The property owner, Sharon Heffelmire, stated that she was asleep in bed when she was awakened by a popping and cracking sound. The single occupant exited the smoke filled home and call 9-1-1.

At approximately 5:53 am, fire suppression crews arrived to find smoke and flames coming from the residence. Fire crews made an interior attack on the fire and had the incident under control at 6:33 am.

The fire originated in an area where an alternative heat source was located. The fire has caused approximately \$200,000 dollars in damage to the contents and structure. The home did not have working smoke detectors.

Portable electric space heaters can be a convenient source of supplemental heat for your home in cold weather, but they also can increase the risk of fire or electrical shock if not used properly.

Here are a few safety tips when using a portable space heater.

• Make sure your space heater has the label showing that it is listed by a recognized testing laboratory.

• Before using any space heater, read the manufacturer's instructions and warning labels carefully.

• Inspect heaters for cracked or broken plugs or loose connections before each use. If frayed, worn or damaged, do not use the heater.

• Never leave a space heater unattended. Turn it off when you're leaving a room or going to sleep, and don't let pets or children play too close to a space heater. • Space heaters are only meant to provide supplemental heat and should never be used to warm bedding, cook food, dry clothing or thaw pipes.

• Install smoke alarms on every floor of your home and outside all sleeping areas and test them once a month.

• Proper placement of space heaters is critical. Heaters must be kept at least three feet away from anything that can burn, including papers, clothing and rugs. • Locate space heaters out of high traffic areas and doorways where they may pose a tripping hazard.

• Plug space heaters directly into a wall outlet. Do not use an extension cord or power strip, which could overheat and result in a fire. Do not plug any other electrical devices into the same outlet as the heater.

• Place space heaters on level, flat surfaces. Never place heaters on cabinets, tables, furniture, or carpet, which can overheat and start a fire.

• Always unplug and safely store the heater when it is not in use.



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

Another upset for the Millers....

Noblesville picks Berries

Noblesville is 3-0 against North Central Conference teams, leading the conference.

Oops, the Millers don't play in the NCC; they play in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

Still, wins over North Central teams bring smiles to the face of Noblesville coach Brian McCauley, who for years bled the colors of the NCC while a player and later as a coach at Kokomo.

"NCC teams are tough to beat. They have a comfort zone while playing at home," McCauley said.

The Millers shattered that comfort zone when last evening they rolled into Logansport and came away with a 69-55 licking of the state's No. 12 ranked Berries.

We've done okay in the Hoosier Crossroads, too," the coach continued. "We lost on the road by four points to Fishers early in the season and we could have, should have, won in our double-overtime loss to Zionsville last week."

Noblesville will have an opportunity, perhaps, to decide the HCC champion when next Friday hosting Hamilton Southeastern. The Royals lead Fishers by a game in the conference.

"It has been a while since we've beaten Southeastern," McCauley noted.

Following back to back losses to Fishers and Carmel early in the season, Noblesville has won seven of 11 games, falling to Ft. Wayne South in overtime; losing to Columbus East in double overtime, losing to Bloomington South and falling to Zionsville in double overtime.

Against North Central foes, Noblesville has now upset Logansport and Muncie Central and defeated an Anderson team which



the Millers could face again in the Noblesville Sectional.

In the win over Logansport last night, McCauley got a huge 1-2-3 punch from Max Flinchum, Corby Mertens and, of course, John Kiser. Flinchum led the way with 20 points, followed by Kiser with 16 points and Mertens with 14. Flinchum canned 4-of-5 shots from 3-point range and was 7-of-11 overall.

"Kiser had an outstanding game," said McCauley. "He hit 6-of-9 shots and 4-of-4 free throws. He also had 6 rebounds and 3 assists."

Kiser got into a little foul trouble and had to sit for about 4 minutes.

"The guys did a great job of taking care of the ball with Kiser on the bench," said McCauley. "Kiser played a heck of a defensive game against Jalen Atway, holding him to 2-of-11 from the field.

Atway is a junior averaging 21 points a game. Another junior averaging 22 points a coming to The Mill next Friday.




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
