Digging deep for the tax payer

Living at the 1999 wage level in 2016 has many challenges considering the United States, Indiana and Hamilton county has some of the highest tax and cost of living rates. Taxes and death are certain but everything else can be negotiated. The economy, world conditions, fewer good paying jobs have given way to raw nerves and strained budgets. Can anyone live on their social security payments the government has held for the entire working years and now giving it out in small monthly dabs? The looming threat of no payments of social security is a concern as the govern-

ment continues to tax and spend at the highest level.

The income side is certainly fixed by many outside sources but the expense side is being drained by everyone who can. Without a lot of coupons and some keen shopping skills even the food we need is out of reach. Referendums create an extra draw down as everyone must go along with the majority, no matter how the individual voted. Some tax and fees are passed along without much discussion as is currently the city trash fee in Noblesville. Tax Payers are discovering that the city trash fee has been part of the property tax collected by the city for years. Now the city wants to redirect that money and ask for the tax payers to pay again for the same service. Does a tax and a fee equal double taxation?

Taxes are authorized at the State level and then distributed back to the cities. There are four major taxing areas. Sales tax at 7%, State income tax at 3.3%, Excise tax charged on motor vehicles, alcohol, tobacco and gasoline that funds state and local roads, Property tax capped at 1% calculated by the city tax rate (Noblesville has the highest tax rate of the major cities in Hamilton County), Gaming tax (if you win the lottery and go to casinos), Gasoline at 22.9 cents a gallon, additional taxes on alcohol and cigarettes just to name a few. On top of state and city tax is Federal income tax and business tax which is the highest in the world adding two more to a very long list of opportunities to take money.

Note: By cutting out eating, not buying a car, not owning any property, not buying anything with sales tax attached, paying any taxes or fees, a family could do pretty good!

All of the costs and taxes do add up to a significant amount of money for seniors and families. Is it too much to ask government, that continue to spend other people's money, to "dig a little deeper" into the government budgets? Certainly, the Federal level has some real work to do or life as we know it is going to be very different in the years to come. One idea is asking the city to consider a zero base budget process where each department starts with zero and assess the needs for the coming year from there. Logic says the result would probably have some real savings. The reason for the savings is that every item must be given consideration - is necessary to serve the community. Giving real thought to the process would result in some very sound awareness of the potential for over spending. How about those abatements and are they over competitive? It is the job of the council's around the county to work hard and "dig deep" keeping the tax payers in mind. Providing services at a rate that the tax payer can afford along with the fees, school taxes, libraries, state and more is a balancing act that needs close attention. It is time to calculate the cumulative effect of all tax impact to the payers not just the cities piece of the pie. Before any government asks for more money for any reason, look at the multi-million dollar budgets and see how to make it work within the dollars already

Think of the tax payer first and "dig a little deeper".

However, as we begin to pass the "middle years" we realize that apart from health conditions beyond our control, most of us have not been the best stewards of our bodies. According to the Harvard School of Public Health, one of the most recent and careful global estimates finds that roughly 500 million adults are obese (defined as a body mass index, or BMI, of 30 or higher). That's almost 10 percent of men and 14 percent of women—and it's nearly double the rate of obesity in 1980. Nearly 1.5 billion adults were overweight or obese (defined as a BMI of 25 or higher.) If nothing is done to reverse the epidemic, more than 1 billion adults are projected to be obese by 2030.1

Obviously there is nothing we can do about the passing of time, but each day we all have a total of 24 hours, 1,440 minutes, 86,400 seconds, and a LOT of nanoseconds (One nanosecond is to one second as one second is to 31.71 years – so you do the math...!) Each day provides another opportunity to focus on some aspect of your health and well being – these opportunities may be short in duration around your busy schedule, but they do exist. As we take on this new year of 2016, remember that you can be in charge of increasing your fitness level, developing a healthier eating plan, and finishing up the year knowing that those nanoseconds have been well cared for along the way!


