Carmel-based... MISO to expand HQs, create 84 new jobs

Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO) Inc., an independent regional electric transmission organization, announced plans today to expand its headquarters here, creating up to 84 new high-wage jobs by 2020.

Sheridan Library announces leadership for 2016



The company will invest \$30 million in its Carmel campus, with the investment including costs for construction, new technology and leasing to reconfigure its 133,409-square-foot facility at 720 City Center Drive in Carmel to increase the efficiency of its operations. Construction is scheduled to begin in January, allowing MISO to support the expansion of its utility customers and work to ensure the reliable delivery of electricity across 15 states and the Canadian province of Manitoba.

"Over the last three years, Indiana's private sector has added 140,500 jobs with the help of companies like MISO," said Governor Mike Pence. "Indiana's unemployment rate stands at its lowest rate in more than a decade because job creators like MISO are looking at their options and choosing to locate their growth in the Hoosier business climate, which is one of the best in the nation. Today MISO joins a long list of homegrown companies that are expanding their headquarters in Indiana and creating more high-wage jobs for Hoosiers."

MISO currently employs more than 940 associates nationally, including more than 700 Hoosiers at its headquarters. The company has already begun hiring for information technology and engineering positions, with average wages expected to pay nearly double the Hamilton County average wage. Interested applicants may search for open positions on the MISO website.

Noblesville residents asked to report problem potholes

During this time of year, potholes develop on roads due to winter weather. While the Noblesville Street Department monitors roads daily, they also are asking for the public's help in reporting potholes. Residents who see large potholes are encouraged to report them so that the holes can be repaired as soon as possible.

The street department is out filling potholes whenever the weather allows, which means when it's not snowing or raining during the winter months," Street Commissioner Patty Johnson said.

For potholes on city streets, residents may report them through any of the following methods:

• Send an e-mail with the specific location of the pothole to NSD@noblesville.in.us.

• Visit the city's website (www.cityofnoblesville.org). On the homepage is a "Report Assistant Coach: Beth Niedermeyer, a Pothole" button that will take you directly to the online form.

• Call the street department at (317) 776-6348.

For Indiana 19, 32, 37 and 38, residents must report potholes to the Indiana Department of Transportation at (317) 462-7751. As a reminder, the Noblesville Street Department is not allowed to maintain roads that fall under INDOT's jurisdiction - this includes plowing snow and repairing potholes.



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WNBA approves regular-season, playoff changes

The WNBA Board of Governors approved changes to playoff seeding and qualification procedures as well as the postseason format, effective with the 2016 season, the WNBA announced today. The reconfigured postseason structure, featuring live telecasts by ESPN networks of every playoff and Finals game in 2016, dovetails with a new, more balanced format for the regular-season schedule.

Beginning with the WNBA's historic 20th season, the eight teams with the highest winning percentages regardless of conference will qualify for the playoffs and be seeded based on their record.

Additional changes to the playoff structure are as follows:

• The number of playoff rounds increases from three to four. The top two seeds receive a bye to the semifinals (third round), and the third and fourth seeds receive a bye to the second round.

• Teams will be re-seeded after each postseason round.


• The first and second rounds are single elimination. In the first round, the No. 5 seed hosts the No. 8 seed and the No. 6 seed hosts the No. 7 seed. In the second round, the No. 3 seed hosts the lowestseeded first-round winner and the No. 4 seed hosts the other first-round winner.

• The semifinals feature a best-of-five format, with the No. 1 overall seed playing the lowest remaining seed and the No.
