Thank you for the letter in the January time to explain the reasoning behind your votes in favor of the trash fee.

I am among those who expressed concern during your campaigns that Noblesville is falling behind our peer communities. We absolutely need bold and visionary leadership to catch up.

I can't speak for all of your constituents but I can assure you that a new tax wasn't what I had in mind. What I'm looking for is new ideas, new energy, new initiatives. We need to look at our challenges with new eyes and look for alternative solutions that add value for taxpayers, ways to get more services for our tax dollars, ways to be more efficient. That's what innovation is all about and that's what we've been lacking in City Hall. That's what I was hoping you would bring to the discussion.

This new fee is not a new idea, is not innovative and doesn't add value for the same money. In fact, I'm not exactly sure what additional value we are getting for this new fee. I've reviewed the literature available at the meeting and it seems we are using this money simply to maintain the future for Noblesville. status quo, to keep city services from declining. I will take you at your word that you 28 Reporter. I appreciate you taking the listened carefully to the concerns of your constituents, including those who spoke at the meeting. I believe all three of you want to do the right thing. But you have to understand how hard it is for us in the gallery to believe that you approached this meeting with an open mind when none of you changed your vote after all the public input, which was heavily against this fee. There was very little discussion and no questions to the public. The impression from this side of the desk is that deals were made beforehand, votes were secured and the fee was going to be implemented regardless of what the public had to say. That is very discouraging and is one reason so many people are cynical about the political process.

At this point we, the public, have no choice but to hope that you will hold the Mayor and his staff accountable to "be creative, be aggressive and push for progress." I will try to do the same. for the costs associated with growth. We are already paying for it in our city taxes. The city has other funding solutions available. The Mayor has again overlooked the best elimination or reduction in the capture of taxes in the many TIF districts in the city of Noblesville. The city has been capturing almost all of the taxes from the new businesses that have located in our city to pay off the bonds for their Free infrastructure. This includes the taxes that were supposed to go to the schools, city, library, etc. What this means is that none of the taxes paid by all of the new businesses in the TIF districts are going to pay for police or fire protection, snow removal or any of the other city services. We are always told that when a new business is added that we are adding to our tax base. That addition to the tax base doesn't happen for 25 years until the bonds are paid for in the TIF district that was created. If the capture rate was 50% instead of 100% then these new businesses would at least be paying for a portion of their police and fire protection, snow removal and the other city services that they require. The existing residents and businesses in Noblesville shouldn't have to pay for all of the costs of growth. It is long past time that the capture rate in TIF districts is reduced. Every year when I return my legislative survey to Senator Kenley and Representative Richardson I put in the comment section that the state needs to cap the capture rate in TIF districts at 50%. If TIF districts are such a great thing then they need to

The letter above was sent to all 9 Council members on Dec.31st, 2015. Since then we have been told that in the May primary we will be voting to extend the operating fund referendum for the schools, If the City reduced the capture rate in their TIF districts to 50% the City would have plenty of money to continue paying for trash pickup in the budget and the schools wouldn't need the operating fund referendum. Indiana single-family building permits up 15 percent from December 2014

Single-family building permits in Indi- CalAtlantic Homes, Brighton Knoll, 10602 ana increased 15 percent in December compared to the same time last year according to the latest data from the U.S. Census Bureau and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Permits decreased 13 percent in December from the previous

In December 2015, there were 835 single-family building permits issued compared to 726 in 2014. Single-family permits for 2015 were down 1 percent compared to 2014 totals.

"After years of ups and downs, the housing market has settled into a steadier pattern," said Indiana Builders Association Chief Executive Officer Rick Wajda. "A firming economy, solid job growth and rising consumer confidence are all positive indicators that provide solid evidence this will be a good year for housing and the economy.'

Builder confidence in the market for newly-built single-family homes held steady at 60 in January, according to the Association National of Home Builders/Wells Fargo Housing Market Index. The index has been between 60 and 62 for seven of the last eight months with only October rising briefly to 65. Any number over 50 indicates that more builders view sales conditions as good than poor.

"Top concerns for builders in 2016 include the cost and availability of developed lots and labor, federal environmental regulations that are making it more expensive and difficult to build homes and increasing building material prices," said Wajda. "Indiana's unemployment rate continues to be at its lowest level in more than a decade and we are confident this will play a factor in a growing housing market this year."

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

After almost five years...

Hot-shooting Millers beat Royals

A great shooting night for Noblesville finally broke down five years of frustration against Hamilton Southeastern Friday night.

The Millers boys basketball team had another efficient night from the field, and rode that to a 67-54 victory over the Royals at The Mill. It's the first time Noblesville has beaten HSE since March 5, 2010, when it edged the Royals 43-42 in the sectional semi-finals. This game had a sectional-type atmosphere, which is a good thing to experience since the postseason is only a few weeks away.

"I'm really proud of our guys," said NHS coach Brian McCauley. "I thought we had great energy. We had a great start. We were focused, and then obviously we shot very well tonight from the floor." Noblesville was 26-of-38 from the field, a blistering 68 percent.

The Royals scored the first basket of the game, when Brennan Schofield made a layin. After that, the Millers scored the next seven points, and held the lead from there. Nolan Ginther got the first basket, McGwire Plumer drained a 3-pointer, and John Kiser hit a jump shot.

"I thought we played decent the first half," said HSE coach Brian Satterfield. "Kiser's a great player, and he hits tough, contested shots. But some other guys stepped up and hit shots there, especially in the first half."

Noblesville kept steadily increasing its advantage throughout the game, scoring mostly on little runs of five or six points. Usually those runs included a 3pointer. The Millers made eight long range baskets in all. Noblesville was ahead 32-24 at halftime, and the Miller was Kiser, who poured in 23; he also lead was 48-36 after three quarters.

A new chant has become popular among student sections over the past couple years when a player makes a '3': It ends with the kids screaming "Everybody!" And it seemed like everybody on Noblesville's team hit a 3-pointer Friday. Max Flinchum totaled three downtown shots, Corby Mertens and Plumer both hit two, and Kiser made one. That gave the Millers an 8-of-13 mark from 3-point range.




