SB 67 could mean millions to Hamilton County

Hamilton County's Local Option Income Tax was adopted by officials of local municipal and county government in the 1990s as a method of raising money for local needs. The tax raises millions by deducting one percent of every county wage earner's income each year.

COIT has been the single most important factor is giving local city, township and county government the financial ability to meet the public



service needs of a growing county. And, due to the high average income of county residents, COIT now brings in nearly as much money as the property tax.

There are some problems with this huge source of revenue. The state of Indiana collects the tax and then distributes most of it to the county. The state has been keeping some of the money in what they call "reserve." Statewide they've kept hundreds of millions of dollars, a pretty healthy reserve.

Now there is a bill in the legislature (SB 67) that proposes to give back this reserved money to the counties, cities and towns for road improvements. It sounds like

good news, everyone wants to get more money especially when it's their money that someone has been keeping.

Hamilton County's share of this reserve is somewhere over \$50 million that would be divided among our eight cities, towns and the county government.

Under the legislation the state plans to somehow make sure that most of the money is spent on road improvements because legislators are convinced that money for roads is a popular issue right now. Even though streets and roads in this county are not in great disrepair, local political leaders could no doubt find road projects on which to spend it.

In a sectional noted for its ranked teams, two advanced Tuesday in first round competition of the Westfield Sectional.

Carmel, ranked No. 10 in this week's Coaches Poll, took out Hamilton Southeastern, 62-37, and No. 11 Noblesville easily got past Anderson, 76-60.

That set the stage for Friday's semifinal round, which will include still another ranked machine. Three of the four teams still alive have won 20 or more games this season.

Fishers (6-16), the only team in this sectional with a losing record, will face (20-4) Carmel in the Friday opener, fol-

lowed by a battle between two ranked teams and two teams with 20-win seasons. No. 14 Westfield (20-3) will take on Noblesville (23-4). Westfield defeated Noblesville 55-44 during the regular season. Carmel won over Fishers, 54-24, during the regular season.

The tourney at Westfield is one of four sectionals involving Hamilton County teams. Three of those sectionals are being played on Hamilton County hardwood.

Play at the Class 3A sectional at Hamilton Heights got underway with one game, Tipton beating Delta, 59-35.

Action will heat up tonight at Hamilton Heights with Guerin Catholic trying to upset No. 5 Heritage Christian in the opener

and then the host Lady Huskies facing Marion in the nightcap. Heritage Christian is 19-4 and Guerin Catholic 14-10. In the nightcap, Heights is 11-11 and Marion is 20-3.

Sheridan, playing in the Class 2A sectional at Frankton, jumped out of the gate with a tourney-opening 34-26 victory over Monroe Central. The Lady Blackhawks (14-9) Friday will face Muncie Burris (3-18).

University, hosting its own Class 1A sectional, began by beating Indiana Deaf. In the nightcap game, International pounded Metro 63-25. On Friday at University, the host team will face Tindley and International will take on Bethesda Christian.

NEMS, NHS bands have success at ISSMA contests

Noblesville East Middle School sent 21 band events (66 students) at the ISSMA Solo and Ensemble contest at Westfield High School this past weekend.

The East Millers received 15 Gold ratings, the highest rating, and six Silver ratings. Two of the Gold Ratings qualified for state solo competition: Sophia Kussow and Grace Wiles. This is an honor, because students usually qualify in high school.

Last year was the first time a middle school band student from Noblesville went to state. Noblesville East sent one last year, and is sending two this year.

Over 130 Noblesville High School Band students competed in the ISSMA Solo

and Ensemble contest this past Saturday at Westfield High School.

The Millers competed in 51 events. Forty achieved the highest rating (Gold), with the other 11 events achieving a Silver Rating.

Out of these events, 19 soloists and eight ensembles with 48 students achieved a Gold rating in the hardest division. This achievement qualifies them for the prestigious ISSMA STATE Solo and Ensemble Contest on Feb. 27th at North Central High School.

The only problem is that a local option tax was enacted to allow local government to use the tax money where they need it. If the legislature establishes a precedent of dictating where COIT funds must be spent, then it may not be long before the "local option" would be gone and it could become just a state controlled tax collected locally.

Not every county has COIT, some have less than our one percent rate and some units that receive COIT such as townships and libraries, don't have roads to care for.

Hamilton County has had problems in the past trying to get the State Budget Agency to distribute our fair share to us. Hopefully, legislators from our county will take care to watch the details of this bill and make sure we get all the money our citizens have paid.

It also might be a good idea to have no road maintenance mandate attached and an even better idea to not allow the Budget Agency to hold so much of our money in "reserve." There is an opportunity here whereby all this could be achieved by amending SB 67 which looks likely to pass because everyone is understandably anxious to get their money.

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Shipman sets NHS 3-point record...

‘Hounds, Millers advance

Tuesday's opening night at the Westfield girls basketball sectional saw a little bit of history to go along with two ranked teams advancing to Friday's semi-finals.

In the first game, No. 10 Carmel beat Hamilton Southeastern 62-37 to move on to a date with Fishers in the first semi-final game. The nightcap featured Noblesville's Rachel Shipman make a school record eight 3-pointers in the Millers' 76-60 win over new sectional opponent Anderson.

Now, No. 11 Noblesville will take on No. 14 Westfield in Friday's second semi-final. The championship game is scheduled for Saturday.

The 'Hounds led 17-8 after the first quarter, and increased its lead in all four periods of the game. That included a 9-0 second quarter run, with Emily Kmec scoring five of those points, an 8-0 run in the third period, with Amy Dilk scoring four points, and a 15-0 run that started at the end of the third and continued through the first two-and-a-half minutes of the fourth quarter. Dilk opened the fourth with two consecutive putbacks; those would put her total for the night at 17 points, leading all scorers.

Blake Smith added 13 and Kmec scored 11.

Carmel's press did its job, as it has been doing all season.

"The biggest thing about it is, the intensity level of it has been really good about the last six to seven games, where we really were intense and got after people," said Greyhounds coach Tod Windlan. "That's what we talked about. We wanted to get at a high possession game as we could."

Carmel outrebounded HSE 29-23, with Smith grabbing seven boards, Dilk six and Celene Funke five.

The Royals, who finished their season at 11-11, was led by 11 points from Kyndall Williams, who also led the rebounding with seven. Amaya Hamilton had five rebounds.

MILLERS PULL AWAY AGAIN

It looked as if Noblesville was going to make quick work of Anderson right at the beginning. The Millers scored seven points in the first 30 seconds of the game - yes, you read that right.

Alexis Shannon made a layin, then Emily Kiser scored off a steal, and Shipman made her first 3-pointer of the game. Noblesville's immediate lead swelled to 12-0, when Kiser scored off another steal, and Shipman drained another 3.

But the Indians came back, erasing a 19-9 Miller lead with a 10-0 run of their own. However, Shipman made a 3-pointer to get Noblesville the lead, and the Millers would be ahead 23-21 at the end of the first period.

"They started with a big lineup, so we came out pressing," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. Anderson then started get-

ting the ball into its guards, so Noblesville switched to a 2-3 zone defense.

"We don't play a lot of 2-3 zone," said Buckley. "We kind of hung in there and finally got them to take some long, quick 3s, which led to transition for us."

Anderson held the lead twice during the second period, at 29-28 and again at 35-34.

But Shipman stepped up and hit another long-range shot late in the quarter to move Noblesville ahead 37-35. The Indians tied the game, but Maddie Knight scored a 3 at the buzzer - the only Miller 3-pointer that wasn't by Shipman - and Noblesville had a 40-37 lead at halftime.

"Her mom actually played for the state championship team back in (19)'87, so she's kind of got it in the bloodline," said Buckley of the freshman Knight.

The Millers never trailed again, as once again Noblesville took over in the second half, using its energy and defense to shake loose Anderson. The Millers went on a 9-0 run midway through the period to get up 54-43; Knight scored four points and Shipman capped the run with her record eighth 3-pointer of the night. Shipman wound up with 24 points, all of her scoring coming from those 3s.

"The difference in the game, I thought, was just wearing them down physically," said Buckley. "Then we got the ball inside."

Noblesville put the game away with a final 8-0 run midway through the fourth. Kiser and Katelyn O'Reilly scored four points each in the run; O'Reilly launched the ball coast to coast to Kiser for an easy layup in the run's final basket.

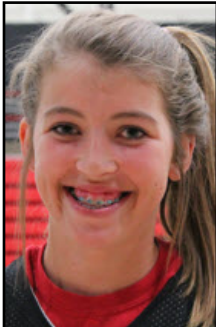

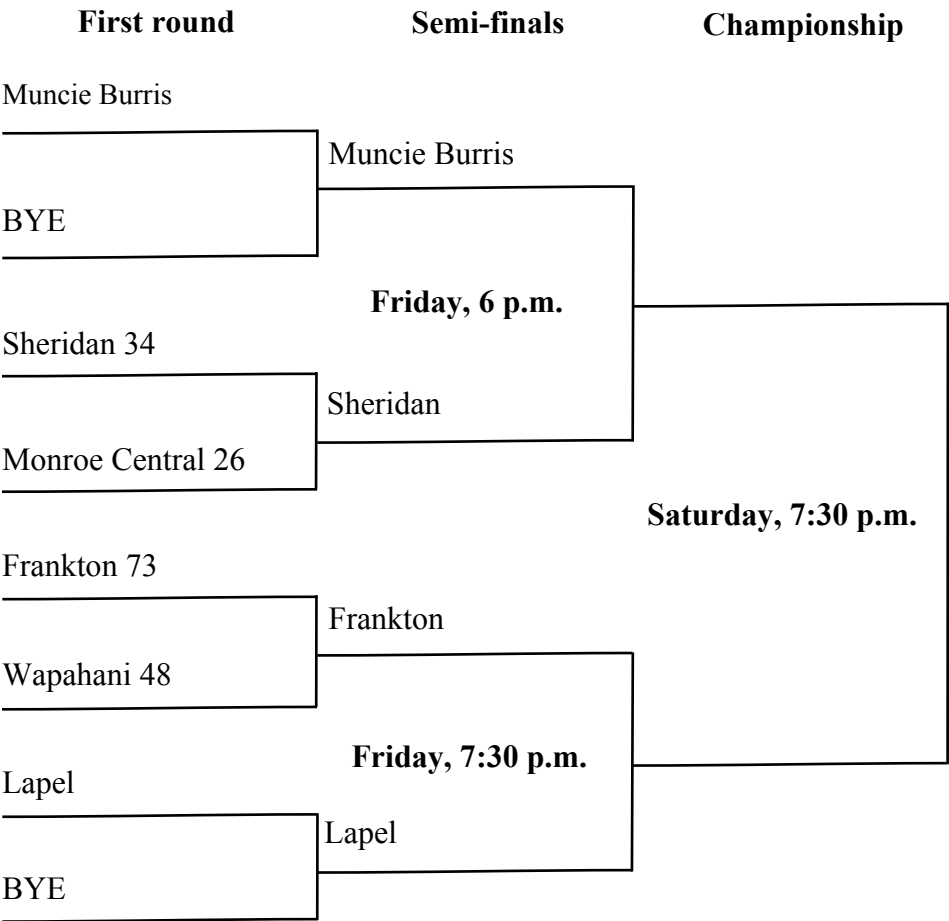
Sectional 8 - At Westfield



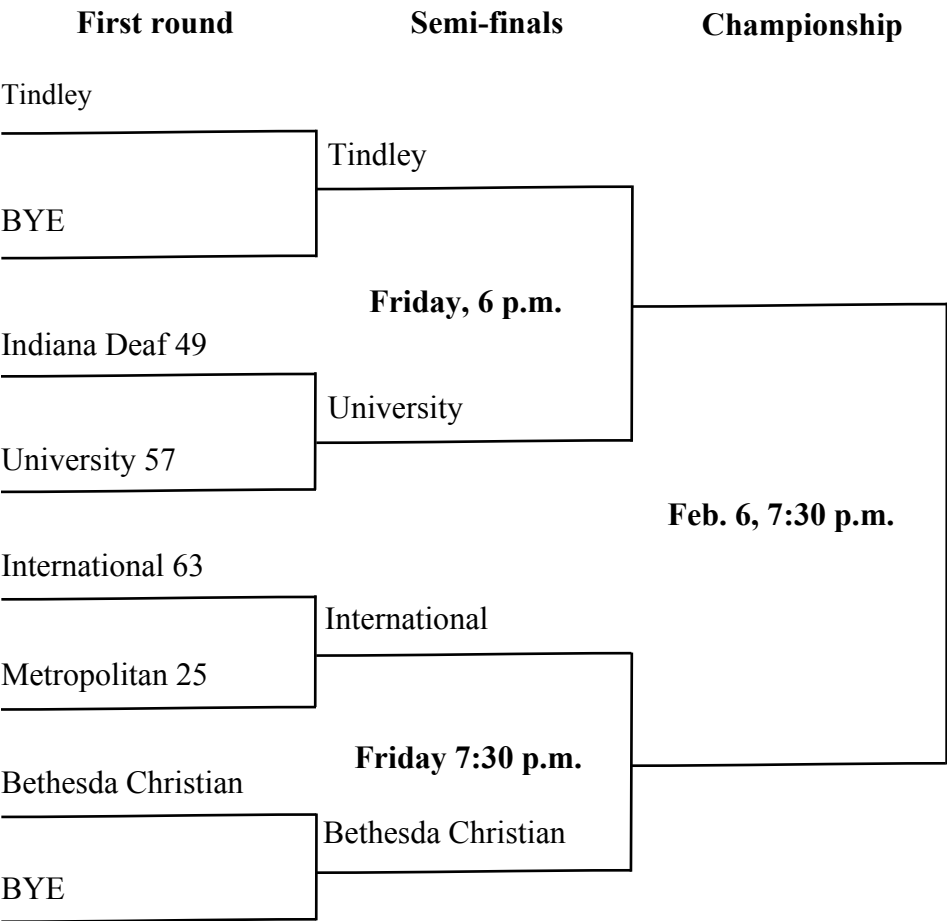

*"We are starting to guard with a little more urgency.

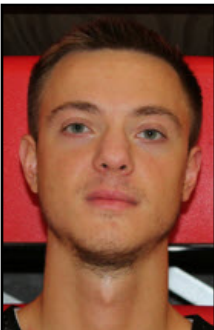
*"Our movement on the defensive end has been much improved.

Carmel will take on Lawrence North at 6:30 p.m. Following that game, Lawrence Central and North Central will battle.

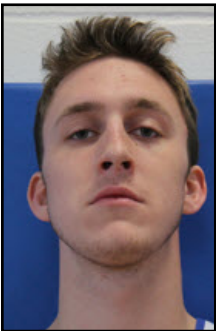


