Charged with two Level 6 felonies...

Sheridan Fire Department captain arrested

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has arrested a Sheridan Fire Department captain on charges resulting from a personal injury crash that occurred on January 31, 2016. Deputies responded to a crash on State Road 38 at Six Points Road near Sheridan on a single vehicle crash at 4:50pm on Sunday. The driver of the vehicle, identified as Joshua Stoops, age 37 of Sheridan, stated he thought he fell asleep while driving. His vehi-

cle, a white Chevrolet Silverado truck, was westbound on SR 38 before drifting to the south side of the road where it left the pavement and eventually struck a utility pole, according to witnesses. A passenger in the truck was taken to the hospital complaining of pain to a hip.

Deputies investigating the crash determined through an informant that Sheridan Fire Department Captain Travis William Stern, age 37 of Sheridan, who responded to the scene with the Sheridan Fire Department, was involved with narcotic evidence allegedly removed from the crashed vehicle. According to officials, Stern is related to Stoops. The alleged narcotics and paraphernalia were later de-

stroyed; however, an informant came forward with information leading to Stern's arrest. Sheridan Fire Department officials also cooperated during the investigation. Stern was taken into custody on Friday, February 4 after deputies, working with the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office, obtained a warrant for his arrest.

Initial charges for Travis Stern include Official Misconduct and Obstruction of Justice, both Level 6 felonies. Stern is currently being held at the Hamilton County Jail with bond set at \$5,000. A charge is an accusation and all individuals are presumed innocent unless found guilty in court.

Primary filing ends with many unopposed

Seven of Hamilton County's incumbent elected officials can breathe easier today as filing for the May 3 primary ended without opposition for many county and state legislative officeholders.

As usual, the contests that have developed are in the Republican primary. But, State Representatives Kathy Richardson, Tony Cook and Jerry Torr are all unopposed in the primary.

And, County Commissioner Steve Dillinger, County Treasurer Jennifer Templeton, Surveyor Kenton Ward and former Auditor Robin Mills also are home free on the GOP ticket.

There will be contests on the primary ballot for State Senate, State Representative in Dist. 24, judge of Superior Court 2, County Commissioner, Dist. 2 and County Council-at-large.

Sen. Luke Kenley is opposed by first time candidate Scott Willis and incumbent State Rep. Donna Shaibley will face Greg Fettig in legislative contests.

Court Magistrate David Najjar faces John Brown for the Superior Court bench, County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt finds a challenge from Bill Smythe, and Council incumbents Jim Belden, Brad Beaver and Rick McKinney will be opposed by Bill Dennis, Jeff Hern and George Kehl for the three at-large seats up this year in battles for county office.

Winners in the primary are all but certain of election in November. No Democrats have filed for county office. The county Democrat leaders can still fill their ticket by appointment, but knowing that chances of winning in November are remote, they are not expected to do so.

Earlier this season election observers had thought the primary would attract a substantial number of office-seekers, but as it turned out the greatest interest has been in political party positions of precinct committeeman and state convention delegate.

On the Hamilton County website under Current Election Information are found the names of more than 200 hopefuls for these positions, the largest number of which are seeking GOP precinct posts due to an expected contest for party chairman next year.

It's Carmel vs. Westfield

In attempting to defend their sectional championship, Noblesville went 23-5 this season and was ranked No. 11 in the state. But, three of those losses were to Hamilton County teams.

The finale came Friday evening at The Rock in Westfield as Coach Ginny Smith's Lady Shamrocks defeated Noblesville for a second consecutive time. This one, a 52-42 decision, advanced the 21-3 Shamrocks into Saturday's championship game of the sectional, facing a 21-4 Carmel team.

During the regular season, back on Dec. 8 at Carmel, Coach Tod Windlan's Greyhounds edged Westfield 51-48.

Last evening, Carmel rolled its way into the championship game with a 40-25 victory over Fishers, which closed its season with a 6-17 record.

Westfield last won a sectional championship in 2012-13 when the Shamrocks defeated Hamilton Southeastern, 37-35. Carmel's last crown was in 2010-11 with a 51-34 win over Westfield.

With Noblesville's and Fishers' losses last evening in Class 4A play at Westfield and Sheridan's 80-37 win over Muncie Burris in the Class 2A sectional at Frankton, Hamilton County will have three teams in two sectionals shooting for sectional championships tonight.

Sheridan will take on host Frankton, which last evening defeated Lapel, 53-41. Coach Jeff Guenther's Blackhawks, now 15-9 on the season, did not face Frankton during the regular season. Frankton is 19-6.


Another Hamilton County team to fall Friday evening was University in a Class 1A sectional at University. Tindley defeated University 107-42. In the second game, Bethesda Christian defeated International 60-53.

In the Class 3A sectional at Hamilton Heights, where Guerin Catholic and host Heights were eliminated earlier in the week, Heritage Christian unloaded on Marion 74-37 and Tipton advanced with a 49-40 win over Yorktown.

Game time tonight at Westfield and at Frankton is 7:30 p.m.

Celebrate February with healthy heart habits

You might consider this to be "Part II" of my previous article from a few weeks ago, referencing the passing of time and how we can make the best use of our time. Perhaps that is in part because as we come to the stage of life where we fully acknowledge there is more time behind us than ahead of us that is when we can fully engage in our lives. The quote I have used in this article is so true but I admit that I have selected it in honor of the recent passing of one of my

favorite musicians, Glenn Frey, co-founder of the Eagles band.

I believe we are all aware of the American Heart Association's use of February as recognition of the importance of good heart health and the very serious situation that we face when we don't care for our hearts. (In this article I am writing about the physical aspect, not the emotional aspect – although that can certainly affect our health as well.) Additionally, unfortunately some of us are born with heart issues that are not a result of our lifestyles and again that is not a subject specifically referenced here. The statistics on heart disease are staggering, much like the statistics on obesity:*

- Heart disease strikes someone in the U.S. about once every 43 seconds.
- Heart disease is the No. 1 cause of death in the United States, killing over 375,000 people a year.

• Heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women, taking more lives than all forms of cancer combined.

In 2011, about 326,200 people experienced out-of-hospital cardiac arrests in the United States. Of those treated by emergency medical services, 10.6 percent survived. Of the 19,300 bystander-witnessed out-of-hospital cardiac arrests in 2011, 31.4 percent survived.

Less than 1 percent of U.S. adults meet the American Heart Association's definition for "Ideal Healthy Diet." Essentially no children meet the definition. Of the 5 components of a healthy diet, reducing sodium and increasing whole grains are the biggest challenges. Eating patterns have changed dramatically in recent decades. Research from 1971 to 2004 showed that women consumed an average of 22 percent more calories in that span and men consumed an average of 10 percent more. The average woman eats about 1,900 calories a day and the average man has

nearly 2,700, according to the government figures. Hypertension is projected to increase about 8 percent between 2013 and 2030.

Valentine's Day? Sure, why not? (Careful of the sugar!) However let's celebrate February with healthy heart habits and continue to pursue those dreams before we "run out of time." Rest in peace, Glenn Frey.

Indianapolis man arrested for Fishers gas station robbery

An Indianapolis man was arrested Thursday afternoon and charged in connection with an armed robbery at a Fishers Village Pantry gas station.

Adelrick Woods, 19, was found in a vehicle that matched the description of the vehicle involved in the robbery at the Village Pantry at 8772 E. 96th St. According to a post on the Fishers Police Department Facebook page, "The officer stopped the vehicle and detained the driver. Investigators from the Fishers Police Department were able to positively identify the driver as one of the armed robbery suspects. The

suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Hamilton County Jail without incident. This investigation is on-going."

Woods is charged with three felonies: Robbery (Level 3), Pointing a Firearm (Level 6) and Intimidation (Level 5), and two Class A Misdemeanors: Carrying a Firearm without a License and Theft.

The robbery was reported shortly after 10 p.m. Wednesday night. An employee of the store said two men entered the store and demanded money, with one of the men showing a handgun.

Winkler sentenced to 80 years

A Fishers teenager will spend most of his life in prison for a brutal killing he committed in November 2014.

Maxwell Winkler was sentenced to 80 years Friday for the death of Henry Kim, 73, of Fishers. Winkler was 17 when he shot and slashed the throat of Kim, but was waived to adult court.

Kim's body was discovered on Nov. 1 in the area of Windermere Park. When police officers arrived they found three .22 caliber shell casings near Kim's body. Police located Winkler in a nearby park two days later, and discovered the teenager was carrying knives. A later search of his residence revealed a .22 caliber handgun, .22 caliber ammunition that matched the shell casings found near Kim's body, a bloody towel and handwritten letters that outlined what prosecutors called "a desire or methodology for planning to kill or injure people."

Defense rules the semi-finals at Westfield...

‘Hounds, ‘Rocks reach championship game

Since Sectional 8 contains five Hamilton County schools, re-matches are inevitable come sectional time.

That's what happened Friday in the girls basketball sectional semi-finals at Westfield. Both games were repeats of regular season contests, and both had the same result the second time around.

First up was Carmel, which beat Fishers 40-25 to become the first team to earn a spot in tonight's sectional championship game, which tips off at 7:30 p.m. The Greyhounds will play the host Shamrocks, who won the nightcap by defeating Noblesville 52-42.

And yes, Carmel and Westfield played each other earlier in the season, back on Dec. 8. The 'Hounds won a close game, 51-48. The Shamrocks come into the game with a 21-3 record, the Greyhounds at 21-4.

Back to the semi-finals, which were both defensive-minded affairs. Carmel scored the first 10 points of the game against the Tigers, before Fishers got on the board late in the first quarter when Ali Gerka made a putback. Blake Smith had four points for the Greyhounds in the first period.

Carmel kept rolling in the second quarter, scoring three baskets off steals - Emily Kmec had two, Amy Dilk one - to get up by 21-4 with 1:59 left in the half. Casey Walker hit two free throws for Fishers 15 seconds later to cut the Carmel lead to 21-6, and that would be the halftime score.

"We knew what was going to transpire," said 'Hounds coach Tod Windlan. "The good thing for us was, the delay game they ran is what we run. When they did it at the start, I told our kids, 'It's what we prepared to defend.'"

Kmec opened the second half with a 3-pointer to make the score 24-6. Fishers' Kenedi London provided a spark in the third, scoring four points and getting the Tigers to within 24-10. But Carmel closed the period with seven unanswered points; Larson's 3-pointer ended the quarter where the 'Hounds began.

Fishers went down fighting in the fourth quarter, outscoring Carmel 15-7. That included a 3-point basket by Gerka, and 3-point plays by Hannah Kroehler and Amanda Surber. Carmel scored all of its points from the free throw line in that period, with Dilk getting six.

"I think our kids played their hearts out," Fishers coach Michael Gaines said of his team. "I think they played extremely hard. I think we had trouble finishing in the first half, when the opportunities were available. That hurt us in the end, but our kids were extremely resilient, played great defense. Carmel's a very talented team."

Larson led the Greyhounds with 11 points, and Dilk totaled 10. Gerka scored eight points for Fishers, and Kroehler had seven rebounds. The Tigers' Audrey Turner blocked two shots.

The defensive play from the first game carried over into the second game. Noblesville's Emily Kiser opened the contest with a jump shot, but Westfield then went on an 8-0 run. Two of the Shamrocks' four baskets in that run were putbacks, one each from Allison VanDyke and Haliagh Reinoehl. The Millers' Brooke Herron made a 3-pointer late in the first quarter, which ended with Westfield up 8-5.

Another '3,' from Ryann Bunting, put the 'Rocks ahead 15-7. Noblesville scored five unanswered points to get back to 15-12 (Alexis Shannon and Kiser each hit baskets), but Westfield ended the half on a 6-0 run, for a 21-12 halftime lead. VanDyke made two straight layins.

"I think they played well," Westfield coach Ginny Smith said of her team. "I think our kids did an incredible job in terms of what the game plan was, executing the game plan. I think defensively we were solid. I really feel so good about what we were able to do defensively."

That 6-0 run became a 15-0 run, as the Shamrocks opened the second half by scoring nine more points. Abby Reeder hit a 3,

and Reinoehl's jumper made the score 30-12.

"We just had a meltdown right at the end of the half, and didn't respond at the start of the second half, and obviously that was the difference in the game," said Millers coach Donna Buckley.

Noblesville, like a defending sectional champion team would, kept battling, going on a 7-0 run of its own. Katelyn O'Reilly's basket around the five-minute mark of the period stopped the Shamrock surge, and Shannon helped out with a pair of free throws. Rachel Shipman drained a 3-pointer as well.

The third quarter ended with Westfield up 36-22, and the Shamrocks' margin stayed around there for most of the fourth period. Bunting opened the fourth with another '3.' Westfield enjoyed a 52-36 lead with a minute to go, although the Millers scored the game's final six points. Shipman made the last basket, an appropriate 3-pointer for the senior who had set the Noblesville record for most '3s' in a game (eight) just three days ago.

Jalyn Foland led the Westfield scoring with 12 points, while VanDyke added 10. Reinoehl pulled 11 rebounds to go with her nine points, with VanDyke grabbing nine.

O'Reilly, a senior, led Noblesville with 10 points and seven rebounds. Both she and Kiser blocked three shots. The Millers fin-

ished 23-5, the second year in a row they've won 23 games.

"We had another great year," said Buckley. "I'm really proud. Obviously tonight was disappointing, but it doesn't take away from how proud I am of these kids, and especially the senior class and what they did for our program, the success and the expectations that they brought to our program and the excitement about girls basketball. It's phenomenal what they've done."

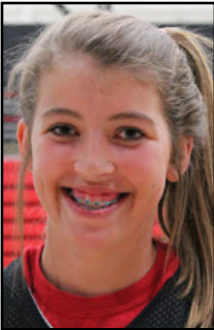
