

Jackson Township Trustee Chris Miller on Thursday announced plans for Jackson Township to withdraw from services. the Jackson Fire Territory.

Township has withdrawn, the Fire Territory will dissolve beginning July 1, 2016.

Currently the Jackson Fire Territory provides fire and paramedic services to all unincorporated Jackson Township and the towns of Arcadia and Atlanta.

The press release issued by Miller indicated, fire and emergency services will not change for residents of unin-

## Cannon, rifle fire to be part of **Whitcomb Memorial Service**

Indiana's 43<sup>rd</sup> Governor, Edgar Whitcomb, and WWII Veteran, passed away on February 4th. He will be honored on February 12th with a Memorial Service being held in downtown Indianapolis, in the area of the downtown Circle and on the south side of the State Capitol Building.

The Memorial related services will begin late in the morning and will conclude by early afternoon. People that work in the downtown Indianapolis area should be prepared for traffic congestion around and near the Circle along the streets of Michigan, Meridian, Market, Capitol and Washington.

At approximately 12:45 p.m., as part of the Memorial Service, three Howitzer Cannons will fire six volleys, followed by one single shot for a total of 19 rounds in recognition of Indiana being the 19th State admitted to the Union. There will also be a seven person rifle team that will fire three volleys, for a total of 21 shots, in recognition of Gov. Whitcomb's WWII service. Weather permitting, there will also be a military aircraft flyover of the Circle.

The Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department is aware of the Memorial Service and is assisting with traffic flow before, during and after the Memorial Service.

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

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


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

It's a challenging weekend for Westfield basketball. A double challenging weekend for Hamilton Heights. That's Hamilton County basketball.

The Shamrocks will host the Huskies tonight at The Rock. On Saturday, at the Husky Dome in Arcadia, Hamilton Heights will entertain powerhouse Lawrence North.

Coach Chad Ballenger will take his Huskies to Westfield with a 12-7 record. The Huskies have won three of their last four outings. Heights is coming off an early week victory over Frankton.

"Westfield is always a good gauge for us," Ballenger said. "They are playing very well. Their schedule always prepares them.

"Playing over there is always tough, but our guys look forward to it. It is always a nice atmosphere. Being a Hamilton County game, we always judge off this game headed down the home stretch into the tourney," Ballenger added.

Westfield is 8-10 after dropping a tough one-pointer to Harrison earlier in the week.

"Hamilton Heights is an explosive offensive basketball team," said Westfield coach Shane Sumpter. "We will need to do a good job containing their guards and limiting their opportunities in transition. We will need to recognize their changing defenses and be sure we are taking great shots.

"Heights is playing very well right now, so we will need to be sharp in all aspects of the game. We look forward to a great night

of Hamilton County basketball," Sumpter added.

Heights has played its last five games without scoring leader (18.5) Hunter Crist, out of action with a wrist injury. Sterling Weatherford (14.4) and Caymn Lutz (10.5) have picked up the pace.

Westfield is led by the 1-2 punch of Charlie Warner (16.6) and Ian Kristensen

Hamilton Heights has defeated Westfield two consecutive games.

The Huskies will take on Lawrence North Saturday at Hamilton Heights.

"It will be our toughest stretch of basketball in a long time," said Ballenger. "We played really well vs. Tipton in the fourth quarter. We played as well defensively as we have in a while. If we can play defense like that, we will compete against a lot of

"Weatherford and Lutz turned on the offense in the fourth quarter and gave us a chance to win.

"We have had some good practices and the guys' attitudes have been fantastic. Hunter is healing and there is a chance we might get him back.

'We are looking forward to this stretch to help us get ready for March Madness," said Ballenger.

Lawrence North, before traveling to Hamilton Heights on Saturday, will play Ben Davis on Friday. The Wildcats are 14-5 and have won three straight, beating Center Grove, Fishers and Carmel.

## Carmel girls go for record 30th in a row

weekend's 42nd Annual IHSAA Girls Swimming & Diving State Finals are unlikely to disappoint as significant team and individual records are expected to fall.

Preliminary swimming heats will begin Friday at 6 pm ET / 5 pm CT at the Indiana University Natatorium with the top 16 in each event returning Saturday for the championship and consolation finals scheduled for 1 pm ET / 12 pm CT. Those events will be streamed on the IHSAA Champions Network at IHSAAtv.org.

The state diving competition begins Saturday at 9 am ET.

As it has in recent years, Carmel's girls swimming and diving team's continuous climb up the national record ladder has been at the forefront of talk about this meet. The Greyhounds are poised to extend their consecutive state championship streak to a 30th straight year which would set a new national high school record in all sports. The Greyhounds are currently tied for the national record with Punahou High School

In what has become annual anticipation boys swimming and diving from 1958-86. of more historic performances, this Carmel's first championship in this string arrived November 22, 1986 when girls swimming and diving was a fall sport in Indiana. Five different coaches have directed the Carmel program during its run with Chris Plumb in charge for its last nine titles. Plumb has also guided the Carmel boys team to four championships in 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2015.

> "The team is excited for the IHSAA State Championship meet," Plumb. "We have put ourselves in a good place, but it means little unless we can execute on Friday night. The team wants the opportunity and is ready for the challenge. Our goal is to have all 27 spots move on to Saturday." Carmel qualified all 27 of its swims for state below the state cut time.

> There are 32 swimmers or relay teams in each of the 11 swimming events that will compete in tonight's preliminary round. The top 16 in each event return on Saturday, with the top eight swimming in the championship heat, and positions 9-16 competing in the consolation heat.

Claire Adams, with 12 state championships to her credit, could become the most decorated swimmer in state history on Saturday. She'll be shooting for former Greyhound Emily Ayers' mark of 14 blue ribbon medals between 1992 and 1995. Adams is the top seed in the 100 backstroke (54.21) and will look to become the first fourtime state champion in the event she set the state record in a year ago (51.99). Adams is not entered in the 200 freestyle this year after winning the last three state titles and setting a new state record in last year's prelims in days to IHSAA.org and tweeted at 1:45.09 but is set to go in the 100 freestyle @IHSAA1. Saturday's championship and where she had the state's fifth-fastest time last weekend.

Teammate and classmate Veronica Burchill is right behind with 11 state championships including a leg on each of Carmel's three relay teams which have swept the field the last three seasons. Burchill also is the defending state champion and state record holder in the 100 butterfly after her 52.26 last year. She had the second-best time (54.16) during Saturday's sectional behind Crown Point junior Hannah Kukurugya's 54.02. Kukurugya has stood on the podium's top step previously as well having won the 500 freestyle as a freshman in 2014. Sophomore per session or \$12 both days. Emma Nordin of Carmel is the defending champion in the 500 freestyle but is seeded fourth this year in 4:57.26. Franklin Community freshman Carla Gildersleeve is the top seed (4:55.51) in the event after helping the Grizzly Cubs win their first sectional crown since 1989 last weekend which ended Center Grove's 26-year stranglehold on the local sectional crown. Franklin Community swimmers captured five events, two by Gildersleeve, and all three relays for the school's third sectional crown in school history.

Hamilton Southeastern senior Robyn Clevenger is the top seed in both freestyle sprint races clocking a 22.60 in the 50 and 49.80 in the 100. The Royals are poised to have a strong finish after their sensational performance at their own sectional last Saturday.

Southeastern qualified 17 swims for state, with seven sectional champions and nine more making it to state by virtue of beating the state cut time. Another swimmer, Hannah Pugh, earned a callback in the individual medley; a callback happens when a swim is fast enough to fill a field of 32 in

Fishers junior Lauryn Parrish heads the field in the 200 free with a 1:49.03. Fishers classmate Lauren Edelman had the fastest time in the 200 individual medley in 1:59.77 and Yorktown freshman Emily Weiss heads into the weekend with the best time in the 100 breast in 1:01.59. All of those swims took place at the HSE sectional.

Fishers, in all, will have 16 swims compete at state. The Tigers had three sectional swimming champions, another eight qualify by the state cut time, and then had five more earn callbacks. Those were Carissa Schneider (200 and 500 freestyles), Ally Sperring (IM), Amilia Nusbaum (butterfly), Morgan Booth (500 free)

Westfield will have four swims at the state meet. Erin Verbrugge made the state cut time in the 500 freestyle to earn a spot at state, then received a callback in the 200 free. The Shamrocks also got callbacks in the 200 and 400 free relays.


