The Carmel girls swim team's 30-year journey to history finally reached the summit on Saturday, as the Greyhounds won their 30th consecutive state championship. Carmel's streak is now the longest of any sport in the United States, surpassing that of the Punahou (Honolulu) boys swim team, which had a 29-year consecutive state championship streak from 1958-86. Ironically, 1986 was the same year that the 'Hounds began their championship streak.

There was more history to be made as well. Carmel senior Claire Adams finished her high school career a perfect 16-for-16, as she won individual state championships in every event she entered. Adams also received the Mental Attitude Award. Her classmate, Veronica Burchill, won four state titles Saturday, giving her a total of 15 for her high school career.

Carmel wasn't the only story in Hamilton County swimming, though. Hamilton Southeastern finished as state runner-up in dramatic fashion, edging Chesterton by one-half point in the final event of the day, the 400 freestyle relay. Fishers placed 10th as a team, Noblesville continued its diving legacy with senior Megan Hayes placing seventh in that event, and Westfield freshman Erin Verbrugge emerged as a new star for the Shamrocks.



'Hounds pass Punahou...

Carmel goes "30 for 30"

The Carmel girls swim team won its record 30th consecutive state championship Saturday at the IUPUI Natatorium. The Greyhounds won in their usual dominating fashion, taking nine of the 11 individual swimming events.

The official Twitter hashtag for Saturday's record-breaking IHSAA state meet performance by the Carmel girls swim team was "30 for 30."

That, of course, brings to mind ESPN's popular series about historic sports moments and personalities. If ESPN is stuck on 29, then maybe it should give Carmel High School a call and give a profile to the Greyhounds.

Carmel dominated the state meet again, scoring 438 points, well-ahead of the 193.5 points scored by runner-up Hamilton Southeastern (the Royals' performance was worthy of its own "30 for 30" story - see Page 7.) The Greyhounds won nine of the 11 swimming events at the IUPUI Natatorium, setting a new record in the butterfly race in the process. "Today we just told them 'Let it rip," said Carmel coach Chris Plumb. "Yesterday, before the meet, we were extremely nervous. Just having the mounting and the building up to this point was a lot. But to go out today like we did, and they swam so well. It's just a tremendous feat to

these ladies to deal with what they dealt with. It's a great tribute to the program."

Carmel's program was anchored by two seniors who leave as the most decorated swimmers in IHSAA history. First there's Claire Adams, who finished her high school career "16 for 16."

A swimmer can participate in up to four events at the state meet, so Adams won four events in each of her four trips to the Natatorium. That includes



Royals are runners-up by half a point

Young swimmers, gather 'round for a tale about how every swim is important in an IHSAA state meet...

Actually, it's not a tale. It's real life, and Hamilton Southeastern achieved the goal for which it was working all season thanks to every single swim at Saturday's state finals.

The Royals edged Chesterton for second place at the IUPUI Natatorium by one half point. That's right. 0.5. Southeastern scored 193.5, the Trojans 193.

"We swam well enough to make our goal, which is to get second, to get a ring," said HSE coach Andy Pedersen. "This girls team was super-focused the whole year on one

the relay, while Chesterton placed third, and that gave HSE 34 team points to the Trojans' 32, and that was enough. While the placing was close, the Royals wound up outdistancing Chesterton by a strong margin: 2.99 seconds.

All four swimmers on the team were seniors: Kylie Sutherlin, Robyn Clevenger, Allie Barnes and Natalie Mudd.

"I think all four of those girls on that last relay are very deserving," said Pedersen. "Some amazing young women."

Girls state swimming...

Tigers fight their way to 10th, Hayes medals for NHS

Reporter Sports Editor After finishing as state runner-up last year, the Fishers girls swim team placed 10th at this year's IHSAA state finals.

While another Top 10 finish is a great achievement, especially for a team that is still very young in terms of competition, there was a vein of disappointment for the Tigers. Fishers had to deal with disqualifications in two of its relays over the course of the tournament series, but did the best it could.

"We swam all right," said Fishers coach Jay Chambers. "We're obviously very disappointed in the weekend. The entire championship series for the girls has been a series of setbacks, and I think they've come back from them very well."

The Tigers won medals in six events, including two in the individual medley. Senior Maggie Jahns and junior Lauren Edelman placed fifth and sixth respectively in that event. That followed a fourth-place finish for junior Lauryn Parrish in the 200 freestyle; she would later place sixth in the 100 free.

Jahns and Edelman would also both get second medals. Jahns took sixth in the backstroke, and Edelman was seventh in the breaststroke.

"I'm proud of the girls, I'm proud of their character," said Chambers. "I coach the best girls in the state, got the best coaching staff in the state, so I'm real happy where our program is at. Sometimes you have weekends like this."

While Jahns will be tough to replace, Chambers remains ever optimistic about Fishers' chances in the future. Parrish and Edelman will return, and there were other young swimmers at state as well.

HAYES GIVES THE MILLERS AN-OTHER DIVING MEDAL

Every year, it seems that a Noblesville diver steps up and does well at state.

This year, it was Megan Hayes' turn. The senior made the most of her first trip to the Natatorium, placing seventh in the diving event with a score of 425.45 points. Since the top eight in each event earn medals, Hayes got her moment on the podium.

"I'm so excited," said Hayes. "This is my first time ever being at state, and I honestly didn't know if I was going to make it through the first round of cuts. I'm just happy that I had a good day and did the dives how I can do them."

Hayes said she thought she performed better "than I have in past weeks" at state, and was able to keep calm throughout the meet.


