Is there any doubt?

One thing I've learned over the past few



years is the newspaper industry is always changing. Reporters come and go. Newspapers change ownership. Distribution and publication has changed to meet the needs of an internet driven society.

A little over four years ago when I pub-

lished my first newspaper, the Sheridan Reporter, I realized at some point the newspaper would need to change. It would need to grow.

About 1 year into publication the Sheridan Reporter expanded. We began covering all of northern Hamilton County and our banner changed to the Hamilton County North Reporter.

The expansion got the attention of newspaper readers from all over Hamilton County. People in Noblesville, Westfield, Fishers and Carmel wanted to read northern Hamilton County news and sports.

The expansion also caught the eye of my dad, Reporter Editor Don Jellison and Sports Editor Richie Hall. At that time both were working for another county newspaper. Both eventually made the decision to jump on board with the Reporter.

Having Don and Richie on staff, I knew another change needed to be made. I knew Don and Richie could not be chained to just northern Hamilton County. I also knew newspaper readers in Noblesville, Westfield, Fishers and Carmel would be unhappy if Don and Richie were no longer in their gyms and government meetings.

In 2012 the Reporter expanded coverage into all of Hamilton County. Another per? Is there any doubt?

name change followed. The Hamilton County North Reporter became what is known today as the Hamilton County Re-

The decision to go county-wide was something I discussed with northern Hamilton County government leaders, school officials and residents. All expressed the same concern. They were concerned their news would take second place to the news from the "big towns."

Since going county-wide I've often published the statement, "We are Hamilton County's hometown newspaper." That's a statement I take very seriously. It's our way of saying we are committed to publishing not just "big-town" news, but also news from "small-town" Hamilton County.

In news this past week we were the only Hamilton County based newspaper to cover the controversial Jackson Fire Territory meeting. We were first to report former Sheridan Police Chief Bill Curl was selected to fill a vacant town board position, the first to report Sheridan Community Schools was selected once again by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce as their Best Place to Work, the first to publish Sheridan resident Indiana State Trooper John Perrine had been promoted to the rank of sergeant and Reporter columnist Fred Swift produced an article on the Morse Lake silting problem.

This week in sports Don previewed the Hamilton Heights boys basketball team's chase for a conference crown. Richie Hall produced a terrific preview about Hamilton County wrestlers in the state tournament that featured a page wide picture of Hamilton Heights wrestler Clayton Cowan.

Considering, at the time of this writing, we are only two days into this week's publication schedule, that's a lot of northern Hamilton County news and sports.



Ecology focus for community input meeting for...

Carmel West Park master plan

On Tuesday, Feb. 23, Carmel Clay and the general public to provide input on Parks & Recreation will hold the second of three community meetings to provide information about the ecology of West Park and the surrounding area. The meeting will take place at 6:30 p.m. at the Meeting House, 3rd Floor, 2000 N. New Market St., Carmel, located within the Village of West

The community meeting will feature Steven Apfelbaum, a nationally acclaimed ecologist and author who specializes in ecological restoration, ecosystem assessment, alternative stormwater management, and conservation development. This educational topic builds upon the department's historical commitment to conservation and sustainable land management, which was recently recognized through the 2015 Barb King Environmental Stewardship Award from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA).

Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation is beginning the process of creating a new master plan to guide future development within West Park, the park system's only park located west of U.S. 31/Meridian Street. The original 75 acres for West Park was purchased in 1997 and developed in three phases between 2000 and 2002 based on the 1999 West Park Site Master Plan. Some of the original amenities, such as the playground and spray pad, are nearing the end of their anticipated life and will soon need to be replaced. The park was expanded though the acquisition of adjacent property in 2003 (5 acres) and 2005 (40 acres), accounting for its current 120 acres. The new master plan will incorporate and integrate designs for both the capital repair and replacement of existing infrastructure and expansion into the 45 undeveloped acres.

The master planning process is anticipated to take 6-9 months and will incorporate a variety of opportunities for both community leaders, neighbors, user groups,

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



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
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
