About my new phone? It arrived, by mail, less than fifteen hours after I figured out my password. How did that happen??? It must have liked my password.



The referendum route for more school funding at the local level came about in 2008 when the state legislature enacted a statute that allows each school district to go to its voters to seek funds beyond what it provided by state government. Most schools in the county have made use of this option.

While state funding covers a majority of instructional costs, local property taxes pay for other needs such as buildings, transportation and debt retirement as well as the optional referendum-approved taxes for instruction.



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

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Wrestling state finals

County gets four place winners

Hamilton Southeastern's Spencer Irick finished third at 182 pounds at this weekend's IHSAA wrestling state finals. Irick won two overtime matches during the state finals, including in the first round over the state's No. 2-ranked wrestler, and again in the third-place match.

There's always a different story behind

each medal that a wrestler earns at the IH-SAA state finals.

All four of Hamilton County's place winners at Saturday's meet at Bankers Life Fieldhouse each went a different route to get his medal. And all four seniors got a chance to put his mark on what was an exciting state tournament.

Westfield's Evan Eldred finished third at 138 pounds, with Hamilton Southeastern's Spencer Irick also placing third at 182. Carmel had two wrestlers at state: Nick Fox

finished fifth at 195 and Sam Hipple placed with Lee winning 4-2 and handing Eldred sixth at 220.

Eldred, the third-ranked wrestler at 138 according to the MyHouse Individual Rankings, had already started his tournament out with a bang Friday night, beating Jennings County freshman (and No. 19 ranked) Brooks Wathen by fall in just 50 seconds. Eldred continued to roll in the quarter-finals, where he took care of No. 14, Prairie Heights junior Riley Rasler in a 4-1 decision. That brought him to Brownsburg's Brayton Lee, a sophomore who is ranked No. 1 in the state. It was a battle,

just his second loss of the year.

Still, Eldred ended his career a winner, getting a pin over Crown Point senior Daylan Schurg, ranked ninth. Eldred got the fall right at the halfway point of the match, at three minutes.

season on a win," said Eldred, who is headed to Indiana University this fall and finshing his senior year at 42-2. "No one from Westfield has ever been able to get an odd number at state, so it was nice to finish my day with a win and end my senior year with a solid win."

Irick, meanwhile, got everyone's attention Friday night when he upset Chesterton junior Andrew Davison in "sudden victory" - he won 3-1 in overtime. Davison is ranked No. 2 in the state and in the top 20 nationally. Irick is rated 16th.

The HSE senior kept going in the quarter-finals, where Jay County senior Andy Kohler 3-2. That put Irick in the Corbin Maddox, ranked 15th. Finally, the Carmel senior semi-finals, where he took on Blake Rypel, a Cathedral senior who is ranked No. 1.

Rypel pinned Irick in 2:51 to advance to the final - he scored pins in his first three matches at state. That put Irick in the third-place match against a familiar opponent, Brownsburg senior CJ Damler, ranked sixth.

"I wrestled Damler (Hoosier Crossroads) conference finals," said Irick. "Things didn't go my way, I got an injury halfway through. My knee is still bothering me today."

Irick got out to an early lead, and held on even when Damler made a furious late run to tie the score at 5-5. But once in the overtime, Irick did it again: He got a takedown to win the match 7-5, and secure third place. It was the best finish for a Royal wrestler since Patrick Robinson placed third in 2010. Irick said he wasn't going to end his senior season with a loss - instead he finished with another big Derek Paz, who is rated 10th.
