Roads in unincorporated areas of Hamilton County are now under an orange level Travel Watch. The temperature has dropped and precipitation has frozen making roads slippery and hazardous in some areas of the county. A Travel Watch, which is higher than a Travel Advisory, means conditions are threatening to the safety of the public. During a Travel Watch only essential travel, such as to and from work or in emergency situations, is recommended and emergency action plans should be implemented by businesses, schools, government agencies, and other organizations.

Cigarette tax increase can close the gateway to harder drugs

Recently, the Indiana House of Representatives took a stand for Hoosiers health and approved a bill to increase the state cigarette tax by one dollar.

Much press and discussion currently surrounds heroin, opioid and other illicit drug abuse in Indiana, however we overlook that nicotine has been proven to be a gateway to harder drugs. Youth especially are susceptible and findings show that youth who smoke cigarettes are 32 percent more likely to use harder drugs at some point in the future. Youth are price sensitive and when cigarettes are cheap and easily accessible that are a higher risk of picking up the habit.

If we look to the future while focusing on the present the cigarette tax increase is a means of prevention not only for tobacco use, but other drugs use down the line. I encourage our Hamilton County Senators to make a lasting impact on the health of Indiana residents by voting to increase the state tobacco tax by one dollar.







Carmel hosts Brebeuf in finale

The Carmel boys basketball team will finish its regular season Friday by playing a team with an identical record.

Brebeuf Jesuit will come into the Eric Clark Activity Center as one of the top teams in Class 3A. The Braves are tied for 13th in the 3A media poll with a 13-8 mark. The Greyhounds are also 13-8 for the season.

The Carmel-Brebeuf rivalry has been a bit one-sided over the past few years. The 'Hounds have won four in a row over the Braves; their last loss to Brebeuf was on Feb. 25, 2011, and that was a close game, 48-46. Carmel then won back-to-back 4A state championships the next two years and beat the Braves by over 30 points both times. The 'Hounds were 57-32 winners two seasons ago and edged Brebeuf 39-37 last season.

The Braves are coming off an overtime loss to Louisville Ballard in their last game, 67-63. That stopped a three-game win streak over teams such as Tri-West, John Marshall and Heritage Christian. Brebeuf has gotten some wins over 4A teams, including Fort Wayne Snider, Roncalli, Warren Central and Anderson.

The Braves have a pair of players that are averaging in double figures. Senior Matt Broderick leads with 11.4 points per game, while junior Kobie McNeal is contributing 10.4 points per contest. Another senior, Tarig Eldosougi, is the leading rebounder with 6.5 boards per game. Broderick is averaging 6.0 boards per game.

Carmel's leading scorers are Sterling Brown, with a 13.4 points per game average. Preston Flamion is not far behind with 12.8 points per contest. Garrett Covington, a transfer from Georgia, has established himself as the leading rebounder with 5.9 per game. Flamion has 5.7 boards per game.
